## Hohlweck, Oelhafen T. Wayne Winners

Three candidates were running for Town Chairman in the Town of Wayne. The primary on Tuesday eliminated Leo Zehren. Carl Hohlweck received 154 votes, incumbent John Oelhafen 148 and Zehren 74.

Both Hohlweck's and Oelhafen's names will appear on the April ballot along with four running for the supervisory position: incumbent Merlin Ernisse, Ronald Panzer, Walter Theusch and Mark Strobel.

Incumbent Clerk, Orville Kern, is unopposed as are Treasurer Raymond Kudek and Assessor Alvin Wiesner, Sr.

## Hlavaty, Standish Eliminated In School Board Primary

The Tuesday primary eliminated two candidates from the Kewaskum School Board race. Francis J. Standish of R. 2, Kewaskum, received 69 votes and Donald Hlavaty of the Village of Kewaskum received 221 votes.

A total of 2,965 votes were cast with John R. Tessar of the Village of Kewaskum receiving the most with a total of 614. Next in order of total votes were Richard S. Theusch, Town of Wayne, 573; James Walters, Town of Wayne, 508; Jeanne Goeden, Town of Farmington, 353; Thomas W. Gundrum, Town of Farmington, 353, and Maryanne Merwin, Town of Farmington, 283.

These six will be on the April 5 ballot. The top two candidates will fill a three year term on the board and the third candidate's term will be for one year.

Ballots were canvassed on Feb. 16 and names were drawn for position on the April 5 ballot.

Justice of the Supreme Court—Travton L. Lathrop 36, William G. Callow 115, Robert W. Landry 132. Landry and Callow were the winners in the Justice Race and will vie in the April runoff.

## 2 Indiana Men Killed in Fiery Truck Crash

Two Indiana men were killed about 7:15 a. m. Saturday in a fiery crash between their pickup truck and a gasoline tank truck in heavy fog on Hwy. 41 near the intersection of Hwy. 28, about seven miles west of Kewaskum.

Dead at the scene were Lawrence E. Callahan, 27, of Indianapolis, driver of the pickup owned by Midwest Construction of Indianapolis, and Jim Rhodes, 27, of Danville, Ind., a passenger. Both died of severe burns when their truck and the tanker collided and burst into flames.

One witness said the bodies of the two men, still inside the pickup, were charred almost beyond recognition.

According to police, the tank truck, owned by Tractor Trailer Leasing Inc. of Fond du Lac, and operated by James G. Schneider, 28, of Sheboygan, was northbound on Hwy. 41 when it began to make a U-turn at the Hwy. 28 intersection. As the semi-trailer turned into the southbound lane of Hwy. 41, it was struck in the side by the pickup, which also was traveling south.

When the collision occurred, the tanker exploded and both vehicles burst into flames. The tanker was loaded with 9,000 gallons of gasoline. Schneider reportedly jumped from the cab of his truck and escaped injury.

## How Well Kewaskum Schools Meet Requirements Discussed

How well the Kewaskum Schools are meeting requirements of the 13 Standards was discussed at the Monday meeting of the board of education. The schools had recently been visited by a Department of Public Instruction representative, who then submitted his report to the district.

Two general areas were cited as needing changes in order for the district to be in complete compliance. Elementary guidance and some curricular areas were listed as needing some altering.

It was felt that additional time must be allotted to the elementary schools for guidance services. This will be considered by the board for various possible changes. The curricular areas will require additions to be made in written curricula for health, art, music, and physical education. Most of these required additions are minor, but health and music will need more extensive work.

The board considered a motion to eliminate the positions of psychologist and social worker, and to study the possibility of contracting with CESA for part-time services. Concern was again expressed about the entire special education program and its rapid growth. It was pointed out that it was late to begin such a study now because it would place the persons in those positions in a situation of not knowing whether they would have a contract for next year. The board decided to keep the positions and to make a study of the special education department, with a report due by January 1, 1978.

Two resignations were accepted by the board, both effective at the end of the school or contract year. Mrs. Evans, kindergarten teacher at Kewaskum Elementary School is retiring. Mr. Becker, agriculture teacher at the high school, also submitted his resignation, effective at the end of his contract. The board expressed its thanks to Mrs. Evans for many years of service to the

were called to the scene to extinguish the blaze. Firemen from Kohlsville, Kewaskum and Lomira were called to assist them. Kewaskum responded with some men and its foam equipment as well as its FWD truck and equipment truck. One fireman described the "flames as shooting as high as 25 feet." Fire fighters remained on standby for several hours before a truck arrived from Milwaukee to pump the remaining gasoline from the charred tank truck.

Southbound traffic on Hwy. 41 was detoured onto Hwy. 175 for several hours. The heat from the fire was so intense that holes were gouged into the pavement. Dodge County Highway Department crews were called to the scene to repair the road.

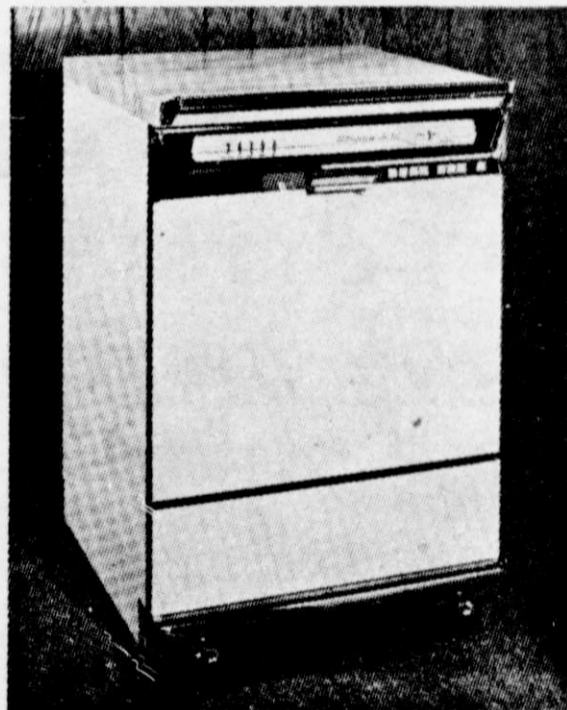
### LEWIS (JIM) HENDRICKS

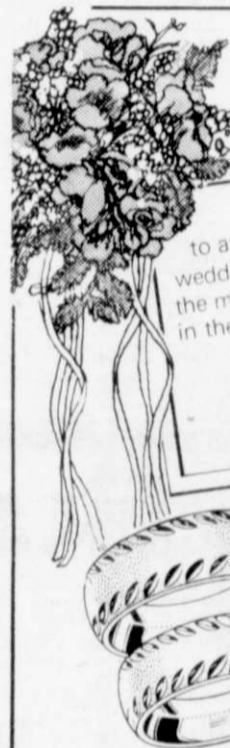

## Record Year Reported by Savings & Loan

West Bend Savings and Loan Association experienced a year of solid, balanced growth in 1976, according to association president Richard A. Larson, when reporting to the annual members meeting last week.

Larson indicated that 1976 was a record year in practically all areas for the association with assets increasing 17.2 per cent, savings 17.4 per cent and mortgage loans increasing 17.1 per cent.

"Basic growth alone is not a good indicator of how well a financial institution is doing," said Larson. "This time of year a lot of news reports show large growth figures and equate bigness with goodness.

"Growth that is too slow can indicate stagnation and lack of progress... but extreme growth can indicate lack of control." Larson reported that West Bend Savings felt it had achieved a balance with good growth, but not extreme expansion. As of Dec. 31, 1976, West Bend Savings had no foreclosures, no real estate owned or in judgment and no "problem" investments.

West Bend Savings earned 15.3 per cent on its net worth which is above the industry average. Net income before payment of interest to savers and reserve allocations came to \$3,078,787 and funds paid to savers totalled \$2,710,751, a new record.

At the annual meeting, directors H.C. Kaempfer, A.V. Weasler, Richard A. Larson and Lawrence W. Hillman were reelected. H.C. Kaempfer was also named to a newly created position of vice chairman of the board.

## KHS Observes Vocational Education Month in February

February has been designated as the month to recognize Vocational Education.

In Kewaskum High School vocational education involves 198 students enrolled in Vocational Agriculture and young adult farmers enrolled in programs through Moraine Park Technical Institute under the direction of Ralph Van Dixhorn.

For students in the industrial arts area of the high school, vocational education is "Learning by Doing." Fifty-six students are enrolled in welding, 180 students are in wood working classes, 159 students are running metal lathes and doing foundry work in metals I, II, III. Power mechanics includes the interest of another 68 students and the follow up course to power mechanics, in which 57 students are advancing their special interest and are receiving technical training. Plastics attracts 33 young people. One of the newest and most interesting courses for seniors is the building trades, frame construction course. This group is involved in "hands on" experience that ranges from building frame constructed garden houses to minor remodeling jobs. Thirty-three students took advantage of this course this year.

Graphic Arts is one of the most popular areas for boys and girls alike at KCHS with 208 students working at dif-

ferent levels from beginning photography to advanced printing.

Seventy-three students are engaged in electricity that ranges from basic electricity to household wiring. In addition many of these courses require the use of drawing boards and as a result 153 students are enrolled in different levels of drafting.

The business education department of the high school varies its training from beginning typing to a two-hour course in clerical office practice. A total of 126 students are taking advantage of these courses this year.

The home economics class has expanded its offering of cooking and sewing to such areas as child development and human relations. This year's enrollment in these areas include 532 students in half-year courses. Boys as well as girls are finding an interest in this area.

Many Kewaskum students

or graduates of these courses go on to advanced training in the state vocational system.

A six or seven mile drive will take them to West Bend for advanced work in metals or a half hour to an hour drive will take them to Fond du Lac or Beaver Dam to receive training in an area that may be their life's work.

The mission of vocational education is to prepare students for the world of work. This starts in high school and continues with adult education. Many of these programs include classes for enjoyment and use of leisure time.

Moraine Park Technical Institute offers classes in the Kewaskum area. They are BUSINESS EDUCATION: computer concepts, operating your own business, shorthand, supervisory training, typing, tax preparation, basic arts class, ceramics, beginning, chair decorating, crewel embroidery, decorative eggs, flowers in the home, furni-

ture refinishing, making something from nothing, metric systems, plans home and yard, rug hooking and braiding; HEALTH AND SAFETY: basic life support, defensive driving, fire training course first aid, gun maintenance and repair, school bus driver education; HOME ECONOMICS: cake decorating, clothing - sportswear, knits, crocheting, diet delight, gourmet cooking, home entertainment, household mechanics, knitting, sewing with knits, remodeling, upholstery; TRADE AND TECHNICAL: auto air conditioning, auto doctoring, diesel servicing, electricity, refrigeration, air conditioning, small engines, welding, woodworking.

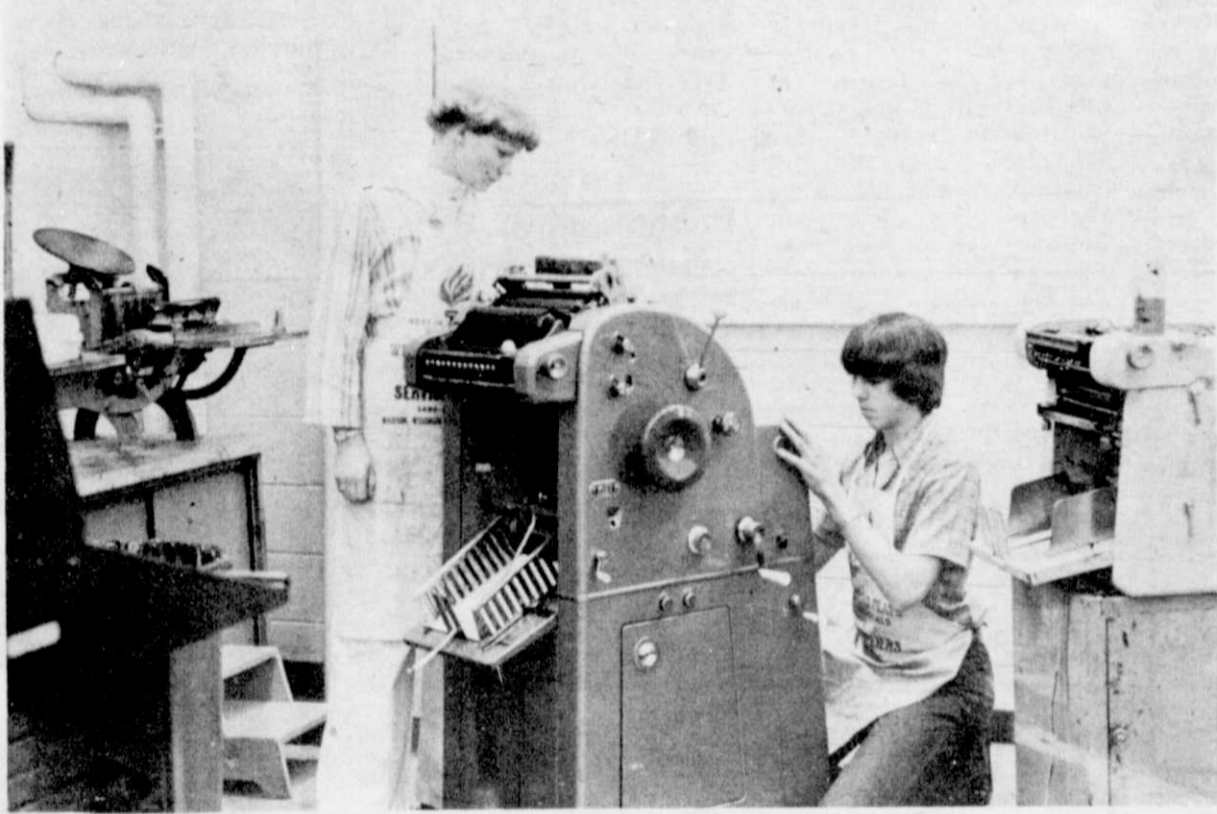

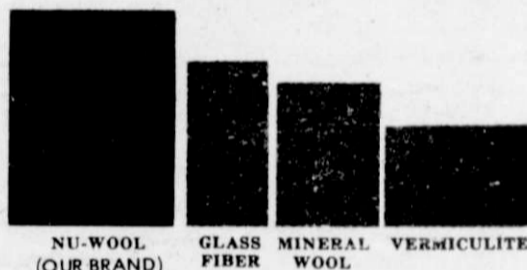
