Hlavaty, Standish Eliminated In School Board Primary

The Tuesday primary eliminated two candidates from the Kewaskum School Board race. Francis J. Standish of R. 2, Kewaskum, received 60 votes and Donald Hlavaty of the Village of Kewaskum received 221 votes.

A total of 2,965 votes were cast with John R. Tessar of the Village of Kewaskum receiving the most with a total of 614. Next in order of total were Richard S. Theusch, Town of Wayne, 573; James Walters, Town of Wayne, 508; Jeanne Goeden, Town of Farmington, 353 Thomas W. Gundrum, Town of Farminngton, 353, and Maryanne Merwin, Town of Farmington, 283.

These six will be on the April 5 ballot. The top two candidates will fill a three year term on the board and the third candidate's term will be for one year.

Ballots were canvassed on Feb. 16 and names were drawn for position on the April 5 ballot.

2 Indiana Men Killed in Fiery Truck Crash

Two Indiana men were killed about 7:15 a. m. Saturday in a fiery crash between their pickup truck and a gasoline tank truck in heavy fog on Hwy. 41 near the intersection of Hwy. 28, about seven miles west of Ke-

Dead at the scene were Lawrence E. Callahan, 27, of Indianapolis, driver of the pickup owned by Midwest Construction of Indianapolis, and Jim Rhodes, 27, of Danville, Ind., a passenger. Both died of severe burns when their truck and the tanker and burst into collided flames.

One witness said the bodies of the two men, still inside the pickup, were charred almost beyond recognition.

According to tank truck, owned by Tractor Trailer Leasing Inc. of Fond du Lac, and operated by James G. Scneider, 28, of Sheboygan, was northbound on Hwy. 41 when it began to make a U-turn at the Hwy. 28 intersection. As the semi-trailer turned into the southbound lane of Hwy. 41, it was struck in the side by the pickup, which also was traveling south.

When the collision occurred, the tanker exploded and both vehicles burst into flames. The tanker was loaded with 9,000 gallons of gasoline. Schneider reportedly jumped from the cab of his truck and escaped injury.

How Well Kewaskum Schools Meet Requirements Discussed

How well the Kewaskum Schools are meeting requirements of the 13 Standards was discussed at the Monday meeting of the board of education. The schools had recently been visited by a Department of Public Instruction representative, who then submitted his report to the district

Two general areas were cited as needing changes in order for the district to be in complete compliance. Elementary guidance and some curricular areas were listed as needing some altering.

It was felt that additional time must be allotted to the elementary schools for guidance services. This will be considered by the board for various possible changes. The curricular areas will require additions to be made in written curricula for health, art, music, and physical education. Most of these required additions are minor, but health and music will need more extensive work.

The board considered a motion to eliminate the positions of psychologist and social worker, and to study the possibility of contracting with CESA for part-time services. Concern was again expressed about the entire special education program and its rapid growth. It was pointed out that it was late to begin such a study now because it would place the persons in those positions in a situation of not knowing whether they would have a contract for next year. The board decided to keep the positions and to make a study of the special education department, with a report due by January 1,

Two resignations were accepted by the board, both effective at the end of the school or contract year. Mrs. Evans, kindergarten teacher at Kewaskum Elementary School is retiring. Mr. Becker, agriculture teacher at the high school, also submitted his resignation, effective at the end of his contract. The board expressed its thanks to Mrs. Evans for many years of service to the

Kewaskum responded with some men and its foam equipment as well as its FWD truck and equipment truck. One fireman described the "flames as shooting as high as 25 feet." Fire fighters remained on standby for several hours before a truck arrived from Milwaukee to pump the remaining gasoline from the charred tank truck.

Southbound traffic on Hwy. 41 was detoured onto Hwy. 175 for several hours. The heat from the fire was so intense that holes were gouged into the pavement. Dodge County Highway Department crews were called to the scene to repair the road.





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

Record Year Reported by Savings & Loan

West Bend Savings and Loan Association experienced a year of solid, balanced growth in 1976, according to association president Richard A. Larson, when reporting to the annual members meeting last week.

Larson indicated that 1976 was a record year in practically all areas for the association with assets increasing 17.2 per cent, savings 17.4 per cent and mortgage loans increasing 17:1 per cent.

"Basic growth alone is not a good indicator of how well a financial institution is doing," said Larson. "This time of year a lot of news reports show large growth figures and equate bigness with goodness.

"Growth that is too slow can indicate stagnation and lack of progress... but extreme growth can indicate lack of control." Larson reported that West Bend Savings felt it had achieved a balance with good growth, but not extreme expansion. As of Dec. 31, 1976, West Bend Savings had no foreclosures, no real estate owned or in judgment and no "problem" investments.

West Bend Savings earned 15.3 per cent on its net worth which is above the industry average. Net income before payment of interest to savers and reserve allocations came to \$3,078,787 and funds paid to savers totalled \$2,710,751, a new record


