AFS Seeks Home for Foreign Student for Coming Year Ballot Order for Election



Kewaskum has been fortunate to have had foreign students since 1961-1962 living in our community and attending our high school. Kewaskum's A. F. S. students are pictured above. We have had two International Fellowship Students who are not shown. They are Ana Rita Reyes, Chile, and Hector Vargas, Columbia.

Students, totalling 85,000 have lived with almost as many families throughout the world, all of whom were special people; however, the families make no special distinction as they accept students from other areas in the world. The A. F. S. program insists on this. The program develops relationships, shares educational institutions, families, cultures and makes a commitment for better understanding in the future

In the U.S., the A.F.S. program has grown from 50 students to 5,500 this year, and 60 countries participate. Caring people are vital to A.F.S. Important features of this program are sharing, growing and learning.

Christoph Obst is the A. F. S. student this year and he lives with the Warren Schmidt family, Auburn Lake. Christoph is from Regensburg. Bavaria, Germany. He has a younger brother and sister. His mother is a housewife and his father is a professor of geography at the Regensburg University Christoph has many interests but enjoys art the most. Those who have became acquainted with him are gaining some understanding of his nation. Germany, and its people.

Recently, Christoph was the guest speaker for the Senior Woman's Club and showed slides of his country. home and school. A question and answer period followed his talk

Christoph and his host brother, Eric Schmidt, domestic student last year to New Jersey, were guests at a family pot luck supper at the Peace Church, February 13. Eric was the first student in this area to be selected for the domestic program.

"Some of my friends thought I would come back a little Americanized as far as political ideas are concerned, but it's not true, because I've simply changed my concept of the American people from the wrong one to the right one. And in order to accomplish all the goals as an A.F.S.'r. I should tell the people back home what I've learned in a first-hand experience and try to breakup the misunderstandings and misconcepts that might exist among them. I've told people that Americans themselves are just won-

derful and I sincerely believe they are the nicest people I will ever be in touch with."

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

Archbishop's Fund Appeal Begins Sunday

The 1977 Archbishop's Fund which commemo-Appeal. rates Archbishop William E. Cousins' 50 years of priesthood and his 18 years of ministry in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee, begins Sunday, Feb. 27, in the 21 parishes and missions of Washington

Spurred by this year's campaign theme "My help is from the Lord," scores of leaders and workers will seek the county's \$131,000 goal from Catholics and other donors through personal calls at homes, appeals in churches, and solicitations by mail.

The Washington County goal represents a 3.6% share of the total Archdiocesan goal of \$3,565,000. The overall goal is 4.2 per cent higher that the 1976 goal, but only \$35,720 more than the amount subscribed in last year's Fund Appeal.



Indians Edged at Germantown, Defeated at Hartland Arrowhead

Third place Germantown led all the way but had to withstand a Kewaskum comeback to nip the Indians, 62-60 in a heartbreaker at Germantown Friday. Ironically the Indians lost by the exact same score in their first contest here in January

Kewaskum jumped off to a 17-11 lead in the first quarter and was ahead 23-15 in the second period when Leon Laatsch got into foul trouble, forcing the Indians into a zone defense. This opened the door for the Warhawks and they crept to within three points, 23-20. Just before the half, with Doug Wagen leading the way, Germantown took the lead, 28-26, at the intermission.

The Warhawks led throughout the second half, never by more than eight points. Late in the final quarter Germantown led 57-49. A three-point play by Laatsch and bucket by Dale Poling made it 57-54. Another basket by Laatsch put the Indians within one. The teams exchanged two baskets apiece and a free throw on an intentional foul gave the Warhawks their final two point win. With one second left, Laatsch let fly with a 40-footer which missed sending the game into overtime.

Wagen led all scorers with 17 points. Laatsch and Mark Tessar each had 16 for Kewaskum. Laatsch's early foul trouble hampered him and left him short of his 25-point average. Reserve Dale Poling's 12 points and his play in the third quarter kept the Indians in the game.

The freshmen (9-2) rallied to beat Germantown. 63-57. and the Jayvees lost. 57-42.

In other games Friday Slinger clinched at least a tie for the title by drubbing winless Pewaukee, 91-70, Hartland beat Grafton, 58-49, and the Mayville Cards topped Kettle Moraine, 49-47.

This is his last year of college wrestling. He will graduate this spring with a history major. "The team is improving so much, I wish I could be a part of it next year," he said.
