Exodus House for Rehabilitated Alcoholics Opens in Kewaskum

Exodus House, a transitional house for rehabilitated alcoholics, has found its niche in Kewaskum.

The President of the Board of Directors, Robert Kroncke, and the Director Thor Otto, appeared before the Plan Commission on Feb. 22 to discuss the possibility of opening an Exodus House in the former Rosenheimer Malt and Grain office building. Kroncke and his wife, Linda, are the owners of the building. which is a large house divided into three apartments and an office. The Kronckes are leasing the building to Exodus House.

Kroncke explained that the downstairs level of the building had been made into one unit by removing a door between the office and living quarters. There are still two apartments on the second floor.

Questions raised by Kroncke and Otto were a need for rezoning of the property or application of a conditional use permit. Their goal is to have eight residents and one resident manager living in the house in a family-like

atmosphere, not in separate quarters. Future plans would include re-doing the upstairs apartments into sleeping quarters for the residents. The first floor now consists of an office, kitchen, sitting room, two bedrooms and the resident manager's quarters. There is room for one additional bedroom. At the present time, there are two residents and the resident manager living in the house.

The Plan Commission explained to Kroneke and Otto that the village was in the process of changing the zoning and in the change, there provisions would be group homes etc. At the present time; there is none, but the ordinance reads that no more than four un-related people can occupy one unit. Since there are three complete units in the building, a total of twelve people could be housed there, under present zoning without violation, as long as the building stays as is.

The Plan Commission gave Exodus House the go ahead, with the stipulation that no (Continued on Page 2)

Leads to Fines

A large scale tavern scuffle in Kewaskum early Sunday morning grew into near riot proportions, with the Washington County Sheriff's Department, West Bend Police and Wisconsin State Patrol being called in to assist Kewaskum Police. Also assisting, after being called by the Sheriff's Department, were the Kewaskum Fire Department, Campbellsport Police and Dodge County Sheriff's Department. Other sheriff's departments reportedly helping or standing by were Ozaukee, Fond du Lac and Waukesha Counties.

Kewaskum Police Chief Donald Hlavaty reported that at closing time, following a dance at Jordan's tavern and hall, the pushing and shoving started, possibly with efforts to clear the tavern. A fracas resulted with officers trying to get people out and others apparently deciding were going to help their friends

Hlavaty requested disorderly conduct charges against two West Bend and Mayville young men. Additional charges were sought against the Mayville man. Dist. Atty. Fred A. Fink Jr. said he had requests for charges from county authorities on two or three other people.

The Kewaskum chief had no reports of serious injuries. One local officer who was on the scene had to be hospitalized the next day, the chief said. He came through the tavern fracas all right but then broke out in hives in reaction to some medication he was taking.

Three of the five people facing charges as a result of the near riot pleaded no contest Monday afternoon to disorderly conduct charges. The cases of two other defendants were adjourned to March 14.

Those pleading no contest were two Mayville men and a Horicon man. Each was fined \$91 plus \$9 court costs. The alternative would be 30 days (Continued on Page 5)

Near Riot Early Music Testing Program for Sunday in Village Fifth Grade Pupils Approved

On a voluntary basis, parents will be able to have a music test administered to their children at grade 5. The intent of the program is to provide parents with a better picture of the chances of success if their child enters the instrumental or vocal musical program.

The proposal for the music program had been made by Mr. Getter at the previous meeting. The board had requested additional information at that time, then at this meeting decided on the voluntary program rather than testing all fifth graders.

The board considered, in general, a number of proposals which had been made for the 1977-1978 school year. Discussion was held on beginning a curriculum study. The first step will be a recommendation to the board from a faculty committee on the method and procedures to be used in the study. At that point, a committee or committees involving parents and other group representatives will be appointed to work on the project.

Discussion was held on the proposal to contract with CESA for budgeting, accounting and payroll services Times will be set when board members can see and discuss the system with West Bend School representatives and then to see the computer programs at CESA or with a local demonstration.

A group of parents representing the Farmington PTO presented information to the board on lunch programs in Milwaukee and Cedarburg. A request was made to the board to study the information and to consider a dietician or nutritionist to head the local program. They expressed a feeling that menus could be improved and that ways could be found to cut costs.

The board also discussed a teacher sick leave request, but took no action. A Title II application for library funds was approved, and the board then went into closed session to discuss teacher negotiations, an employee contract compensation matter and a staff personnel matter.

structural change be made until the new zoning ordinance is in effect and Exodus House directors again appear before the commission with complete renovation plans. approved by the state and then submit an application for conditional use permit. which must be approved by the village board, followed by a public hearing.

Exodus House is the only transitional house for rehabilitated alcoholics in Washing ton County. There is a facility in Fond du Lac County, operating at canacity

Exodus is operating under the jurisdiction of the Washington County Council on Alcoholism for the first six months of their existence and will then become a senarate entity. It is a non-profit organization, operating on funds obtainable from state contributions, purchasing of service contracts from the 51.42 boards of Washington and Ozaukee counties. These boards are responsible for allocating state funds for alcoholism in both counties

Residents will also be required to pay room and board in accordance with their ability to pay.

A grant from the Wisconsin Council of Criminal Justice enabled the present work to be done on the house and another grant from the Wis-

Exodus House will be a residence for eight recovering male alcoholics from the ages of 18 to 60. Their stay will be from one to three months. While residents, they will be employed or engaged in some type of vocational training. All residents are required to attend three AA meetings per week. The use of alcohol and non-prescribed drugs is prohibited, and the use of such would mean, the immediate removal from the house.

Referrals will come from the Department of Social Services, Department of Vocational Rehabilitation, Washington County Council on Alcoholism, county courts, probation and parole boards and county doctors.

The resident manager is Mates Qualheim, who was a resident manager at Waybridge in Kenosha for three years. He is certified in the state of Wisconsin by attending seminars and classes. The state require a minimum of forty hours of credited study every two years to be certi-

Thor Otto, Director of Exodus House, has taken courses at University of Wisconsin, Milwaukee and Madison on counseling of alcoholics and their families and was affiliated with the Washington County Council on Alcoholism before taking over directorship of Exodus House. He lives in Kewaskum with his wife and four children.



in jail.

The other two defendants were from West Bend and Theresa. The Theresa man faces an additional charge of criminal damage to property, for allegedly denting a radar set and breaking a mirror in a Kewaskum squad car. The West Bend man was released on a \$200 personal recognizance bend and the Theresa man on a \$300 bend.

According to complaints, Kewaskum officers went to Jordan's in response to a call for assistance from the owners. The crowd refused to disperse on the officers' request. When sheriff's deputies arrived somewhat later, they encountered a large unruly crowd of about 75 - 80 people pushing and shoving police officers, the complaint said. The crowd was described as "hostile and threatening." The defendants were said to have refused to leave the tavern and pushed and shoved officers or tried to pull officers off other people being handcuffed.





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ELECTION NOTICE VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT

County of Washington) State of Wisconsin

Any qualified voter, unable to get to the polling place on election day, may ask to vote by absentee ballot. A qualified voter is one who is a U.S. citizen, will be 18 years of age or older on election day, and who has resided in the ward or aldermanic district where voting is desired to be accomplished for at least 10 days prior to the election. If the voter resides in a municipality which requires voter registration, then registration is also a requisite for the voter who is qualified in other respects.

To obtain an absentee ballot, contact the clerk in the city, village or town in which you reside by mail or telephone, or in person, and request an application form. After properly completing and returning the application to the municipal clerk, an absentee ballot will be sent to you along with a postage pre-paid return envelope or given to you if the application is submitted to the clerk in person. The deadline for receipt of the application by the municipal clerk is 5:00 p.m. on the day before the election.

Absentee ballots can be marked at home anytime after they arrive in the mail. They can also be marked right in the clerk's office if submitting the application in person. If returning the ballots by mail, the affi-davit-certificate must be properly completed and wit-nessed by two persons. If returning the ballots in per-son, the affidavit-certificate must be properly completed and subscribed and sworn to by the clerk or the deputy clerk who are authorized to administer oaths. In either case the marked, sealed ballot must be in the hands of the issuing municipal clerk on or before election day. Any absentee ballot received at the polling place after the polls close or received in incomplete or improper form cannot be counted


