The Kewaskum High School girls' basketball team is going to the State Tournament at the University of Wisconsin Fieldhouse at Madison this weekend. It is the first time ever a Kewaskum basketball team has gained a berth in the state meet.

The Kewaskum girls earned the privilege to go to Ma dison by winning the Kewaskum Sub-Regional Thursday night, beating Lomira, 53-43: winning the Kiel Regional semi-final Saturday night. beating Random Lake's Lakeshore Conference champions easily, 43-26, and winning the Kiel Regional final Monday night, beating Kiel, 48-43.

This advanced the girls to the Kewaskum Sectional (also a first for Kewaskum) on Friday night and Saturday Here Kewaskum beat Pewaukee Friday, 55-47, in the semifinals and then took the Sectional championship by whipping Clinton Saturday afternoon, 49 - 38, in the fi-

Kewaskum's avenging an-

kee during the regular season by close scores and last year they lost to Clinton in the Sectional finals at Edgerton. This time the tables were turned.

Clinton, second in the state meet a year ago, reached the Sectional finals by defeating Columbus in the nightcap game here Friday, 41 - 32. after Kewaskum had done away with Pewaukee. Clinton came a long way for the Sectional, being located in southern Wisconsin near the Illinois state line, and brought them.

Kewaskum is one of only four teams in the entire state in Class B still left in tournament competition. The others are Cuba City, Mondovi and Omro

In their first game at Madison the Indians will be paired against Cuba City. which has the best record could be the strongest team in the meet. They are undefeated with a perfect 20-0 record. Kewaskum is 15 - 6. Mondovi 12-8 and Omro 19-2.

Potatoes should be smooth and clean when bought. Do not buy any that show the slightest amount of green; they are likely to be bitter.





Lt. Col. Liepert Honored by National Guard



Lt. Col. Gerald C. Liepert, Port Washington, serving on active duty at Headquarters Fifth Army, Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio, has the distinction of being the only Army National Guard officer nationwide selected to attend the National War College 10-month course beginning in August, a release this week said.

Liepert's wife is the former Judy Westlund of Muskego. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Anton Westlund, live there on Muskego Drive. Willard Liepert, Liepert's father, lives on R2, Kewaskum.

He was selected by the National Guard Bureau and notified by the Wisconsin state adjutant general. There will be 160 students taking the course.

Assigned to Fifth Army since January 1974, he has served as National Guard training officer, office of the deputy chief of staff for training.

The National War College, Fort Lesley J. McNair, Washington, Dc., is a joint educational institution of the National Defense University under the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

The college's mission is to prepare selected personnel of the armed forces and other agencies of the government to exercise joint highlevel policy, command and staff functions, and to perform strategic planning duties in their respective departments. It also develops understanding of those agencies of government and those factors of power potential which are

essential to the national defense effort.

Inducted into the Army in 1951, Liepert was assigned to the 45th Infantry Division, Fort Polk, La. He served with the 816th Field Artillery Battalion in Darmstadt, Germany, 1952-53.

He received a direct commission as a second lieutenant of infantry in 1957 while serving with Company K, 426th Infantry, 32nd Division, Wisconsin Army National Guard. The same year he was graduated from Lakeland College, Sheboygan, Wis., with the B.A. degree in German and English languages.

Liepert was one of the original staff members at Muskego High School when it opened in September 1957. He taught German and organized and directed the "Ambassadors of Youth" exchange program with a school in Germany, 1960-64.

From 1967-73 Liepert was with the 64th Support Center, Rear Area Operations, Wisconsin Army National Guard. In addition to his duties as liaison officer, security plans and operations section, he was an instructor at Wisconsin Military Academy (State Officer Candidate School); advisor to the command senior noncommissioned officers in forumulating, establishing and operating the Command Noncommissioned Officer School; and command recruiter.

Before coming to Fifth Army, he was executive officer of the 2nd Battalion, 128th Infantry, Wisconsin Army National Guard. His

civilian occupation is German language teacher and head of the department of foreign languages for the Port Washington public schools.

Motion was made by Trustee Strack that permission be granted with the stipulation that the welding unit be used for hobby purposes only and in the event that there are complaints from neighbors regarding electrical interferences or noise. the use of the unit must be discontinued. The motion was seconded by Trustee Danielsen. Unanimous vote

Building permit applications as follows were approved and the Commissioner was authorized to issue the proper permits upon payment of the required fees.







Indians Reach Finals in Regional Tournament

The Kewaskum Indians boys' team also did very well in WIAA tournament play, especially considering they placed in a tie for sixth place with a 4 - 10 record in the Scenic Conference. With two tourney victories and one defeat they wound up with an overall 8 - 13 mark.

The Indians defeated Random Lake of the Lakeshore Conference 77-64, in the Kewaskum Sub-Regional Thursday to advance to the Regional at Lomira. Saturday night they also beat Lomira of the Flyway Conference, 75 - 62 to reach the finals Monday night. After giving them a battle, the Indians lost to Sheboygan Falls in the finals, 67-58. Falls gained a berth in the finals by beating North Fond du Lac Saturday, 73 52, after downing Campbellsport in the Kiel Sub-Regional,

Kewaskum needn't feel ashamed in losing to Sheboygan Falls. The Falcons were Class B state champions in 1974 and 1975, and reached the Sectional finals last year at Whitewater before losing to state champion St. Francis. This will be their fourth straight year in the Sectionals, in which they meet Slinger's Scenic co-champions in their opener Friday.

In the victory over Random Lake in Thursday's Sub-Regional here, high scoring Leon Laatsch was held to 16 points by a Ram box-and-one. but guard Kevin Darmody took up the slack and scored 24 points, his highest output of the season, to pace Kewaskum. Darmody scored 16 of his 24 points in the third quarter. when the Indians took charge.

It seemed Kewaskum took Random Lake lightly but found out the Rams were giving it their all. The score was tied at the quarter, 10 - 10. The Indians loosened up to take a 25 - 18 lead in the second quarter but the last few minutes were all Rams and they took a 26 - 25 halftime lead.

It was tied at 37 - 37 when Darmody took charge. The small guard bit on a variety of shots to out the Indians head by 10 The Rams came back again to come within one but then Kewaskum pulled away for good.

Mark Tessar added 14 points and Jim Donath 10. Soph Jim Melis did a great job with 25 points for the Rams and Jim Stuerwald had 20. The shorter Rams outrebounded the Indians, 35 - 20. Lomira players (Kewaskum's next openent) scouted the game and were not shown near the capabilities of the Indian players

Leon was held scoreless the remainder of the first half. but six other Indians scored as Kewaskum broke away to a secure 12-point lead at halftime. 38-26.

Despite his slow start. Laatsch broke loose in the second half to score points, giving him a game high of 22. This gave the Kewaskum standout 491 points in 20 games, a 24.6 average Seven other Indians scored as Kewaskum made 33 of 65 shots, a crisp 50.8 per cent. Tessar chipped in with 18 points and Darmody added

Sheboygan Falls and Ke waskum also met in the Regional finals last year, with this one going to the Falcons. too. Monday night's 67 - 58 win over the Indians gave them yet another championship and their fourth straight trip to the Whitewater Sectional. The Falcons seem to catch fire at tournament time.

Falls broke open the game in the fourth quarter, breaking away from a slender twopoint lead (44-42) after three quarters to outscore Kewaskum in the final period, 23 16. The free-wheeling Falcons started the fourth quarter like gangbusters, scoring 12 straight points. Kewaskum, which hung in the game grimly, could not recover.
