Village Board Tables Decision on Re-Appraisal of Village Property

At Monday night's meeting, the Kewaskum Village Board tabled until the next meeting, a decision on a re-appraisal program for all village owned property based on an explanation from Gene Bohn, insurance agent.

Bohn explained that the village is currently under a blanket coverage, amounting to \$2,938,000 on all buildings and contents, including the lift stations. Approximately \$1,700,000 of that amount is under appraisal, the remaining \$1,238,000 has never been incorporated into appraisal to set a value.

The last appraisal was done eight years ago and since that time values have doubled. Bohn explained that the insurance company wants a re-appraisal of several large items such as the sewage plant, on which the original cost was updated and the fire station and village garage, which never had an on-site inspection but was covered by using the construction costs.

The cost of re-appraisal would be \$2,475 plus \$231 for upkeep service after the first year. The \$231 figure would cover an annual upkeep service until another appraisal is ordered. Bohn stated that the cost would raise approximately \$300 if the board waited another year.

Bohn also stated that the village's umbrella premium of \$1,000,000 excess liability is due May 12. This year instead of renewing the policy, a new application must be submitted to the company. The previous cost of this policy was \$203 per year and when additional ambulance coverage was added the cost rose to \$1,000 per year.

President Charles Miller asked Bohn what he figured the cost would be now? Bohn explained it wasn't a matter

of additional premium, but whether the company would renew. He stated the village did have a good relationship with Employer's Mutual Casualty of Des Moines, Iowa, and he didn't feel there was any cause for worry. "I do feel the cost might triple," Bohn explained. Miller stated "if it's anything under \$20,000 that would be wonderful." Bohn was instructed to

Then there was the Rev. Paul Hoenecke of Kewaskum, whom she was a little reluctant to name. He was a brother-in-law of Michael Dorn, a Random House editor who worked with Betty on the original version of the book. Through Patty Darin (Edwards), a cousin in Brookfield, she was put in touch with a literary agent, Jacquelyn M. Krill, who stood by her on the long road to publication. And there were others she wanted to praise.

Betty was elected to the board of the United Cerebral Palsy Association of Southeastern Wisconsin for the first annual Cerebral Palsy Telethon, March 26 and 27. The Telethon will be broadcast over WISN-TV, Channel 12, beginning Saturday at 10:30 p. m. and continuing live for 19½ hours to Sunday at 6 p. m.

The book "Bittersweet Triumph" is available at Tri-County Book Shelf in West Bend.

Recently, in celebration of Betty's book, there was a big party for all of them at the Wigwam in Kewaskum, with William Edwards, its owner and a son of "Uncle Doc," as host. "Uncle Doc" and "Aunt Erna" were present, of course. There were flowers and other gifts.

have the application ready for the April 4 meeting.

Pete Albers, Sanitation Engineer, requested the board contact the village engineer for cost quotes on re-amping the chlorination building and laboratory. Albers stated that it might be better to move the lab into the old building instead of enlarging the lab. There will be more stringent testing regulations when the new discharge permit comes out Albers explained, and we have 90% of the equipment needed in storage right now.

Building permits for Leroy Zipperer, John Baitinger and Pro-Bilt Inc., all for one family residences were approved.

Dan Schmidt, Library

Board Chairman, stated that the library added 319 adult volumes and 221 juvenile volumes to their inventory last year for a total of 13,046 volumes. A total of 15,512 volumes were loaned out.

Gregor Nigh read Recreation Director Tom Larsen's report on the men's slo-pitch softball program for the summer. Projected cost for the program is \$1,095 which covers umpire fees and lighting. Larsen would like the entry fee raised so this figure can be met. At this time an exact fee figure cannot be set, since number of teams involved have not been determined.

Miller stated, "normally at this time we would adjourn to closed session as indicated on the agenda," but since an article appeared in the West Bend News stating that a discussion of state funding for the park as a closed session item may be in violation of

the open meeting law, "we won't discuss it at an open meeting or closed meeting" he stated. Miller stated we will put it on the agenda for the April 4 meeting. At that he adjourned the meeting.

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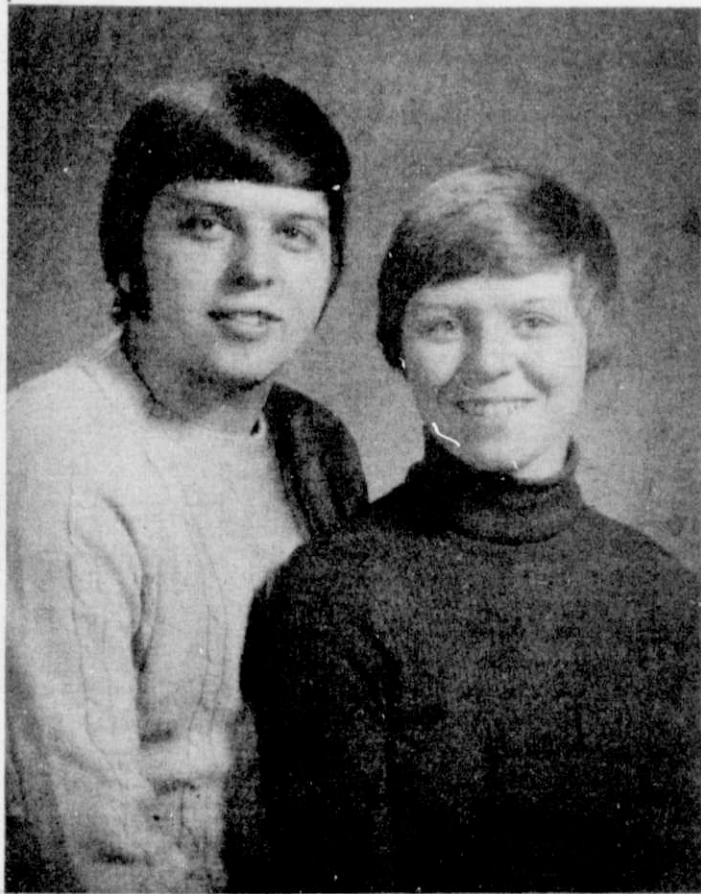

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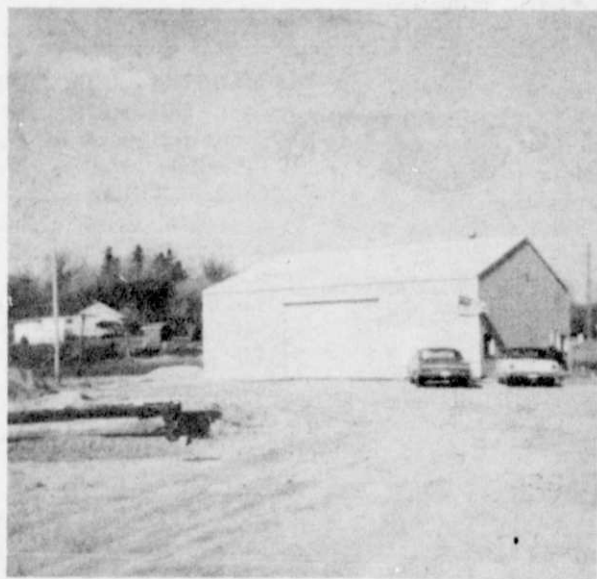

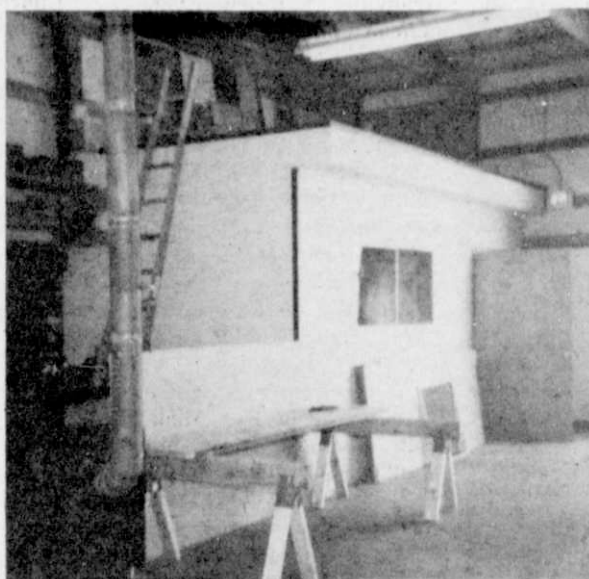

The Kewaskum Town Board initiated the new office area, recently constructed at the Town Building on Hwy. 45 just north of Kewaskum, by holding their regular meeting there. Up to this time all meetings were held at the Town Clerk's home. The

meetings have always been open to the public, but the comment had been made several times that people felt funny going to a private home for a public meeting.

The Town Building was built four years ago, at which time a truck with snow

Aug. 7 - 12 — Man and his Environment

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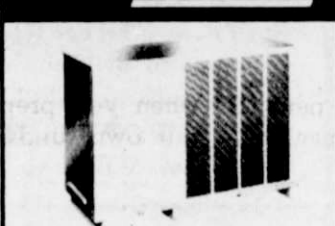

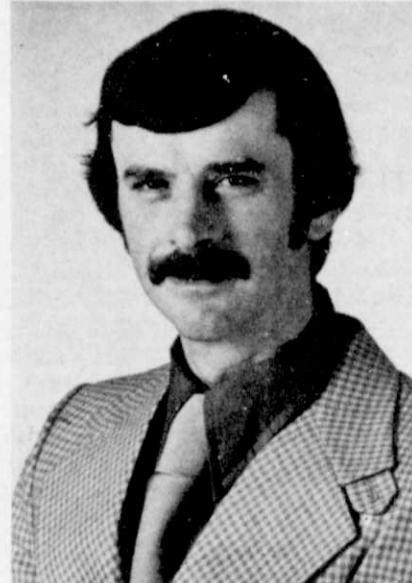

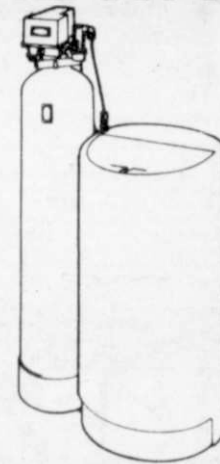

INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

The following instructions are given for the information and guidance of electors:

(a) Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his name and address before receiving the ballot from the ballot clerk. The initials of 2 ballot clerks must appear on the ballot. Upon receiving the ballot, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and mark his ballot. A ballot clerk may inform the elector of the proper manner for marking a ballot, but he shall not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

(b) To vote for a person whose name is printed on the ballot, make a cross (X) or mark in the square after the name of the person for whom you desire to vote. To vote for a person whose name is not printed on the ballot, write the name in the blank space provided for the purpose.

(c) The ballot should not be marked in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than 3 ballots shall be issued to any one elector. Not more than 5 minutes' time shall be allowed to mark the ballot. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

(d) After the official ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed indorsements and ballot clerks' initials on the outside do show. After folding the ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, give his name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him the ballot to be placed in the ballot box, and leave the polling place promptly.

(e) An elector may be assisted by 2 election officials of different political parties in marking the ballot if he declares to the presiding official that he is unable to read or that due to physical disability he is unable to mark his ballot. If an elector declares that he is visually handicapped, he may have anyone assist him in marking his ballot. The presiding official may administer an oath as to a person's disability.

(f) Any qualified elector who is absent, or expects to be absent from the village in which he is a qualified elector, or who, because of sickness or physical disability cannot appear at the polling place on election day, may vote at such election by means of an absent voter's ballot to be secured upon application to the Village Clerk, not more than sixty days and no less than three days, or by personal application, not later than the close of office hours on the day prior to such election.

County is disaster area

Washington County is one of 27 Wisconsin counties declared Economic Injury Disaster Areas by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the U.S. Small Business Administration.

The action was taken because of drought (natural disaster) during the 1976 crop year, which ended Dec. 31, 1976. The declaration authorizes SBA to make or guarantee long-term loans to commercial businesses affected by the disaster. Agricultural enterprises and farmers should contact the Farmers Home Administration. The interest rate on any SBA share of the Economic Injury Disaster Loan (EIDL) is six and five-eighths per cent.

To qualify for such a loan a commercial business must show not only a loss of revenue, but must have been placed in a jeopardized position as a result of the loss. Applications under this program will be accepted until Nov. 22, 1977.

Facsimile Ballot Notice of Town of Kewaskum Spring Election

April 5, 1977

Notice is hereby given of a spring election to be held in the Town of Kewaskum, Washington County, on the fifth day of April, 1977, at which the officers named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office to be voted for, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office in the sample ballot below.

INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

Voting instructions shall be given substantially as follows:

Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his name and address before receiving the ballot from the ballot clerk. The initials of two ballot clerks must appear on the ballot. Upon receiving the ballot, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and mark his ballot. A ballot clerk may inform the elector of the proper manner for marking a ballot, but he shall not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

At a non-partisan election, the elector shall place a cross or other mark in the square at the right of the candidate's name for each office for whom he intends to vote or insert or write in the name of his choice for a candidate.

If the elector spoils a ballot, he shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed to mark the ballot. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After the official ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed indorsement and ballot clerk's initials on the outside do show. After folding the ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, give his name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him the ballot to be placed in the ballot box, and leave the polling place promptly.

An elector may be assisted by two election officials of different political parties in marking the ballot if he declares to the presiding official that he is unable to read or that due to physical disability he is unable to mark his ballot. If an elector declares that he is visually handicapped, he may have anyone assist him in marking his ballot or operating a voting machine. The presiding official may administer an oath as to a person's disability.

The following is a facsimile of the official ballot:

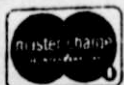
