Spring Election Tuesday, Apr. 5

Tuesday, April 5, is Spring Election Day in Wisconsin.

Locally ballots will be cast for school board members, village and town officials, Justice of the Supreme Court, State Superintendent of Public Instruction circuit judge, county judge and on five referendum questions.

The six candidates for the three school board member posts are John R. Tessar, Maryanne Merwin, James Walters, Richard S. Theusch, Thomas W. Gundrum and Jean E. Goeden. A facsimile ballot appeared in last week's issue.

Kids in the age group from 6 to 9 years will hunt eggs in that area of the village park located on the east side of the river. Age group 5 and under meet in the park on the west side of the river.

New Band Uniforms Modeled, Purchased at School Board Meeting

Band uniforms were modeled at the meeting of the Kewaskum School Board Monday evening, as samples were presented by two companies. The uniforms shown were designed for the Kewaskum band, and the board selected the one from Macmillan Ward Ostwald, Inc. The total cost is \$143.40 per uniform, \$5.57 less than the bid submitted by Sol Frank Co. Both include delivery charges, and delivery is expected within 75 to 90 days.

The new uniforms include slacks, hat and two tops, one for concert appearances and one for marching. A total of one hundred band uniforms will be ordered, along with one drum major uniform.

Contracting with CESA for budgeting, accounting and payroll beginning July 1, was approved. It had been discussed at previous meetings by the board, and members had seen a demonstration and discussion at the March 14 meeting. Individual members had visited the West Bend Schools to talk with officials on the present CESA system, and had visited Gehl Company to observe the computer installation there.

Primary reason for considering the system was the new state accounting program to be instituted fully by 1979-80. It will require much greater detail and will be nearly impossible to accomplish without some type of computer capability. Costs will run to about \$7,000 on a yearly basis, with a one-time expenditure of some \$5,800 for the local computer terminal.

Anne Glisch, teacher at Farmington, was given the 1976-77 Junior Chamber of Commerce Outstanding Teacher of the Year Award. The presentation was made by Jerry Buchel. Mrs. Glisch has taught in the Kewaskum Schools for 4½ years, having started January 22, 1971. The board voted its congratulations to her for the award and for her outstanding teaching.

One staff member was added at the Middle School for 1977-78, and three at the high school. The net increase district-wide will be 1.8 teachers, since two intern positions at the high school will be dropped for next year, along with one elementary position. The larger enrollments are now moving into the middle school-high school ages, while enrollments are dropping somewhat in the elementary grades. The middle school addition will be a general teacher. At the high school there will be one English-Social Studies position added, one

Science-Mathematics and one Agriculture-Industrial Arts.

The board asked Mr. Brenholt, superintendent, to prepare a report on the events which took place at the Farmington School when a visit was made by two newspaper reporters, Mrs. Harlow and Mrs. Schmidt. They had gone there to gather information concerning some questions on the lunch program which had been raised at a previous board meeting. At a later meeting, a statement had been made that Mrs. Harlow had gone through some papers on the desk in the school office. This was denied by Mrs. Harlow.

In other actions, the board approved payment to the gymnastics coach of \$515; reviewed the auto mechanics program and had no objection to purchasing additional old cars to work with, and changed the middle school, high school parent-teacher conferences to 6-9 p. m. on April 5, instead of April 6. The board then adjourned to closed session to discuss a personnel matter, teacher negotiations and administrator salaries.

Historical Society Receives \$200 Gift; Museum to Open

The Kewaskum Historical Society, Inc. received a \$200 gift from Mrs. Myron Perschbacher in memory of her husband, to purchase local historical articles. The Society extends their sincere thanks for this gift.

The Historical Society Museum, a rural style museum, is located on Parkview Dr., one block south of Hwy. 28 east (Main street) on the banks of the Milwaukee River, Village of Kewaskum.

The museum consists of portions of a typical Wisconsin cheese factory, old post office, old school room, general store area, fire house area with hand pumper from the 1800's, old farm machinery plus old tools and an old home set up with kitchen, bedroom and parlor.

The museum will open for the spring season on the third Sunday of April and May from 1 to 4 p. m. During the summer season, opening will be every Sunday from Memorial Day weekend to the Labor Day weekend, 1 to 4 p. m. The fall season will be the third Sunday of September and October, 1 to 4 p. m.

Group tours can be arranged by calling 414-626-4656. Admission is free, but a donation of at least 25c per individual is appreciated to help cover expenses.

Work Starts on Hwy. 45 Bridge

Road construction is expected to start the week of March 28 on reconstruction of the US 45 bridge over the Milwaukee River, located about 3½ miles north of Kewaskum in Fond du Lac County. The work will consist of removing the old two-span bridge and replacing it with one-span structure, the state Department of Transportation has announced.

The work will be done under a contract let to Ralph Morello, Milwaukee, at an estimated cost of \$129,391. Financing will be shared on approximately a 75-25 percentage by the federal government and the State of Wisconsin respectively from funds provided primarily by gas taxes.

US 45 will be closed to through traffic during construction operations, with access only to local property owners. It is anticipated that US 45 will be reopened in late summer. The marked detour will follow County "V" from the south to State 67 in Campbellsport, then follow State 67 northwest to US 45.

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Introducing Your Village, Town Candidates

Candidates seeking office in the April 5 election for the Village of Kewaskum include Charles Miller, running unopposed for Village President. Miller had served 13 years on the board, took time off and now has served for four years. He would be in the office of President for the third consecutive term.

Candidates for trustee includes incumbent Daniel Schmidt who is seeking his third term of office. He is an expeditor at the Wisconsin Electric Company in West Bend, married and has two children. This past year he was chairman of the Park Committee. Schmidt stated that he enjoys being on the board, helping the community and he would like to see the park project finished. He stated, "I would like to see continuing progress for betterment of the community."

The other incumbent is Dave Nigh, who is seeking his second term on the board. Dave is Vice-President of Kewaskum Frozen Foods, married and the father of five children. Nigh states that "he likes the job and would like to continue working on the park project."

Roger Schmitt is trying for the second time to gain a seat on the board. He ran unsuccessfully in 1975 and has been attending every village meeting in the past 3½ years. He is employed at Herriges Oil Inc., is married and has three children. Schmitt states that "he would like to try to keep taxes where they are or down." "Win or lose," he stated, "I will still keep coming to the meetings."

Oscar Knoeck also ran unsuccessfully in 1975. He is employed at Gruber Tool & Die in West Bend, is married and has two children. He is an EMT in the Kewaskum Fire Department. Knoeck stated that "he feels there should be newer faces on the board, someone who can represent the younger homeowners."

Mark Kral is seeking his first try at public office. He is employed at Dadson in Grafton and is married and has one child. Kral stated that he is running "to have more of an involvement in the community." He too has been attending village meetings as an interested citizen.

The Town of Kewaskum has a two way race for Town Chairman. Incumbent Mervin Thompson is being challenged by George Allmann.

Thompson is seeking his third term. He retired from Winninghoff & Bradley in 1972 as General Superintendent of Construction. He then worked on St. Joseph's Community Hospital three year construction project. He was building consultant for the Kewaskum High School and Middle School project and the fall and spring of 1976 served with the Washington County EPA Project. He is married and has three grown children.

When asked why he was

seeking his third term, he answered "I don't know." He then said, "to be serious, I started a project four years ago of setting up equipment and place for the Town of Kewaskum, also a project of improving roads in the town and removal of stumps and I would like another whack at it."

Challenger George Allmann graduated from Plymouth High School, Lakeland College with a BA and University of Wisconsin - Oshkosh with a Master's Degree. He teaches remedial reading and advanced composition at Kewaskum High School. He has lived in the Kewaskum area for nine years, is married and has one daughter. Allmann stated that "I was contacted by a number of people to run, I feel it is time for a change in leadership." Allmann feels that the roads are plowed too late in the day and not properly maintained and he stated that he has heard this comment from other people in the township.

He stated that he has gone door to door to over 200 homes talking to people and has sent a letter to the town constituents.

Incumbent Jerome Herriges is running for supervisor. He held this position for 11 years, first being appointed in 1966 to fill the unexpired

term of Bill Becker, who passed away during his term of office. Herriges works at Kohn Bros. Implement and farms parttime. He is married and the father of nine children.

Victor Backhaus, a lifelong resident of the Town of Kewaskum is seeking his first term of office. He is retired from farming, a member of the Lions of Kewaskum and President of the Cemetery

Committee for Peace Church. Backhaus stated that he has been a taxpayer for thirty years, and had been contacted by people to run in the place of the announced candidate, David Dorn, who had to withdraw from the race for personal reasons.

Daniel Stoffel is seeking his first term on the Town of Kewaskum Board. He ran for School Board in 1975 and was unsuccessful. He is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin - Madison and farms in the township. He is married

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and has one daughter. He is also a Field Monitoring Specialist for the Washington County EPA Project. Stoffel stated that "I would like to contribute to local government, to see that there is adequate input from the people who pay taxes on decisions that are made."

FOR THOSE PEOPLE INTERESTED IN THE SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM OFFERED TO THE KEWASKUM SCHOOL DISTRICT ON FEBRUARY 28TH

I would like to clarify both the program and the so-called "controversy" surrounding it.

Briefly, the facts presented to the school board were these: Other school districts in our area are serving lunches more cheaply and, apparently, with less waste due to menus with more student appeal. After examining alternative programs, our research as a committee indicated that the best lunch program management existed where the supervision was guided by a Registered Dietician with managerial training in food service. And, contrary to other reports, we had made comparisons in areas where data was relative, and we indicated discrepancies where system differences warranted explanation. We had been researching this subject as a committee since April, 1976, and individually even before then.

We asked the board's consideration of the hiring of a dietician with a background in food service management in lieu of filling the head cook position which would be vacant the end of March.

After expressing disbelief that: 1. any school lunch could be offered more inexpensively than ours and 2. there could ever have been any complaints made against any of our own lunches, the board accepted our written materials of explanation and

sources of information and heard us cite incidents of wasted food — including the three day period when prunes gave their repeat performance at Farmington Elementary School.

We then offered this theory: If management of the district's food service were to be centralized in one food service position we could expect: 1. better quality control of staff and food, 2. a single location for complaints to be received and resolved, and 3. recipe standardization to minimize complaints, improve quality, and increase our purchasing power through larger quantity buying. (Note: We said management centralization and not centralization of food preparation by cooking in only one kitchen). Our objectives, then, in presenting this alternative to "head cook" were: 1. to improve the quality of the food and its distribution by adding efficiency and consistency through centralization and 2. to either decrease or at least stabilize the price of lunch tickets.

We were subsequently answered by a statement adopted and published by the school board. I would like to answer here some of the major points of that statement — without the double-talk.

1. A self-supporting school lunch program is one that balances income and expenses. Purchases made by the district through the normal channels of "vouchers payable," salaries of staff, and costs of equipment and maintenance must be balanced by Federal food, per student-lunch reimbursement, and ticket fees. This takes no mathematical genius to understand, but facts can appear different when budget jargon is used to shift labels. The fact is that Milwaukee and other area lunch programs are in-

deed solvent; we have proven Kewaskum's program is not. The cost of a lunch ticket will continue to rise as long as the system runs at a deficit.

2. This was the perfect time to hire a dietician. The head cook was retiring. Budget analyses for the coming year are just beginning. Contract negotiations are now opening.

3. The reason inventories differ in our district, thus altering menu standardization, is that purchasing of everything except meat is done separately from each school's kitchen.

4. Uniforms are a requirement as well as hairnets wherever food is offered for public consumption.

5. The procedure followed by the Committee for a Better School Lunch program for Kewaskum Schools was indeed proper or, rest assured, we would never have been heard at all. We received the endorsement of the Farmington P.T.O. Executive Committee to present our information to the board. (The reasons we had not presented our findings to the full membership were the head cook's retirement had been announced during the hiatus between P.T.O. meetings and our research had not been completed until February 24th). And since our presentation called for no immediate action from the board, our approach during "new business, miscellaneous" was perfectly appropriate.

6. We the taxpaying public have every right to bring our findings to the board in the form of a report. We sought not to complain but to indicate areas of inconsistent quality where improvements could be made. We offered a high quality, low risk program, and we will offer it again when the opportunity presents itself in the

form of an administration more favorably disposed to examine the facts with a less prejudicial air.

Finally, I would like to address myself personally to this business about "the controversy" which occurred after our presentation was made. Essentially, it is the use of the word "slob," in reference to the character of the Farmington cooks, and the use of the word "sloppy," in reference to the condition of the Farmington kitchen. These words are not in my vocabulary, as people who know me will confirm. A delivery person was heard using those words in his remarks to the Farmington cooks, and they were then attributed to me. In the presence of more than 70 people at the Farmington P.T.O. Voters' Forum, the Farmington cooks revealed that "the Board told" them that I made those derogatory remarks at the meeting on February 28. Unfortunately, not all the voters of this school district know me well enough to realize I would not use such terminology. And, also unfortunately, not very many of those same voters

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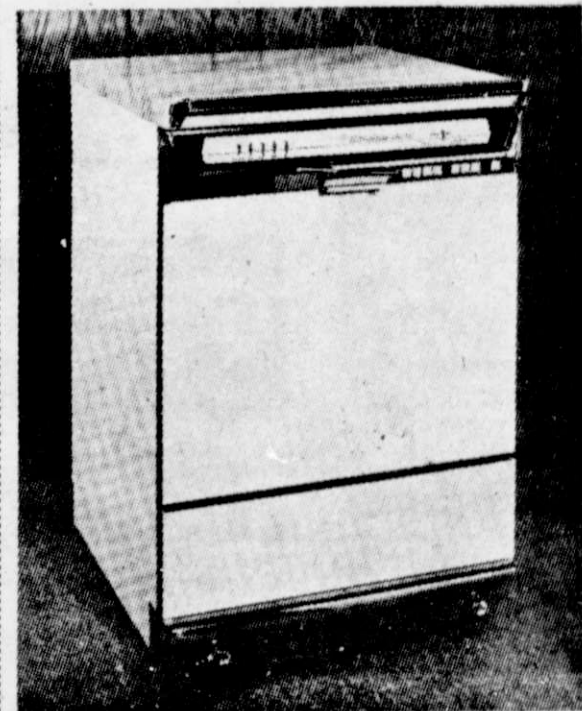
were actually present at the meeting in question to know I did not in fact make any such comments.

It is "the Board," in the personification of those members who falsely informed the Farmington cooks, which created "controversy" and spread "misconceptions" about the lunch program. To cheapen the work of an honest committee by the use of infantile gossip is an unconscionable abuse of social station. It is this kind of trickery that must conscientiously be stopped. It is just this kind of cheap abuse of political power that must be curbed. If the public seeks integrity in its politicians, then the voter must elect people who are above using their fellow beings as their personal pawns.

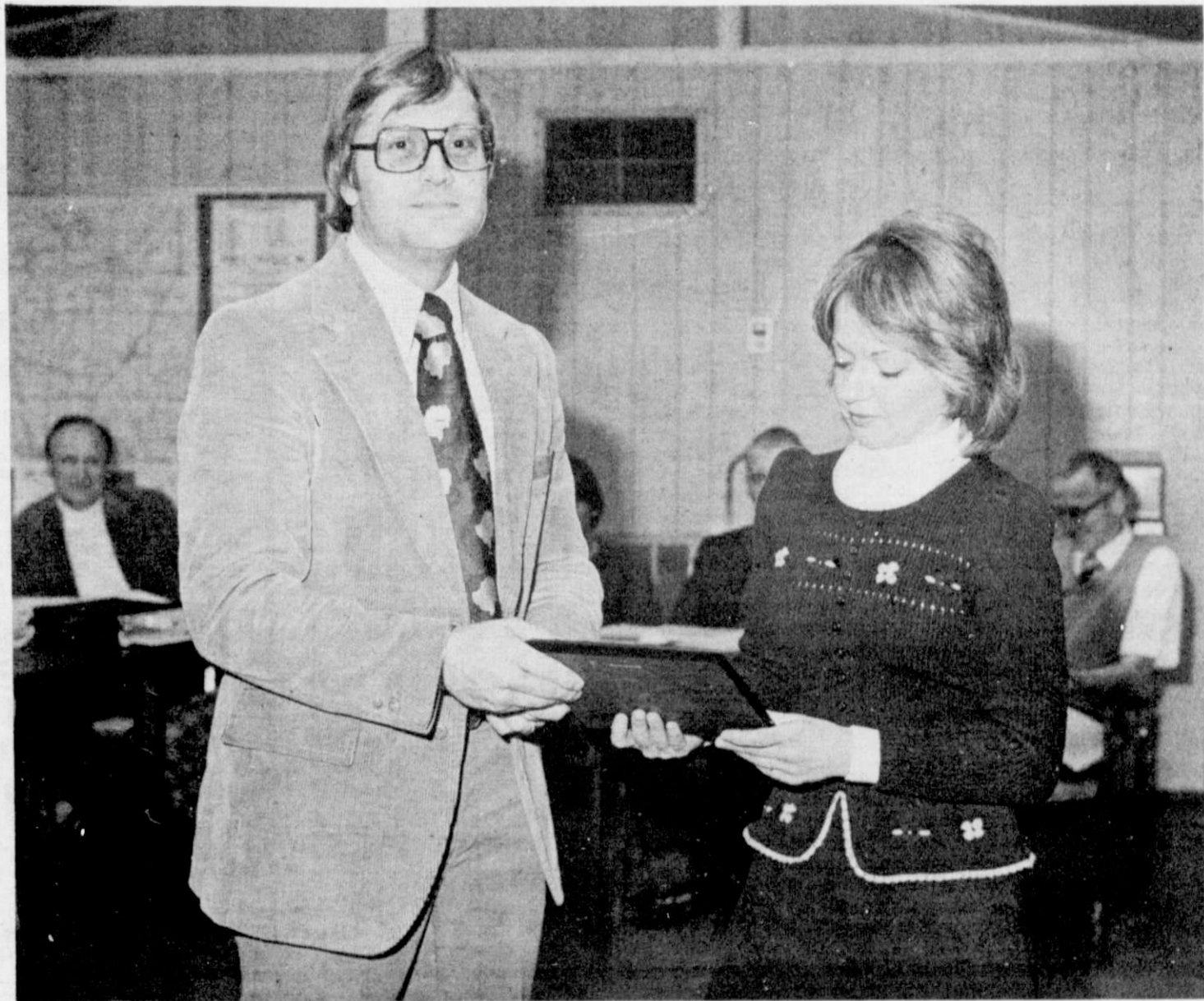

On The Line...

One-To-One

By Gene Anderson



It's the Spring of the year. Snows have melted, flowers are about to bloom. And most publicly-held corporations are issuing to stockholders annual reports of earnings and progress during the previous year.

In this first "One-to-One" report for 1977, I want to issue to General Telephone Company of Wisconsin customers my own form of annual report—on the progress we made throughout the firm's operating territories to improve your service in 1976.

We have numerous indices by which to measure and compare the effectiveness of service efforts. For instance, when you initially request telephone service, we schedule and tell you a date on which that service will be in operation. That's called a "due date." The Public Service Commission of Wisconsin, the state regulatory body which regularly monitors our firm's service performance, concluded that after leaving a margin for the occasional unforeseen problems which can cause delays, 95 percent of all installation orders must be filled by the date stated. In 1976, General Telephone's statewide due date performance resulted in 95.4 percent of all installations completed on time.

In another area—repair—we are expected under normal weather conditions to have 95 percent of all "out of service" calls satisfactorily treated within 24 hours from the time they are reported. Last year, despite the disruptions and delays caused by the massive March ice storm, we nearly equaled that PSC expectation. Approximately 93.6 percent of all repairs requested were completed before a full day had passed. Further, in another unpredictable month (December), better than 97 percent of all outages were corrected on time. Our operators during 1976 were also proving their ability to match or better Public Service Commission standards. Of the 5,059,000 toll operator-handled calls placed through our facilities last year, some 99.9 percent were answered in ten seconds or less.

Further, of the 16,035,000 calls identified by General Telephone operators for billing purposes, 95.6 percent were answered in five seconds or less. By comparison, the PSC objective for toll calls being answered is 90 percent within a ten-second limit, while 95 percent of the operator-identified Direct Distance Dialed calls must be answered within five seconds. Lastly, our Customer Opinion Survey at year-end 1976 indicated 85 percent of all General Telephone-Wisconsin customers satisfied with our Company's service. This compares with 83.9 percent statewide satisfaction in 1975. Naturally, while we are buoyed by these results, room remains for improvement. In 1977, the employees in my command and the roughly 2,100 General Telephone workers throughout Wisconsin will do our utmost to insure that such improvement is realized.

Notice is hereby given of a spring election to be held in the Town of Kewaskum, Washington County, on the fifth day of April, 1977, at which the officers named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office to be voted for, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office in the sample ballot below.

INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

Voting instructions shall be given substantially as follows:

Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his name and address before receiving the ballot from the ballot clerk. The initials of two ballot clerks must appear on the ballot. Upon receiving the ballot, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and mark his ballot. A ballot clerk may inform the elector of the proper manner for marking a ballot, but he shall not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

At a non-partisan election, the elector shall place a cross or other mark in the square at the right of the candidates name for each office for whom he intends to vote or insert or write in the name of his choice for a candidate.

If the elector spoils a ballot, he shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed to mark the ballot. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After the official ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed indorsement and ballot clerk's initials on the outside do show. After folding the ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, give his name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him the ballot to be placed in the ballot box, and leave the polling place promptly.

An elector may be assisted by two election officials of different political parties in marking the ballot if he declares to the presiding official that he is unable to read or that due to physical disability he is unable to mark his ballot. If an elector declares that he is visually handicapped, he may have anyone assist him in marking his ballot or operating a voting machine. The presiding official may administer an oath as to a person's disability.

Notice is hereby given of village election to be held in and for the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, on the 5th day of April 1977, at which the officers named below shall be chosen.

INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

The following instructions are given for the information and guidance of electors:

(a) Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his name and address before receiving the ballot from the ballot clerk. The initials of 2 ballot clerks must appear on the ballot. Upon receiving the ballot, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and mark his ballot. A ballot clerk may inform the elector of the proper manner for marking a ballot, but he shall not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

(b) To vote for a person whose name is printed on the ballot, make a cross (X) or mark in the square after the name of the person for whom you desire to vote. To vote for a person whose name is not printed on the ballot, write the name in the blank space provided for the purpose.

(c) The ballot should not be marked in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than 3 ballots shall be issued to any one elector. Not more than 5 minutes' time shall be allowed to mark the ballot. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

(d) After the official ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed indorsements and ballot clerks' initials on the outside do show. After folding the ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, give his name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him the ballot to be placed in the ballot box, and leave the polling place promptly.

(e) An elector may be assisted by 2 election officials of different political parties in marking the ballot if he declares to the presiding official that he is unable to read or that due to physical disability he is unable to mark his ballot. If an elector declares that he is visually handicapped, he may have anyone assist him in marking his ballot. The presiding official may administer an oath as to a person's disability.

(f) Any qualified elector who is absent, or expects to be absent from the village in which he is a qualified elector, or who, because of sickness or physical disability cannot appear at the polling place on election day, may vote at such election by means of an absent voter's ballot to be secured upon application to the Village Clerk, not more than sixty days and no less than three days, or by personal application, not later than the close of office hours on the day prior to such election.

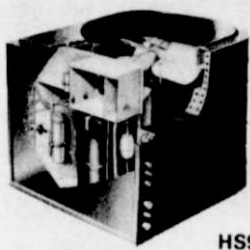

Monday in January on which such terms would otherwise have expired, but such advancement of the date of term expiration shall not impair any retirement rights vested in any such justice if the term had expired on the first Monday in January.

SECTION 17. Section 16 (5) of article XIV of the constitution is created to read:

(Article XIV) Section 16 (5) Prior to the effective date of this amendment the legislature shall by law establish one or more appeals court districts, provide for the election of appeals judges in such districts, and determine the jurisdiction of the court of appeals under section 21 of article I and section 5 of article VII as affected by this amendment, so that the court of appeals shall become operative on the effective date."

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the senate, the assembly concurring. That the foregoing amendment to the constitution is agreed to by this legislature, and, be it further

Resolved, That the foregoing amendment be submitted to a vote of the people at the election to be held on the first Tuesday of April, 1977; and, be it further

Resolved, That the questions concerning ratification of the several separate issues contained in the foregoing amendment be stated on the ballot as follows:

No. 2 — "Court reform. Shall sections 5, 11 and 16 to 23 of article VII of the constitution be repealed; shall section 20 of article I, sections 17 and 26 of article IV, and sections 2 to 4, 6 to 10 and 14 of article VII of the constitution be amended; and shall section 4 (3) of article VII and section 16 (1) to (4) of article XIV of the constitution be created, so as to provide for a unified court system under the administrative authority of the supreme court and the chief justice, consisting of a supreme court, circuit court, and such trial courts of general uniform statewide jurisdiction and municipal courts as the legislature may provide by law?"

EXPLANATION

Effect of ratification.

If you answer "Yes" to the above-stated question, you will be voting (a) to create certain new features in the Wisconsin Constitution; (b) to repeal certain other features of it; and (c) in a few instances, to recreate one of the repealed features by inserting it elsewhere in such Constitution.

The "new features" above-mentioned would be created by amending an existing constitutional provision or adopting a new one. Such new features would be these: (1) Amendment creating, in place of present judicial system (supreme court, circuit courts, county courts of probate, inferior courts established by Legislature, and municipal courts of limited civil and criminal jurisdiction) a new system of general uniform statewide jurisdiction as Legislature may create by law, and municipal courts limited to jurisdiction over municipal ordinance cases; (2) amendment of provisions relative to supreme court jurisdiction providing that such court shall have superintending administrative authority over all courts, appellate jurisdiction over all courts, and may hear original actions and proceedings; that it may issue all writs necessary to aid its jurisdiction; and that it may review judgments and orders of court of appeals, remove cases therefrom, and accept cases certified to it by such court; (3) a new provision that chief justice of supreme court shall be administrative head of judicial system, shall exercise authority as such under procedure adopted by supreme court, and may assign any judge of court of record to aid in disposition of judicial business in any court of record except supreme court; (4) amendment specifying that supreme court justice's ten-year term of office shall commence on August 1 next succeeding the election; that any four justices shall constitute a quorum for conduct of court's business; and that justice designated chief justice may irrevocably decline to so serve or may resign as chief justice but continue to serve as justice; (5) amendments providing that: the Legislature may prescribe by law the number of judicial circuits; no alteration of circuit boundaries shall remove a circuit judge from office during his term; in case of increase in circuits, the first judge or judges shall be elected; for each circuit there shall be chosen by the qualified electors thereof one or more circuit judges as prescribed by law; circuit judges shall be elected for 6-year terms, and except otherwise provided by law, circuit courts shall have original jurisdiction in all civil and criminal matters in this state, and such appellate jurisdiction in the circuit as Legislature may prescribe by law; and circuit court may issue writs necessary in aid of its jurisdiction; (6) amendment providing that the Legislature may by law authorize each city, village, and town to establish a municipal court; that all municipal courts have uniform jurisdiction limited to actions and proceedings under ordinances of municipality in which established; and that judges of such courts may receive such compensation as provided by municipality in which established, but no fees of office; (7) amendment making qualification for eligibility to office of judge applicable to judge appointed as well as to judge elected; (8) amendment of provisions relative to filling vacancy in office of supreme court justice or circuit judge, making such provisions applicable to offices of supreme court justices and judges of any court of record instead of to offices of such justices and circuit judges; (9) amendment of prohibition against supreme court justices or circuit judges holding any other office of public trust, except judicial office, during term for which elected, to make it applicable to such justices and judges of any court of record instead of to such justices and circuit judges; (10) a new provision that supreme court justices and judges of courts of record shall receive such compensation as Legislature may authorize by law, but no fees of office; (11) a new provision that writs of error be issued by such courts as Legislature designates by law; (12) amendment of existing provisions relative to the effective dates of pay adjustments for judges; making them applicable to supreme court justices and judges of any court of record, instead of to such justices and circuit judges; (13) amendment of provision that there shall be no election for "a judge or judges" at any general election for state or county officers, to make it applicable to "a justice or judge" and to describe such election as "the partisan" general election for such officers; and (14) new provisions that: 1975/1977 amendments relating to revised structure of judicial branch, if enacted, to take effect August 1 of year following ratification by voters; all county courts and branches thereof existing on effective date of amendment to continue after such date as trial courts of general uniform statewide jurisdiction, with same jurisdiction, powers and duties conferred by law upon such courts and branches and judges thereof, until Legislature by law alters or abolishes such county courts and their jurisdiction, powers and duties; after effective date of such amendment, municipal courts and judges thereof shall continue with same jurisdiction, powers and duties as conferred upon such courts and judges as of such effective date, until Legislature acts to alter or abolish such municipal courts and their jurisdiction, powers and duties; and that terms of offices of supreme court justices serving on such effective date shall expire on the July 31 next preceding the first Monday in January on which said term would otherwise have expired, but advancement of date of term expiration shall not impair any retirement rights vested in such justice if the term had expired on the first Monday in January.

Your "Yes" vote on the above-stated question would be a vote to repeal, that is, to eliminate, these features of the Wisconsin Constitution: (1) the provision for division of the state into 5 judicial circuits; (2) provisions for when and where the supreme court and circuit courts are to be held; (3) provisions that the Legislature may vest such jurisdiction as shall be deemed necessary in municipal courts, and may authorize establishment of inferior courts in several counties, cities, villages or towns, with limited civil and criminal jurisdiction, with jurisdiction vested in such courts not to exceed, in their respective municipalities, that of circuit courts in their respective circuits as prescribed in Constitution; that the Legislature shall provide as well for election of municipal court judges as of inferior court judges, by qualified electors of respective jurisdictions; and that the term of office of the judges of such municipal and inferior courts shall not be longer than that of circuit court judges; (4) provisions that circuit courts have appellate jurisdiction from all inferior courts and tribunals, and a supervisory control over same; and that such courts have power to issue writs of habeas corpus, mandamus, injunction, quo warranto, certiorari, and all other writs necessary to carry into effect their orders, judgments and decrees, and give them a general control over inferior courts and jurisdictions; (5) provisions that supreme court justice elected to fill a vacancy shall hold his office for a term of 10 years, and the circuit judge so elected shall hold his office for such term as the Legislature prescribes for circuit judges elected under Wis. Const. art. VII, sec. 2; (6) provisions that each of judges of supreme and circuit courts shall receive a salary, payable at such time as Legislature shall fix, of not less than \$1500 annually; and that they shall receive no fees of office, or compensation other than salary; (7) provision that supreme court, except in cases otherwise provided in Constitution, shall have appellate jurisdiction only, coextensive with state; and that in no case removed to such court shall a jury trial be allowed; (8) provisions that supreme court may issue writs of habeas corpus, mandamus, injunction, quo warranto, certiorari, and other original and remedial writs, and to hear and determine the same; (9) provisions that no person shall be eligible to office of judge and less, at the time of his election, he is a citizen of the United States and has attained the age of 25; (10) provision that votes for supreme court justice or circuit court judge, for office he is ineligible to hold, given by the legislature or the people, shall be void; (11) provision for choosing probate judge in each county, by its qualified electors, to hold office for 2 years and until his suc-

cessor shall be elected and qualified, and whose jurisdiction, powers and duties shall be prescribed by law; and that Legislature shall have power to abolish office of probate judge in any county, and to confer probate powers on such inferior courts as may be established in such county; (12) provision that in any circuit in which there is a county that had a population in excess of 85,000, according to last state or U.S. census, Legislature may, from time to time, authorize additional circuit judges to be chosen; (13) requirements relating to style of all writs and process, the carrying on of criminal prosecutions in name and by authority of the state, and concluding language of indictments; (14) requirements that the Legislature provide by law for speedy publication of all statutes and such state judicial decisions as deemed expedient, and that no general law be in force until published; (15) requirement that 1849 Legislature set up commission to inquire into, revise and simplify rules of practice, pleadings, forms and proceedings, and arrange system adapted to the courts of record of this state, and report same to Legislature, subject to its adoption and modification; (16) authorization for Legislature to provide for appointment of court commissioner, not to have powers exceeding that of circuit judge at chambers; (17) authorization for setting up tribunals of reconciliation and requirement that the Legislature pass laws for their regulation; (18) provision for any suitor in any state court to have right to prosecute or defend suit, either in own proper person or by attorney or agent of his choice; (19) requirements that testimony in equity causes, as in cases at law, and that office of master in chancery be prohibited; and (20) requirement that Legislature impose suit tax on civil suits in (20) inferior or circuit courts to constitute judges' salary fund.

As to several of the above-described constitutional features which your "Yes" vote would be a vote to eliminate, the same vote would also be a vote to recreate such features, in whole or in part, by inserting them elsewhere in the Wisconsin Constitution. Such recreated features would be: (1) a provision that in any court in this state, any suitor may prosecute or defend his suit either in his own proper person or by an attorney of his choice (Note: Under the existing version of this provision, the words "or agent" follow the word "attorney," so this provision would only restore in part the repealed provision); (2) provision that no law shall be enforced until published; and (3) provision that the Legislature shall provide by law for its speedy publication of all laws (Note: the existing version of this provision also requires that the Legislature shall provide by law for the speedy publication of such judicial decisions, made within this state, as may be deemed expedient, so this provision would only restore in part the repealed provision).

If you answer "No" to the above-stated question, you will be voting against the creating of the new features in the Wisconsin Constitution above-described, against the repeals of certain features of such Constitution above-shown, and against the recreating of certain Constitutional provisions above-shown.

No. 3 — "Court of appeals. Shall section 5 of article VII of the constitution be repealed; shall section 21 (1) of article I and section 2 of article VII of the constitution be amended; and shall sections 3 (3) and 5 of article VII and section 16 (5) of article XIV of the constitution be created, to provide for the creation of a court of appeals with appellate jurisdiction, including review of administrative proceedings, as provided by law, and with original jurisdiction limited to prerogative writ?"

EXPLANATION

Effect of ratification.

If you answer "Yes" to the above-stated question, you will be voting (a) to create certain new features of the Wisconsin Constitution; and (b) to repeal a certain feature of it.

The "new features" above-mentioned would be created by amending an existing constitutional provision or adopting a new one. Such new features would be these: (1) amendment creating, in place of present judicial system (supreme court, circuit courts, county courts of probate, inferior courts established by Legislature, and municipal courts of limited civil and criminal jurisdiction) a new system of general uniform statewide jurisdiction as Legislature may create by law, and municipal courts limited to jurisdiction over municipal ordinance cases; (2) a provision that the supreme court may review judgments and orders of court of appeals, may remove cases from it, and may accept cases on certification by it; (3) provisions that: Legislature shall by law combine the judicial circuits of state into 1 or more districts or court of appeals, and shall designate in each district the locations where appeals courts shall sit for convenience of litigants; for each district of appeals court there shall be chosen by qualified electors of district 1 or more appeals judges as prescribed by law, who shall sit as so prescribed; appeals judges shall be elected for 6-year terms and shall reside in district from which elected; no alteration of district or circuit boundaries shall have effect of removing of appeals judge from office during judge's term; in case of increase in number of appeals judges, first judge or judges shall be elected for full terms unless Legislature prescribes shorter initial term for staggering of terms; appeals court shall have such appellate jurisdiction in district, including jurisdiction to review administrative proceedings, as Legislature may provide by law, but no original jurisdiction other than by prerogative writ; such court may issue all writs necessary in aid of its jurisdiction and shall have supervisory authority over all actions and proceedings in courts in the district; (4) provisions that prior to effective date this of amendment the Legislature shall by law establish 1 or more appeals court districts, provide for the election of appeals judges in them, and determine jurisdiction of court of appeals under sec. 21 of art. I and sec. 5 of art. VII, as affected by this amendment, so that court of appeals shall become operative on effective date; and (5) provision that writs of error shall be issued by such courts as Legislature designates by law.

Your "Yes" vote on the above-stated question would be a vote to repeal, that is, eliminate, the provision for division of the state into five judicial circuits.

If you answer "No" to the above-stated question, you will be voting against the creating of the new features in the Wisconsin Constitution above-described, and against the repeal of a certain feature of such Constitution above-shown.

No. 4 — "Court system disciplinary proceedings. Shall section 13 of article VII of the constitution be amended; and shall section 11 of article VII of the constitution be created, to authorize the supreme court to discipline, suspend, or remove a justice or judge for cause in accordance with procedures established by the legislature by law?"

EXPLANATION

Effect of ratification.

If you answer "Yes" to the above-stated question, you will be voting for these things: (1) to create a provision that each justice or judge shall be subject to reprimand, censure, suspension, removal for cause or for disability, by the supreme court pursuant to procedures established by the legislature by law; a provision that no justice or judge removed for cause shall be eligible for reappointment or temporary service; and a provision in the section containing such provisions that such section is alternative to, and cumulative with, the methods of removal provided in art. VII, sec. 1 (impeachment and trial), in art. VII, sec. 12 (recall); and (2) to amend the provisions relative to removal of a judge from office by action of both houses of the legislature, by making such provisions applicable to any "justice or judge," instead of to any justice or judge of the supreme, circuit, county or municipal court.

If you answer "No" to the above-stated question, you will be voting against the creation of the above-described provisions of the constitution, and against the above-described amendment thereof.

No. 5 — "Mandatory retirement age. Shall section 24 of article VII of the constitution be amended, to authorize the legislature to set the age not less than 70 at which a justice or judge must retire?"

EXPLANATION

Effect of ratification.

If you vote "Yes" on the above-stated question, you will be voting for a provision that no person may serve as a supreme court justice or judge of a court of record beyond the July 31 following the date on which such person attains that age, not less than 70 years, which the legislature shall prescribe by law, unless such person is assigned to serve as a judge on a temporary basis in any court of record except the supreme court.

If you answer "No" on the above-stated question, you will be voting against the above-described provision.

It should be pointed out here that while the above-stated question does not so indicate, the proposed amendment of art. VII, sec. 24 agreed to by the 1975 and 1977 Legislatures eliminates the present requirement of such section that a person must have 8 or more years of service as a supreme court justice or circuit judge in order to serve temporarily as a judge under such section. If amended, such section would permit a person to so serve who has served as a supreme court justice or judge of a court of record, with no time specified as to the length of service as such justice or judge making such person eligible

for temporary service as a judge.

The explanatory statements set forth above have been prepared by the Attorney General, pursuant to sec. 10.01 (2) (c), Stats.

I, Gerald J. 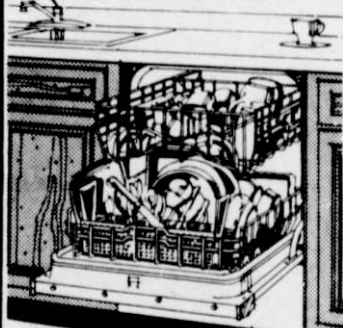

TO THE ELECTORS OF THE TOWN OF AUBURN

Notice is hereby given of a spring election to be held in the Town of Auburn, Fond du Lac County, on the first day of April, 1977, at which the officers named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office to be voted for, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office in the sample ballot below.

INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

Voting instructions shall be given substantially as follows:

Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his name and address before receiving the ballot from the ballot clerk. The initials of two ballot clerks must appear on the ballot. Upon receiving the ballot, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and mark his ballot. A ballot clerk may inform the elector of the proper manner for marking a ballot, but he shall not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

At a non-partisan election, the elector shall place a cross or other mark in the square at the right of the candidates name for each office for whom he intends to vote or insert or write in the name of his choice for a candidate.

If the elector spoils a ballot, he shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed to mark the ballot. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After the official ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed indorsement and ballot clerk's initials on the outside do show. After folding the ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, give his name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him the ballot to be placed in the ballot box, and leave the polling place promptly.

An elector may be assisted by two election officials of different political parties in marking the ballot if he declares to the presiding official that he is unable to read or that due to physical disability he is unable to mark his ballot. If an elector declares that he is visually handicapped, he may have anyone assist him in marking his ballot or operating a voting machine. The presiding official may administer an oath as to a person's disability.

The following is a facsimile of the official ballot:

To vote for a person whose name is printed on the ballot, make a cross (X) in the square after the name of the person for whom you desire to vote. To vote for a person whose name is not printed on the ballot, write his or her name in the blank space provided for that purpose.
