## Kewaskum Hosts Badger Firemen's Spring Meeting, Banquet Sunday

With its new fire station and facilities, the Kewaskum Fire Department will host this year's annual spring meeting and banquet of the Badger Firemen's Association on Sunday, April 17. The Badger Association is comprised of approximately 26 fire departments of the area.

Chiefs and delegates of the various departments will attend the afternoon meeting starting at 2 p. m. at the new fire station. Among other business, the sites for next year's spring meeting and banquet as well as the annual bowling tournament, will be selected. Last year's

meeting and banquet was held at Germantown.

In the evening they will be joined by other association fire department members for the banquet at Amerahn Hall, starting at 6:30 p. m. sharp. Approximately 250 firemen are expected to attend the banquet.

Following the dinner, a guest speaker will be present and trophies and prize money winners of this winter's bowling tournament will be awarded.

Wives and lady friends of the Kewaskum firemen will wait on table and assist at the banquet.

## \$125,620 Budget Approved at Town Of Kewaskum Annual Meeting

A budget totaling \$125,620 was approved by the electors at the Town of Kewaskum annual meeting held on April 6. Outgoing Town Chairman, Mervin Thompson, conducted the meeting.

Federal revenue sharing of \$4,421 was again voted to be used for fire protection as it has in the past. Questions concerning the proposed 1977-78 budget were raised by members of the audience, one being how do you arrive at the figure of \$43,400 for highway maintenance? Thompson stated this cost is for complete road work from scratch, at a cost of \$14,000 per mile. The town did five miles last year and it is committed to finish work on West Moraine Drive which was started last year. A new bridge was built and there is \$2,700 left to pay and stumps have to be removed from property adjoining the road, also this road must be paved.

Town Board members salaries were raised from the present \$12 per meeting to \$15 per meeting and from .13 per mile to .15 per mile. All members will receive \$25 per day for any overnight conventions or meetings they attend and \$10 per day for the one day meetings.

Thompson noted that Ken Weddig had been appointed by the board on a permanent basis, the Chairman of the Land Development Committee, and will be paid the same fee as a board member.

Robert Etta was appointed the certified assessor for the township, on the presumption that he passed the certification test. He is waiting for the test results, and will be sworn in upon certification. He is a graduate of Kewaskum High School and University of Wisconsin - River Falls and has worked for the

Federal Land Bank. He is now engaged in farming.

A motion was passed thanking all outgoing board members: James Andre, retiring supervisor; Raymond Schaefer, retiring assessor; William Bruhn, retiring treasurer, and Mervin Thompson, chairman.

The new board consisting of George Allmann, chairman; Daniel Stoffel, supervisor, and Delores Prost, treasurer, were sworn in to join incumbent Jerome Herriges, supervisor, and Barbara Hinz, clerk.

The 1978 annual meeting will be held the Wednesday night after the election at the town garage.

## House Trailer Gutted by Fire

The Kewaskum Fire Department answered two calls the past week.

At 3:29 p. m. last Thursday firemen were summoned to the John Dahlke home, 3723 Badger Rd., one mile south of Kewaskum, where a house trailer was gutted by fire. The blaze is believed to have been caused by an electric space heater in the trailer, which was parked near the house. Only the frame of the trailer remained.

At 2:45 p. m. Monday firemen were called to assist in putting out a grass fire on state owned land across Hwy. S and to the north of St. John's Lutheran Church Cemetery at New Fane. The blaze, which destroyed about three acres of grass, apparently started from a rubbish burner and was fanned by a high wind.

## Village Board OK's Additional \$1,000,000 in Liability Insurance

The Kewaskum Village Board, on Monday evening, agreed to purchase additional umbrella liability insurance in the amount of \$1,000,000 from Employer's Mutual Casualty Company of Des Moines Iowa. The cost of this insurance is \$1,450. This coverage is over and above the existing insurance.

The go-ahead was given to the on-site appraisal of village owned property for insurance purposes at a cost of \$2,700. This price includes the cost for the first year's update. Industrial Appraisal Company of Pittsburgh, Pa., with a representative in a Milwaukee office, will do the work. After the initial appraisal, the cost will be \$231 per year for an annual update.

The board also voted to purchase a new copy machine, which is a discontinued model, at a cost of \$700. Regular price of this machine is \$1,300. Dan Schmidt suggested giving the old copier to the Fire Department for their use.

West Bend Contractor, Ray Schaefer, has a lot in the Village of Kewaskum, approved plans, but he can't obtain a permit to begin construction. Schaefer appeared at the vil-

lage meeting on April 4 to ask about building permits in the Ideal Land Subdivision, but was advised by Village President Charles Miller that they have been advised by legal counsel to continue the "moratorium."

Schaefer, who had appeared last fall with the same question, stated that he had purchased a lot from Port Savings and Loan with a "clean, clear title." He said there was no mention of a moratorium on the title.

He said as he understood the situation, Ideal officials only own a half dozen lots. He wondered why those lots from Port Savings would have to be denied permits.

Schaefer referred to the village's subdivision ordinance stating that it says if a subdivision is approved and building permits are issued, the subdivision is accepted according to the ordinance. There are several homes in the subdivision at this time.

Miller stated that "presently there is litigation and at this point it has not been resolved." He further stated that as long as it has not been resolved, there will be no permits issued.

Commissioner William Martin informed the board that

## Assistant Administrator, Remodeling Discussed at School Board Meeting

Discussion of proposals for changes for 1977-78 continue to dominate the meetings of the Kewaskum Board of Education. At the Monday meeting, it was a proposal for adding an assistant administrator position and some proposals on remodeling.

While the board discussed the merits of the proposals, it was agreed to hold decisions until a tentative budget proposal has been presented by the superintendent.

The remodeling proposal includes changing the library to what is presently the 700 area of the high school and then remodeling the present library for guidance and central administration offices and meeting areas. Concern was expressed also for expanding the art area and questions were raised as to the necessity of a larger library since enrollment is stabilizing. It was pointed out that the present library area is already crowded with materials, and that future needs would be blocked if other possible library areas were used for a different purpose.

A second central office administrative position of as-

stant superintendent was discussed. Statistics showing the administrative staffs of other districts was presented. Of eight schools in the area, the average is one (1) central office administrator for each 996 students. This ranges from a low of 549 to a high of 1,546. In Kewaskum, there is one for 2,052 students. In a second survey, of 15 schools, the average expenditure per pupil for all administrative staff was \$71.85. Kewaskum spent \$57.12. Questions were asked and discussion held on what the results would be to the district if an assistant superintendent was to be authorized.

A report was presented by Mr. Brenholt on the visit by two newspaper reporters to the Farmington School. The board adopted the report and

Schaefer's plans had been approved by the Plan Commission and the building inspector, so he will be set to get his permit when the moratorium is lifted.

In other board action, approval was given to Augie Bilgo, Supt. of Public Works, to purchase a used wet-dry vacuum floor machine at the cost of \$109. Approval to purchase a desk for \$200 and a factory rebuilt electric IBM typewriter for \$395 was given to William Martin, to be used in the village offices. An office has been established for the assessor, thus necessitating the need for additional office equipment.

A building permit was granted to Terry Koch for a one family residence at Edgewood Road.

Miller informed the board that Virgil Samsal, village assessor, would not have time to do a complete re-appraisal this year. Money has been budgeted this year for the project, so the board will advertise for bids from qualified appraisers. There had been a previous vote to advertise for bidding, but all the bids had been rejected according to Dan Schmidt.

Gregor Nigh reported that Tom Larsen had informed him that the entry fee for the men's softball league for the summer has been set at \$50 per team.

**MINUTES OF VILLAGE BOARD MEETING**

Mid-Monthly Meeting  
March 21, 1977  
8:00 P. M.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin met in mid-monthly session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building.

President Charles Miller presided. Present were Trustees Herriges, Schmidt, Strack and D. Nigh. Trustee Danielsen was absent. Trustee G. Nigh arrived at 8:20 P. M.

The minutes of the meeting of March 7 were approved as printed. Motion by Trustee Schmidt, seconded by Trustee Strack. Unanimous vote.

Eugene Bohn, Kettle Moraine Insurance Agency, informed the Board that the Village's umbrella liability policy was up for renewal on May 22. He stated that the Village should be prepared to expect an increase in the renewal premium of perhaps three times of what it is now no matter what Company the Village may wish to contact. He further stated that he would submit a quotation for this type of insurance for the Board's consideration at the April 4 Village Board meeting.

Mr. Bohn also suggested that the Board consider an on-site appraisal update of all Village owned property. Mr. Bohn stated that the last on-site appraisal was prepared about eight years ago and that some of the Village owned improvements made during that time never had an on-site appraisal. The Industrial Appraisal Service quoted a price of two thousand four hundred seventy-five dollars (\$2,475.00) for an on-site appraisal with the upkeep service each year thereafter to cost two hundred thirty-

one dollars (\$231.00) per year. Since consideration of this quotation was not on the agenda for this meeting, the matter was tabled.

Peter Albers, Superintendent of Waste Water Treatment, reported that because of additional DNR requirements, it may become necessary to enlarge the laboratory area at the treatment plant and that it might be necessary to move the chlorination room to another location. Mr. Albers requested authority to obtain cost figures. Authority granted.

Building Permit applications as follows were approved by the Board and the Commissioner was authorized to issue the proper permit upon payment of the required fee:

1. Leroy Zipperer - One family residence at 507 Lin-De Lane. Motion by Trustee Herriges, seconded by Trustee D. Nigh. Unanimous vote.
2. John Baitinger - One family residence at 712 Moraine Court. Motion by Trustee Strack, seconded by Trustee Herriges. Unanimous vote.
3. Pro-Bilt, Inc. - One family residence at 702 Moraine Court. Motion by Trustee D. Nigh, seconded by Trustee Schmidt. Unanimous vote.

The adjustment of a compensation claim of a Village employee will be discussed

with the employee in closed session at a later date.

Trustee Schmidt, a member of the Library Board, presented to the Board the 1976 Statistical Report of the Public Library. Trustee Schmidt made note of the fact that during the past year the Library had added 319 adult volumes and 221 juvenile volumes. The report also showed that the Library had 13,046 adult withdrawals and 15,512 juvenile withdrawals during the Year 1976. The report was ordered placed on file in the office of the Commissioner.

Trustee Gregor Nigh, Chairman of the Recreation Committee, reported that the estimated cost of the summer softball program would be about one thousand ninety-five dollars (\$1095.00). It is estimated that the team entry fees would cover the cost of the program.

The scheduled closed session to discuss State Funding for park development was cancelled.

It was suggested that the "Yield" signs at Western Avenue and North Avenue be removed.

Upon motion by Trustee Schmidt, seconded by Trustee Herriges and unanimously carried, the Board adjourned to 8:00 p. m. April 4, 1977.



The Wisconsin Farm Bureau held its 31st annual Women's Leadership Seminar March 29 to 31 at the Holiday Inn in Stevens Point. Orlyn Mayer, Slinger; Elaine Linstedt, Colgate; Evelyn Brugger, Richfield; Marlene Witte, Jackson, and Karen Schmidt, Kewaskum, represented Washington County Farm Bureau.

The seminar is coordinated by the state women's committee of the Farm Bureau. Its four-fold purpose is to involve new leaders, develop present leaders, increase member participation and build a strong county Farm Bureau.

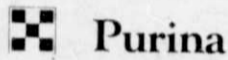
