

School Board Re-Elects Officers: Disapproves Action by Reporter

In unanimous decisions, the Kewaskum Board of Education re-elected all officers at its meeting Monday evening. Dr. Ogi, James Oelhafen and Byron Gessner were named president, clerk and treasurer respectively. All have served in these positions since July, 1974.

After a brief discussion of various possibilities, the Holy Trinity science class was reinstated. It had been dronped at an earlier meeting. but requests to reinstate the program resulted in a review of the situation and the latest action by the board. The eighth grade class from Holy Trinity has, for a number of years, received one period of science instruction at the Middle School.

A review was made of the visit to the Farmington School by reporters. The rebuttal of the reporters to earlier statements by school personnel was distributed and read by the board, after which a 6-1 vote resulted in the resolution expressing disapproval of the actions of the reporter from the "West Bend News."

A contract to teach agri culture was approved for Dale Staude. He is a graduate of Platteville and has three years of teaching experience

The contract will be for 230 days to allow for summer visits to students in the program. Mr. Staude will also act as FFA advisor.

The resignation of Mrs Caldwell as English teacher was accepted by the Board. The resignation is effective at the end of the school year. Mrs. Caldwell will accept a teaching position nearer her

In other business. Byron Gessner and Richard Theusch will participate in the high school graduation on June 3 and the board pay period was changed to an April to April date since that is when new members take office.

Mrs. McKee raised the question of whether lockers should be purchased at the Middle School to help ease the problem of students taking items from others' lock ers. Mr. Brenholt suggested that a survey be made of parents at both high school and middle school levels to determine if the problem varies between the schools. The high school has lockers, the middle school does not.

The board went into closed session following the open meeting to discuss administrative salaries and two student personnel questions.

Town Board Approves Placing \$40,000 in Savings Accounts

The Kewaskum Town Board approved placing approximately \$40,000 in savings accounts at their regularly scheduled meeting on April

Half of the \$40,000 will be placed in a 90 day savings account and approximately \$20,000 will be placed in a regular savings account. Both Town Clerk Barbara Hinz and Treasurer Delores Prost had attended a seminar on investing funds in Fond du Lac and brought ideas back to the board.

Certified survey maps were approved for: Roman Laubenstein on County Trunk H: Martha Foerster on West Moraine Drive: William Otten on Ridge Road: Tom Staehler on Sandy Ridge Road; Wilmer Hilgendorf on Hwy. H (former Schneider Farm); Carl Meilahn estate on East Moraine Drive Meilahn's was approved pending the removal of a shed which was considered too close to the road. Hilgendorf's was approved pending approval of the County Park & Planning Commission and provision that the road is 66 foot in

Supervisor Daniel Stoffel was instructed to contact of ficials from the Town of Auburn to check if debris from road work on West Moraine Drive can be dumped on a roadway being filled in the Town of Auburn. Also several area excavators were contacted for their hourly rate for removal of stumps on town road sides. An amount of \$5,000 can be spent for this removal without advertising for bids.

gency Government that it had spent \$2,062 in excess of the amount received for work resulting from last year's ice storm. A new application can be submitted for reimbursement. Supervisors instructed Town Chairman George Allmann to apply for the additional funds as the work has already been completed.

The Town Clerk was advised to advertise for bids for seal coating and possible resurfacing town roads. Bids will be opened on May 18. The clerk was also instructed to advertise for three part time employees for summer work for road maintenance. Application blanks will be available from the Town Clerk, Town Chairman and the two Supervisors.

At the annual meeting, it was announced that Robert Etta had taken the assessor's test and was waiting for word as to whether he had passed. A motion had been made to hire him on the provision he had passed the

test

At the April 20 meeting. the board was told that he had failed to pass the test. due to being given the wrong books to study, and the board had until May 1 to hire an assessor. Several names of certified assessors on an eligibility list were chosen, and these men would be contacted so the town would be in compliance with the May 1 deadline for hiring a certified assessor. The assessor's salary was open for negotiation and he would be hired for a period of one year.

All town meetings will be held the third Wednesday of the month, starting at 7:30 p.m. at the Kewaskum town shed.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Public notice is hereby given that the Plan Commission of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, has recommended to the Kewaskum Village Board the adoption of the following amendment to the Village's Subdivision and Platting Ordinance:

AN ORDINANCE AMEND ING THE SUBDIVISION AND PLATTING ORDIN-ANCE OF THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, do ordain as follows:

PART I. To repeal and recreate Section 18.062(2) of the Subdivision and Platting Ordinance of the Village of Kewaskum, as follows:

(2) STREETS. After the installation of all utilities, the subdivider shall surface all roadways and streets proposed to be dedicated to the widths prescribed by these regulations and/or comprehensive plan or comprehensive plan components. Said surfacing shall include both base material and wearing course and said surfacing shall be done in accordance with the following plans and specifications:

a) Prior to any surfacing operations, the soil conditions of the roadway and/or street must be approved by the Village Engineer. If at any point, during the course of construction, the existing base is deemed insufficient, the existing gravel shall be removed, along with whatever undercut is necessary to remove unacceptable material. These undercut areas shall be filled and compacted with crushed road gravel approved by the Village Engineer.

b) Gravel base to be placed in two layers, the first being four (4) inches of pit run gravel, the size of which is not to exceed No. 3 stone. The second or upper layer is to consist of six (6) inches of crushed road gravel. The maximum thickness of each lift shall be four (4) inches with each lift being compact-

c) Prior to surfacing the subdivider shall submit to the Village Engineer a report prepared by an independent testing laboratory, which shall include:

1) A proposed mix design utilizing bituminous material and mineral aggregate mater ial which the contractor intends to use in surfacing. Separate test designs shall apply to base course and wearing course mixtures. This design shall conform to the Wisconsin Highway Specifications.

2) A complete seive analysis of aggregate to be employed in the execution of the contract.

3) Test information indicating performance of the design mix including specific gravity compaction data. This data shall be presented to the Village Engineer for approval not less than one week prior to beginning work.

d) The subdivider shall

strictly adhere to the approved design mix while carrying out the surfacing. The mix for surface or binder course shall not be altered from the approved design without written approval of the Village Engineer.

e) TESTING SAMPLES:

1) Compacted samples of each type of asphalt material placed may be cored from the pavement for determination of density, thickness and other characteristics at the direction of the Village Engineer.

2) All samples of materials which are required for test shall be furnished by the subdivider without cost to the Village. Samples taken of pavement before acceptance of the work shall be replaced by the subdivider without charge or cost to the Village.

f) The subdivider shall furnish to the Village Engineer, a list of all equipment to be used for surfacing stating name, year of manufacture capacity and location. He shall, at the Village Engineer's request, furnish a certificate of inspection from the manufacturer of the mixing machine, laying machine,

and rollers to be used which will guarantee that said equipment is in good operating order and will conform to Section 405.4 of the Wisconsin State Highway Specifications for Road and Bridge Construction, 1969 Edition.

g) Streets and roadways shall be paved with a 4" bituminous concrete pavement as follows:

1) The aggregates for bituminous pavements, including mineral filler, shall conform to the following gradation requirements as set forth in Subsection 401.2.5 of the State of Wisconsin. Department of Transportation, Division of Highways. Standard Spec. for Road and Bridge Construction, 1969 Edition.

2) Asphaltic Concrete Binder Course 21/2" - Graduation No. 2-4.5% to 5% A.C.

3) Asphaltic Concrete Surface Course 11/2" - Gradation No. 3 or No. 4 - 5.2% to 6.0%

4) The bituminous material for the bituminous concrete shall be Asphalt Cement Type A.C. in the penetration range 85 - 100.

h) Prior to placing the bituminous binder course the existing gravel base shall be regraded and shaped to a cross-section having a centerline crown of 51/2".

i) Before the asphalt pavement is to be placed, the base course shall be stringlined to check the crown of the road.

j) Prior to paving, all street structure shall be adjusted to finished pavement grade by the use of cast iron rings or masonry blocks and mortar.

k) The cost of surfacing roadways in excess of 46 feet in width, curb-face to curbface, and to standards over and above those which would be required for local streets that are not required to serve the needs of the developer shall be borne by the community.

PART 11. To repeal and recreate Section 18.062(5)(a) of the Subdivision and Platting Ordinance of the Village of Kewaskum, as follows:

(5) STORM WATER DRAIN-AGE FACILITY. (a) The subdivider shall construct storm water drainage facilities which shall include curbs and gutters. Catch basins and inlets, storm sewers, road ditches and open channels shall be installed as may be required by the Village Engineer. The type of facility required, the design criteria and the sizes and grades are to be approved by the Village Engineer. Storm drainage facilities shall be so designed as to present no hazard to life or property; minimize shore land erosion and siltation of surface waters; and shall prevent excess run off on adja-

cent property. The size, type and installation of all storm water drains and sewers proposed to be constructed shall be in accordance with the plans and standard specifications approved by the Village Engineer. Curbs and gutters shall be installed on all streets and roadways prior to paving as required by Section 18.062 (2) of this Ordinance. Plans for such installation must be approved by the Village Engineer and installation shall be in accordance with specifications of the Village Engi-
