Plan Reconstruction of Hwy. 45 Overhead Bridge

James Rosenmerkel, Project Design Engineer, Dept. of Transportation, held a meeting for the news media at the Washington County Highway Office Wednesday afternoon to announce plans for the reconstruction of the Hwy. 45 overhead bridge just north of Kewaskum.

Three plans were revealed at this time, one being to replace the bridge in its existing location, another to erect a grade crossing with signals on

Old Fond du Lac Road, and the department's recommended plan is to relocate the bridge 150 feet to the west of Hwy 45 correcting the present alignment problem.

A public informational meeting will be held at 7:30 p. m. on May 18 at the Kewaskum Municipal Building.

Due to the lateness of Wednesday afternoon's meeting, a more complete writeup will appear in next week's issue.

Village Water Rates Will Be Increased 55.6% Effective July 1

Effective July 1, 1977, the water rates in the Village of Kewaskum will be increased from \$5.11 to \$7.95 for a 55.6% increase in compliance with a unanimous board vote on Monday evening.

The rate increase was approved by the Public Service Commission on April 14, 1977. The increase is only for water rates, not sewage rates, which will remain the same.

The board approved an ordinance amending the municipal code on the cost of removal of stumps from a tree lawn. The ordinance will now read, the cost of removal of stumps located on a tree lawn (more particularly described as the area between sidewalk and curb) or on private property, shall be borne 100% by the property owner.

Village Commissioner, William Martin, was authorized to advertise for bids for asphalt paving of streets. Moraine Court, the oldest subdivision, will be first on the list with other streets being Reigle Drive and Edgewood down to Forest. Other streets will be considered after estimates of footage needed is prepared by Superintendent of Public Works Augie Bilgo and determination of available money.

In the proposed 1977 budget, \$25,000 was budgeted for street outlay and \$20,000 for repair of streets and alleys.

President Charles Miller was authorized to contact someone, who Miller had talked to previously, to write job descriptions for all village employees. For the past three years, at budget time, the board had discussed writing descriptions of all jobs and it never went beyond the discussion stage. Miller stated this would help in hiring when replacements are needed

and in fixing salary schedules.

William Martin was authorized to advertise for bids for a new chassis and box for a new garbage truck. The present chassis will be converted into a snow plow unit and the present box (16 cubic yard) will be traded for a 17 cubic yard capacity.

Bilgo had requested the advertising be done now, as it will be months before a new truck would arrive, since it will take thirty days before the bids would come back.

Approval was given to Leroy Schmidt's application for a bartender's license.

Two up-coming meetings for village boards are a Washington County Project Meeting on May 11 on the Watershed Project and a League of Wisconsin Municipalities meeting on May 26 at Wauwatosa.

Dan Schmidt reported that Tom Blotz had informed him that the spending limit on the new park has risen from \$146,000 to \$185,100 due to cancellations by other municipalities. Madison recommended that the additional money be used for completion of the tennis courts, basketball court and the cleaning, grading and seeding of the ditch area. Blotz should be sending the final papers this week so Arthur &

Board Passes Ordinance at Public Hearing

A public hearing on a proposed ordinance to amend the existing Subdivision and Platting Ordinance with reference to paving of streets and installation of curb and gutter was held by the village board on May 2 at 7:30 p. m.

No one appeared at the hearing indicating no one was either for or against the ordinance.

The ordinance had been recommended by the Plan Commission and approved by the board.

The vote on the motion was 6 to 0 with one abstention, that being new board member, Mark Kral, who stated he had not had time to study the ordinance.

A resolution was introduced by Dan Schmidt concerning the assessment of village property and the inability of the local assessor to handle the job.

The resolution states that the Village President consult at once with the Department of Revenue, explain the situation to such body and ask it to approve the hiring by this body of additional and expert help under the provisions of Section 70.055 of the Statutes to aid in making the 1977 assessment of the district in order that an equitable assessment may be made in substantial compliance with law.

The motion for the resolution was passed unanimously.

This year we have a wild-life photo contest for children in the middle grades. We have a slide presentation, hike on glacial trails and plan lunch for them. We also sponsored a tree sale for homeowners, stressing beauty and conservation.

We donate to Trees for Tomorrow, Riveredge Nature Center and places that teach all ages environmental awareness. We have also chipped old Christmas trees for natural walkways for the new park.

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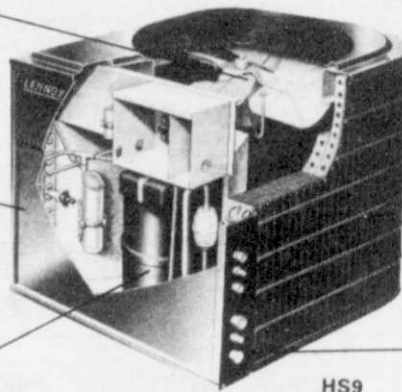

Road aids checks mailed

The state Department of Transportation mailed checks in April totaling \$37 million to counties, cities, villages and towns in Wisconsin, as "advance" payments of supplemental highway aids, about \$3.2 million more than a comparable payment in the same month of 1976.

The distribution is pre-payment of the 1976 supplemental aids provided under statutory allotment for maintenance or improvements to county trunk highways and local public roads and streets. The balance will be paid in August, after the close of the fiscal year.

Washington County received an advance payment totaling \$134,606.47, while a total of \$303,597.92 was distributed to the following municipalities:

WASHINGTON \$134,606.47 PLUS \$303,597.92 for the Cities of Hartford \$24,723.11, Milwaukee \$228.01 (also in Milwaukee Co.), West Bend \$67,918.89; Villages of Germantown \$74,169.33, Jackson \$4,511.38, Kewaskum \$7,899.86, Newburg \$2,921.47, Slinger \$6,667.69; and 13 towns \$114,558.18.

The present payment equals about 50 per cent of the total fiscal 1976 supplemental aids of \$74.1 million distributed from the state highway fund to local units of government.

Under the current partial distribution of supplemental aids, the counties share \$11.1 million. In the distribution to municipalities, cities share about \$12 million, villages share \$2.8 million and towns, \$11.1 million.

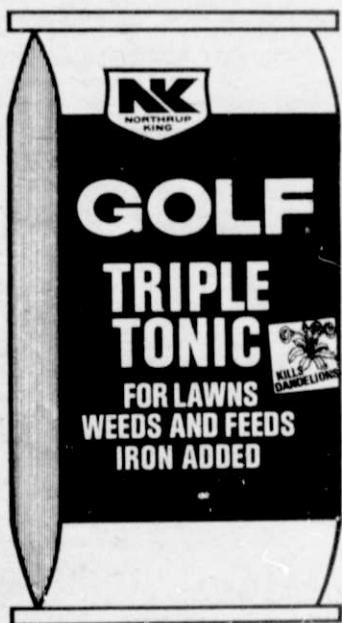

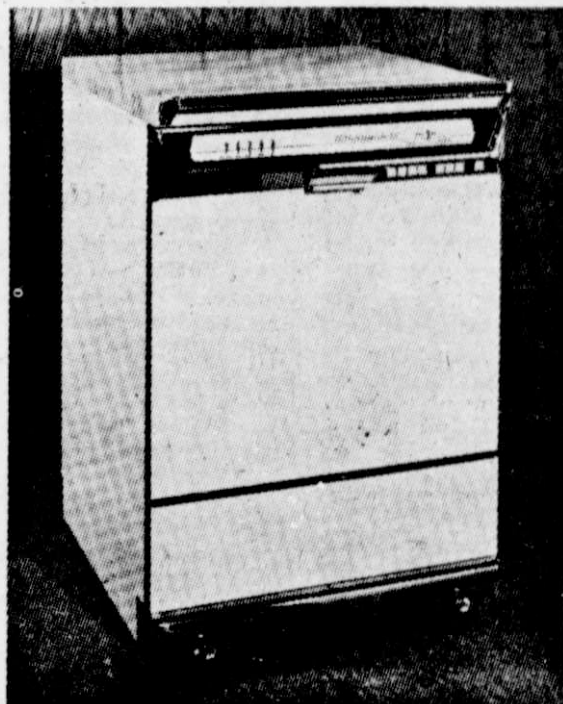

Home Eye Test For Preschoolers To Be Mailed Out

Washington County Community Health Nursing Service announced today that the agency has received a supply of the "Home Eye Test for Preschoolers," a kit which enables parents to screen their children for amblyopia (lazy eye). The kits are provided to Washington County by the Division of Health, Wisconsin Dept. of Health and Social Services.

Amblyopia occurs when a child unconsciously becomes accustomed to seeing with only one eye. To avoid seeing a double image, the child ignores the weaker or "lazy eye" and depends only on the stronger one.

If the condition is not discovered or treated before the age of six or seven, it usually leads to permanent reduction of vision or even blindness in the affected eye.

The screening kit consists of a simple eye chart with complete instructions for parents and a post card to report results to the local health department. Parents have the option of requesting help from the agency in screening the child.

The Community Health Nursing Service will begin mailing the eye charts to the homes of all four-year-olds within the next week. If you do not receive a kit and desire one, please notify the nurse's office.

The home test kit is not meant to replace a professional eye examination. However, it helps parents become aware of possible eye problems and the need to seek a professional examination.

Horicon, with two golfers coming in with 40's, one with a 41 and another with a 42, has a strong team, which plays a lot of summer golf.

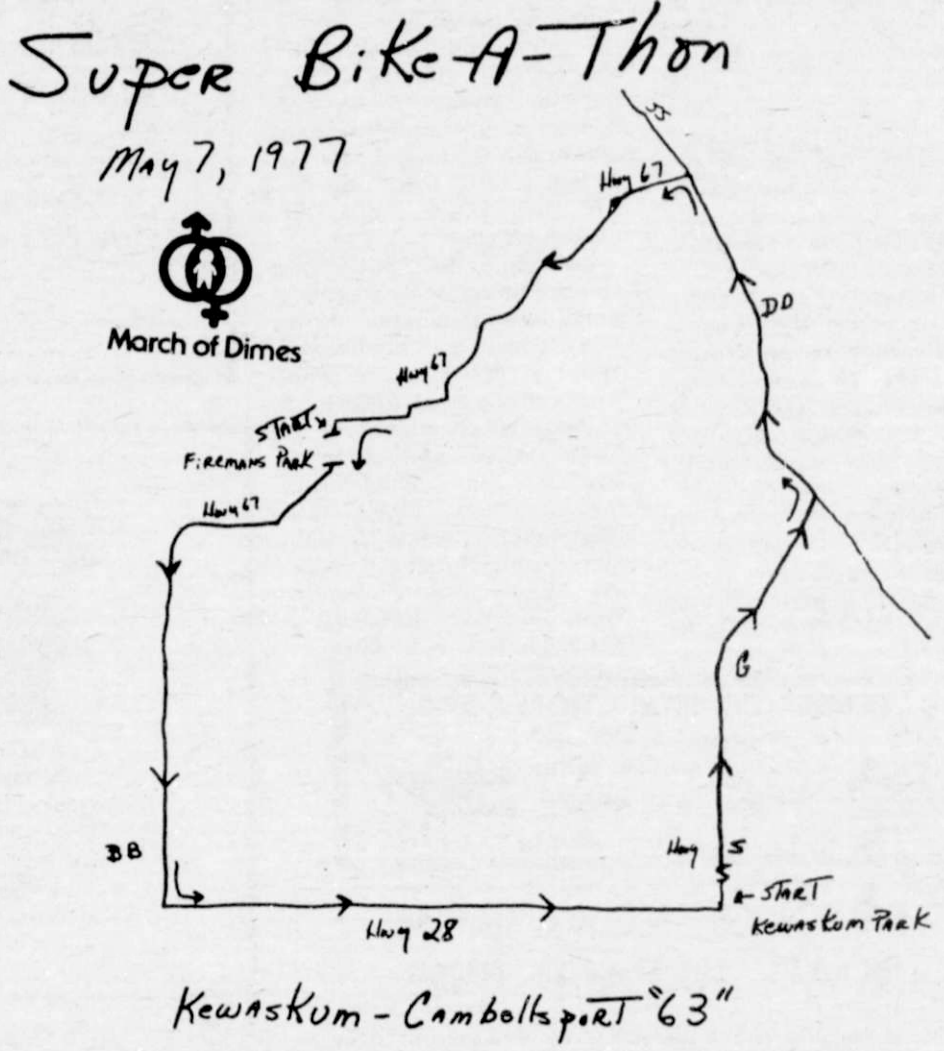

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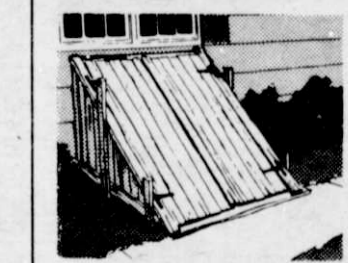
