54-year-old overhead bridge on Highway 45 just north of Kewaskum will soon be reconstructed according to James Rosenmerkel, Project Design Engineer, Dept of Transportation

Rosenmerkel stated that studies have been completed by his department and joint

meetings have been held with the Washington County Highway Commission, Village of Kewaskum and the Town of Kewaskum. All are in accordance with the proposal as is Glenway Backhaus, the only property owner affected. He would lose approximately 2.7 acres of land.


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Board to Discuss 1977-78 Programs





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
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
