Bids for Park Will Be Advertised

According to a joint decision by the Kewaskum Village Board and James Arthur of Arthur and Arthur and Associates Monday night, bids for the new Kewaskum Kiwanis Park will be advertised on May 27 and June 3, and the opening of bids will take place on June 20 at 8 p. m.

Arthur appeared, he stated, to set bid dates and make sure we are bidding the right things.

Dan Schmidt, Park Chairman, received the paper work from Tom Blotz, Recreational Aids Specialist with the DNR, in which the total for the park is to be submitted for

funding is \$185,100, of which \$92,550 is shared funding.

There will be seven individual contracts awarded, one each for excavating, curb, gutter, sewer and water, electrical, plumbing, heating and ventilating. All bids will be open for sixty days or until August 20. All bids are subject to approval or rejection by the board.

Schmidt questioned Arthur as to the advisability of hiring a general contractor to carry the brunt of the work. Arthur advised against this policy since there is a 10% to 15% charge for this service. Board's decision was to handle the contracting themselves.

Village to Blacktop, Resurface Streets, Purchase Garbage Truck

The authorization to advertise for bids to blacktop and resurface several streets was given by the Kewaskum Village Board Monday night.

Supt. of Public Works, Augie Bilgo, stated that he talked to two firms, Payne & Dolan and Ram Construction and got some information as to what route to take. On new streets with no blacktop, a 2 to 2½ inch base coat is put down one year and the following year a 1½ inch finish coat is applied. This allows the area to settle before applying the second coat. Bilgo stated they could cover more area with the money budgeted this year by going this route.

President Charles Miller, questioned James Arthur of Arthur & Arthur, who was at the meeting to discuss the park project, as to what he recommended. He stated that they usually go with a binder course of 1 7/8 inch or 2 inches first and then a 1 inch to 1 1/8 inch finish course, which would be a total of 3 inches, whereas the village has always used a total of 4 inches.

Proposed streets to be worked on this year would be: Edgewood to Forest, Edgewood South, Brooklane and Moraine Court. Estimated

cost, figured on price paid last year, would be \$12 per ton and an additional \$1.50 per ton for the finish coat.

Bids will be by the ton, with a figure for tack coating the first coat, and will include shaping and grading. The village will provide the gravel.

Bilgo also stated that he talked to several communities on the size garbage truck they are using and at the last meeting he had recommended going from a 16 yard to 17 yard truck, but now would like to recommend going to a 20 yard truck. Raynor Herriges inquired if this would mean having to go to a tandem? Bilgo said no, just the bigger wheel base. Since the motion had been made at the previous meeting concerning the truck, advertising for bids will go out.

The Board had interviewed three candidates for the position of Building Inspector. Motion was made and passed to appoint Henry Becker, who was presently filling the position on a temporary basis.

William Martin stated that invitations to twenty various people had been sent concerning the re-appraisal of village property. The bids will be opened at the June 6 meeting.

Curriculum Study and Revision Funds Approved by School Board

Funds for beginning a curriculum study and revision were approved at the Kewaskum Board of Education meeting Monday evening. The action approved \$2,500.00 to hire teachers to begin planning during the summer, and some volunteers from the community will also be asked to participate in the planning stages of the curriculum study.

A second proposal, to begin a program of hiring lay readers for student writing projects was also approved. This program will allocate between \$1500 and \$2000 to hire people to read and evaluate writing of high school students. It would be supplementary to the work done by English teachers, and would be an attempt to improve writing skills.

A contract was offered to Sally Johnson for high school English and social studies. Miss Johnson is a graduate of Eau Claire and has three years of teaching experience.

In other business, the board approved fencing for the ball diamond east of the tennis courts, with a maximum of 50 feet on each base line. Approval was given to transfer monies from inactive student activity accounts to the baseball club to purchase a pitching machine. A statement was made by Mary Ellen McElhatton, congratulating the board on its work and expressing the wish that reporting would be more positive and accurate. Dave Vande Vrede then indicated his feeling that he did not agree, that he thought the reporting in general was accurate. He indicated he was resigning, and that he felt he'd been treated unfairly by the board in salary considerations.

A closed session was held following the open meeting to discuss a student personnel problem, administrator evaluations and salaries and negotiations.

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'Women in the Middle Years' Offered at KHS

Between growing up and growing old are the middle years, a period during which women and men experience biological and emotional changes. As jobs shift and children leave home, people begin to ask themselves: who am I? and what do I want to do with the rest of my life?

"Women in the Middle Years", a four-week course beginning Monday, June 6, from 7-9:40 p.m., will look at this phase of adult development. It will cover topics such as physical and psychological changes, cultural attitudes towards men and women in the middle years, and survival skills for making the most of these years.

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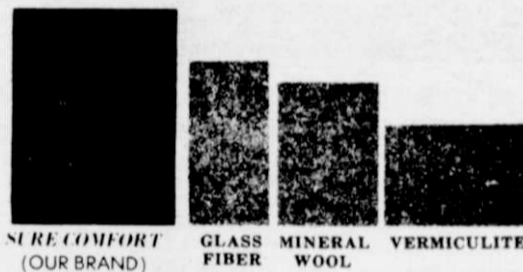

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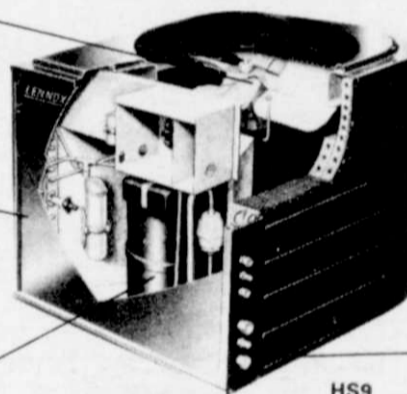

The board will discuss teaching principal salaries and a student discipline question in closed session following the open meeting.

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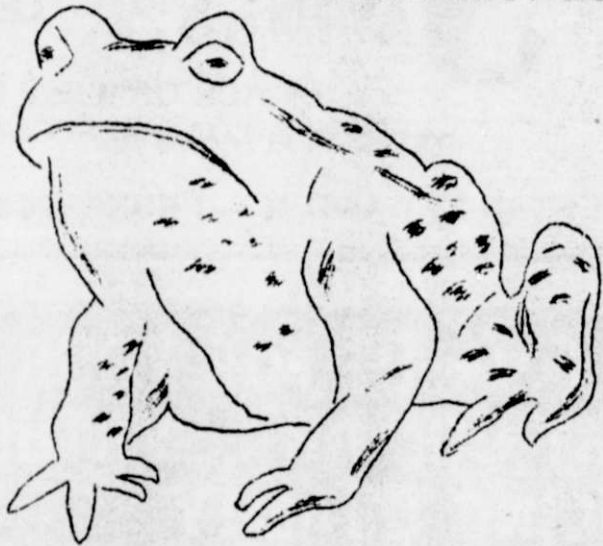

Valley Bancorporation, parent company of Valley Banks, posted total consolidated resources of \$344.6 million on March 31, a 13.2 per cent increase over the same date a year ago. Total loan volume at the Valley Banks climbed 15.4 per cent from \$173.9 million on March 31, 1976 to \$200.7 million on the same date this year. Total deposits amounted to \$299 million, up 13 per cent over the \$264.6 million posted last year. Time deposits climbed \$29.0 million while demand deposits rose \$5.4 million.

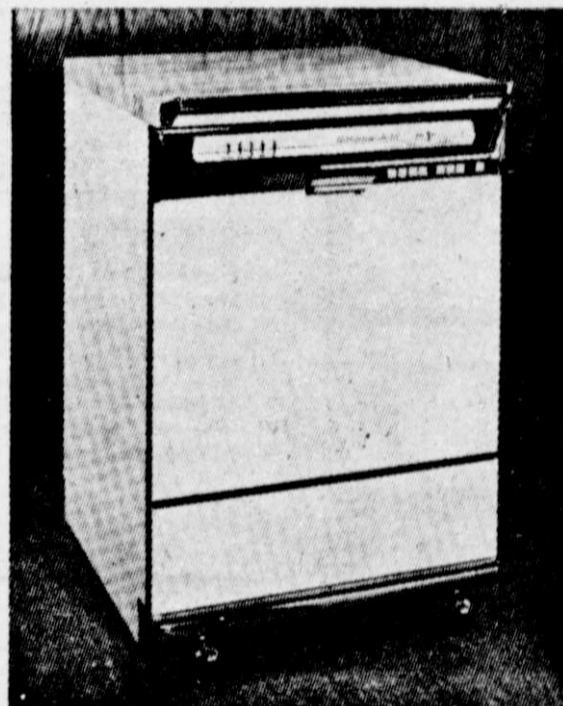
During the first three months of 1977, net income totalled \$550,666 or 82 cents per share, compared to \$615,446 or 92 cents per share during the first quarter a year earlier. The decline in income before securities transactions resulted primarily from continued pressure on interest margins.

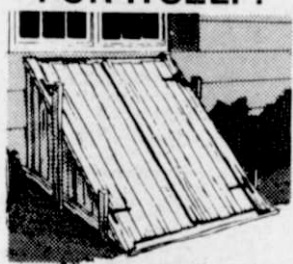

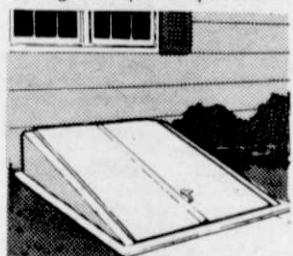

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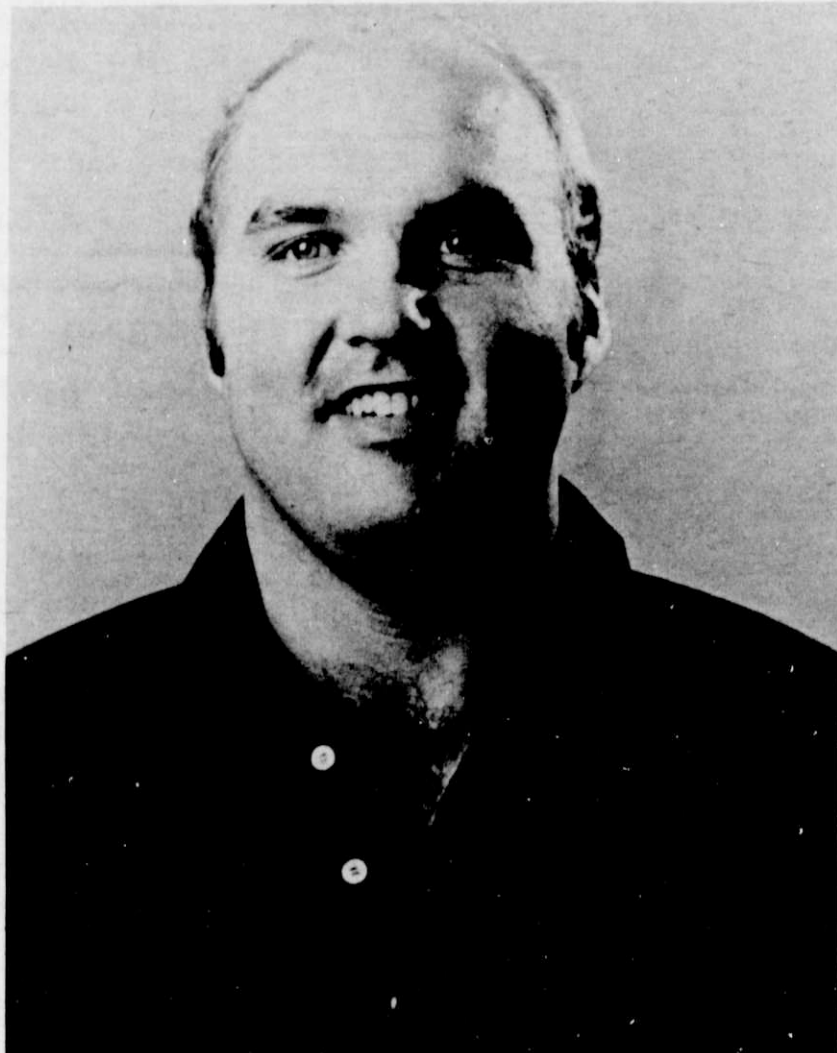
