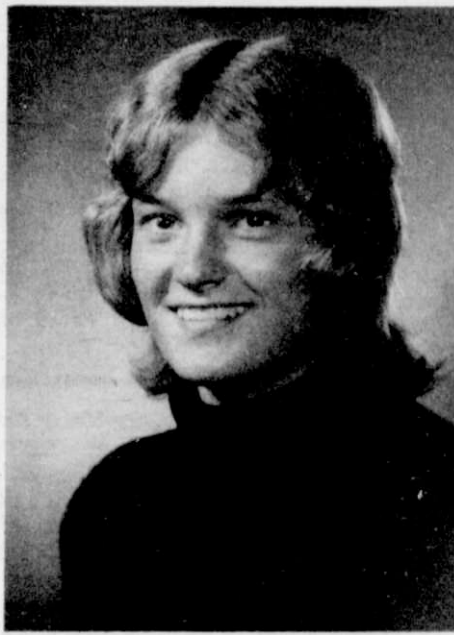

By-Pass of Village Suggested At Meeting on Hwy. 45 Bridge

James Rosenmerkel and Walter Gluege of the Department of Transportation were in Kewaskum on May 18 to conduct a public informational meeting on the reconstruction of the Highway 45 bridge just north of the village limits.

Rosenmerkel, Project Design Engineer, conducted the meeting, at which approximately fifteen interested citizens appeared. Rosenmerkel explained the department's recommendation of moving the present bridge and roadway approximately 150 feet to the west. As had been explained previously, there is no opposition to this plan from any of the parties involved. The Village of Kewaskum, Town of Kewaskum or Glenway Backhaus, whose property is affected. He would lose approximately 2.7 acres in the move.

The bridge could be reconstructed on the same site at a cost of \$330,000 but this would not alleviate the problem of visibility or curvature. The cost of moving the bridge and roadway would be approximately \$550,000.

The department is projecting a car load of approxi-

mately 2,000 cars per day in the next twenty years. Northwestern Railroad is projecting a train load of 10 trains per day, with an average of 100 to 120 cars per train.

The number of trains would eliminate the alternative plan of removing the bridge and constructing a grade crossing with signals on old Fond du Lac Road.

Herb Tennes of the Washington County Highway Committee questioned whether it wouldn't be wiser to construct a highway to the west of Kewaskum thus by-passing the village. Tennes also asked about the proposed by-pass of Highway 45 around West Bend and how that would affect Kewaskum.

Rosenmerkel stated that the present roadway could handle the projected traffic.

Tennes stated that there seemed to be a lot of traffic filtering through Kewaskum. He stated that there would be a lot of money spent on the bridge and it would be better to study the matter thoroughly before putting the bridge in the wrong place. He stated "If I lived here (Kewaskum) I would promote a by-pass

of the village."

Gluege stated that Highway 45 by-pass of West Bend, at this point, would not affect Kewaskum at all. It would end at Highway D and if at a future time construction would affect Kewaskum, there would be no reason why you couldn't swing around the village.

Village President, Charles Miller, stated that a by-pass around the village would not eliminate congestion from Mauthe Lake traffic. He also stated that there are objections to a road to the west.

As a result of no objections voiced at the informational meeting, Rosenmerkel stated on Monday, May 23, that a design study report will be submitted to the Central Office of the Department of Transportation.

He also stated that they would go ahead on the assumption that a public hearing will not be required and the final designs for the bridge and plans for letting of bids will be finalized with the hope of beginning construction in the spring of 1978.



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Town Awards Bid for Road Construction

Town Board of Kewaskum met at the Town Garage, Highway 45, on Wednesday, May 18.

Bids were opened from road contractors Wolf Construction of Oconomowoc and Scott Construction of Lake Delton. The bid was awarded to Scott Construction with a price of .455 cents per gallon of MC-3000 and \$4.40 per ton of cover aggregate, furnished, placed and rolled.

In addition to the advertised 1977 road construction requirements, a separate bid was submitted by Wolf Construction for an alternate slurry seal.

The Board discussed finishing West Moraine Drive.

Ted Schoofs appeared before the Board requesting that the top soil from his field be salvaged, should it be necessary to widen the road at that point. The Board made an appointment with Schoofs to make a personal inspection of the land in question.

Agents' schedules were approved by the Board for beer and liquor licenses being applied for by organizations and corporations: St. Michael's Congregation (Kenneth H. Doll), Hon-E-Kor, Inc. (Gilbert Korth), Amerahn, Inc. (Allen E. Amerling), and Glacier Ridge Corporation (Thomas F. Smith).

The Town of Ashford Board has given approval for the Town of Kewaskum to dump stumps, stones, and other solid fill from W. Moraine Drive onto Badger Road, located on the townline of the Towns of Ashford and Au-

burn.

In other business discussed, the Board decided to review the existing Mobile Home Ordinance and a non-resident relief bill for Bernice Prey was forwarded to the town attorney.

The next scheduled Town Board meeting will be Wednesday, June 15, 7:30 p. m., at the Town Garage, Highway 45, north.

At the previous Town Board meeting, the 1977 assessor was hired. Raymond Weinholt, certified assessor from Random Lake, began his duties the second week of May.

As of Monday, May 23, dog licenses can be obtained by town residents from Town Treasurer, Dolores Prost. Mrs. Prost was sworn in by the county clerk as town dog licensor.

OUR SACRED TRUST

They all echo the words of John Adams after the first war: "Posterity! You will never know how much it cost the present generation to preserve your freedom. I hope you will make good use of it!"

Phi Theta Kappa is a national honorary society for two year colleges. Its purpose is to recognize and to encourage scholarship among students, as well as to provide opportunity for the development of leadership and service.

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Assistant Superintendent Position Voted Down by School Board

A number of proposals for the 1977-78 school year were acted on by the Kewaskum School Board at the meeting Monday evening. The major question was that of adding a person to the central office administrative staff. At the May 16 meeting, a majority of the board had indicated they felt a position should be added, but this did not happen at Monday's meeting.

Votes were taken on a part-time assistant superintendent position and on a full-time position. The first was voted down 4-3 and the second 5-2. No vote was taken on the question of adding a business manager. John Tassar expressed his concern that he had received a number of telephone calls in which the people calling had known administrative salaries, even though these figures to that time had been discussed only in closed session by the board members.

In discussing other proposals, the board approved making the principal's position at Farmington half-time. The vote was 4-3 on this proposal. Putting half the time of the Middle School guidance counselor at the elementary level was approved 4-2. Unanimous approval was given to teaching an algebra class at the eighth grade level, as was eliminating one teaching position at Kewaskum Elementary School. Because the central administrative offices will not be moved, the proposal to buy computer time for educational programs was not acted on for next year. The computer will not be in the high school building and would be difficult for classes to use.

Administrator contracts for 1977-78 were approved. Increases for the five administrators (excluding teaching principals) will average 6.4%. The board approved trans-

porting the Beechwood kindergarten students to the Farmington School next fall. There are presently 9 students at Beechwood and 32 at Farmington. There would then be two classes at Farmington. This decision may be reviewed at a future time.

A contract was issued to Fredrick Lautz to teach high school math and science. Mr. Lautz attended college at La Crosse and Madison and is a beginning teacher. He will also assist in coaching football and wrestling.

A question was raised on student dress, and a review of the laws and regulations will be made. A question of board policies relating to a student problem was also raised, but was referred to administrative staff.

In other business, the board approved replacing front doors at the high school, allowing the Farmington PTO to keep the Farmington library open at certain times in summer, hiring personnel for the kindergarten screening program, and continuing the student board representative program.

A closed session was held following the meeting to discuss a student question and salaries of teaching principals.
