Kewaskum Girls Third in State

880 Relay Team's 1st Sets State Record; Carrie Kempf 1st in 220

Although qualifying for only three events, the Kewaskum girls performed outstandingly by placing third in State Class B Track meet at Madison over the weekend. They placed just two points behind second place Whitewater. As expected, Prairie du Chien captured the state title.

Kewaskum (sixth a year ago with only Carrie Kempf in the meet) scored 28 points, just two short of its maximum. Whitewater scored 30 and Prairie du Chien 52.

Losing out by two points prevented them from winning a large WIAA trophy which was awarded to all first and second place teams.

The Indians made the best of having just one relay and one runner in two events. They took two firsts and one second.

With three good passes, a 25.6 split from their third runner (Jenny Schaub) and a great anchor leg by Carrie Kempf, the Indian girls pulled away from Prairie du Chien for a state record of 1:46.1 in the 880 relay. Schaub's 25.6 split against a tough Prairie du Chien runner, set the stage for the last 220. Kewaskum anticipated a

win with Kempf running anchor. Carrie turned into high gear on the corner to take the lead and held it all the way to the tape.

Four excited girls got together on the infield minutes later to hear their time and receive awards. They couldn't believe it but they were state champs in record time. Besides Kempf and Schaub, other members of the team are Laurie Wilson and Carrie's sister Pam Kempf. All but Carrie, a senior and star of the team, will be back next year. Schaub is a junior, Pam a sophomore and Wilson only a freshman.

But Carrie was far from finished for the afternoon. Later, after catching her breath, she also lined up for the 220 finals, and 26 seconds after the gun went off she hit the tape first again for another state title.

Carrie also had taken second in the long jump Friday so she was involved in all of her team's 28 points. Although she won the 100 and placed fifth in the long jump last year, Kempf did not enter the 100 this year.

Congratulations to Coach Connie Kreuser and her girls for a great job.

The Kewaskum girls' var-

sity basketball team also made it to the state tournament this year, losing out to champion Cuba City.

On June 1, Health Officer R. G. Edwards, M.D., received a report on the safety of our river swimming area from the Wisconsin State Laboratory on a sample taken by Police Chief Don Hlavaty. The test was good.

Village Beach, Swim Lessons to Open June 13; Registration June 11

The Kewaskum village beach will officially open Monday, June 13. If this date must be changed, notice will be given. Supervised swimming hours will be from 10 a. m. to 8 p. m. Monday thru Saturday. Sunday hours will be 12 noon to 8 p. m. A "Beach Closed" sign will be displayed in the lift station window whenever lifeguards are not present.

Swim lessons will begin June 13 and will be conducted from 10 a. m. to 1 p. m. Monday thru Friday in two sessions of three weeks each. Notice of any daily cancellations will be given over WBKV.

Registration for swim lessons will be held Saturday, June 11, at the Kewaskum Municipal Building on First St. from 9 to 11 a. m. Classes offered will include Beginners, Advanced Beginners, Intermediates, and Swimmers. Specific class times will be determined at registration. Classes for Lifesaving or Adult Beginners will be arranged when and if there is sufficient interest.

A fee of \$1.00 for Kewaskum residents and \$2.00 for non-residents is payable at the time of registration and will cover both sessions.

The personnel at the beach will be Mike Diez and Bruce Peterson (swimming instructors), Dan Meilahn (head guard), Jim Backhaus and Tony Simon (guards).

Swimmers are advised to be alert for any debris which may be in the swimming area. Caution is urged when entering or leaving the water on the east bank as the rocks are gradually sinking into the river. The practice of diving off certain rocks is still allowed, but may have to be discontinued if the situation becomes too dangerous.

Parents are urged to remind their children of the rules which must be obeyed to assure safety. Violators will have to pay certain consequences related to specific rules, will be denied certain swimming privileges or will be expelled from the beach area. Parents will also be notified of persistent misbehavior. In addition, the Kewaskum Police will cooperate in enforcing rules if necessary. Rules are:

1. Rocks, mud, sand or other objects must never be thrown in or near the beach or swimming area.
2. Floating devices and swimming aids (innertubes, inflatable rafts, large beach balls, or "life preservers") are not permitted in the water as such devices can carry a non-swimmer to water of dangerous depth where he may become separated from such device.
3. Glass and metal objects (bottles, toys, small metal shovels, etc.) are not allowed on the beach. Soft plastic pails are acceptable but must never be thrown.
4. Pushing, shoving, and horseplay is not permitted on either raft or pier due to the possibility of injury. Running on the pier is prohibited

as it is dangerous to yourself and others, especially when it is wet and slippery. Swimming is never allowed under the raft or pier, because if someone bumps their head or injures himself he may not be spotted in due time. Going down the slide in a standing position is not allowed. This is extremely dangerous.

5. Any anti-social actions will not be tolerated. This means no physical or verbal abuse, excessive teasing, or badgering of one individual by another. The beach is a place to have fun and no one should have to fear bullying by others.

6. Bikes are to be parked well away from the beach area, preferably in the avail-

able bike rack. Bicycles are never to be ridden on the beach, and certainly not into the water. Pets, such as dogs, are to be kept away from the beach and never taken into the water. During crowded conditions, a dunked dog may react instinctively and become vicious. Food should not be brought onto the beach or into the water. Picnic facilities are available elsewhere in the park.

7. Anyone under 6 years of age must be accompanied by a responsible adult. Also, guards cannot be requested to watch over any specific individuals. This is not a baby sitting service. The guard stand is for guards ONLY. It is neither a seat for others nor a depository for miscellaneous items, as children's watches, radios, towels, etc. Guards are for your protection. Their orders and judgments should be heeded at all

times. If a guard deems someone's behavior irresponsible or dangerous, the offender will be ordered to leave the beach area for a designated period.

8. Litter has become somewhat of a problem. Parents should instruct their children to use the trash barrels for depositing any paper wrappers, bottles, or cans.

9. The matter of jumping and diving off the dam is a critical one. This is extremely hazardous and foolhardy. Above the dam, tree limbs and other jagged objects can collect and may not be seen by a jumper. Below the dam, there are deep holes and swifter currents which pose threats to novice swimmers. Also, there is a concrete ledge which can be struck by jumping or diving. The greatest hazard is that the antics of older children attract

younger inexperienced swimmers to the dam area where an accident may occur. Again this year no one will be allowed to jump or dive off the dam. Guards will discourage these actions and the police will cooperate to enforce this rule.


10. Fishing is not allowed in the swimming area when any swimmers are present and is not recommended during any swimming hours. Obviously motorized boats are not to be operated in the swimming area and all other boats or canoes are to be launched and landed outside the beach area.

Weekend Storms, Tornadoes Hit Area; Barn Damaged by Fire

While a series of severe storms Saturday night and storms and tornadoes Sunday night sailed over southern Wisconsin, Kewaskum and Washington County escaped relatively lightly.

One tornado was believed to have hit a portion of the Town of Erin in Washington County around 10 p. m. Sunday, knocking down a barn and tipping over a house trailer. A tornado also appeared to have touched down about four miles south of Hartford, near Thompson, and followed a path south. Trees and lines were damaged.

The most severe tornadoes stabbed at a Jefferson County farm near Waterloo, hit hard in Dodge County's Mayville area then waged a full-scale assault on Waukesha County.

At Mayville, west of Kewaskum, it was reported one new home was demolished, the roof was torn off of a 25-unit apartment building and upper apartments were left in a shambles, and roofs were blown off of about eight homes.

In Waukesha County it was reported a half dozen tornadoes struck an area representing Brookfield, Pewaukee and Sussex, damaging buildings, blocking highways, tangling utility wires, and breaking a gas main. Some residents were evacuated.

and about 3,000 electric utility customers were without power temporarily.

In Dodge County, a barn was also reported destroyed east of Horicon.

The storm during the night Saturday resulted in heavy damage as a barn in the Kohlsville area was struck by lightning. The barn, belonging to Mark Pamperin, Midland Drive, and father Paul, was not completely destroyed. The downstairs portion of the barn was pretty well saved.

Cattle were removed from the barn, but fresh baled hay that had just been put up Saturday, an elevator and miscellaneous equipment were lost. The Kohlsville Fire Department was assisted by tankers from Theresa, Allenton and Kewaskum hauling water. The lightning apparently struck shortly after 3 a. m. Sunday.

Earlier Saturday, about 6:15 p. m., Kewaskum firemen were called out to assist Beechwood firemen at a fire on state owned land on Forest View, 1/2 mile north of Hy. S in the Town of Scott, Sheboygan County, about seven miles northeast of Kewaskum. The Beechwood department had the fire out when local firemen arrived on the scene. A good-sized area of pine trees and grass burned over.

Lawsuit Between the Village And Ideal Land, Inc. Settled

Attorney Gerald Kiefer appeared at the Kewaskum Village Board meeting Monday evening to explain to the board the settlement of the lawsuit between the village and Ideal Land, Inc.

The settlement culminated a lengthy dispute between the two parties involving bond money Ideal had put up when starting their subdivision.

Approximately \$12,000 had been paid by Ideal, of which approximately \$3,000 had been repaid by the village. The dispute centered around the \$9,600 held by the village. Ideal contended they had executed all necessary work in the subdivision, thus entitled to return of the \$9,600.

The Village contended that satisfactory execution had not taken place.

In September of 1976, Ideal initiated a lawsuit against the village for refund of the \$9,600 cash performance fund along with interest. They also sought \$4,000 in damages for denial of building permits on remaining lots in the subdivi-

The village also sued for an additional \$1,224.40 for catch basins required to be installed along with curb and gutter.

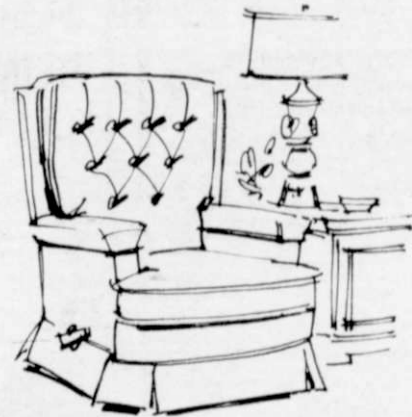
The settlement, out of court, will split the \$9,600 plus accrued interest between the two parties.

The board passed a motion to dismiss the lawsuit and authorized Village Commissioner William Martin to issue a check for \$5,265.29 to Levy & Levy, Ideal's attorneys for their share of the settlement.

Another motion was passed to rescind the motion passed on September 20, 1976 whereby a moratorium was placed on granting building permits in Ideal Land Subdivision.

From this time on, building permits will be accepted for approval from Ideal in accordance with normal procedure.

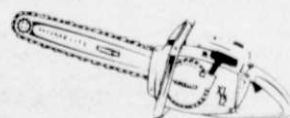

Batzlers Observe 45th Anniversary

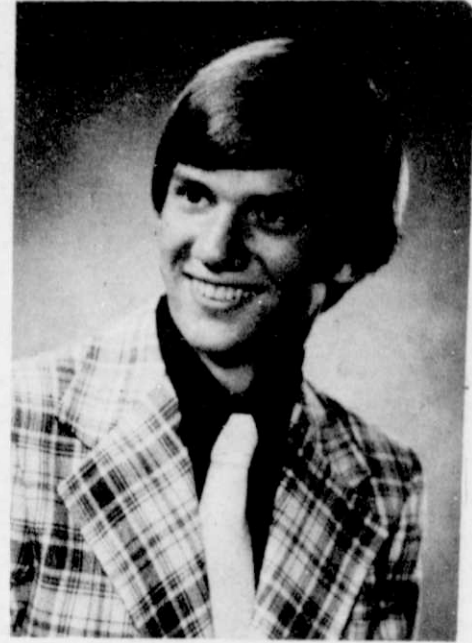

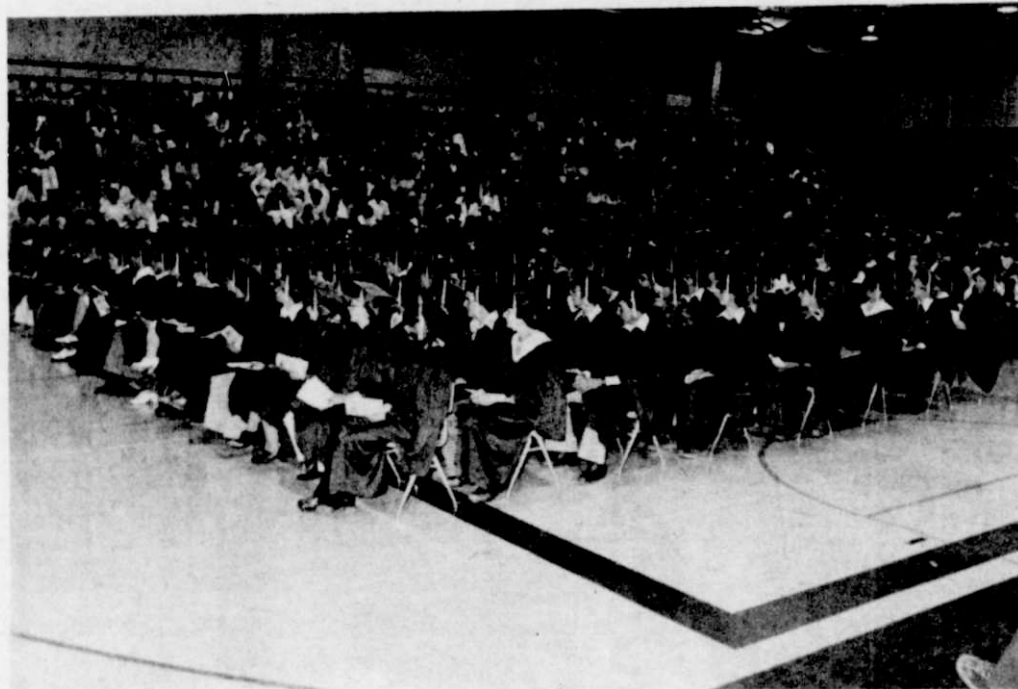

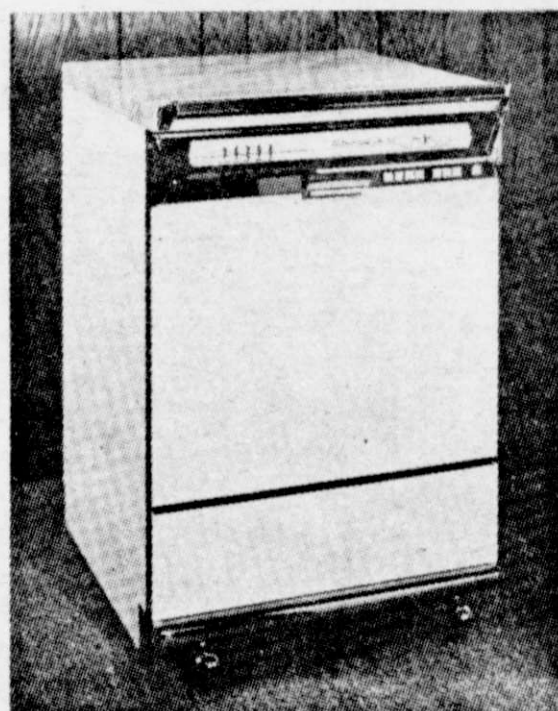

Bids Are Opened for Paving of Streets, Revaluation of Village

A public hearing on tavern license applications was held prior to the regular Kewaskum Village Board meeting on Monday, June 6.

Chief of Police, Donald Hlavaty, had no objections to the eleven license applications, but did submit a report, suggesting denial of the application of Jordan's Tavern. The board would act on that at the regular meeting.

Bids were opened for asphalt paving of village streets. Ram Construction of Byron enclosed a bid bond of \$1,442.33. Their bid for binder coat was \$1.77 per square yard for a total of \$19,530.18; surface coat of 670 ton at \$12.95 per ton for a total of \$8,676.50; tack coat MS-2 at 80 cents per gallon for a total of \$640. and the prime coat MC-1 at 75 cents per gallon with no final figure. The total bid was \$28,846.68.

The second bid was from Payne & Dolan with a 5% bid bond enclosed. Binder coat of 11,000 yards at \$1.83 per square yard for a total of \$20,192.22; surface coat at \$12.19 per ton for a total of \$8,167.30 and tack coat at 45 cents per gallon with no final figure for a total of \$28,359.52. They did not submit a bid for the prime coat.

Gregor Nigh made a motion to have the committee meet with Supt. Augie Bilgo and award the contract. The motion passed unanimously.

Bids were then opened for the revaluation of the village. Bowman Appraisal of Appleton submitted a bid for \$10,600.00; Knapp Appraisals of Pittsville, no bid; Arrow Appraisals of DePere, a bid of \$9,998.00; James R. Laird of Appleton, a bid of \$9,500.00, and Chase & Chase of Monona, a bid of \$13,000.00.

These bids were based on the 1976 tax rolls and would indicate what new properties would have to be picked up both mercantile and residential.

Dan Schmidt made the motion to refer to the Finance Committee. The motion unanimously passed.

Nancy Malvick, Recycling Chairperson, of the Kewaskum Junior Woman's Club appeared to inquire about the decision of the board on a place within the village to move the recycling center. The present location has been outgrown and at a previous meeting Trustee Dan Schmidt had asked board members to see if they could locate a new place.

Malvick stated that since the recycling center has been in existence, a ton of cans and several tons of glass have been collected. The money from this project has bought a glass crusher and an additional \$400 has been realized. This money is being used by the Juniors for their conservation projects, one of which is taking Woodsy Owl to the area schools.

Malvick further stated that the center has tripled in growth since its inception and is now the only one in Washington County that is still active and the only one in the

surrounding area including Ozaukee County that takes glass. There are people coming from the Cedarburg - Mequon area with their glass, she stated.

Village President, Charles Miller, stated that "Malvick's devotion to this project should be complimented and that the program has a good promoter." "Thank you for sticking with it," he stated. He further stated that the project has helped the village cut down their expense at the landfill site. Miller told Malvick that the matter would be brought up further into the meeting.

A building permit for the new Sison Medical Clinic was submitted for board approval. The clinic will be built on the south end of the village, which was annexed to the village last year. The plans were approved pending the receipt of the proper forms from the architect.

Building plans were also approved for Embassy Construction for a one family residence at 415 Lazy Lane and Radke Homes for a one family residence at 708 Moraine Court. A permit was also approved for a storage shed at 1017 Edgewood Road.

The board granted liquor licenses to eleven applicants and authorized clerk Martin to inform Mr. Jordan of Jordan's Tavern to meet with the board on Tuesday, June 14, at 7 p. m. to review his application.

Miller stated that there was two vacancies on the Plan Commission with L. N. Peterson and Wayland Tessar requesting not to serve again. Orville Behnke's term is up. He submitted for board approval the names of Donald Mlodzik for a three year term, Orville Behnke a three year term and Dan Schmidt to fill out the remaining one year term of Peterson. The board unanimously passed the suggestion.

Board authorized Clerk Martin to send out a copy of the increased water rate schedule to all village residents affected by the increase.

According to the Public Service Commission, a notice only has to be published in the municipal office but the board felt an individual notice should be sent.

Board authorized the hiring of Ed Christie to proceed with the job study of all village employees which has been discussed at previous meetings. The cost will not exceed \$350.00 and should be completed in a couple of weeks.

A motion was passed by the board to grant permission for the Kewaskum Junior Woman's Club to move their recycling center from its present location to a storage shed on village owned property, pending approval by neighbors concerned.

Gregor Nigh reported that Recreation Director Tom Larsen stated that swimming would begin on June 13 pending a favorable water sample and favorable weather and that the recreation program would begin at the same time.

Kasten Speaks to Area Physicians

Congressman Robert Kasten spoke to a gathering of physicians, dentists and hospital administrators at a meeting Tuesday at St. Joseph's Community Hospital in West Bend. The meeting was organized by the Washington County Physician's Alliance, the socio-economic and political arm of the State Medical Society.

The format of the meeting was a breakfast with questions from the audience answered by Congressman Kasten. Areas of concern to local doctors included welfare reform, President Carter's proposed limit on hospital expenses, and proposals for national health insurance.

When asked about his interest in State politics, Kasten replied "Very likely I

will run for Governor". As in previous campaigns, he will rely heavily on a highly organized campaign organization.

When asked how local professional people could become more involved in government, Kasten said organizations such as the American Medical Association, State Medical Societies, and the Wisconsin Physician's Alliance were all very important but that they did not have as much impact on legislators as direct contact. He indicated that those with an interest in political problems should make it a point to become acquainted with their local, state, and federal elected officials. Personal contact and personal involvement can have a great impact on elected officials.

**Pan Fish Stocked
In River Here**

Some 76,000 pan fish were
stocked last week in child-
ren's fishing ponds in five

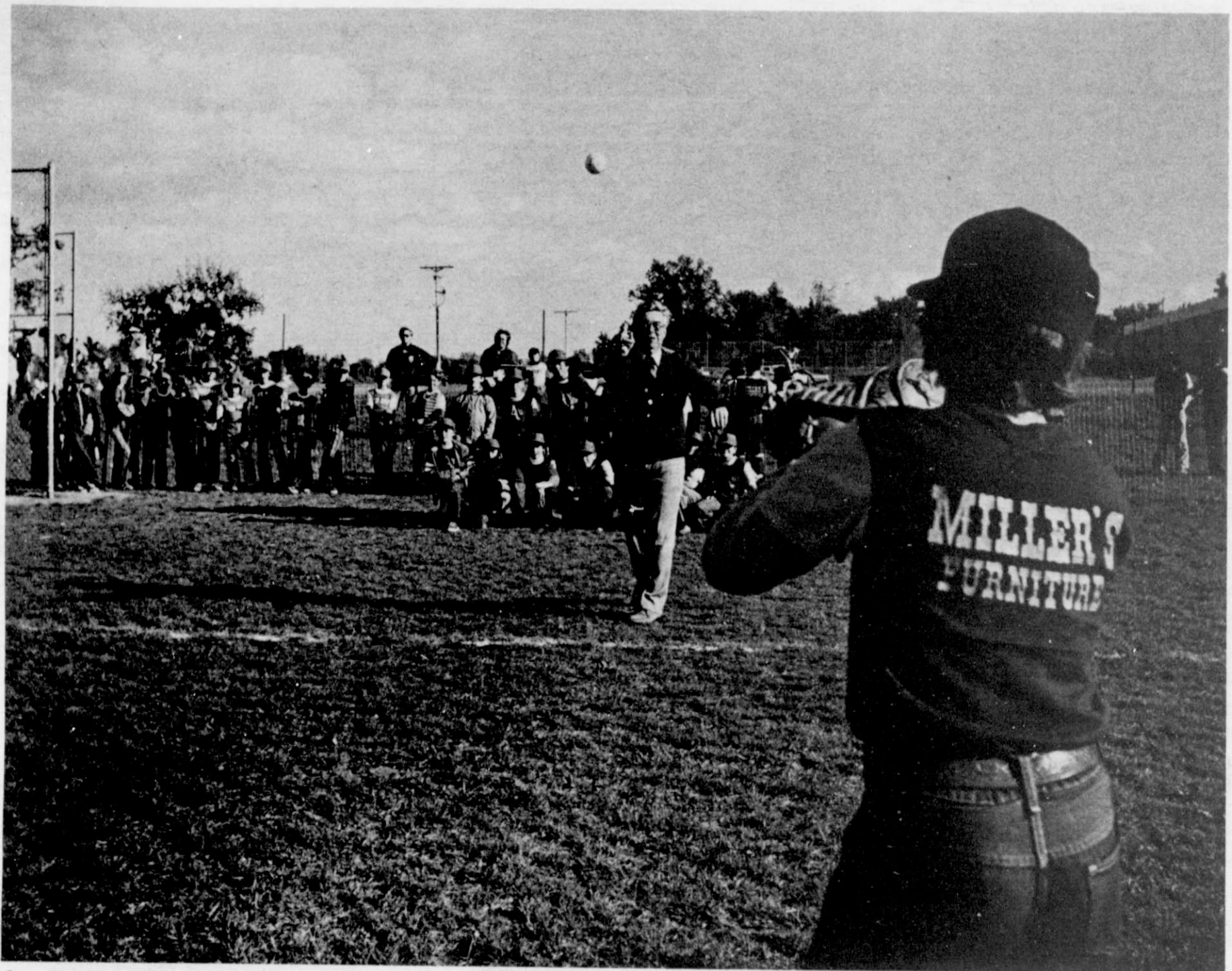
