The Kewaskum High School Class of 1917's 60-year reunion was attended by three remaining members, August Bilgo of Kewaskum, Ralph Schaefer of West Bend and Mrs. Jack (Lorinda Schaefer) Tessar of Kewaskum.

Guests included Mrs. Louis (Corrine) Opgenorth, Kewaskum, whose late husband was a member of the class; Arthur Guenther, Sr. of Cedar Lake Home, formerly of Campbellsport, whose late wife Mae (Raether) was also

a member of the class, and Maryann Gruber, a friend of Mr. Bilgo's.

Besides the above mentioned, the class of '17 included Harry Schaefer, Hulda Quandt Schowalter, Leo Marx, Pearson Brown (killed in World War I), Louis Opgenorth and Mae Raether.

The 60th anniversary reunion (1917-1977) was held at the Glacier Inn on Friday, June 10, with a dinner at 5 p. m.

The original freshmen class

had 33 pupils.

Olive Opgenorth, who resides in the State of Washington, is the only living teacher of the class. Mr. Simon was principal of the old KHS at the time. The grade and high school classes were held in the old four-room building (long since torn down) on East Main St.

Basketball games were played in the old opera-house, where the plays given by the school were also held.

Two Men Are Killed, Four Seriously Hurt in Accidents

Steven M. Fickler a young Boltonville man, was killed late Tuesday night in a one-car accident at the "T" intersection of N. Paradise Road and State Hwy. 28 in the Town of Farmington, east of Kewaskum.

According to authorities, Fickler, 22, of 9261 Bolton Drive, R. 1, Kewaskum, apparently ran the stop sign at the south end of N. Paradise at State 28. He crossed the intersection and struck the steep embankment.

According to the report of the Sheriff's Department, Fickler's pickup truck went 39 feet up the embankment and rolled back down 24 feet before coming to rest.

Coroner Bob Boltz said Fickler, who was pronounced dead on arrival at St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, died of a skull fracture.

The accident, which happened just before midnight, was the 19th fatality in the county this year and the third in less than a week.

Truck Driver Killed

A milk truck driver was killed in a one-vehicle accident early Saturday on State Hwy. 28 near St. Kilian Heights Rd. west of Kewaskum in the Town of Wayne.

Bradley P. Lukens, 20, of Cedar Grove was fatally injured when the truck he was driving for Hy-Way Transit, Cedar Grove, went off the road and hit an embankment at 5:05 a. m.

According to the accident report, the truck, which was loaded with milk, went into the ditch and came to rest on its right side. The report listed the soft, low, narrow shoulder of the road as a factor in the mishap.

Lukens reportedly received head injuries. He was taken to St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, by Kewaskum's rescue squad.

Three Hurt in Crash

Three men were injured, one of them critically in a two-car accident last Wednesday on County Trunk H near Townline Road, several miles west of Kewaskum.

Richard R. Bonenfant, 43, of County H, R. 1, Campbellsport, was reported to be in critical condition Thursday morning at Milwaukee County General Hospital. The Sheriff's Department said he received head and internal injuries.

The driver of the other car, Gary M. Linzo, 25, of 701 Memorial Dr., Kewaskum, reportedly sustained head cuts and a hip injury. A spokesperson at St. Vincent's Hospital, Greep Bay, said he was to undergo surgery for the hip injury Friday morning.

Douglas W. Krull, 25, Green Bay, a passenger in Linzo's auto, was in stable condition at St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend. The accident report said he sustained a head cut and spinal injury.

All the injured were taken to St. Joseph's by the Kewaskum rescue squad. Bonenfant and Linzo were subsequently transferred.

The accident report said Bonenfant had come over a hillcrest and braked to avoid a slow-moving truck driven by Ralph J. Ruplinger of Townline Road. Bonenfant apparently lost control of the car and crossed the center line, striking the Linzo car, which was trying to stop.

Train Strikes Truck

A train-truck accident south of Campbellsport around 10:35 Wednesday morning sent the driver of the truck, Duane Streen, 24, of Campbellsport to the emergency room at St. Agnes Hos-

Residents Complain to Board of Seepage Into Homes During Storm

Six residents of the area of Meadow Lane and Clinton Street in Kewaskum appeared before a specially called meeting of the village board on Tuesday evening to complain of water and sewage seepage into their homes during the storm of June 11.

Orville Behnke was the spokesman of the group and had drawn a map of the area concerned. He stated that he had lived in his present home on the corner of Meadow Lane and Clinton for seven-

teen years and hadn't had any great problem with water but that twice in the past two years the water actually ran into the home.

On Behnke's map he illustrated the number of catch basins on the streets in the area and how the water flow comes from the surrounding streets and actually ends in the catch basins on his corner.

The board explained that the water is to flow into a mini creek but when a rain of more than three inches oc-

pital, Fond du Lac.
The Campbellsport Rescue Squad responded to the call and reported it took about 15 minutes to free Strea from the cab of the gravel truck owned by Butzke Sand & Gravel of rural Campbellsport.

Strea was reported in serious condition, according to the squad, which took him to the hospital. Possible neck injuries were suspected, along with numerous cuts and bruises.

According to the squad, Strea said he was driving on Sentry Drive and heard the whistle of the southbound C & N W train. But he could not stop in time and the truck rolled on the tracks, where the train struck the cab, he reportedly said.

curs in an hour's time, the creek was filled and the water from the catch basins had no place to go.

Behnke stated that the catch basins had been put in more than 17 years ago and since then a new subdivision on Brooklane Drive had been added as well as the homes in Bel Ric Acres, from where the water also runs into the mini creek. He suggested deepening the creek and may be straightening out the curve so the water could run faster.

Trustee Dan Schmidt said that straightening the curve was being talked about now. He also stated that when such a large amount of water in a short space of time occurs, there isn't much that can be done.

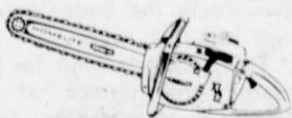
Another resident, Gerald Buchel, stated that he had to dump sewage out of a room and that this was the second time in two years that this had happened. He said he didn't mind water but the sewage was another problem.

After further discussion by the residents and the board, President Charles Miller stated that the matter would be brought to the attention of the engineers on the 20th of June when they appear at a board meeting to see if something can be done in that area.

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Schreiber Asks Federal Aid for Tornado Damage

Acting Governor Martin J. Schreiber last week requested limited federal assistance for the tornado-stricken counties of Fond du Lac, Columbia, Dodge, Washington, Jefferson and Waukesha because of \$6.2 million in public and private damage in those counties caused by the tornado.

Citing the extensive property damages, debris and tree damage caused by high winds and tornadoes on June 4 and 5, Schreiber asked President Carter to provide assistance to the afflicted property and business owners through low-cost loans available from the federal Small Business Administration. He also requested

financial assistance for debris clearance costs for county and local governments.

Representatives of Wisconsin state government toured the disaster-stricken areas Tuesday, June 7, to assess the extent of damage.

Schreiber has urged President Carter to take prompt action on the request, and said he expected a response in a few days.

Immediately following the tornado damage, Schreiber directed monitoring of the disaster relief programs by state agencies. In addition to the Division of Emergency Government meeting with local officials to ascertain relief needs, the Wisconsin State Patrol assisted county and local law enforcement personnel with traffic con-

trol and rescue work in the hard-hit area.

The Acting Governor also commended the hundreds of volunteers who have provided aid. "The spirit of cooperation, goodwill and help to one's neighbors being demonstrated in the face of adversity should make every Wisconsin resident proud. I am especially grateful for the

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work of the local Red Cross, Civil Defense officials, Future Farmers of America, the Mennonite disaster team and all others who are assisting during this difficult time," Schreiber said.

Editor:
With the teacher contract negotiating teams back at the bargaining table for the Kewaskum School District, a new wrinkle has appeared on the list of demands. Normally the teachers' unions, in this case the Kewaskum Education Association, demand that school boards give in to a so-called "fair share" agreement. The Kewaskum district already has "fair share," and the school board is now asking that it be dropped from the contract. Although this request is not common, it is highly commendable.

Under the current contract, all teachers in the district, whether or not they want, or agree with the KEA, for whatever reason it may be, must have a share of their monthly salary withheld in support of the union's activities. Individual teachers have no freedom of choice with this "fair share" agreement but to pay. Of course, they can always make the choice of looking for another job where paying dues to a private union isn't a stipulation for keeping their job.

I hope the board is serious with their request that "fair share" be dropped. They are hopefully not planning to use it just as a trade off item later in the negotiation process.

Citizens living in the Kewaskum district should take advantage of the open, public forums that are being held during these negotiations by attending them and letting the board know you want them to stand up for the freedom of choice for your teachers and to remain firm in their request to drop "fair share."

No one should be forced to support a union to keep their job. The right to refrain from support of union activities must be protected as is the right to join, or to support union activities. The school board must be made aware of how the people feel about this blatant form of compulsory unionism in Kewaskum.

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Budget Calling for Expenditures of \$3,171,720 Discussed by School Board

A 1977-78 budget calling for general fund expenditures of \$3,171,720 was discussed by the Kewaskum Board of Education Monday night. Debt service expenditures of \$320,662.95 was also called for in the budget.

A tax levy of \$2,047,159 was anticipated, resulting in a tax rate of 12.605 mills. These figures compare with a levy of \$1,903,922 in the 1976-77 school year and a tax rate of 12.898 mills.

After taking up the budget discussion, the board felt they could adopt a budget at the regular June 27 meeting for presentation to the Annual Meeting in July. As a result, a special meeting for June 20 was not felt to be necessary.

A vote was taken on the question of a business manager for the district for 1977-78. The motion was defeated on a 4-3 vote. The board also voted, 4-2, with one abstention, to uphold a school ruling which counts as F's classes from which a student withdraws after a specified date in the semester.

Resignations were accepted from Dave Vande Vrede, school psychologist, and Dale Staude. Mr. Staude had been

hired earlier this spring to fill an opening in the agriculture department. Three teaching contracts were issued. They included a contract for Gordon Darmody to replace Dale Staude in the agriculture department, Lynn Walters to teach high school English and David Wietor to fill the added middle school position.

Gordon Darmody is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin, Madison, and has one year of teaching experience at Lake Mills. Lynn Walters is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin, Eau Claire, and has taught in Manitowoc and Montville, Conn. David Wietor graduated from the University of Wisconsin, Milwaukee, and will be beginning his first year of teaching in the fall.

Mrs. Goeden said she had received a question as to why people who had graduated from the local high school were hired for teaching positions. It was indicated that the best applicants were recommended for teaching positions without regard to whether they were local residents.

The board reaffirmed its

position opposing school boundary changes. This action was taken as a result of a petition requesting that property be changed from Random Lake District to Kewaskum. The board also expressed its congratulations to the girls track team for their fine accomplishments during the year and at the state track meet.

In other business, the board had no objection to forming a Title I committee and working on a plan for use of these Federal funds, approved purchase of musical instruments, and approved purchase of a carpet steam cleaner.

A closed session was held following the regular meeting to discuss negotiations, salaries of teaching principals and a personnel question.

One-To-One

The arrival of Spring and approach of Summer finds outdoor activities, both recreational and occupational, underway at a brisk pace. Many such activities, like contractors conducting construction projects, farmers planting crops and homeowners improving their property, involve digging efforts.

Digging, of course, can achieve positive goals, but when a telephone cable is cut by the digger, the effect is extremely negative. Many customers — perhaps as many as 5,000 when a major cut occurs — can lose all or part of their service for many hours.

Naturally, when a cable is cut, General Telephone repair crews are immediately dispatched to explore the problem and begin repairs. We also often seek to notify the public of the extended outage by radio. But by then, the damage is done.

Cable cuts are a serious business. They are at best a 'mere disruption' to normal business and personal communications. They are at worst a contributing factor to disaster when emergency calls to police, fire or medical care units cannot be completed.

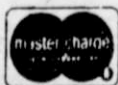

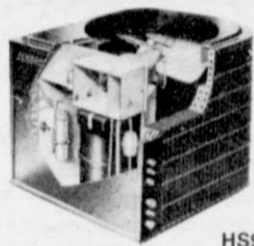
