Bids Opened for Park Project; 21 Submitted

James Arthur of Arthur & Associates of Fond du Lac opened bids for the Kewaskum Kiwanis Community Park Improvement project at the village board meeting on June 20.

Twenty-one bids were submitted with one bid being rejected due to failure to follow prescribed instructions.

Bids for excavation work were submitted by: Rademan Stone & Material, Fond du Lac, for \$81,368.50, starting date of 20 days and completion date of 240 days; Kettle Moraine Enterprises of West Bend, \$42,165.09, starting date August 15, 1977, completion date of 90 days; A. T. Forseth of Waukesha, \$41,625.45, starting date in 10 days, completion date of 120 days, and John Lamm of Jackson with sub-contractors \$42,990.00, starting date July 5, 1977, completion date 120 days.

Ptaschinski Construction of Beaver Dam submitted the lone bid for curb and gutter of \$6,897.60. Starting date in 60 days depending on the excavation contractor, completion date of 30 days.

Sewer and water bids were: Edward Ryan, Delafield, for \$25,751, starting date of July 11, 1977, completion date of 35 days; Westra Construction of Waupun, \$27,199, starting date of August 1, 1977, completion date 60 days; James C. Rule Construction, Dodgeville, \$47,660, starting date of 20 days, completion date of 100 days; Zunker Contractors, South Byroen, \$22,070, starting date of 20 days, completion date of 75 days; C. F. 5 Bids Received for Garbage Truck; Paving, Revaluation Bids Awarded

Five bids were received by the Kewaskum Village Board for the purchase of a new garbage truck. Bids were opened at the regular meeting on June 20.

Feller Pontiac & Cadillac of West Bend submitted a bid of \$21,485.00. Stocker Ford & Mercury of West Bend submitted a bid of \$20,719.54 for a Heil Mark 4 unit and \$22,626.54 for a Leech 20 cubic yard truck.

Bruce Equipment of Milwaukee submitted a bid of \$20,545.00 for the complete unit with an International truck.

Honeck Chevrolet submitted six bids: Option No. 1 \$19,349.88, Option No. 2 \$20,056.88, Option No. 3 \$18,444.88, Option No. 4 \$20,997.66, Option No. 5 \$21,704.66, and Option No. 6 \$20,092.66. These prices would be for a 20 cubic yard dump with different truck chassis.

Cooley International submitted a bid of \$19,954 for a 1978 Roadster Model 1800 Pak-Mor and submitted additional alternate bids of \$19,053 and alternate bid No. 2 of \$21,960. All prices include \$1360 for air brakes, which were optional.

The board authorized bids to be turned over to Supt. of Public Works, Augie Bilgo, and the Equipment Committee.

The board awarded the contract for asphalt paving to Payne & Dolan of Waukesha, who submitted a bid of \$28,359.52.

The board also awarded a contract to Bowmar Appraisal, Inc. of Appleton for revaluation of all real and personal property for tax roll purposes. Their bid was \$10,600. Their bid was third highest of four bids opened at the June 6 meeting. Dan Schmidt reported that he had contacted all three companies and received letters of recommendation from each and had checked all references. Bowmar had the best references, starting and completion time less than the other companies, no charge for board of review time, which can be \$20 per hour and sometimes meets for four days for 8 hours per

Jordans' Tavern Granted License By Village Board

Jordans' Tavern in Kewaskum was granted a tavern license at the Kewaskum Village Board meeting on June 20.

Chief of Police, Donald Hlavaty, at the June 6 meeting, had recommended denying a license to Jordans'.

The Board met privately with Terry Jordan, owner of Jordans' and it was the finding of the board to issue the license. Vote on the motion to grant the license was 5 to 0 with one trustee missing and President Charles Miller abstaining.

Village Clerk, William Martin, will send out fire contracts to the Town of Kewaskum and Town of Auburn. Rates will remain relatively the same as last year with rates determined by equalized valuation. Town of Kewaskum's contract runs from January 1 to January 1 and the Town of Auburn runs from July 1 to July 1.

Miller authorized Martin to add a notice to the water rate increase letter being sent to all residents that they have sixty days to have connections made so sump pumps do not empty into the sanitary sewers.

A request was received from the Library Board and librarian to move books stored in the municipal building basement to an area in the old firehouse. The basement area is becoming overcrowded and more room is needed. The board authorized this move.

The recycling center will be moved to village owned property after checking with nearby neighbors. Application has been made for electrical service.

The Board will meet on July 5 for their next regularly scheduled meeting.

The board authorized Arthur & Arthur to submit total number of bidders and tabulated bids to LAWCON and the DNR.

Dan Schmidt, Park Chairman, stated that contracts can be awarded, but work cannot be started until word is received from the Federal Government. It has been decided not to award the contracts until such word has been received.

Schmidt also stated that going over the bids roughly, the total amount is approximately \$195,000. The committee had estimated approximately \$250,000, including the cost of the shelter house. He stated that the figures seemed good to him.

Schmidt further stated that Tom Blotz, Specialist DNR had sent the application for funding to the Federal Office in Ann Arbor, Mich. on May 26, 1977 for a decision. From there it would go to Washington for procedure. Notification would come from Washington on approval. It is hoped this approval would be received by the middle of July, Schmidt stated.

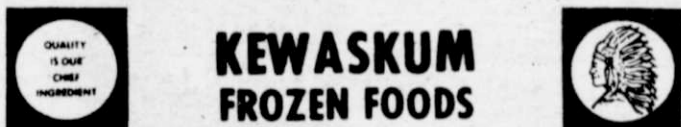

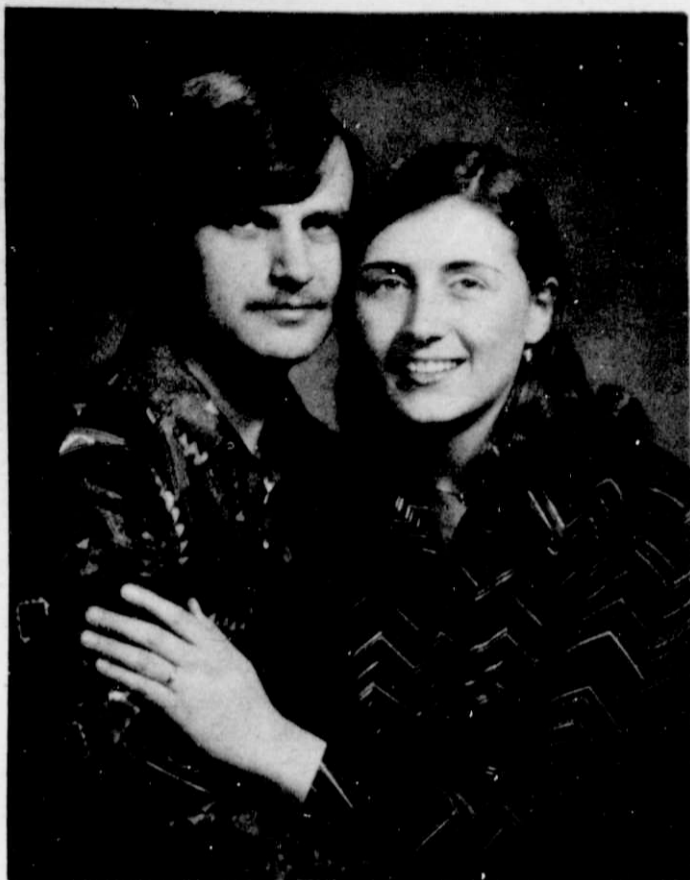

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

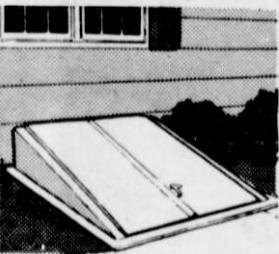
