## 9 Bands, Drum & Bugle Corps in Parade

### Annual Firemen, Rescue Squad Picnic July 9-10

The annual Kewaskum Firemen and Rescue Squad fund-raising picnic will be held in the village park on Saturday evening, July 9, and Sunday, July 10. Plans are nearing completion to make this year's event bigger than ever.

On Saturday night there will be live music in the beer garden by the 50's & 60's Rock Revival, featuring Danny and the Sunliners, from 7:30 to 11:30 p. m. A 5-man beer drinking contest will be held this year for men or women 18 or older. Qualifying will be at 8:30 Saturday evening with finals at 3:30 p. m. Sunday. Entry fee is \$10 with cash and trophies to be awarded. All of the rides, games, refreshment and food stands will be in operation.

An excellent parade at 12 noon sharp will highlight the picnic and get the festivities underway Sunday. The parade will feature nine bands and drum and bugle corps, including West Bend Patriots Drum & Bugle Corps, West Allis Wranglers Drum & Bugle Corps, Racine Kiltie Kadets Drum & Bugle Corps, Continental Youth Band of Milwaukee, Cardinal Cadets of Wauwatosa, Mariners of Port Washington, Oconomowoc American Legion Band, Hartford City Band and Kewaskum High School Band.

Other units will include the Tripoli Motor Corps of Milwaukee, a drilling motorcycle unit comprised of 40 men, in 4 segments of 10 each on different kinds of bikes, beautiful floats, drill teams, baton twirlers, majorettes, children's specialties, visiting firemen and equipment, Legionnaires, comic entries, orchestras, ancient cars, riding horses, clubs, organizations and more.

The parade will form on the high school campus and adjacent streets, from where it will proceed to the park. All participants should be present to line up no later

than 11:30 a. m. Persons wishing to enter the parade should contact Bob Staehler, parade chairman, or Mike Fierke. Theme for this year's parade will be "In the Good Ol' Summertime." Businessmen, industries and organizations are urged to enter a float. Prizes will be awarded for the best floats and children's specialties.

Immediately following the parade there will be exhibitions by drum and bugle corps in the park. There will also be mini-concerts by at least two of the bands. There will be continuous music throughout the afternoon and evening from the stage and in the beer garden. In the beer garden music will be by Bob Kuether from 2:00 - 6:00 and Don Schlies from 7:30 - 11:30. Annie & the Playboys will perform on the stage in the evening from 8:00 - 12:00.

The popular water fights will be held at 6:30 p. m.

## \$3 1/2 Million Budget Approved to Present to Annual School Meeting

A 1977-78 school year budget was approved for presentation to the Annual Meeting by the Kewaskum Board of Education at its meeting Monday evening. No changes were made in the budget which had been presented to the board by Superintendent Brenholt and the budget committee at the previous meeting. While not all figures are final because salary settlements are not complete and the state budget not finalized, a budget must be prepared for the Annual Meeting. The budget is based on anticipated final state and local actions.

The budget at this point calls for a tax levy of \$2,047,159, up from \$1,903,922 for the past year. Expenditures in general fund and debt service will total \$3,492,383. A summary budget will be published and a more complete budget will be mailed to all residents as a part of the Annual Report.

A number of contracts were issued. Full-time contracts were approved for Janice Hartmann and Diane Bahr. Both have been teaching half-time, and a kindergarten section was added to the schedule of each.

Sharon Trampf was approved to take the art position at the Middle School, which also includes some elementary school art. She is a graduate of Oshkosh, and this will be her first teaching assignment.

A contract was approved for David Wellskopf as school psychologist. He is a graduate of Whitewater and has one year of teaching experience and one year of experience as a school psychologist.

Transportation of students living less than two miles from their school of attendance was discussed as a result of a hazardous area plan presented by Mr. Brenholt. The local schools can receive state aid for transporting those children if it is believed too hazardous to allow them to walk. The plan was approved and will now go to the sheriff for approval and then to the State Department of Public Instruction.

In other business, the board approved temporary dividers for the 700 area to create one separated area, appointed John Tessar delegate to the CESA convention and Jean Goeden as alternate, and then adjourned to closed session to discuss salaries of teaching principals and teacher negotiations.

## Large Fireworks Display in Park Sunday, July 3; Other Entertainment

A dazzling display of color and light will be seen illuminating the sky at the annual Fourth of July fireworks to be held in the village park Sunday night, July 3. This yearly event is sponsored by the Village of Kewaskum under the supervision of the fire department.

The electrifying fireworks extravaganza will begin at dusk and will again be set off on the west side of the river.

Spectators from the park hill on the opposite side of the river and other vantage points will be able to view the breathtaking array of ground displays and aerial bursts.

Added displays have been purchased this year to make the whirling wheels of fire, cascading waterfalls and spinning airbursts a bigger and better show than ever before.

As an added attraction this year the firemen have planned two interesting events starting at 7:00 p. m. with a demonstration featuring the fire department's new Telesquirt aerial pumper. At 7:30 p. m. there will be women's water fights, with at least four area fire department's women's teams participating.

Music and other entertainment will be provided in the park before and after the fireworks animation. Game and refreshment stands will be open at 5:00 p. m. Hamburgers, popcorn, beer and soda will be sold.

Live music, featuring Annie and the Playboys, will be held on the park grandstand from 7:30 to 11:30 p. m.

The firemen invite the residents of Kewaskum and the surrounding communities to add some "spark" to their holiday celebration by attending this year's spectacular fireworks. Come early and enjoy the evening.

In the event of rain, the fireworks will be held Monday, July 4.

## County Farmers Asked to Report Crop Acreage

Washington County farmers are asked to report the planted acreage of wheat, corn, barley or grain sorghum to the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS). According to Washington County ASCS Executive Director, Donald E. Sampson, proposed farm legislation could call for implementation of set-aside for 1978 crops.

"The acreage required to be set aside as a condition of eligibility for program benefits may be based on a percentage of the acreage planted for harvest in 1977," Sampson said.

Under proposed legislation, the reported acreage will not be used for purposes of establishing allotments. By

obtaining the acreages, the Secretary of Agriculture will have a full range of options if the 1978 set-aside is necessary, Sampson explained.

"Crop acreages and the crop use must be reported on a field-by-field basis," Mr. Sampson said. Crops seeded last fall should be reported before harvest if possible.

Farmers who have planted acreage in 1977-crop wheat, corn, barley or grain sorghum, and fail to report such

acreage may be ineligible for program benefits in 1978. Sampson pointed out that random spot checks will be made to assure accurate reporting.

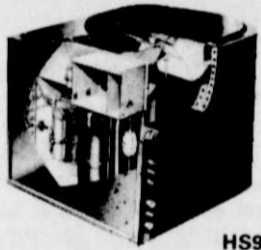
The ASCS acreage report requirement is effective immediately.

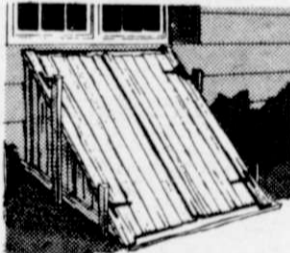
## DRIVER HURT IN ACCIDENT

A driver who said he was trying to avoid another car sustained facial cuts in a one-car accident Sunday on US 45 near County Trunk V just north of Kewaskum.

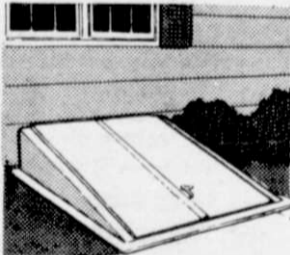
