\$31/2 Million Budget Approved to Present to Annual School Meeting

A 1977-78 school year budget was approved for presention to the Annual Meeting by the Kewaskum Board of Education at its meeting Monday evening. No changes were made in the budget which had been presented to the board by Superintendent Brenholt and the budget committee at the previous meeting. While not all figures are final because salary settlements are not complete and the state budget not fin alized, a budget must be prepared for the Annual Meeting. The budget is based on anticipated final state and local actions.

The budget at this point calls for a tax levy of \$2,047. 159, up from \$1,903,922 for the past year. Expenditures in general fund and debt service will total \$3,492,383. A summary budget will be published and a more complete budget will be mailed to all residents as a part of the Annual Report.

County Farmers Asked to Report **Crop** Acreage

Washington County farmers are asked to report the planted acreage of wheat, corn, barley or grain sorghum to the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS). According to Wash. ington County ASCS Executive Director, Donald E. Sampson, proposed farm legislation could call for implementation of set-aside for 1978 crops.

obtaining the acreages, the Secretary of Agriculture will have a full range of options if the 1978 set-aside is necessary, Sampson explained.

"Crop acreages and the crop use must be reported on a field-by-field basis," Mr. Sampson said. Crops seeded last fall should be reported before harvest if possible.

Farmers who have planted acreage in 1977-crop wheat, corn, barley or grain sorghum, and fail to report such

acreage may be ineligible for program benefits in 1978. Sampson pointed out that random spot checks will be made to assure accurate reporting.

The ASCS acreage report requirement is effective immediately.
