# **Community Has Tornado** Scare

Dark, threatening skies and tornado warnings for Washington County on radio and television stations sent many area residents scurrying for shelter last Wednesday night. The storm missed this area. however, and went around to the south. An "all clear" was received about 9:15 p.m.

There were unconfirmed reports of tornadoes south of Kewaskum and there was another report of a tornado in the Sunburst area near Kewaskum, heading toward the village. Seconds later the Kewaskum fire siren sounded a tornado warning, sending many local residents to their basements and other shelters. Others hearing the reports watched from their yards and two additional un confirmed reports by village residents of seeing funnel clouds were reported. County Civil Defense Director Sherman Carr said winds were very high, between 80 and 100 miles an hour in some spots, causing damage. West Bend and Allenton fire fighters were called to homes where lightning had apparently hit.
