Rescue Squad Demonstrates Removal of Passengers Trapped in Wrecked Vehicles

Members of the Kewaskum Rescue Squad held an unusual demonstration and practice Tuesday evening, arranged by Squad Captain Paul Behring.

The squad practiced situations it may face when answering a call to a serious auto accident in which passengers are trapped in a locked or jammed vehicle.

Hefter Auto Salvage donated two cars for the practice and Roger Strack also donated one and towed the vehicles to the fire station parking lot, where the session was held.

The men used their portable power tools and a set of hydraulic "jaws" to remove windows, doors, seats, steering column, and even the roof of one auto, simulating removing injured occupants.

To give squad members more practice on this type of accident, which is also needed by other area squads, Behring also invited Camp-

bellspoint, West Bend and Newburg rescue members to attend the 7 p. m. test.

The upper photo shows Mark Jansen of the Washington County Sheriff's Department and a member of the Kewaskum Rescue Squad, using their hydraulic "jaws" to pry open a jammed door after he had already removed the front door. Jansen also demonstrated pushing the front seat out of the way, breaking the windshield to pull the steering column clear and cutting the door posts to remove the roof. In the lower photo Kewaskum and neighboring firemen practice with the squad's portable power and hand tools on another car. Witnesses were amazed at the power of the hydraulic "jaws."

The Kewaskum Rescue Squad presently has 14 qualified EMT's (Emergency Medical Technicians), all of whom had extensive training and testing before receiving

certification. Three EMT's are on call 24 hours a day in the village. Three or more men respond to all ambulance calls, and in the case of automobile accidents six are sent to the scene.

Six Contracts Awarded for New Park; Seek Re-Bids on Two Others

Contracts were awarded for the Kewaskum Kiwanis Community Park at the village board's meeting on Monday, July 18.

James Arthur of Arthur & Arthur appeared with that firm's recommendations. He stated that in some instances the engineering firm had worked with the recommended contractors and in most instances it was because of the low bid.

The board approved Arthur's recommendations as follows: A. T. Forseth of Waukesha for excavation work in the amount of \$41,625.45; Curb and Gutter - Ptaschinski Construction, Beaver Dam, \$8,897.60; Sewer and Water - Zunker Contractors, South Byron, \$22,070.00; Electrical - Steiner Electric, West Bend, \$17,478; Ventilating and Heating - Thelen Heating & Sheet Metal, Campbellsport, \$2,070.00, and Fencing - Packer Land Fence Company, Manitowoc, \$9,494.84.

Arthur recommended that the shelter house and plumbing bids be re-bid. In the case of the shelter house, there was only one bid submitted and it was felt that it was too high and of the two bids submitted for the plumbing, Arthur felt that that there was too great a

spread in the amount.

The board authorized re-bidding the shelter house and

Town Wayne Man Drowns In Farm Pond

James Broecker, 30, drowned Friday afternoon in a pond at his family's home on Butternut Drive in the Town of Wayne. The body was found by skin divers about two hours and 15 minutes after Broecker was noticed to be missing.

He was swimming with his brother and two other people, but they were reportedly all down at the other end of the pond, playing with an overturned boat and diving underwater, and at first didn't notice Broecker was gone.

According to the Sheriff's Department report, they noticed him missing around 3:30—but thought he might have returned to the house to get ready for chores. When they didn't find him at the house, his father, Raymond, was called from work, and he notified the Sheriff's Department shortly after 4:30 p. m.

The divers were then called to search the pond. The body

plumbing and will open the new bids at their August 15 meeting.

Trustee Robert Danielson questioned Arthur as to when he thought the project could be completed? He stated that it could be completed by December 1 of this year.

The question was raised as to when the pond would be filled? Arthur stated that when the water main goes in, the pond would be filled slowly with village water.

Dan Schmidt stated that the water should go in soon as three months of water sampling is needed before the village can apply for funding for the pond and the deadline is December.

A ground breaking ceremony will be held at the

new park on August 15 at 7:15 with the Kewaskum Kiwanis as special invited guests.

At a special meeting on Wednesday, July 20, the village Board rejected bids for

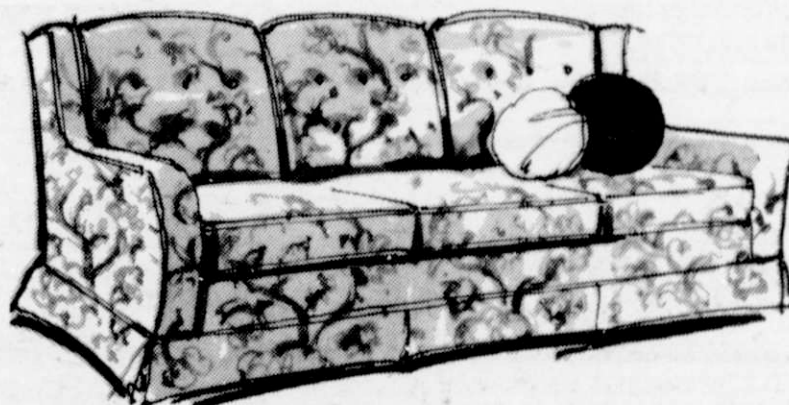

**Youth Wounded in
 Shotgun Accident**

A rural Adell youth driving himself to the hospital after a shotgun accident was stopped in West Bend early Sunday morning and taken the rest of the way by the rescue squad.

He is Roger Rezel, 18, Route 1, Adell, who will be a senior at Kewaskum High School this fall and was a starter on the varsity basketball team the past season.

Police said Rezel was apparently heading for St. Joseph's Community Hospi-

tal when he was stopped about 12:30 a. m. for driving through town at a high rate of speed.

Rezel told authorities the leg wound was self-inflicted and accidental. The incident reportedly occurred in Sheboygan County.

The rescue squad, called to 8th Avenue and Chestnut Street, took him the rest of the way to the hospital. He was reported to be in good condition the next day.

A police spokesman said the wound was "fairly serious" and that the youth was almost in shock at the time

Flood Plain Ordinance Postponed; Re-Evaluation to Begin in Village

A public hearing on the updated Flood Plain Ordinance was held on July 18 at the Municipal Building in Kewaskum.

Village President Charles Miller stated he had spoken to Rollie Tonn of Southeastern Planning Commission. Tonn is presently working with the Village Plan Commission on up-dating the zoning ordinance.

Tonn suggested that the village board not implement the Flood Plain Ordinance at this time, since when updating the zoning ordinance, this can be done at the same time.

Miller sent a letter to Ken Hendricks of the DNR, Milwaukee office, requesting postponement of the flood-plain ordinance.

Miller suggested tabling the ordinance until hearing from Tonn on July 26, since no one appeared at the hearing to oppose the ordinance.

A representative from Bowmar Appraisal Co. explained to the board their procedure for coming into an area to do a re-evaluation. A pamphlet will be sent to each property owner explaining what the appraisers will do, and how the re-evaluation will affect the individual property owner. This pamphlet is sent out at no cost to the village. There will be four full-time certified appraisers working in the village. They will start the first part of August and finish by November 10, as stated in their bid. After completion of the appraisal work, a public hearing will be held for two days at the Municipal Building from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. and 6 p. m. to 8 p. m. for all people who have questions concerning their re-evaluation. This is then followed by a board of review.

Mrs. William Key appeared to request something be done with the water problem they have on their street. She stated that there is only one catch basin in their street and that has been there since they moved there in 1955. She stated that with the expansion of the village since that time nothing new has been added to take care of the additional water. The board promised to look into her complaint.

The board authorized contacting the village attorney to start action to collect delinquent personal property taxes. Board members received a list showing the amount of back taxes owed which came to approximately \$3,000 and went back to the year 1972.

Miller informed the board there is action pending where by the county would assume all direct control of relief cases, now handled by the individual communities. This would be put on the tax rolls and divided throughout the county. Each community would know exactly how much it would cost them. It would be taxed on a levy basis on equalized evaluation.

not by population. If the amount collected for one year was not all spent, the following year the amount would be lowered.

It is felt that this would be more efficient since it is now handled by both the community and the county. Quite a few counties are doing this now.

Miller will roll the board on their thoughts at the August meeting and it will come up for a vote on the county level in September.

Two representatives from Johann Plumbing appeared to discuss the Aquadine method of water supply systems treatment.

The cost to the village would be \$600 per well and 5 cents per 1,000 gallons water for treatment. This would amount to approximately \$1 per person per year in residential use.

It was explained that Aquadine is valuable for city maintenance as well as individual home owner maintenance. It was explained that it will not affect the taste of the water and the flouring treatment equipment will still be used.

The board will study the matter further before making any decision.

Information helpful to our office when calling would be the firm name, the individuals name and description, and license number of vehicle used if possible.

County Tops Fund Appeal Goal

Washington County surpassed its 1977 Archbishop's Fund Appeal goal, with subscriptions totalling \$135,356 from 4,913 donors.

This represents 103 per cent achievement of the county's \$131,000 goal.

According to the final report, subscriptions for the entire Archdiocese of Milwaukee totalled \$3,581,363 from 113,465 donors, the highest in the appeal's history. Totals exceeded the 1977 goal of \$3,565,000 by \$16,363, and surpassed the amount subscribed last year by \$51,616.

Leo F. Schlaefer, Washington County chairman, said the county's \$135,356 total is the highest in the county's history, and exceeds the amount subscribed last year by \$7,015. He said participation by the county's potential donors was 56 per cent.

Serving as associate county chairmen in Washington County were: Robert Kirst, Kewaskum; Jerome Krantz, Allenton; Thomas A. Dlugopolski, Hartford; and David Baldus and James A. Spella, both of West Bend.

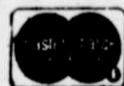

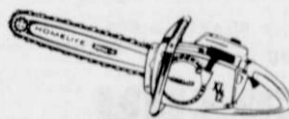
