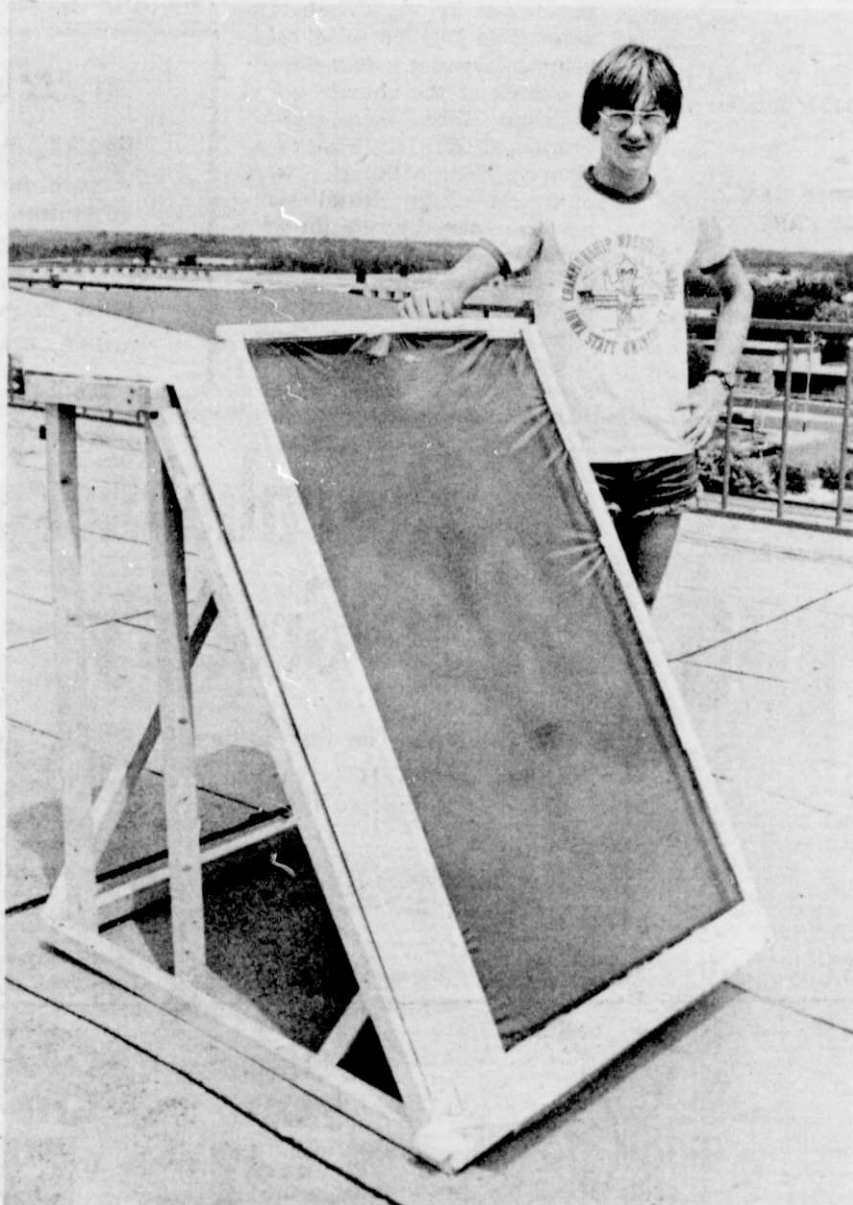

Ideal Land Subdivision Citizens Discuss Improvements With Board

Several concerned citizens of the Ideal Land subdivision appeared before the Kewaskum Village Board Monday night to discuss possible improvements to that area.

Board President Charles Miller reported that street lights had been ordered earlier and "should arrive by no later than Sept. 1."

Responding to a question about the money received in the settlement with Ideal Land Corp., Miller noted that it was earmarked for repairs on one of the intersections in the subdivision that was torn up this spring.

According to the board, there is no money available in this year's budget for blacktopping. It won't be done until all the houses are completed. Also, there is a drainage problem that must be solved before it can be done. The village engineers have been putting too much time into the park and will be handling the drainage problem in the very near fu-

ture, though two tentative solutions have already been found.

Trustee Bob Danielsen suggested the idea of posting agendas at the post office and bank no later than the Wednesday before each meeting, since the school board does the same thing only at the bank.

He hoped that this action would give the public a chance to find out what was scheduled for each meeting in advance and make them more aware of what problems the board faces. At present the agenda isn't made known until the day of the meeting.

The only possible harm is in the issuance of building permits, where applications received after that time may be postponed until the next meeting. Corrections to the agenda could be mailed out to the trustees if a rush of items came up after the first agenda was published. The board agreed by a 7-0 vote to try Danielsen's idea for

two months to see if it was practical.

Four Teacher Resignations and Seven Teacher Contracts Approved

Four teacher resignations and seven teacher contracts were approved at the Kewaskum Board of Education meeting held Wednesday evening, July 27.

Resignations were accepted from Sylvia Schultz, who taught at Beechwood; John Triphan, secondary teacher of special education; Nancy Kulvekoski, home economics teacher, and Terry Kelly, high school social studies English teacher and coach. The board expressed special thanks to Mrs. Schultz, who has taught in the Kewaskum District for 19 years.

A good deal of discussion was held concerning the question of releasing teachers from contracts at such a late date. The board indicated they would accept no further resignations this year, and that a policy will be considered which will set a deadline date after which no resignations will be accepted in future years.

The resignation of Marlene Erickson as principal at Beechwood was accepted. She will continue to teach at Beechwood. A contract was issued to Victoria Marone as teaching principal. She has 18 years of experience teaching, including three in Japan and two in Germany. Miss Marone received her bachelor's degree from Milwaukee - Downer and her Master's from Marquette.

Sue Brockman will be the new elementary teacher of learning disabilities children. She has her degree from Oshkosh. Diana Glick, a graduate of UW - Milwaukee, will teach the elementary EMR class. She has taught three years at Greenfield.

Kathy Roehrig will be the librarian for the Kewaskum Elementary School next year. A graduate of UW-Milwaukee, Mrs. Roehrig worked for two years as an aide in the Silverbrook library at West Bend. Christine Dehler, a UW - Milwaukee graduate, will be the half-time teacher at Farmington. She will replace Mr. Larsen for the half-day to allow him that time for his duties as principal. She has taught three years at St. Matthews' in Campbellsport.

Carol Martin will teach home economics. She is a graduate of UW-Stout, and has six years of teaching experience. Vocal music duties will be handled by David Bertelsen next year. He is a UW-Madison graduate, and this will be his first teaching assignment.

Bids for oil were awarded to Quickflash and to Strobel Oil. Quickflash will handle

the large transport deliveries. Strobel Oil the tankwagon deliveries to Beechwood.

Bids from L & W Construction for blacktop seal coating and from Ram for hot mix blacktopping were accepted. The total cost will run about \$14,000.00.

As a result of discussion held at the Annual Meeting, the board decided not to carry accident insurance for students next year. There are policies available through local agents, and athletic coverage can be paid for through the school for WIAA coverage or can be obtained through a private carrier.

In other business, the board appointed Rich Theusch to the special WASB delegate assembly, with Jerry Secor the alternate.

Lunch prices were set at the same figure as the past year. This would include prices of \$2.65 for a 5-day student elementary ticket, \$2.90 for a 5-day student ticket for grades 7-12, and 70c for a daily ticket.

The contract for WEA employee health and accident insurance was approved. The board met in closed session to discuss negotiations for the bus contract.

Woman Bicyclist Killed, Another Injured by Car

A West Bend woman was killed Thursday when the bicycle she was riding was struck from behind by a car on County Trunk V in the Town of Auburn, several miles north of Kewaskum.

The victim was Ann Busack, 37, of 821 Walnut St., West Bend, who was dead on arrival at St. Agnes Hospital, Fond du Lac. Driver of the car was Ronald W. McCollum of 406 Spring St., Campbellsport.

The accident occurred at 7:29 p. m. Thursday when the McCollum car was traveling south on County V one-tenth mile south of Mill Pond Drive.

Also injured and taken to St. Agnes Hospital by Campbellsport ambulance was Marian B. Haupt, 45, of Route 1, Kewaskum, and Jesse McCollum, 6, of Campbellsport. Mrs. Haupt, also riding a bicycle, received multiple injuries and the McCollum child, a passenger in the car, suffered minor scratches.

Mrs. Haupt is the wife of Pastor Arthur Haupt of St. John's Lutheran Church at New Fane.

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Local Teachers Attend Workshop

Twenty-eight Washington County teachers traveled to Eagle River this week to become students of water quality and soil science, and to develop pollution study units to take back to their classrooms.

The teachers from public and private schools throughout the county are spending Aug 1 - 5 at the Trees for Tomorrow Environmental Center in a "Water Quality and Land Use Curriculum Development Workshop," sponsored by the Washington County Project and the State Department of Public Instruction (DPI).

Before school begins in the fall, the teachers will spend 40 hours adapting the information they gain in Eagle River to their local condi-

tions, and tailoring the study units to their students' needs. During the school year, the teachers will fulfill part of a DPI mandate for conservation education in all schools with units that are relevant to local problems.

The workshop expands on the material covered in a five-week seminar for Washington County teachers held last spring in West Bend.

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West Bend up to the time of her death.

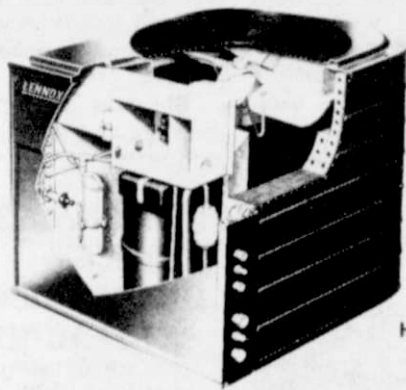

Visitation at the funeral home was after 4 p. m. on Wednesday.

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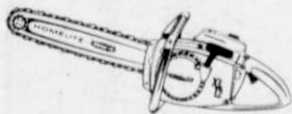
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Maedke Graduates

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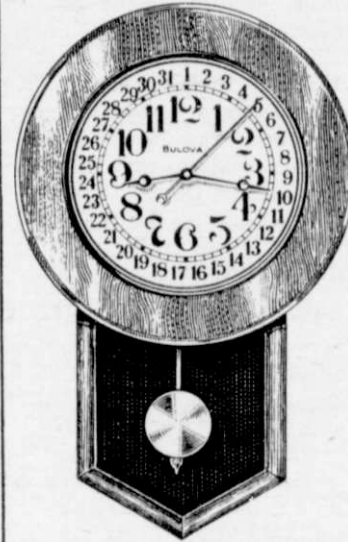

Registration for Students at MPTI

Student orientation and registration at Moraine Park Technical Institute, West Bend is scheduled for Wednesday, August 10. Students planning to enroll for the fall semester will have an opportunity to meet their advisor, register for classes, pay for tuition, fees, books and supplies and generally become familiar with the West Bend Campus.

All students are to report to Room 146 at the time assigned for their chosen program: 8:30 a. m. - Machine Tool Technics, 2nd year students; 9:00 a. m. - Clerk Typist / Secretarial Science students; 9:40 a. m. - Marketing / Accounting students; 10:30 a. m. - Machine Repair / Mechanical Design students; 11:00 a. m. - Machine Tooling Technics, 1st year students.

It is anticipated that orientation and registration will require a full morning and a portion of the afternoon. Students should bring their Social Security number, a pencil, a pen and tuition fees.

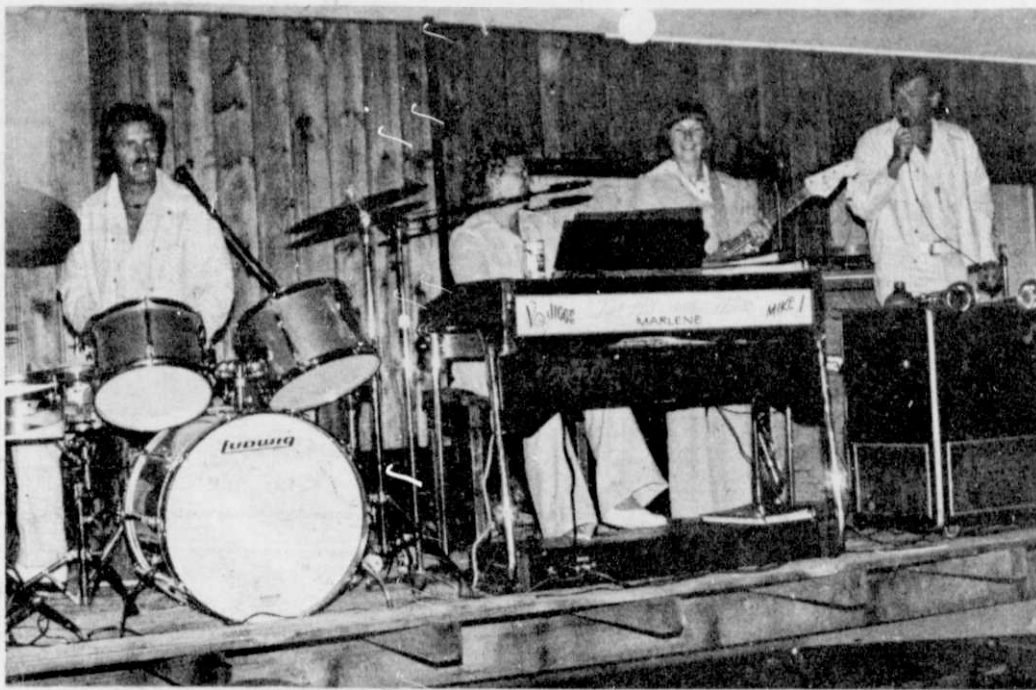

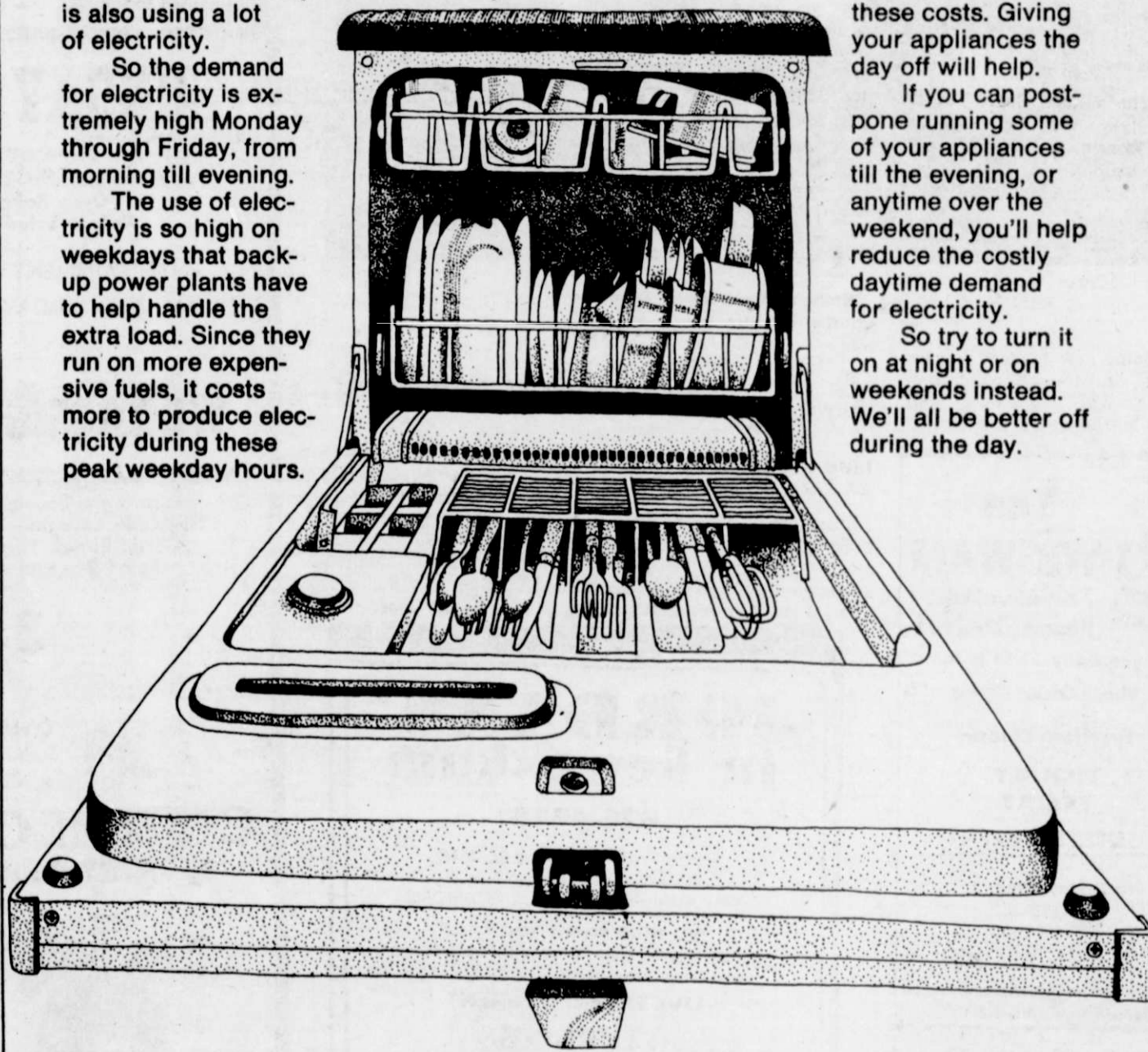

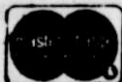

The Village Board Members were in agreement with this recommendation.

A Representative of Bowmar Appraisals was present to explain to the Board Members their procedure of conducting a revaluation of a community. It was confirmed that Kewaskum's revaluation would be started on August 1 and be completed by November 1.

Motion was made by Trustee Herriges and seconded by Trustee Kral that the proposed flood plain ordinance be tabled at this point in time as was recommended at the public hearing. Unanimous vote.

Mrs. William Key discussed with the Board the problem of surface water flooding in the area of their home at 509 Main Street. The Village's Engineering Consultant will check the area and make a recommendation to alleviate the problem.

A Representative of Johann Plumbing and Heating explained to the Board the aquadene treatment for a municipal water supply system.

The Board held a discussion on the letter received from Marilyn Reinhardt suggesting that the Village make an aerial survey of the east half of Section 10 on a 50-50 cost sharing with the property owners in that area. Motion was made by Trustee Herriges, seconded by Trustee Schmidt that no action be taken on this suggestion at this time. Unanimous vote.

The Commissioner was authorized to refer all delinquent personal property taxes to the Village Attorney for collection. Motion by Trustee Schmidt, seconded by Trustee Danielsen. Unanimous vote.

President Miller presented a letter from the Washington County Department of Social Services advocating that the Washington County Board of Supervisors change to a county system of general relief administration. No definite action was taken by the Village Board.

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LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

To All Citizens,

This letter is aimed at clarifying a letter by a Mr. Stephen Stone of the Wisconsin Citizens for Right to Work in the June 17 Statesman.

As one of the leaders of the Staff Nurses' Council - Milwaukee County, a union representing over 600 Registered Nurses employed by the Milwaukee County Institutions, I feel compelled to bring in the open the positive reasons for a "Fair Share" agreement. All Milwaukee County employees represented by a union have a Fair Share clause in their contracts. This clause has existed for approximately five years and never have the County negotiators tried to remove the clause as they realize the "fairness" of this clause.

Mr. Stone tries to indicate that a person's right to work is jeopardized by a Fair Share clause. The only requirement of a Fair Share clause is that all persons represented by the Kewaskum Educational Association (KEA) must pay dues to the KEA - no one is forced to partake of union activities, show support for the union, or have their job in jeopardy for speaking against Fair Share.

When a group such as the KEA petitions for an election for the right to have a union to represent them this requires certain obligations on the part of the union if the election is successful. The KEA is then obligated to represent ALL teachers qualified for membership in the Kewaskum School District. This means representation at grievance hearings and disciplinary and/or suspension hearings. In addition to this

ALL teachers receive the benefits of the contract, be it wages or improvements in working conditions, even if they would choose not to be members.

What this all boils down to is that if there is no Fair Share agreement only the teachers, committed to and belonging to the KEA bear the full financial burden while those not belonging would get a "free ride."

It is because of this inequity that the Fair Share concept exists and has been voted in yearly by at least 90% of the teachers of the District. This Fair Share clause is not denying anyone the right to work - it's only making all teachers represented by the

KEA share equally in the financial burden of the cost of representation when needed and for contract negotiations. If teachers are truly that upset by the Fair Share agreement they have the right to vote against it or even seek employment elsewhere. An even better idea for those opposed to Fair Share is that they refuse all KEA representation when needed and that they refuse all wage increases and improvements in working conditions obtained by KEA bargaining.

I feel the School Board should drop their idea of attempting to do away with Fair Share. In fact I strongly recommend that the School Board and KEA work together on mutually agreeable phrasing and make Fair Share a permanent part of the contract. A well-written Fair Share clause harms no one and certainly denies no one the right to work. A Fair Share clause is only just and right and MUST remain

in existence for the KEA.

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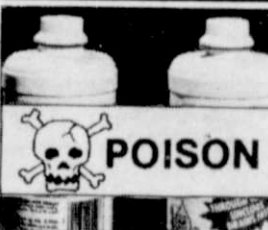
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Barely Miss State Tourney Indians Edged in 11 Innings In Sectional Final, 8 to 7

The Kewaskum Indians (8-14) and Cedar Grove (20-4) battled for 11 innings in the finals of the West Bend Sectional Tournament Thursday with the Rockets finally emerging the winner, 8-7. The victory advanced Cedar Grove to the State Tournament, also being held in West Bend this week.

The surprising Indians reached the Sectional finals by blanking Ozaukee, 7-0, in the Regional and also shutting out a strong West Bend team (21-2) in the Sectional opener, 1-0. Leon Laatsch, who missed the entire conference season due to an injury, returned to the Indians for the tournaments and was the winner in both shutouts.

Unfortunately Leon was not allowed to pitch in the Sectional final because of a change in the WIAA rules several years ago which require that a boy shall be required to take two calendar days of rest after pitching a total of seven innings. Laatsch had pitched Tuesday afternoon in the win over West Bend and therefore couldn't go Thursday. With Leon on the mound the outcome probably would have been turned around against Cedar Grove and the Indians might have been in the state tourney. On the other hand the Rockets used their No. 1 pitcher against Kewaskum.

Cedar Grove won its first state tourney game Tuesday, defeating Grantsburg, 4-1, advancing them to the semifinals against Brown Deer on Wednesday. Brown Deer shut out Iowa-Grant, 5-0, and in other games Menomonee Falls North defeated Tomahawk, 4-2, and Plymouth overpowered Onalaska, 11-0.

The Kewaskum and Cedar Grove marathon lasted 2 1/2 hours with 101 batters going to the plate. It was a heart-breaking loss for Mark Tassar, who came in to relieve Al Jaeger in the third inning. Tassar gave up just four hits in the nine innings he pitched. All runs were unearned. Unearned runs and errors cost the Indians the game. There were 14 errors in the contest but it still was an exciting game. It is the first trip to state for the Rockets.

Cedar Grove got off to a big start with five runs in the second. All the runs were unearned and there were three errors committed. The Indians filled the bases in the third with one out but missed the opportunity by failing to score.

But in the fourth Kewaskum batted around with five runs scoring to tie it up on Donath's double, a hit batter, Brenholt's triple, Tassar's infield hit, a walk and a triple by Laatsch.

The score remained at 5-5 until the fifth when the Rockets scored two without a hit to make it 7-5.

In the sixth Laatsch's double scored Jaeger, who had walked. Laatsch went to third on a bad throw and scored on

White's fielder's choice to tie it again at 7-7.

In the ninth Laatsch re-injured his leg and had to leave the game.

Cedar Grove loaded the bases in the ninth but Tassar got out of it without a score. In the 11th the Rockets' pitcher, Pfeiffer, had to be replaced because of the WIAA rule, but Mondloch got out the side in the inning. Then in the last of the 11th, Meinen was hit by a Tassar pitch and stole second. He scored on a game winning single by Ebbens.
