Severe Hailstorm Pelts Area, Causes Much Damage

A severe hailstorm struck the immediate Kewaskum area at 5:10 p. m. last Wednesday, causing heavy damage. There was a tornado watch out at the time.

Apparently the Village of Kewaskum was hit hardest by the storm, with the hailstones ranging in size from large marbles to golf balls. The hail came down in a heavy, noisy downpour. In some areas bordering the village there was little or no hail reported.

The hail caused severe damage to crops and gardens, stripped leaves off trees, broke some windows, broke and damaged lawn furniture and ornaments, siding was dented and at least one car was damaged.

Tomato vines were snapped off and the tomatoes punctured, sweet corn was shredded, beans, onions, carrots and other garden vege-

tables snapped off or seriously bruised. Said one woman of her cabbage, "it looked like someone shredded it for cole slaw."

The hail continued from five to ten minutes and left the ground covered with white like a winter scene. There were piles of ice pellets in corners and under rain spouts and lawns and rooftops were coated. The frozen ice nuggets were still visible the next morning under trees and rain spouts.

The temperature dropped to about 61 degrees by 5:25 p. m. On the Hon-E-Kor golf course, rising temperatures later turned the hail into steam, creating a foggy white August landscape. In some places the hail drifted to a foot deep.

Some of the older residents remarked it was the worst hail storm they can remember.

Mark Ebert, 15, of Ashford was critically injured after a shed on his father's farm fell on top of him during the storm, possibly a tornado. The boy was pinned in the wreckage and had stopped breathing when his father, Jon, who was also injured, rescued him. Ebert was able to get the boy breathing by the time a rescue squad arrived. Most of the Ebert farm was destroyed by a tornado about three years ago. One insurance agent said he expected a crop loss of 90 to 100 per cent in the Ashford area.

The Lomira area was also hard hit by golf ball sized hail about 5 p. m. Police Chief James Kuechler said "the whole town looked like it was shredded and suddenly all you could hear was glass shattering." He said about 2,000

windows on the north sides of homes were shattered. The storm also damaged about 100 new and used cars at Bob Voskuil Chevrolet and Pontiac, Inc. in Lomira.

The photos were taken by two of our alert photographers, who were "right on." The top photo was taken at the start of the hailstorm and shows the size of the ice pellets. The lower picture shows some of the hailstones in a yard and flower bed immediately after the storm (our photographer couldn't get out during the storm).

A Bus Window View of Jamboree

Once the boys of Kewaskum had arrived at the Jamboree, and had set up their tents, the next order of business was a look at the site which sprawls over 2,630 acres of rolling Pennsylvania countryside.

Kewaskum Boy Scouts who attended the National Scout Jamboree at Moraine State Park in western Pennsylvania included Michael Pettit, Ken Bartz, Michael Paul and Gary Mlodzik.

From the subcamp where they were located, it's nearly three miles to the entrance to Moraine State Park. Winding blacktop roads serve all the campsites and a fleet of 35 school buses ran on a regular schedule, shuttling scouts and scouters from area to area.

From the bus window a rider could see sparkling Lake Arthur with its swimming beaches and boating facilities; catch a glimpse of the stage and natural amphitheatre where band concerts, pageants and ceremonies

took place. There were stops for Brownsea Island, a replica of the first Jamboree site; for the Awareness Trail, where boys ran obstacle courses wearing blindfolds; and for the Merit Badge Midway, a carnival of skills and abilities to be learned through doing.

All along the route were the interesting and innovative entrances to the various regional subcamps. Real covered wagons marked the area where Texans and Arkansas boys lived. An Indian archway spanned the gate to the East Central encampment. Multi-colored dining tents were along the route and activities like a fully-equipped amateur radio headquarters, a complete press section, security and fire sections. It was, actually, a complete city for 28,500 residents, a mini-metropolis that burst with life during the Jamboree from August 3 through August 9, and then vanished.

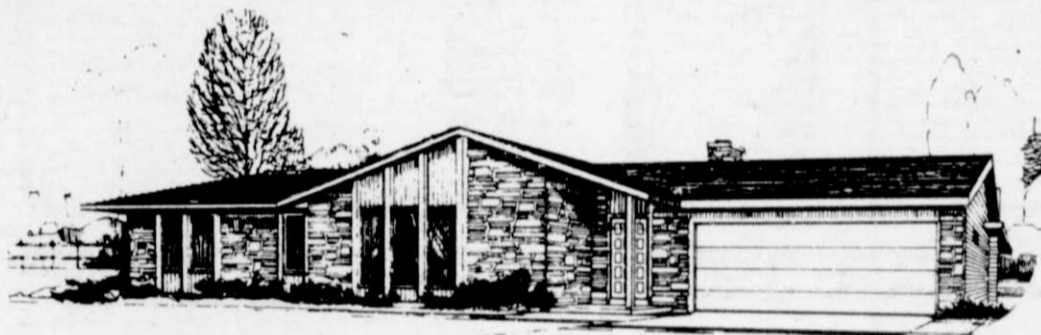


