#### **Kettle 20 Race Has Record 166 Entries**

## Lions Bar-B-Que Most Successful Ever; Between 1300-1400 Served

annual chicken bar-b-que in the village park Sunday was by far the most successful held so far, in spite of intermittent rain. Close to 900 persons ate in the park tent, while there were between 400 and 500 carry-outs.

Attractions included the now famous "Kettle 20" foot race, bicycle races, wrist wrestling championship tournament, early American Antique Farm Display by the Kewaskum Historical Society, square dancing by the Washington County Senior Citizens group, live music by two bands, and refreshments. crowds Large attended throughout the afternoon.

The "Kettle 20" 12-mile foot race through the Kettle Moraine area drew a record 166 runners this year, compared to 105 last year. This popular event, which is growing by leaps and bounds, attracted runners from neighboring states as well as from all over Wisconsin. Most of them are professional, college high school or club affiliated runners. All 166 of them, starting out in a group was a sight to see in their lightweight running outfits with identifying lettering. Somewho raced there before wore "Kettle 20" shirts. some had cut-off shorts, tank tops and some were bare-

Sixty-five minutes later, Green Bay's Jim Drews again was first to cross the finish line. Drews holds the "Kettle 20" course record of 65 minutes flat. He set that mark last year and just missed it by 50 seconds Sunday. Jim averaged just five minutes per mile throughout. He was first runner past the water point at the 7.9 mile mark at 41 minutes.

Muskego's Dave Elger was second overall, one minute behind Drews, and veteran distance runner Tom Hoffman of Wauwatosa was third.

# School Board Approves New Wage Rates for Classified Personnel

A contract was issued to Jan Nesladek at the Monday meeting of the Kewaskum Board of Education. Ms. Nesladek will teach at the Beechwood Elementary School and will handle the intramural program. A graduate of UW Milwaukee, she practice taught at Cabrini Learning Center in Chicago, Shorewood and Bayside. This will be her first full-time teaching assignment.

The resignation of Sue Bohman as high school librarian was accepted, pending the district being able to hire a suitable replacement.

New wage rates for classified personnel were approved. The wage scales represent basic 6% increases. The exception is in the custodial area where a range was set for the first time. Each experience step will allow increases in the range of 5% to 7%. The total package, including experience increments, will be approximately 7.5% to

Discussion was held on the issues coming before the WASB Delegate Assembly. The board expressed opposition to changing employee state retirement laws but felt local boards should have the option of setting up local early retirement plans. 

# Announce Policy for Free Meals and Milk for School Children

Floyd A. Brenholt, Superintendent, Kewaskum Community Schools, announced its policy for free and reduc-

ed price meals and free milk for children unable to pay the full price for meals and milk served in schools under the

Children from families whose income is within the levels shown are eligible for free meals and milk or reduced price meals. In addition, families not meeting this criteria but with special hardship conditions such as unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply

Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter or notice to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted anytime during the school year.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for free meals and milk or reduced price meals. If a family has such children living with

them and wishes to receive such benefits the foster parents should apply on behalf of the child or contract the school officials about their eligibility.

If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. If he wishes to make a formal appeal, he may make a request either orally or in writing to: Floyd A. Brenholt, Superintendent, 1450 School Street, Kewaskum, WI 53040; phone: 626-2160 for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

If a family member becomes unemployed or if family size changes, the family should contact the school to file a new application. Such changes may make the children of the family eligible for

reduced price meals, or for additional benefits such as free meals and milk if the family income falls at or below the levels shown above.

To discourage the possible lity of misrepresentation, the application forms contain a statement above the space for signature certifying that all information furnished in the application is true and correct. An additional statement is added to warn that the application is being made in connection with the receipt of federal funds, that school officials may, for cause, verify the information in the application, and that deliberate misrepresentation of information may subject the applicant to prosecution under applicable state and criminal statutes.

In the operation of child. feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of his race, sex, color or national origin.

#### Tax Monies Turned Over By County

Leo P. Scholtz, Washington County Treasurer, announced that \$4,889,090.14 is being turned over to the various towns, cities and villages in WEFKLY the county for the final 1976 tax settlement due districts August 20. Most of the money was collected in the past four weeks in postponed taxes.

Scholtz reports the following comparison in postponed and delinquent taxes that were being collected at this time:

Postponed - 1975, \$4,229, 945.92; Delinquent \$681,527.-

Postponed - 1976, \$4,961,-849.71; Delinquent \$697,171 .-

The above listed postponed taxes were due July 31, 1977. It appears that approximately 85% of the current 1976 taxes have been collected.

Taxpayers, who are still delinquent will receive bills shortly showing the amount

of tax plus interest retro-active to January 1, 1977 at the rate of 12% as required by State Statute.




