Muscular dystrophy is a disease that involves the cells of muscle tissues. There are different kinds of dystrophy; each touching the life of its victim in similar but different ways. Some kinds of dystrophy involve adults; some cripple; others involve children and are fatal, a release today said.

What doctors most commonly see is the four-to-five year old child brought in experiencing weakness in his or her legs or hips. Blood tests are taken which show an enzyme passed, abnormally, from the muscles to the blood stream, and dystrophy is diagnosed.

Loving parents, who now grieve the almost certain loss of their babe, unknowingly and unwittingly passed this characteristic on to their child right along with his or her sparkling brown eyes, wide smile, and curly blonde hair... as a part of their own (however recessive) genetic heritage.

The child is aided with leg braces and crutches and then a wheelchair. Sometimes their mighty minds, as well as their tiny bodies, grow feeble. Many times not. As the disease progresses the children become aware of the imminence of their own death.

Most children afflicted with this type of muscular dystrophy die before their thirteenth birthdays, commonly of respiratory failure. Dystrophy knows no remissions — it is an onward marching disease that overpowers its victim in a very predictable sequence. There are no cures, no preventative medications. And frequently more than one child in a single family is diagnosed dystrophic.

In cooperation with the annual Jerry Lewis Labor Day Muscular Dystrophy Telethon, Pizza Joe's (Kewaskum store only) will donate 10 per cent of their total day's sales, Sunday, Sept. 4 only, from 4 to 10 p. m. Persons wishing to make small contributions can bring their donations into Pizza Joe's (Kewaskum), since a total of all monies collected will be phoned in to local telethon phones late Sunday night.

Open Door of County Seeking Volunteer Hotline Operators

The Open Door of Washington County, Inc. is now accepting applications for volunteer Hotline operators. The Hotline is a 24-hour phone service that serves Washington and Ozaukee counties.

The training program will begin on Tuesday, Sept. 27, at 7 p.m. at the Open Door in West Bend. Volunteers make a four-month commitment, and work only eight hours per month on two shifts of their choosing. Most often, the shifts run from 6 to 10 p.m. Monday through Friday. In addition, a monthly in-service meeting is required.

Specifically, the program offers drug education, personal growth workshops, crisis intervention training and suicide prevention techniques. Volunteers will also have an opportunity to learn more about community services and to exchange thoughts and ideas with other individuals who are likely to have common concerns about current social issues.

Assistant coaches are Fran Charland in charge of defense, Jim Westphal, quarterbacks, and new assistant Dave Rohde, a Slinger native, line coach.

The Indians will open their season in a non-conference game with Campbellsport of the Flyway loop here this Friday night, Sept. 2.

The Cougars are reported to be loaded with underclassmen but have some good senior performers back. Game time is 7:30 p. m.
