Turkey Shoot Huge Success; 600 Birds Taken

The 25th annual Turkey Shoot sponsored by the Kiwanis Club of Kewaskum at the Bar-N Ranch Sunday was one of the most successful ever and for sure the biggest since live birds were used some 10 or 12 years back. The large crowd was attributed to perfect weather.

A total of 600 turkeys were taken, far over last year's figure of 480. A total of 240 trout were also caught in the trout pond, the largest measuring 14½ inches. There was a tie for the largest fish between two 14-year-olds. Tracy Gavin of rural Cambellsport and Lisa Hoppens of St.

Lawrence.

All food stands were sold out, including between 300-400 hot dogs, 1500 hamburgers and 1800 brats.

The gross is expected to exceed \$15,000, also the largest amount since live birds were placed on the line.

Village Will Continue Contract With Town for 15 Fire Calls

The Village of Kewaskum will continue to honor its contract with the Town of Kewaskum for 15 fire calls instead of the requested 17 calls suggested by Town Supervisor Daniel Stoffel at the Village Board meeting Sept. 6.

Stoffel based part of his argument on information he said he had concerning state fund reimbursement for fires fought on state owned land within the Town of Kewaskum. Fire Chief Augie Bilgo refuted Stoffel's statements saying that not only was it difficult to collect that money because of difficulty in proving the origin of many fires after they have spread away from state land, but he also complained that reimbursements hardly covered the costs of bringing out \$150,000 worth of equipment on a given run. Bilgo concluded by explaining that fires on state land were not counted against the Town's 15 calls anyway.

The charges are based on a per-mill basis and fluctuate with the assessed evaluations of Town properties, according to Bilgo. When Stoffel offered that the Town of Barton had contracted with the Kohlsville Fire Dept. on a half-mill basis, Bilgo reminded him that Barton also holds another half-mill contract with West Bend.

Stoffel said he didn't want

the Town to be "caught in the middle" of rising population figures sometime in the near future. Bilgo said that the contract limitations were fair in that the number of calls had not previously exceeded 15 and said that with proper publicity the lower number could act as a deterrent to people placing calls for questionable emergencies. Bilgo complained about laxness in safety precautions surrounding trash burning in unscreened barrels.

The Board voted unanimously to reject the proposed unification of county general relief systems under the Washington County Department of Social Services. The plan had been explained by Arthur Degnitz and John Riley of the Dept. at last month's Board meeting.

The application of Roger Schmitt for a tavern license was approved. The business known as Schmitt's Never Inn was previously operated as Schneider's Tavern.

A building permit was granted to J. and J. Auto Service for remodeling that business structure after some delay while Richard Zaring was

School Board Again Turns Down Proposal to Add Business Manager

By a 4-3 vote against, the Kewaskum Board of Education again turned down the proposal to add a business manager to the school staff. This most recent board action came as a result of an Annual Meeting in favor of increasing the budget by up to \$20,000 to add a central office position. There was no motion at the Monday board meeting to add an assistant superintendent, which had been an alternative to the business manager.

Approval was given for district participation in a Child Find Project being run through the offices of CESA 16. The purpose of this program is to be sure that parents become aware of the opportunities available in their schools for children with exceptional educational needs. The program will concentrate on locating children who have special education needs and who are not now being served by the local schools.

Bids for gasoline for the transportation program were opened and discussed. The action taken by the board authorized Mr. Brenholt to accept the low bid, considering any discounts, and of an acceptable octane level. The bids

ranged from a low of 47.788 cents per gallon to 52.866 cents. Both prices include a 7 cent tax.

Contracting for architectural services necessary for work on the roof of the Beechwood School were approved. The costs are on a time and expenses basis, and the architect for the original building will be contacted.

The board approved transporting two children to St. John's School of Mayville. The children had been attending parochial school in Theresa, but inability to find a replacement for a teacher who left forced the closing of grades 6, 7 and 8. While Mayville is outside the legally required five-mile limit for transporting children to parochial schools, the board felt the situation was temporary and unusual and felt this could be done on a one-year basis.

A contract was approved for James Sohn as high school librarian. He is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, and this will be his first teaching experience.

In other business, the board adjusted one teacher contract and re-affirmed another where there had been some

question about the validity of the contract. Approval was given to the final three classified salary positions as well as to a request for a parent contract. A teacher request for leave was granted, the second September meeting cancelled, and appointments made to a committee to look at building remodeling needs. Jean Goeden, Dr. Ogi and Byron Gessner will serve on that committee. Jim Oelhafen and Richard Superintend will meet with the superintendent of schools and head of maintenance to discuss equipment needs in the area of maintenance of school grounds. Approval was given to the purchase of two automobiles for shop use which will then be used for district transportation. Approval was also given for purchase of band equipment and scrapping of obsolete equipment.

The board met in closed session to discuss teacher negotiations and a teacher contract question.

David Wietor of Kewaskum graduated from the University of Wisconsin - Milwaukee, with a Bachelor of Science degree in education in August. He has accepted a teaching position in the Kewaskum Middle School.

The building is a three-story structure with the tavern on the ground floor and two apartments above it.

Schneider conducted the business for the past 22 years and before that it was owned and operated by his father, the late Walter C. Schneider, for 15 years.

The tavern will be known as Schmitt's Never Inn. Schmitt was formerly employed at Herriges Oil, Inc. He will continue to operate it as a working man's tavern and sell package goods. Hours will be from 10 a. m. to closing daily and closed Sundays.

According to the August 13 issue of the West Bend News a special prosecutor has been appointed to investigate and possibly prosecute our organization for alleged violation of the Election Campaign Finance Law. Since many of your subscribers are members and supporters of our organization we would like to

explain our position to them in your newspaper.

According to our corporate constitution we are opposed to explicit, hard-core pornography and our daily activities prove it. As an organization we do not involve ourselves in partisan political activity. Our constitution forbids us to take part in politics. Our concerns and activities about pornography are moral rather than political.

We have never considered ourselves to be a political organization, which explains why it never occurred to us that we must file a report stating that we spent about \$500.00 on the pornography referendum at the April elec-

tion in West Bend.

After being publicly accused of breaking the law through our local newspaper we promptly obtained and studied the ELECTION CAMPAIGN FINANCE LAW. To our complete surprise we found that we were required to file a report because we influenced the voters to vote "YES" on the question of prohibiting pornography in West Bend. According to the law this seems to constitute political activity, but we cannot believe that the legislators who enacted this Wisconsin law intended it to interfere with activities such as ours.

However, we filed the required report on August 17,

1977 with the State Election Board in Madison and with the City Clerk in West Bend. We explained our failure to file on time, stating it never was our intention to violate the law, and apologized for the oversight.

If our local officials would have prohibited pornography with proper ordinances and enforced such obscenity laws there would have been no need for us to establish a CITIZENS FOR DECENCY organization.

If our system in this coun-

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try has deteriorated to the extent that citizens who stand up for decency are prosecuted while the pornographers are tolerated — GOD HELP AMERICA!

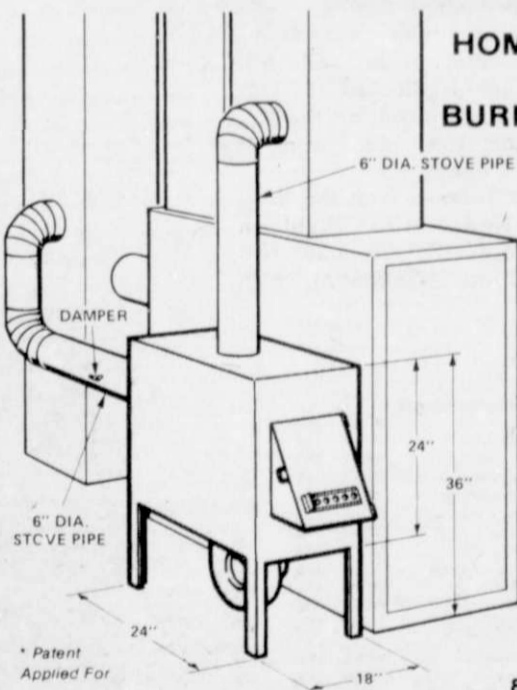
