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Three County Forestry Day In Kewaskum Area Woodlands


A Forestry Field Day will be held Sept. 23 and will be repeated Sept. 24 for woodland owners and users in Fond du Lac, Sheboygan, Washington and surrounding counties

The field day will examine the major problems and opportunities in caring for natural hardwood and planted conifer woodlands, according to University of Wisconsin -Extension forester Gordon Cunningham.

The field day will have morning and afternoon sessions both days. Site of morning sessions is the woodland of LeRoy Becker on Ridge Road, just south of Kewaskum in Washington County. Equipment demonstrations will be held from 8 until 9:30 a. m., with the tour beginning at 9:30 and concluding at 11:30 a.m. Stops on the tour will examine wood for heating, wildlife, harvesting and marketing wood, tax laws, conifer insect and disease pests, and improvement and cost sharing.

The afternoon tour will be held at the Bill Ruth and Elmer Zuehlke woodland on County Hwy. G. just north of Kewaskum in Fond du Lac County. The field tour will begin at 1 and end by 3:30 p. m., preceded by a noon till 1 p. m. equipment demonstration and followed by another demonstration from 3:30 until 5 p. m.

Afternoon tour stops will deal with recreational ponds. care of young plantings, more on insect and diseases in conifers. firebreaks, pruning.
