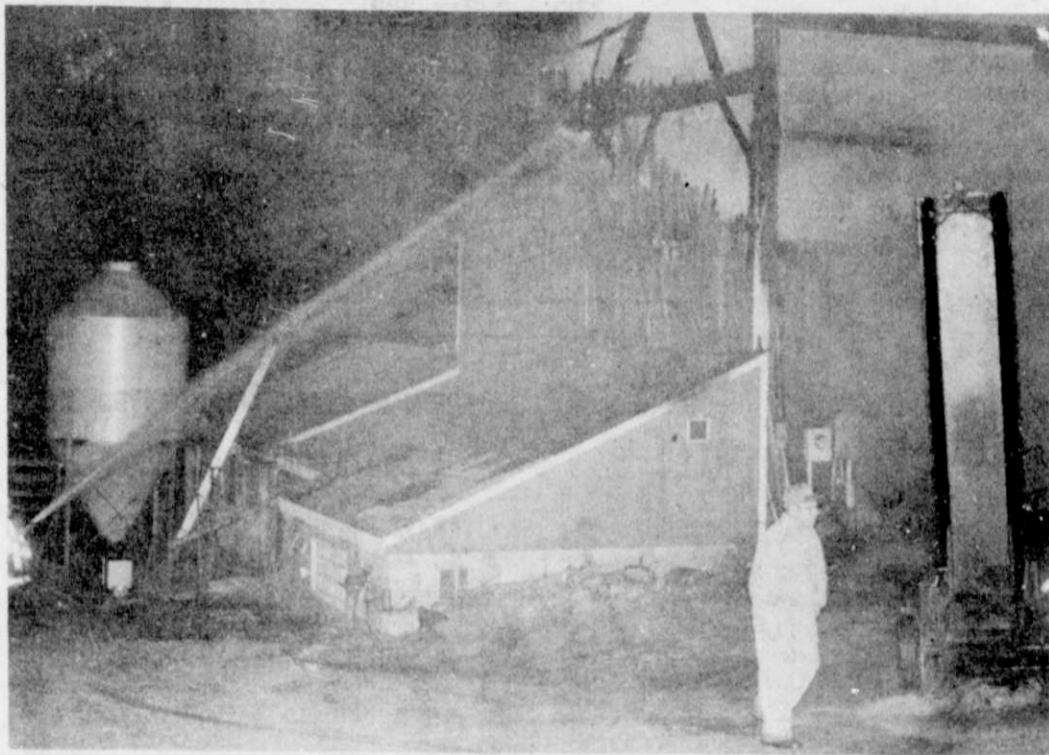

Barn Destroyed by Fire on Peter Farm

Fire destroyed the upper level of a barn in the Town of Wayne Thursday night. The lower level of the barn was saved and cows were milked in the basement the next morning.

The fire was at the Leonard "Bill" Peter farm, 9179 County W, located between Hwys. H (Wayne) and 28. It is believed the fire started from spontaneous combustion of overheated hay.

The upper portion of the barn, which was full of hay and straw, according to Kohl-

sville Fire Chief Wilmer Herman, was lost.

But the basement part was saved and no machinery or cattle were lost. There was some damage to silos and the roofs of additions. The total damage cost is not known.

Herman said that a few men remained at the scene Friday, as burning hay was being hauled from the scene into nearby fields.

Kohlsville firemen were assisted by the Allenton, St. Lawrence, Kewaskum, The-

resa and Cambellsport fire departments in fighting the blaze.

The fire was reported about 8:45 p. m.

Peter said the barn will be rebuilt.

Sidewalk Repair Discussed, Water Tower Painting Tabled by Board

In the absence of President Charles Miller, Raynor Herriges presided over the brief Village Board meeting Monday night.

Trustees Daniel Schmidt and David Nigh said they would begin measuring Kewaskum's sidewalk repair "mileage" after Nigh said he felt last year's maintenance program should be updated. Nigh indicated that a five year prospectus could be helpful in giving Kewaskum residents a chance to budget for necessary repairs and replacements. Raynor Herriges said the village "should do some every year" to keep the program current. It was noted that property owners could install their own sidewalks as long as they maintained the grade-level standards of the village.

The Board voted unanimously to send Commissioner Peter Albers to the Waste Water Treatment Plant Operators Annual Seminar in Green Bay from Oct. 18 to 21. Officer Richard Knoebel was given the nod to attend a conference about juvenile delinquency in Wausau from Oct. 5 to 7.

Rick Buslaff of Brownsville was granted a bartender's license to serve alcoholic beverages at Serwe's Tap.

The water tower will wait for paint again this month. The matter was again tabled until Raynor Herriges' committee can investigate the three bidding firms' reliability.

Robert Danielson asked that Atty. Gerald Kiefer schedule an updated report of delinquent-tax payments. He also asked that Police Chief Hlavaty report next time on the stop sign question involving Brooklane, Hillside, Meadowbrook and Roseland intersections.

Land presently being spread with sludge has been analyzed and was to be discussed with DNR experts on Sept. 20, according to Pete Albers. He noted that most heavy metals, constantly a concern of pollution authorities, are not present even in trace concentration in soil spread with Kewaskum's sludge.

Albers said there would be a public hearing in Milwaukee concerning ammonia concentrations in Kewaskum's waste water. He was confident that the level of ammonia present is well below DNR limits due to the fact that plant operations are only at about half their capacity. Sand filters presently in use are adequate to satisfy requirements for Kewaskum's "discharge permit" at the present, but future standards

could require additional equipment.

August Bilgo reported that the new garbage truck could be delivered in about a month. The present truck is "holding up," he said.

Village Board Given Job Study Report

The "closed session" meeting of Kewaskum's Village Board began with a brief "open meeting" to allow reporters access to part of the Job Study Report prepared by Edward Christie.

After some discussion between West Bend News reporter Judy Harlow and Village Trustees Daniel Schmidt and Robert Danielson concerning state meeting laws, it was agreed to divide Christie's report into two parts: general job descriptions and wage scale discussion.

Christie outlined his methods of study and disclosed that he had relied heavily upon workers' descriptions of their own jobs and the descriptions outlined by their superiors. "Using established personnel guidelines and U. S. Dept. of Labor terminology," Christie said he submitted a final draft of each full-time position presently recognized by the Village to Charles Miller, Village president.

While enough copies had not yet been made for each trustee, Miller said that specific descriptions would soon

Park Development Committee, Engineer Meet to Discuss Funding Applications

Monday night the Park Development Committee met with engineer James Arthur to discuss funding applications due Dec. 31, 1977.

In order to receive help from the Dept. of Natural Resources in July, 1978, requests must be filed in Milwaukee by the end of this year. Top priorities, such as swimming, baseball and basketball were discussed. It was determined that black-topping would be needed for the tennis courts, basketball courts, walkway and access road as soon as possible. Bike racks, pool equipment, picnic equipment and entrance lighting would need to be purchased, too.

Some picnic and park furniture will be built by service groups, and the Lions Club may purchase some playground equipment to defray the costs for the park's first year. In order to open the pond for swimming before the July DNR funds appear, however, a raft and diving facilities may have to wait until next year.

James Arthur announced

that some changes in physical outlay would have to be made to accommodate the increase in groundwater since the 1975-76 borings were made by Roger Miller. The parking

be made available. Generally, each description includes an explanation of the primary function of the position, its relationship to other Village jobs laterally and vertically, any necessary experience including licensing requirements, and the major responsibilities of the job ending in "a catch-all phrase" to include "any other duties" that may not be "written out in black and white," in Christie's words.

Accessibility of job descriptions may be limited to "annual review" time if the Village accepts Christie's recommendations. He didn't "think it's anybody else's business to know others' job descriptions," either. Trustee Bob Danielsen said he felt that each employee should have access to his own description at any time during his employment, however.

Passage of the Job Study Report is not expected to occur this month while it is being studied further.

lot will be moved to the north side of the pond, and to lessen the severity of necessary grading, the tennis and basketball courts have been relocated to the north as well. The bath-house will be raised two and one-half feet above the initially determined level, and the parking lot base must be six to eight inches deeper than expected.

Trustee Robert Danielsen asked that estimates be made on the cost of completing the baseball diamond — including additional fencing and a shelter. Soil tests have indicated the need for more clay underneath the diamond's topsoil. Water will be available for the new seed, since

sewer and water mains are now laid to the park's potential bath-house.

An October update is expected so that final drafts may be made in November and a timely requisition sent to Milwaukee.

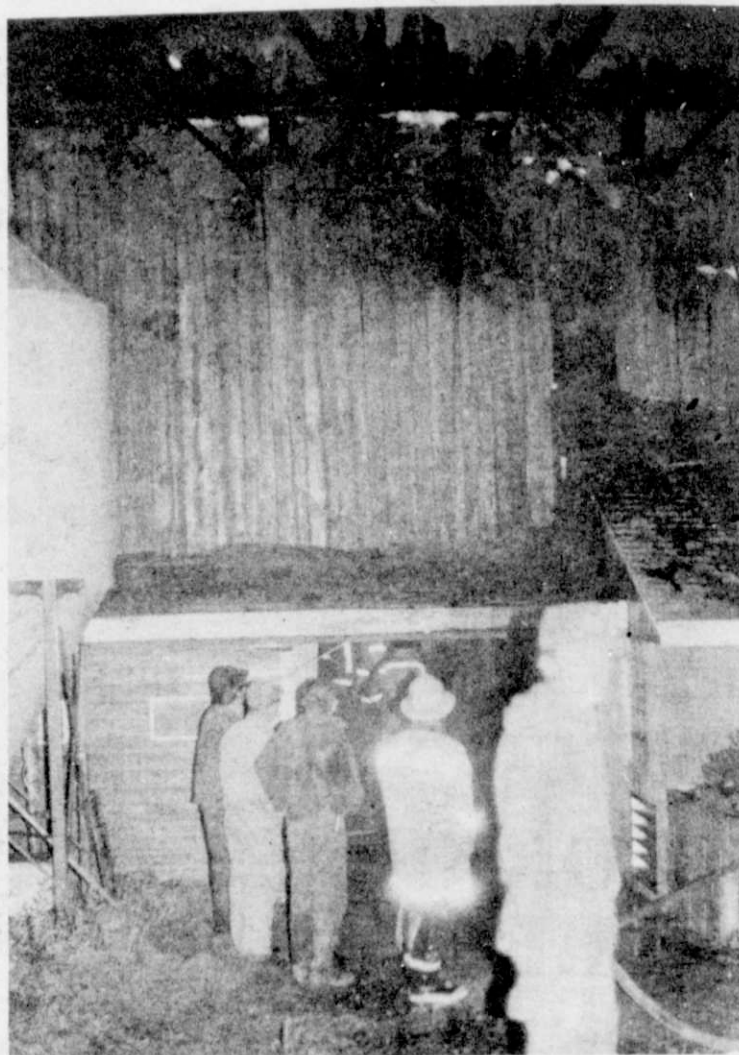

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Three County Forestry Day In Kewaskum Area Woodlands

A Forestry Field Day will be held Sept. 23 and will be repeated Sept. 24 for woodland owners and users in Fond du Lac, Sheboygan, Washington and Kewaskum counties.

The field day will examine the major problems and opportunities in caring for natural hardwood and planted conifer woodlands, according to University of Wisconsin - Extension forestry Gordon Cunningham.

The field day will have morning and afternoon sessions both days. Site of morning sessions is the woodland of LeRoy Becker on Ridge Road, just south of Kewaskum in Washington County. Equipment demonstrations will be held from 8 until 9:30 a. m., with the tour beginning at 9:30 and concluding at 11:30 a. m. Stops on the tour will examine wood for heating, wildlife, harvesting and marketing wood, tax laws, conifer insect and disease pests, and improvement and cost sharing.

The afternoon tour will be held at the Bill Ruth and Elmer Zuehlke woodland on County Hwy. G, just north of Kewaskum in Fond du Lac County. The field tour will begin at 1 and end by 3:30 p. m., preceded by a noon till 1 p. m. equipment demonstration and followed by another demonstration from 3:30 until 5 p. m.

Afternoon tour stops will deal with recreational ponds, care of young plantings, more on insect and diseases in conifers, firebreaks, pruning,

more on cost sharing, wildlife habitat and conifer thinning. A question and answer session will conclude the tour.

Tour participants can bring their own or stop in Kewaskum for lunch.

For additional information on the field day program, call the county UW-Extension office in Fond du Lac, Sheboygan or Washington County.

The Forestry Field Day is sponsored by UW-Extension and the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.

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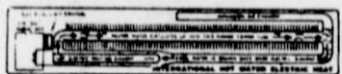
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Claver Simon, Viola Koepke, Others Pass On

The Wittkopp Funeral Home, Plymouth, was in charge of services.

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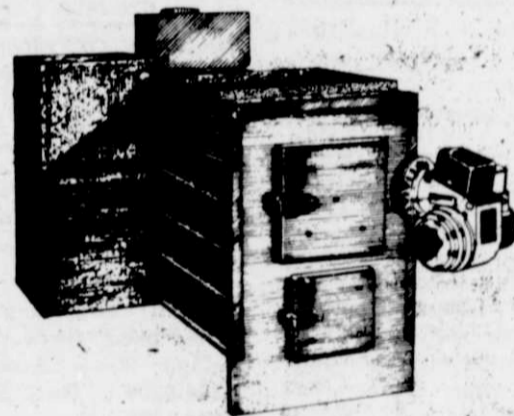
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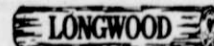

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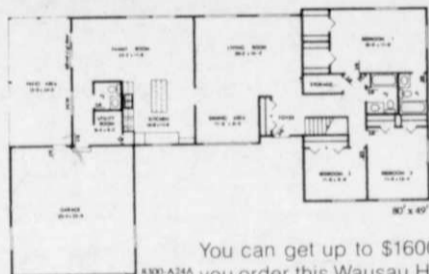
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All Scoring in First Quarter As Indians 'Give' Mayville Win
