Enrollment Up in School District

The downward trend in school enrollments missed the schools of the Kewaskum District this fall. Total enrollment is at 2,139, up 13 students from the fall of 1976. Because some decreases in the number of students had been anticipated, the 2,139 total is 32 over projections for this fall's enrollment.

By school, enrollment trends vary. Beechwood saw a decrease of 9 students, to 94, but most of that was the result of transporting kindergarten students to Farmington. Farmington is up five students, to 280, but that again is the result of moving Beechwood kindergarten students to Farmington. Wayne enrollment is down 8, to 172, but four more than projected. Kewaskum is down 7, at 470, but up 16 from expected enrollment.

The Middle School enrollment was 338 on Sept. 16, the day used for the official state count in all schools. That is up 16 from last year, and the exact figure projected. The High School enrollment of 785 is up 16, and four above the projected figure.

Families moving into the area are offsetting in Kewaskum, general enrollment

state and national decreases. Because there are many factors which affect the rate at which families move into a given area, long-range projections are difficult to make.

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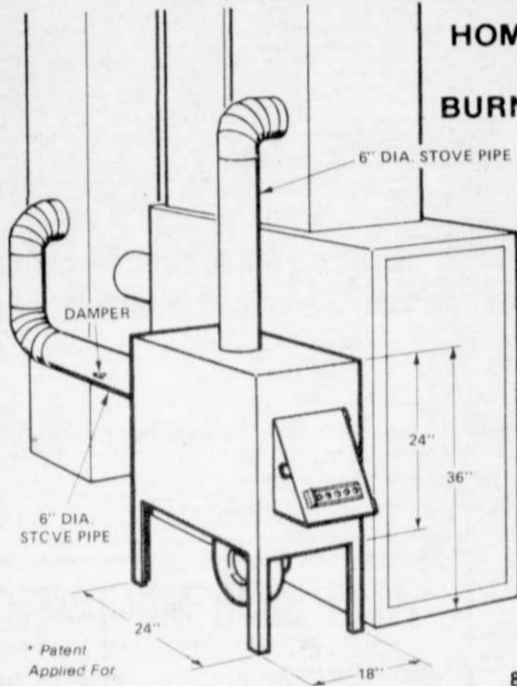
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SKI CLUB TO HOLD MEMBERSHIP MEETING

events for the winter. There will be free beer. Two skiing movies will also be shown. For more information, contact Sharon at 338-2575 or Bev at 334-9116.

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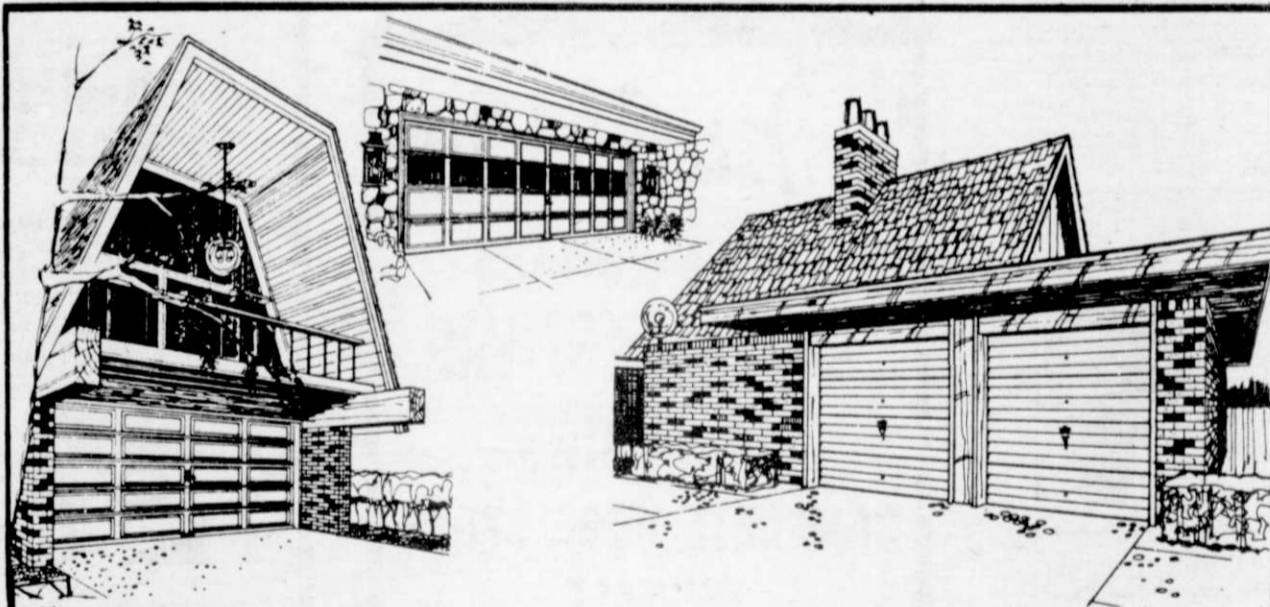
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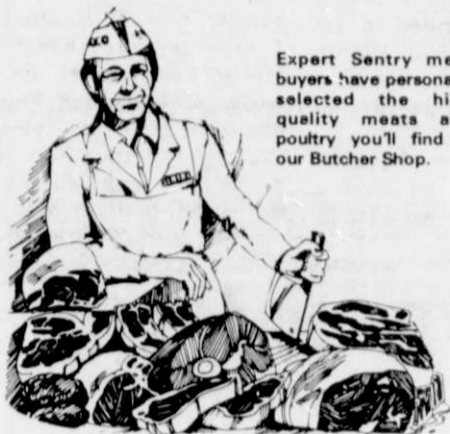

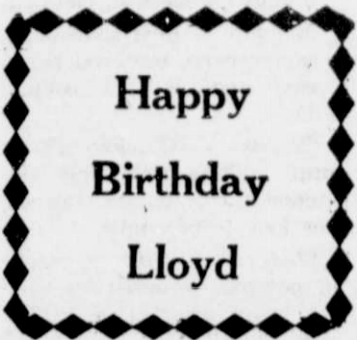

September 6, 1977

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building.

President Charles Miller presided. Present were Trustees R. Herriges, R. Daniels, D. Schmidt, M. Kral and D. Nigh. Trustee Gregor Nigh arrived at 8:30 p. m.

Motion by Trustee D. Nigh. The proposal of the Washington County Department of Social Services for a county wide administration of relief was discussed by the Board. Motion was made by Trustee Daniels, seconded by Trustee Schmidt that the village's representative on County Board be instructed to vote "No" to the proposal if and when such proposal comes to a vote before the County Board. Unanimous vote.

Town of Kewaskum Supervisor Daniel Stoffel appeared before the Board to request an amendment to the Fire Service Contract between the Town of Kewaskum and the

Village of Kewaskum. The amendment requested would allow for seventeen (17) fire calls under the basic charge rather than fifteen (15). Motion was made by Trustee Schmidt, seconded by Trustee Daniels that the request for an amendment to the 1977 Fire Service Contract be denied. Roll call vote was unanimous.

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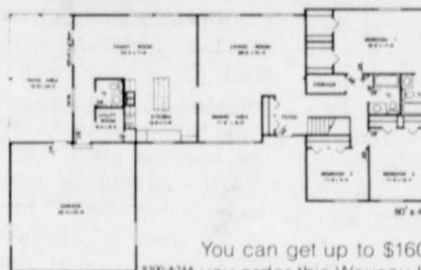
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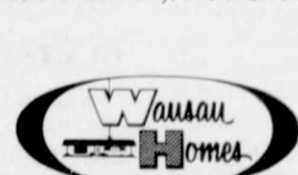
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Indians Crushed by Germantown As All Class A Teams Win

All Class A schools in the Scenic Moraine Conference won their games Friday as the Class B teams fell by the wayside. Three of them are undefeated and tied for first.

The Kewaskum Indians were outclassed by the powerhouse at Germantown, which we and most other writers have picked for the championship, 34-8. The Indians, still seeking their first victory, are now 0-4 overall, while the Warhawks are 4-0.

Germantown's wishbone offense really rolled against the Indians. Five different backs scored for the Warhawks as they amassed 379 yards to a mere 46 by Kewaskum.
