Barking Dog Arouses Couple In House Fire

A pet dog named "PeeWee" is credited with possibly saving the lives of a Kewaskum couple early Saturday morning.

Mr. and Mrs. Earl Kleinke of 622 Main St. were sound asleep when a fire started in the kitchen and smoke filled the house.

Neither Kleinke or his wife smelled the smoke but the dog ran into the couple's bedroom and continued barking until he woke Mrs. Kleinke. She had trouble waking her husband who may have already been partly overcome by the smoke. The two were then able to get outside for some fresh air before calling the Kewaskum Fire Department. The call was received at 1:48 a. m.

The firemen arrived within minutes, put out the fire, opened the wall in back of the stove to make sure there was no more fire in that area, and used a smoke ejector to clear out the house.

There was much damage from smoke in the house and the kitchen walls and ceiling were charred. The blaze started in the stove area, possibly from a short in the wiring.

The lights also shorted out and Kleinke could not see to dial the fire department number. He used his head and dialed O for the operator to report the fire. After some delay the call finally went through.

A Honey of a Visit

On Sept. 27 the fourth and fifth grade students of the Batavia Elementary School, accompanied by their principal, Roger Hoffman, visited the Gatzke Honey Farm, owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. Walter Gatzke, located in the Auburn Lake area.

This Science Field Trip was taken as a part of the children's study of bees. They were shown how a colony is built, the duties of each bee and how the bees survive during the winter. In the basement of their home, Mr. and Mrs. Gatzke showed the children the process of extracting the honey from the honeycomb.

The safety precautions that need to be taken and the special clothing that is worn when working with the colonies was explained. Gatzke then took a bee and forced it to sting himself to show the children the proper way of removing a stinger if this should ever happen to them.

Mr. and Mrs. Gatzke began raising bees as a hobby. They have been raising bees for about forty years. Their hobby

has grown through those years and is now a commercial business for them. At the present time they have 130 colonies. The processing and extracting facilities are inspected by the State of Wisconsin. They also operate under a Food Processing License which is issued by the state.

Before returning to school the children were all treated to a taste of the honeycomb.

Budget Changes to Be Considered at School Board Meet

Consideration of changes to the 1977-78 school budget will be considered at the Kewaskum School Board meeting, Oct. 17. The meeting will be held at 8 p. m. in the district administrative offices.

The proposed revised budget will call for a levy just a few dollars less than that presented to the annual meeting. It will be some \$20,000 less than the amount approved by the electors who attended the annual meeting. The tax rate, because of increased valuations, will be at 12.52 mills, slightly less than the anticipated rate presented at the meeting.

Additions to bus policies will be considered by the board. These additions will be aimed at clarifying drop-off and pick-up points, as well as parent requests for special-occasion busing. Two parent contracts will also be considered.

In other business, the board will consider continuing the contract with Lloyd's Cartage, a question of placement of a teacher on the schedule, purchase of musical instruments, and action on a board committee recommendation on a KEA grievance concerning deduction of dues. The board will also hear reports on cost comparisons of district VS contracting a private concern for behind-the-wheel instruction and fire inspection.

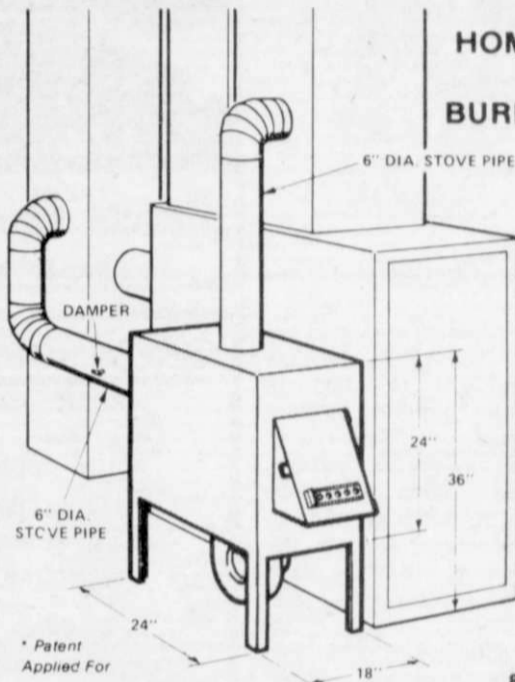

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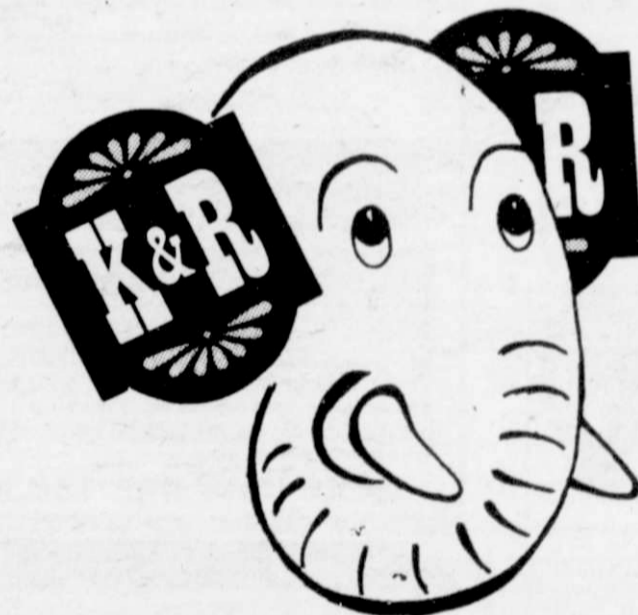
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Local Group Attends UW Ag Conference

High school students attending the 12th annual Agricultural Careers Conference Sept. 29 at the University of Wisconsin - Madison were urged to give thought to the "Life Sciences" part of the name of the College of Agricultural and Life Sciences.

The college's acting dean, Robert W. Hougas, told the more than 1,700 young people, teachers, parents and advisors at the conference that courses of study in the col-

lege could lead to careers in many fields besides production agriculture. He cited as examples careers in natural resources, energy conservation, health, nutrition and rural development, and the "life sciences" fields of bacteriology, biochemistry and genetics.

The conference featured departmental exhibits and career workshops in the college's 22 departments.

The young people came from 87 Wisconsin high schools and organizations. A group from Kewaskum took part in the all day event.

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WEEKLY Health TIP

Can colds be avoided? Colds increase when the winter heating season begins, because the dry air in heated rooms parches the nose and throat membranes, which are then more susceptible to virus infection. Dry mucous membranes cannot clean themselves by action of their cilia (hairlike structures) that move mucous upward out of the respiratory system, clearing away germs and viruses. If homes, schools, and places of work can be humidified to about 40% it should help to reduce the common cold infection.

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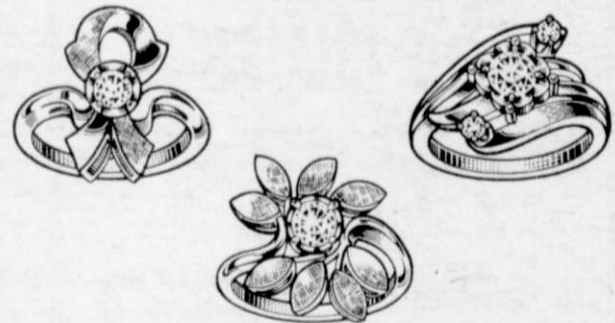

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Indians Lose Sixth Straight to Kettle in Homecoming Downpour

In a game which might better have been postponed but was played in a steady downpour Friday night, the Kettle Moraine "mudders" spoiled Kewaskum's homecoming by handing the Indians their 6th straight defeat without a win, 8-0. On the other hand the victory gave the 3-1 Lasers a tie for second.

The statistics bear out the result. Kettle made 13 first downs to Kewaskum's 3 and gained 181 total yards to the Indians' 117. The Lasers punted only twice for an average of 32 yards while the Kewaskum punting was nil, averaging only 18 yards on six punts. The Indians failed to complete a pass in 7 tries while Kettle didn't even attempt a pass in the rain.

Francis among the puddles, K-M marched to the Indians' 2-yard line in the first quarter, led by Tom Sandler's 28-yard run, but their score came in the closing minutes of the second period. They got a break when the Indians got off a punt of about five yards into the wind and rain.

The Lasers took over on Kewaskum's 23 but a penalty against the Indians for too many men on the field moved the ball to about the Indians' 12. On a third down and seven, Sandler raced around right end to score. His run added two points to make it 8-0.

There was no scoring in the second half as the rains came harder and the footing got more slippery. The only attempt was a 40-yard field goal try by the Lasers' Mike Fink, which was way short and wide.

Kewaskum came closest to scoring in the second quarter when they got to Kettle's 32-yard line after Mike Pettit got the game's longest run of 38 yards. The offensive team had the advantage in the mud because they knew where they were going. And Kettle was on the offense most.

Rich Boden and Wayne Endlich played well defensively for the losers. It was the Indians' fourth loss by one touchdown.

In the game of the week in the conference between the two undefeated teams, Grafton beat Germantown, 13-6, for the sole lead. In other contests Pewaukee edged Hartland 7-6, and winless Slinger also lost again to Mayville, 14-0.

This Friday Kewaskum has hopes of winning its first game, playing an afternoon contest at Slinger at 3:30. Both the Owls and Indians are looking for their first victory and are tied at the bottom of the standings with 0-4.
