Voters involving a tencounty area cast a decisive 3 to 1 "no" vote on the Moraine Park Technical Institute's \$4.5 million expansion referendum Tuesday.

Only about 13 per cent of the MPTI District's 135,000 eligible voters turned up at the polls. The result showed 13,384 against borrowing for expansions at Fond du Lac and West Bend campuses, and 4,267 voted "yes."

In the Village of Kewaskum only 129 voters, or about 10 percent of them, showed up at the polls. The result was 54 "yes" votes and 75 "no" votes.
