## Negotiations Between School Board And KEA to Resume Monday Night

School Board officials again heard from the KEA at this week's board meeting.

The four-person delegation of teachers was successful this time in being allowed to read a statement concerning resumption of this year's contract talks. Basically, it was a plea for a meeting of the entire Board and KEA negotiators without the presence of Ken Cole, the School Board's chief negotiator, and Dennis Eisenberg, head negotiator for the teachers through CLUE. After such a meeting of talking directly, they would "then hold a regular negotiation session with just the negotiating teams."

A regular session for negotiations was set up by Board President Ogi and Supt. Brenholt with Michael Theiler, president of the KEA, and Dale Squire, co-chief negotiator for the KEA. They will meet Nov. 7, at 8:00 p. m., but a larger meeting as requested by the delegation will be discussed further and an answer sent to Theiler prior to Nov. 7.

Also affecting teachers was the Board's decision to accept a resolution in response to the KEA's Oct. 17 request for expedited arbitration in the matter of the Board's denial of their "fair share" grievance. With Byron Gessner being the only Board member absent, the Board voted unanimously "that the authority to arbitrate expired with the 1976-77 agreement." Mike Theiler asked if the Wisconsin Employment Relations Council were the teachers' only alternative, to which Ogi answered, "I don't think we're qualified to tell you what to do next." Promising to find an alternative in the matter, Theiler did settle the authorization of dues deduction from the salaries of the 106 members of the KEA by submitting a written request form from each member and an authorization from the teachers' union.

The Board will be taking another look at its policy on busing before passing such a resolution, since Monday's request by Janet Hubbell that her two children be allowed bus transportation every Tuesday to the Bel-Ric acres subdivision where their piano teacher resides. Mrs. Hubbell pointed out that regular route riders were given special permission to be transported to homes of baby-sitters, and although her children were not eligible for regular bus transportation, she was willing to sent a note every Tuesday for the driver of the bus involved. Hubbell also said

that she has been informed that particular bus is not even filled to capacity. Ogi remanded the matter to the Transportation Committee for study, but Richard Theusch of that committee expressed his unwillingness to sanction such a move based on the number of potential requests for similar arrangements.

Arrangements to purchase a strip of land approximately 13 feet wide at its widest were denied Mr. and Mrs. George Eggert when a motion by Jean Goeden failed to receive a second. Wishing to retain the property "as a buffer" for high school students congregating near the parking area, the Board had concluded last year that no sale should be made. The Eggerts claim that they were never notified of any final decision.

The time clock regulating the bell signals at Farmington received some discussion when Richard Theusch reported that a "second opinion" had clearly indicated the clock was in "bad shape." A final decision whether or not to replace it, however, was not reached.

Unanimous approval was given James Oelhafen's motion for architectural plans to be drawn up for the new roof at Beechwood. Increasing the pitch of the roof by means of either rafters or insulation are the two alternatives. Rafters would cost approximately \$30,000, while insulation increases would be only \$16,000.

Jeff Ketter was unanimously approved as the assistant coach for the wrestling squad for this year. Fran Charland verified his excellent record as a "successful wrestler and

## Winter Parking Ordinance in Effect

A reminder that on November 1, our winter parking ordinance went into effect.

Section 9.30 (1) of the Village Code restricts Winter Parking. No person shall park a vehicle on a public street or highway in the Village of Kewaskum from November 1st to April 1st between the hours of Midnight and 6:00 o'clock A. M., unless such person parks the vehicle in accordance with the following:

(a) On the even numbered side of the street or highway on those dates which bear an even calendar date at 12 o'clock Midnight.

(b) On the odd numbered side of the street or highway on those dates which bear an odd calendar date at 12 o'clock P. M.

captain of the team at Stevens Point."

With John Tassar and Gerald Secor voting "no," a resolution calling for another reporter to correspond for the West Bend News passed on a 3-2 vote. In anticipation of such a measure, Monday evening's News carried an article stating the policy decision of Editor John Torinus, Jr. to retain Judy Harlow in her capacity as Kewaskum School Board correspondent because of "Harlow's long experience" in covering Kewaskum area news. In answer to the Board's assessment of her appointment during contract talks as "questionable policy" since she is "the wife of a teacher in the Kewaskum Schools," Torinus was quoted as saying, "labor negotiations are complex matters, and it wouldn't make sense to pull a reporter who is well backgrounded off the story and replace her with one who is not."

Brenholt received the Board's appointment of Jean Goeden to the committee formed to consider revision of the high school "athletic code" before the adjournment to closed session for further discussion of teacher contract negotiations.

## WB Savings sets record

West Bend Savings and Loan Association announced record third quarter results for the period ending Sept. 30 with assets totalling \$63,324,000, an increase of 21 per cent over the same period of 1976.

Earnings before interest paid to savers for the period ending Sept. 30 were \$2,852,000 of which \$2,325,000 was paid to savers and \$167,733 was paid in income taxes. Net earnings of \$359,386 compared to net earnings of \$275,633 for the third quarter ending Sept. 30, 1976 or an increase in net earnings of 30 per cent.


Richard A. Larson, West Bend Savings president, indicated that through Sept. 30 the association had experienced the highest volume of mortgage loan activity in the association's 51-year history. Mortgage loan totals increased 24.8 per cent.

Current interest rates are still somewhat lower than in October 1976. In pointing out the association's good earnings during 1977 Larson indicated that a savings and loan generally experiences better earnings when home mortgage rates are lower and earns less when interest rates increase. This is because an association's business volume is higher during periods of lower rates.

West Bend Savings compares favorably with state and national savings and loan earning figures, Larson said. During the first three quarters of 1977 the association earned 85¢ on every \$100 of assets and investments as compared to 80¢ for the same period in 1976.

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
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## Shoots Trophy Mule Deer

The game warden, outfitters, guides and people who live in the Town of Tensleep, Wyo., where the deer was registered, said it was the biggest deer they had ever seen

come out of the area.

The hunting party, consisting of Kreuser, his son Rick of Menomonee Falls, Greg Wells of Germantown and Russ Kumrow of rural Kewaskum, had a very successful trip since they filled up, shooting three other nice sized bucks.

This was the first trip to Wyoming for all but Kumrow. Needless to say a good time was had by all.

## Wildlife Award Winners Honored

Bob Melzer and Oliver Baumgartner, and their wives, were honored recently by the West Bend Kiwanis for their support and interest in developing and maintaining wildlife habitat in Washington County.

Melzer was awarded the "Farmer Wildlife Award," and Baumgartner was presented with the "Non Farmer Wildlife Award." Both landowners have conservation plans for their land developed with the assistance of the Washington County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Melzer operates a 288 acre dairy farm in the Town of Wayne. Bob has installed over 100 acres of contour strips and plans on adding 40 more acres in 1979. These contour strips provide both nesting and feeding areas for such upland game animals as partridge, pheasant, and deer.

Nesting areas are found in the grass or hay strip and food is obtained in the grain or corn strip. Bob also uses minimum tillage in his yearly farm operations. By leaving crop residue on the surface over the winter, leftover grain and corn can be utilized by wildlife.

Cover and water for wildlife can be found around a one half acre pond that was constructed by Bob in 1972. Clumps of cedar and spruce have been planted around the pond. Bob also has 22 acres of natural wetland which he maintains in existing vegetation for wildlife habitat. Small areas like these attract migrating ducks and offer needed sanctuary for a frightened deer.

Baumgartner has 107 acres devoted strictly to wildlife with 43 acres maintained in their natural wooded wetland state. Another 32 acres are devoted to nine pine plantations consisting of white and jack pine. He has followed a thinning and interplanting program which has allowed him to plant another 5,000 Norway pines.

There are a total of seven wildlife and fish ponds on his land, two of which were constructed last month. These ponds are stocked with trout, bass, and perch.

Both award winners were selected from a group of judges involving the Kiwanis, Soil Conservation Service, Department of Natural Resources, and the Washington County Soil and Water Conservation District. Art Schmit of the Kiwanis was the chairman of the committee and Don Kurer of the SCS gave a slide presentation of the Baumgartner and Melzer projects. Don pointed out that more wildlife is found in small pot holes, woodlots, marshes and odd unused corners on our farms than in the large marshes of the county. Many farmers and landowners protect their wildlife land because they are more interested in their natural value than in receiving the highest possible economic return.

The Baumgartners and Melzers are being considered for the S.E. Wisconsin Area Association of Soil and Water Conservation District's wildlife conservation award.

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

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in midmonthly session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building.

President Charles Miller presided. All trustee members were present.

Two corrections in the minutes of the meeting of October 3 were noted. Beal for a bartender's license was approved and the Commissioner was authorized to issue the proper license upon payment of the required fee. Motion by Trustee G. Nigh, seconded by Trustee D. Nigh. Unanimous vote.

The application of Merle Miller for a building permit to convert an attached garage into a family room and to construct a new two car detached garage was approved and the Commissioner was authorized to issue the proper permits upon payment of the required fees. Motion by Trustee Danielson, seconded by Trustee D. Nigh. Unanimous vote.

President Miller reported that he and Supt. Bilgo would be going to Madison to determine what government commodities were available. The village is interested in obtaining a generator-welder unit.

The Board discussed the pros and cons of the Gilsabind method and the Slurry Seal method of sealing streets.

The tenant in the village owned house at 1603 Fond du Lac Avenue was granted an extension until November 3,

1977, to vacate the premises and the Commissioner was instructed to direct a letter to the tenant to that effect.

President Miller reported that the League of Women Voters were conducting a Pure Water Conference at Janesville sometime during the month of November.

It was noted that a notice had been received from the Wisconsin Department of Revenue that there would be a Road and Streets Allocations meeting at the Washington County Court House on November 3.

President Miller and Supt. Albers reported on the Milwaukee River Restoration Council meeting they had attended at the Washington County Court House on October 13.

Supt. Albers reported that he had a prospective buyer for the coil filter at the waste water treatment plant.

The Kewaskum Junior Woman's Club, in a letter directed to President Miller, pledged a donation of \$1,000 for playground equipment for the new Kewaskum Kiwanis Community Park. The motion to accept this most generous

offer was made by Trustee Danielson, seconded by Trustee Schmidt. Unanimous vote.

Supt. Bilgo reported that the village had been offered a used hi-lift for a cost of \$2,500. No decision was made. Trustees Daniel Schmidt and David Nigh presented a seven year program for the installation of new sidewalks within the village. The proposed program will be studied by the Board.

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
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## 20 Seniors Bow Out Indians Rout Pewaukee in Final Game, 34-14; Tie for Fifth Place

The Kewaskum Indians wound up a long season with a convincing 34-14 victory over Pewaukee here Wednesday, giving them a 2-5 conference record and 2-7 overall mark for the season. The win also gained them a fifth place tie with Hartland and Pewaukee.

The contest also marked the finale for 20 seniors wearing the green and gold.

Since the fifth game of the year, when Coach Joe Harlow switched to the I offense, the Indians began looking like a pretty sound football team. They averaged over 300 yards per game, except for the Kettle Moraine game played in a downpour.

The result Wednesday was as one-sided as the score indicates. Kewaskum held a 34-6 lead before the Pirates scored a consolation touchdown in the last quarter. They rolled up 436 yards (301 rushing) to Pewaukee's 165 and led in first downs, 17-10, as the offense was the story. Dominating the Pirates, the Indians also had two touchdowns called back and most of their offensive starters sat out the last quarter.

While holding Pewaukee to only two first downs in the first half, the Indians scored first in the opening period after Steve Schneider recovered a Bill Schmidling fumble. Taking over on their own 34, the Indians moved downfield to their own one yard line, from where QB Al Jaeger sneaked into the end zone. A Jaeger to Joe Matenaer pass made it 8-0. On the drive the same two teamed up for a 23 yard pass play and Dan Schmidt caught two passes.

The ensuing kickoff was taken by Lou Larscheidt on his own 16 and he returned it all the way to Kewaskum's nine. On third and goal Schmidling tossed a TD pass to end Perry Pace in the end zone to make it 8-6.

After starting from their own 27, the Indians picked up one first down and then junior Mike Schaub, fourth high scorer in the conference before Wednesday, turned in a fine 54 yard run for another score.

On the Indians' next series, Schaub carried on three plays for 16, 7 and 20 yards and they neared the goal line again. This 61 yard drive was capped by a two yard plunge into the end zone by Greg Eichstaedt. Now it was 20-6.

On the next play an official's call prevented Kewaskum from another score. On a squib kickoff, John Maltch fumbled and Mike Pettit grabbed it in midair. He raced down the sideline into the end zone for an apparent score but an inadvertent quick whistle had stopped play.

Kewaskum put the game out of reach early in the third quarter. On the first play from scrimmage soph Pettit aroused fans with a nifty 54 yard TD run. Jaeger added the two point conversion.

The next series brought another score on a three play 80 yard drive. The key play was a 65 yard pass from Jaeger to Matenaer. Frank Lohrer scored the six points from the one yard line.

A 15 yard clipping penalty prevented another KHS score in the third period and an interception then ended that drive. After this Pewaukee put on a 94 yard scoring drive against the reserves which ended when Dan Schorber took it in from the 11.

Coach Harlow singled out Al Jaeger for a good job on the option. There was not a single fumble or bad pitch. Schaub had 170 yards in 14 carries for his best game of the season. It was his third 100 yard effort in his five starts at tailback. Defensively Rich Boden, Eichstaedt and Nick Vogt were praised.

In a Saturday game Grafton thrashed Hartland, 37-6, for an undefeated season and the Scenic championship. Grafton will face Hartford's Little Ten Conference co-champions in a WIAA Class A playoff game Friday night at Oconomowoc. In other contests Wednesday Mayville ousted Germantown, 23-14, to cop second place, while Kettle Moraine handed winless Slinger its 7th straight loss, 36-14.

Barb Wilson was the first Indian across the finish line. She was in third in 12:22. Robin Acker also was well up in the pack in sixth.


