Exodus House Kicks Off Fund Campaign, Plans Open House

Exodus House, Kewaskum's Halfway House for recovering male alcoholics, opened its county-wide fund raising campaign with a kick-off dinner for volunteer workers at the Glacier Inn Tuesday evening, Nov. 8.

The goal of the campaign announced by Robert Kroncke, fund chairman, is \$85,000 to be used to purchase a home and renovate it to conform with necessary standards at 1421 Fond du Lac Ave., Kewaskum.

In connection with the fund raising campaign, an open house will be held at Exodus House's present location on Sunday, Nov. 13, from 2:00 to 4:00 p. m.

Exodus House is a state certified, short term family style residence for recovering male alcoholics. It is a response to Washington County's need for a structured, professionally directed program to assist those persons in the transition between sobriety and re-entry into society.

Exodus House was formed as a result of the interest and concern of the board and staff of the Washington County Council on Alcoholism which has worked for alcoholics and their families in Washington County since 1973. Now a separate, private and non-profit Wisconsin corporation has been formed called Exodus Transitional Care Facility, Inc. Its board members are pri-

vate citizens with a common interest — providing comprehensive services for those persons suffering from alcoholism.

The purpose shall be to establish a program for the housing and board of recovering alcoholics. Its intent is to promote the character, physical welfare and usefulness of the residents, and to return them to their community as independent, responsible adults. Currently there are six residents at Exodus House.

Exodus House fully subscribes to the Alcoholics Anonymous concept of recovery and endorses A.A. principles and program as important to an individual's recovery.

Exodus House is a large, roomy, comfortable older

Residents Oppose Sidewalks at Board Meeting and by Petition

About 20 people, most of them from the Bel Ric Subdivision, attended the Village Board meeting Monday night to voice their dissatisfaction with the new sidewalk proposal drawn up last month.

Improper grading and placement of curb and gutter were cited as reasons for not installing sidewalks in areas presently without them. Other villages with partially sidewalked areas were indicated as examples of success in maintaining what citizens felt to be a "country" look. Besides the initial cost, which some felt would be too expensive when installation was done by contractors, upkeep and repair could continue to be a burden on residents. Mrs. Chris Ven Haus of 816 Bel Ric Drive suggested bicycle paths — "a narrow strip of blacktop" — to add to the safety along Highways 45 and H.

A petition of more than 70 signatures was presented to the board with the promise of more when President Charles Miller indicated that the opinion of the board could be moved in either direction by obvious support or negative sentiment expressed by the people in this matter. In part, the petition read that the undersigned "oppose the installation of sidewalk on out properties" and asked that the board "consider the wishes of the property owners" before passing the reso-

lution.

Commissioner William Martin explained that before any final action could be taken, a "preliminary resolution" would be published in the local paper, and further dissent by the public would be heard at the public hearing which would follow.

Trustees Dan Schmidt and Dave Nigh defended the sidewalk proposal with the insistence that any sidewalk program would be a monumental task if allowed to slide too long. Schmidt indicated a necessity for safe access to the new park because not all parents would be willing to transport youngsters there.

Police Chief Donald Hlavaty submitted his report concerning stop signs in the Western Avenue area. A study was requested by Bob Danielsen of traffic in this area last month.

The water tower and stand pipe could be refinished with cleaning and painting by the end of next summer if the board decides to accept the bid of the Lane Tank Company. "The entire structure will then be painted with aluminum paint," according to the bid. The board has 30 days to act on this proposal.

The dump truck box may be sold to defray the cost of the \$2500 cherry picker the board decided to purchase for aerial work done in the village. Augie Bilgo said this would include the hoist.

'Some Progress' Marks Negotiating Session Between School Board, KEA

The Kewaskum Board of Education approved two teachers' contracts Monday night before moving into a negotiating session with KEA representatives and Dennis Eisenberg of the Cedar Lake United Educators Council (CLUE). Vicki Ann Dega and Karen Wolf were hired as speech and language therapists for the district to work at all levels with children having these special problems. They fill the two vacancies left earlier this term by resignations.

"Some progress" marked the negotiating session, according to Dennis Eisenberg. An exchange of "statistical information" to "justify their positions" was the major accomplishment of the bargaining session, which lasted until about 11:30 p. m. The KEA Executive Committee met with the full board, as they

had requested last week, for a full hour before bargaining began.

The deduction of KEA dues, which had been requested at a regular board meeting, will begin immediately. "Neither side indicated a willingness to move from their previous positions," Eisenberg commented when asked if any other agreements had been reached.

Floyd Brenholt indicated that the board would adjourn to closed session after next Monday's regular meeting to discuss the information they had received from the KEA. Another bargaining session has been scheduled with the KEA for November 21. Brenholt said, "I'd hate to speculate (on a settlement at this point)." Eisenberg said that he was "pleased with the attitude on both sides of the table," and he ventured "guarded optimism that a settlement can be reached in the near future."

was also authorized Monday night. The sander now in use was a used purchase and has now become badly rusted.

Peter Albers reported that the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) would be sending an inspector on November 15 to check the filtration system.

Dan Schmidt reported that the Modern Woodmen of America have donated \$100 for the purchase of appropriate equipment to furnish the multi-purpose room of the new park shelter. A clock for that room has also been suggested.

Charles Miller reported that highway funding would be done on the basis of a new "bookkeeping system" outlined by the State Highway Dept. May 15, 1979, would mark the end of the first "reporting period" based on records kept of "intersection lighting, snow removal, road maintenance, school safety patrol and police patrols." That figure would be used to derive "a formula" to determine what per cent of the total highway funds could be sent to Kewaskum for Hys. H, 45 and 28.

home that is undergoing remodeling to make it ideal for group living. It is located in Kewaskum, one block from the business district and within walking distance of almost all church denominations, various clubs and library. Most sources of employment are also in traveling distance.

The Exodus House consists of a Director, Resident House Manager, a cook and secretary. A relief staff person is available on weekends. Evaluation and counseling services are provided by the professional staff at Exodus House. Working agreements are maintained with the Washington County Council on Alcoholism and the Washington County Mental Health

Center.

Initially, Exodus House has been funded by a combination of federal grants and local support. Eventually, Exodus House intends to be funded primarily through residents' fees (based on their capability to contribute), sale of service to other agencies, and private contributions.

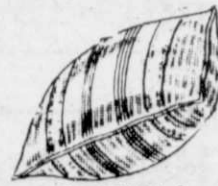

REGULAR MEETING OF BOARD OF EDUCATION

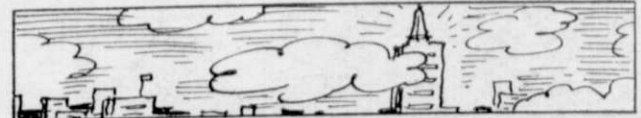
The regular meeting of the Kewaskum Board of Education will be held on Monday, Nov. 14, at 8 p. m. in the district administrative offices.
