Transportation Policy Adopted. Petition Submitted to School Board for Change of Reporter

A transportation policy was adopted by the School Board Monday night without further discussion after Mrs. Janet Hubbell withdrew her request to have her two children bussed from school to a music lesson once a week. The new policy required consistency in pick-up and dropoff points for regular route riders and no transportation for students to non-school activities if they do not regularly receive transportation.

A request by the James Laufer family will be honor ed by the board. Two Laufer children will continue to attend the Kewaskum Elementary School for the remainder of the school year although the family has moved just inside the Farmington school area. No problems in bus routes are evident.

If the clock at Farmington Elementary is beyond repair. as two opinions have indicated, then a new clock has been authorized. Principal Thomas Larsen has said he is still trying to have it repaired if possible. The latest clock repair company, Cincinnati Co. from Milwaukee, had John Tesar's vote of confidence as "a good established firm" "stands behind" its work. Christmas recess is the projected time for repair or replacement.

The Wisconsin Association of School Boards will be get ting more than its share of delegates from Kewaskum if all the volunteers attend the Delegate Assembly in Milwaukee January 18. Richard Theusch volunteered as the official delegate with John Tessar, Gerald Secor and Byron Gessner expressing interest in attending the meeting. Theusch has attended for "at least two years," and he encouraged the other mem

bers to attend. Discussion of West Bend News coverage of the transportation request from Janet Hubbell included a request by Richard Theusch to "retract" or at least "explain" his recommendation during the meeting of October Theusch said that he felt people would interpret his comments (made concerning special requests) could be interpreted to mean that he was not in favor of the bussing of any village students Harlow said that in conjunction with the transportation policy before the board, village students would not be afforded bussing under the two-mile minimum distance as stated in that policy. Gerald Secor said that the policy

was not published as part of that article and only "10 out of 100 would get your (Harlow's) interpretation out of it," meaning the article in the

Judy Harlow agreed to print an explanation of the policy and Theusch's comment on his feelings.

Mrs. Pat Cardarelle submitted a petition which she said carried 403 signatures from people all over the dis trict which supported the board's October 31 resolution to have Judy Harlow removed from coverage of Ke waskum School Board meet ings and teacher contract negotiations. Included in the netition was a statement directed toward the two dissenting board members and the News who did not agree with the board majority passing the resolution. Cardarelle, who said she had never at tended a board meeting said that she encountered "few people" to carry the petition "from door to door " School Board President Charles Ogi asked if she felt she could have obtained more signatures if she had "had more time." Cardarelle answered affirmatively. Ogi said he felt the people were overwhelmingly behind the School Board in this matter.

The petition may have been circulated from door to door in the village, but although Mrs. Cardarelle said she visited "some rural" areas (which she refused to designate), the Farmington School area was left without much contact. Fillmore residents contacted said that they had (Continued on Page 2)







Excess Contributions Should Be Avoided

Avoid contributing more than \$1500 a year for individuals, more than \$1750 yearly for couples, or more than 15% of earned income, or you will be subject to penalties.

What About Working Couples?

Where husband and wife both work, they can (if both are eligible) open separate IRA accounts for a maximum tax-free set-aside of \$3000 a year.
