A bid of \$18,600, not including any additional welding, was accepted from the Lane Tank Company of Menomonie. Pete Albers gave a firsthand account of Lane's work in Allenton by commenting on the sandblasting Sandblasting "the entire inside of the tank, and over 90 per cent of the outwas done to remove peeling layers of old paint. Special tank paint is used inside, and after a primer. the outside is painted with aluminum paint. The need for welding was not anticipated as being very great by Augie

ment will come from federal sources, at least the EPA made its final inspection, and, according to Charles Miller, the inspector "was pleased with the way things were." Hope was expressed that some tangible result could be seen "within the next year."

Miller said he had already been in touch with a firm "interested in tertiary treatment" of Kewaskum's wastewater. Towns with populations under 10,000 seem to be their specialty.

A variance was granted to Kewaskum by the DNR. Removal of 85 per cent of solid waste from wastewater entering the Milwaukee River will be acceptable. The granting of such a permit is on a year-to-year basis and meets DNR standards.

James Arthur submitted his final estimates, but there was not enough prior notice to call a meeting of the Park Committee before Monday. Dan Schmidt reported that he had been informed that funding could be reimbursed without submitting bids, a new policy this year, if material requirements would be explicit in DNR funding requests.

To date, excavators have moved off the job with all but the infield of the baseball diamond completed. Rough grading is done, and as soon as freezing weather permits the ground to harden, gravel can be laid for the courts, parking lot and the path.

Although there was no discussion on the sidewalk proposal, Bel- Ric subdivision representatives submitted a petition signed by 55 people opposed to the installation of new sidewalks. Also represented were 26 other families against and five people in favor of new sidewalks. A copy of ten reasons in support of their views was attached to the petition. Included were reasons of maintenance costs. "poor planning" of grades in Bel-Ric, a chance of the schools' discontinuing bussing and the idea that "the voice of the people" should be heard in making a decision of this kind.







2. We did not influence voters on a political issue, and did not try to elect or defeat any political candidate.

 Explicit, hard-core pornography already was illegal and we only sought enforcement of the law one way or another.

4. It simply is not right to sue well-meaning citizens for asking their elected officials to protect their families and community from obscenity that already is illegal.

5. Prosecution of our organization has a chilling effect on other citizens with the courage to stand up and fight for law and order.

We don't believe that the legislators who enacted the Wisconsin Campaign Financing Law intended it to be enforced against activities such as ours. If it is true that we violated the law, as it is written, then we believe the law needs to be changed. We insist on a jury trial, even though we are mindful of the high cost, because our STRONG MORAL CONVICTIONS TELL US THAT THIS

IS AN INJUSTICE.




