School Board Accepts KEA Contract; Sanctions Student Trip to Germany

The Board of Education voted unanimously to accept the tentative contract agreed upon by KEA and board ne gotiators Nov. 21. Basically the rates of increase along the pay scale remained the same as last year but the base pay for both Bachelor and Master's Degrees increased. A teacher's base salary without a Master's Degree increased \$475 from last year's base of \$8,875. Master's starting pay will be \$10,173 this year

Other minor changes from last year's contract included an increase of two cents (from 12 to 14) for authorized mileage reimbursements and a slight increase of \$2 and \$3 respectively for chaperones at "home" and "away" events. The addition of a \$100 penalty for early release from a contract (to be paid by the teacher seeking release after July 1) is new to this year's

Although the Masters plus 30 credits pay level was not entered into this year's version of the agreement, a fully paid health insurance plan and deduction of union dues (fair share) were retained along with a detailed set of steps for grievance procedure.

The final step in legalizing the contract is expected to come with radification by the teachers on Thursday according to Dennis Eiesnberg.

Bids for building up the Beechwood roof by adding insulating materials will be accepted beginning Wednesday. Jan. 11. Advertisements will be published.

The board voted to retain their present method of covering unemployment compen sation benefit payments. "Reimbursement Financing" was retained as a less expensive means of covering any benefits paid out by the district. The alternative offered for Jan. 1, 1978 according to a letter from Job Service could have cost the district an annual fee of "as much as \$300 tax per employee."

· In compliance with Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, receipt of federal grants, loans and contract money could depend upon fair treatment of persons handicapped in any way. The Board voted to reaffirm the district's policy of non-discrimination in hiring practices Floyd Brenholt said that the law could also have impact in the area of student transportation if a handicapped child would complain of poor or inadequate busing facilites for example.

A trip to Germany this spring was approved for an

unspecified number of students interested enough in the German language to be studying it this year. Although it may involve some time away from the job the teacher will receive her salary while chaperoning the trip. Byron Gessner said that there was "quite a bit of work involved" in planning the trip and seeing it through, making the teacher well deserving of her paycheck. The sanction of the board was given early due to the amount of time needed for advance, overseas reservations. Richard Theusch asked that more exact details be brought to the board when they became


Elect Plaum VTAE Vice-President

The children of Farmington Elementary School were treated to a visit by a real, live author last Wednesday afternoon.

Marion Fuller Archer, author of four historically sound children's books told of her life and interest in children and particularly the history of the people of Oshkosh. Explaining her beginnings at the age of four as a writer (her mother told Mrs. Archer to be sure to include "a beginning, a middle and an end" to her stories and her early recognition by having a story published in a magazine when she was only seven years old, Mrs. Archer gave the first through sixth graders some insight into the life and habits of an author.

Classified as "historical fiction," Archer's books deal with people and pets. "Sarah Jane," based on a character patterned after her grandmother, won first prize in a creative writing contest sponsored by the Wisconsin Regional Writers Association. A book about a cat very much like one she loved as a girl, "Nine Lives or Moses on the Oregon Trail," also won first prize in a similar con-


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James Belongia

Navy Seaman Apprentice Richard R. Weiss, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edgar L. Weiss of 2959 Highway H, Route 2, Kewaskum, is serving as a crewmember aboard the Navy's newest aircraft carrier.

The USS Dwight D. Eisenhower was commissioned Oct. 18 at the Naval Station, Norfolk, Va.

The Honorable Harold Brown, Secretary of Defense, was the guest speaker and Mrs. Mamie Eisenhower, widow of the late general and president, was the honored guest at the ceremony.

Weiss is one of more than 3,300 officers and enlisted men assigned to the Eisenho-She has an overall length of 1,092 feet and a flight deck area covering four and one-half acres. Displacing more than 94,000 tons, she can travel at speeds in excess of 30 knots. In addition to her regular crew. the Eisenhower can accommodate 100 tactical aircraft and approximately 2,800 personnel assigned to an attack aircraft wing. Her highspeed steaming endurance is provided by two nuclear reactors which are expected to provide more than 13 years of normal ship operation without refueling. His ship is one of the least vulnerable carriers constructed, due to extensive armor shielding and an improved anti-torpedo hull design.

The Eisenhower is the second ship in the "Nimitz" class of aircraft carriers. She is named for the late President Dwight D. Eisenhower and, along with the Nimitz. shares the distinction of being the largest naval vessels ever built.

The Eisenhower will be homeported in Norfolk, Va.

Weiss joined the Navy in December 1976.

The course was conducted at the Naval Service Command, Great Lakes. III. 

In the last few years we have seen a great deal of attention focused on special education, particularly the right of all children to a free, appropriate public education, no matter the type or severity of their handicap.

Public Law 94-142, the Education of All Handicapped Children's Act, established the priority that all "unserved" handicapped children must be located, identified and provided a free, appropriate public education. This program is called CHILD FIND, which essentially is an attempt both nationally and by your local school districts to locate any child ages birth to 21, who might have a special educational need. Handicaps may include: hearing, visionor speech impairments, developmental delays, mental retardation, emotional disturbances, learning disabilities, orthopedic problems or other health impairments that might require special services.

Finding the child may not be as easy as it sounds. A child's problem may not be obvious, and in the early years, the parents may be the only one who knows if a child has a special problem. This may also be true for school age children whose problems have kept them out



of school.

This is where you or your organization can help. By disseminating CHILD FIND information in the places the public frequents such as stores, banks, service stations, offices, public meeting rooms, churches and other like places, we can reach those people who would not otherwise know that there is help through CHILD FIND.

Early detection and intervention, through special educational programs specifically designed to meet the child's needs, is the key to helping the individual reach his or her full potential. Anyone working at full capacity is of benefit to himself and the community

in which he or she resides.

Holiday Safety - Do's and Don'ts

The Christmas season usually goes hand in hand with traditions. Many traditions revolve around the decorating of the Christmas tree, and the purchasing of gifts for loved ones and friends. - * Remember to check the decorative lighting strings for frayed wires, broken cords, and loose sockets. These conditions pose potential electrical hazards. Use only light strings that bear a UL Label.
- * When trimming the tree, avoid using candles or other decorations that may ignite easily. Keep the tree away from the fireplace, radiator, and the T.V. set any source of heat may cause the tree to become dry, thus creating a fire hazard.

DON'T overdo it -

- * Be sure not to overload the electrical circuits in your home. The wires that carry more current than they can handle may overheat and cause a fire. Read manufacturer's instructions on lighting strings carefully and do not use more than the recommended number of lights in one circuit.
- * Christmas decorations are beautiful and very pleasant to look at. However, when you leave your home or retire for the night, turn off the light sets, colored spot lights, or other decorations.

DON'T settle for the unknown -

* When purchasing gifts for the people you care about take time out to check for the UL Label. Gifts of electric food blenders, hair dryers, hot combs, and the like are tested for safety by Underwriters Laboratories. Show that you care - check for the UL Label.

Pour wine into fondue pot. Add pieces of cheese. Place over medium-high heat and stir until cheese is melted and mixture is smooth. Add flour mixture and cook and stir until thickened. Reduce heat so mixture continues to bubble gently. Spear bread or fruit pieces on fondue fork and dip into hot mixture. Makes about six servings.

NOTE: Recipe may be doubled or tripled depending upon size of fondue pot and number of people being served.

Kewaskum came from behind in the second half to defeat West Bend East of the Little Ten Conference here last Tuesday night, 87-78.

In a surprise upset this Tuesday, West Bend East won 51-49 over Plymouth, which beat Kewaskum soundly in their opener, in which the Indians had a cold night.

Two of the smallest players on the court stood out in the Indians' win over East, namely Kewaskum's Dale Poling and the Suns' Bob Liebetrau, both 5-8 guards. Liebetrau who scored 27 points, sparked a first quarter spurt that had East out in front, 19-8, at one time. Poling, who tallied 22 for the Indians, led a third quarter rally that turned the tide in favor of Kewaskum. Only Mark Tessar topped Poling in scoring as he tied Liebetrau with 27, while Roger Rezel chipped in 21.

Free throws decided the game. Kewaskum hit on 27 of 33 for 81 per cent, while the Suns made only 16 of 34 for 47 per cent

The Indians closed the gap to 40-38 at halftime. In the third quarter, with the score 48-45, Poling scored 6 straight to give his team a 54-45 advantage. This time East narrowed the gap to 60-57 at the end of the third period.

Tessar was saved for the last quarter and the strategy worked as he came in to score 11 late points. At one point the Indians ran off nine unanswered points, as Kewaskum outscored the Suns, 27-21, in the last period.

Coach Westphal was pleased with the all-around play of Poling, Tessar and Rezel and the fact that all three scored over 20 points.

The Sun JV's defeated Kewaskum, 47-36. Bob Nigh and Henry Schilter paced Kewaskum with 12 and 10 points.

COUNTY DEER KILL 353: HAMPERED BY WEATHER

The deer hunting season closed Sunday with an unofficial county deer harvest of 353 recorded.

Despite warm, wet conditions the opening weekend and the cold weather and snow this past weekend, the county total was still higher than last year's 316. Washington County in years past used to record 400 deer and Game Manager Armin Schwengel said the county could easily have reached 400 this year except for the weather.

Schwengel said there is a pretty constant herd right now and the county's deer population is estimated at about 1,500. "You can't get any higher than that without running into problems with highway accidents and crop damage - they'd never run out of food."

The largest deer was a 210-pounder bagged in the Town of Erin. The county had no gunshot accidents.
