Budget Hearing

Final Assessment Figures Still Unavailable for Village Board

By MARYANNE MERWIN Statesman Staff Writer

With only a little more than two weeks left in the year, final assessment figures were still unavailable for the Vilage Board to work with at the Budget Hearing Tuesday evening.

Only a few bookkeeping adjustments were necessary, with the proposed budget for 1978 standing at \$1,443,-231.40. Some changes may be made - to the advantage of village funds - if M & E reimbursements exceed the projected \$8,200. Commissioner William Martin said that figure "cannot be any less," at any rate. President Charles Miller commented that if more money did become available, the village "could add to the debt retirement."

Daniel Schmidt asked if new wage schedules had been computed into the budget figures. Some changes could

Town Kewaskum Tax Rate \$22.73

Tax bills for Town of Kewaskum residents will be mailed out before Christmas this year. The rate has increased slightly.

School Board's Cost for Special Services from WASB Increased

The cost for special services purchased from the Wisconsin Association of School Boards will be higher this year. The School Board voted to accept a contract with the WASB for special services computed at a \$5 per hour increase over last year's fee of \$30 per hour when performed "within the school district" and \$5 per hour more than last year's fee of \$25 for services "performed in the association office." The minimum contract costs \$500.

Basically, the district's main use of WASB services has been through their representative at bargaining sessions with the teacher's union. The board may also ask for assistance in "writing job descriptions" and other areas of personnel and salary evaluations as well.

Supt. Floyd Brenholt reported that after an audit by the state Kewaskum would probably "be off only one to three students" in the official count taken the third Friday of September each year. Richard Theusch wished to commend Brenholt for his handling of the enrollment computations affecting the amount of state funds received by the district. Brenholt said he would "pass along" the compliment to the principals of each school.

The school's twelve-horsepower John Deere tractor will be fitted with new snow blowing equipment as soon as Brenholt determines the lowest bid of the three possible in this area. The board voted to purchase the snow blower on that basis.
