Kewaskum Tax Rate Finally Set at \$18.28 Per Thousand

The Village of Kewaskum finally received its assessment from the state this week and the board was able to set a tax rate at its meeting Tuesday night.

The figures came in higher than expected, leading to a final net rate of \$18.28 per thousand of assessed valuation. The total assessment of the village came close to \$46 million dollars.

The taxes and rates are as follows:

State taxes-\$8,553 at a rate of .19 per thousand.

County taxes-\$138.474 at a rate of \$3.03 per thousand.

School taxes-\$535,549 at a rate of \$11.73 per thousand.

Vocational School taxes-\$57,593 at a rate of \$1.26 per thousand.

Village taxes-\$318.452 at a rate of \$6..98 per thousand.

The total tax levy equaled \$1,058,600 with a gross tax rate of \$23.19.

The tax credit of \$4.91 per thousand subtracted from the gross rate results in the \$18.-28 figure

Village Commissioner Willlam Martin explained the fi-

gures to the board and noted the \$18 figure would be the tax rate if there were no changes in the budget. He also explained that this year the village's actual levy is \$318,000, well under the \$405,000 set as the village's allowable spending limit. The budget had no changes.

The \$18.28 tax rate is much lower than last year's \$42.87. But the village has just gone through a total reassessment so it was estimated the rate would be half of the1976 figure since the assessed valuation more than doubled.

The reason the Machinery and Equipment assessment from the state came in so late was due to the reassessment.

Martin said he was going to take all the figures to Waukesha Wednesday to have the tax roles computerized and he hopes to have them in the mail by Friday.

First on the agenda was the possible sleigh ride on a Saturday afternoon in January. The idea was suggested by Donna Prost to hold the ride at her home.


The Christmas party was held in the old gym of the high school. After playing games and exchanging gifts. refreshments were served.

Washington County Judge James B. Schwalbach announced today that he would be a candidate in the April 1978 elections to continue as county judge.

Schwalbach is presently serving in Washington County Court Branch I, having been appointed by Gov. Patrick J. Lucey on March 10, 1977. Schwalbach succeeded Judge J. Tom Merriam, who had been appointed to fill a vacancy in the 24th Judicial Circuit.

Election to the nonpartisan post is for a six-year term. County Court Branch I primarily handles family court, probate and juvenile matters, as well as some civil lawsuits and criminal cases

Schwalbach served as district attorney for Washington County from 1973 through 1976. He was then associated with the law firm of Bunk and Conter in West Bend before taking the bench in March of 1977.


Schwalbach said, "I believe my more than eight years as trial attorney, including almost four years as Washington County district attorney, and my present service as a judge qualifies me to continue to act as Washington County judge.

In addition, a monthly in-service meeting is required.

Specifically, the program offers drug education, personal growth workshops, crisis intervention training and suicide prevention techniques. Volunteers will also have an opportunity to learn more about community services and to exchange thoughts and ideas with other individuals who are likely to have common concerns about current social issues.





The legend of Saint Nicholas is, of course, centuries old, and began in Europe. The story had its beginning in the semi-tropical city of Patara, Turkey, where St. Nicholas was born and where he lived and died. Until after his death, when his remains were taken by Italian sailors to Bari, Italy, St. Nicholas traveled little, never venturing more than a few miles from his native region.

It was the goodness and generosity of St. Nicholas which led him to become the patron saint of many countries. of all boys, and of sailors.

Many legends concerning St. Nicholas. with re-telling have become a bit vague and clouded, but some things are certain: he was a man of wealth; he was generous and kind; and he was at one time Bishop of Myra.

Three Dowries

What is generally believed to be St. Nicholas first and best-known act of kindness was the presentation of dowries to the three daughters of a poor nobleman. According to the story. St. Nicholas learned that the poor girls had decided among themselves that one of them would sell herself into slavery in order that the two others could marry in honor. On separate occasions. St. Nicholas tossed three bags of gold into each girl's window, so that all three were married with honor, and in the usual fashion, lived happily ever after.

FIREPLACE GIFT MAKES HOLIDAYS WARMER, SAFER



A gift for the house is a Christmas tradition in many room. homes. With the fireplace being used often these days for auxiliary heat and fuel conservation, accessories for the fireplace are more welcome than ever, according to the Fireplace Institute.

Many are useful as well as decorative. The popular firescreens with tempered glass doors are energy savers. For safety's sake, a fireplace damper should not be closed for several hours after a fire dies out. The glass doors of the screen can be closed while the damper is left open and warm air is not drawn up the chimney.

This and other types of firescreens provide protec-tion from sparks and hot coals popping out into the room. Some firescreens are free-standing, others attach to the fireplace opening. Custom-made screens are available for the odd-size fireplace.

To safely shift logs or place new ones in the hot fire chamber, a sturdy pair of tongs and a poker are needed. A brush and shovel for cleaning the fire chamber and hearth are often included in sets of tools designed to match your room decor. A woodholder or basket keep logs handy and neatly stacked by the hearth.

A grate and andirons hold logs correctly and provide air circulation for a good fire. In addition to conventional grates, many fireplace dealers offer grates constructed to direct more

of the heated air into the

Increased use of fireplaces for heat has made log lighters a popular accessory item. Gas lighters provide a steady flame until logs ignite. A tray that contains fuel and which slides under the logs can also be used as a substitute for kindling. The traditional Cape Cod fire lighter, a pot which holds fuel and a wand, is also popular both for decoration and lighting the fire. Commercially made fire-starting cubes are a safe substitute for kindling. Super long fireplace matches come in decorative containers.

For dedicated recyclers, manufactured logs are available in many fireplace accessory shops as well as a handy gadget that rolls old newspapers into tight 'logs.

Old-fashioned bellows beside the hearth add a traditional decorative touch, but are also handy when the blaze needs some encouragement.

People are re-discovering the fascination of hearthside cooking. Long-handled popcorn poppers are fast moving items, say fireplace dealers. Grills for sizzling steaks and cast-iron pots for simmering beans or stew also are much in demand.

Since the energy crisis began, fireplaces aren't just for hanging Christmas stock-ings. It's the place where the family gathers for warmth, carols and good home cooking

Christmas tree lights, while beautiful, can be dangerous if used carelessly.


Never allow children to play with lights. Be sure that all sockets contain a bulb. Check light strings before you use them. Discard or repair broken sockets or worn insulation. Never put lights on metal foil trees.

Check often to be sure bulbs do not touch branches, needles or flammable decorations.

Falling needles indicate the tree is drying out and could become a fire hazard.

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Every year many of us receive a number of "unordered" items through the mails shortly before Christmas—such things as Christmas cards, pen and pencil sets, holiday envelope stickers, key rings, gift ties, etc. Later, a bill or a plea for a "Donation" follows with the message the money will be given over to a worthy cause.

Some of these solicitations are for worthy causes. Others are from someone trying to make a fast buck. What can you do about it?

Don't give unless you know where your money is going. If it is a legitimate cause, your Chamber of Commerce or Better Business Bureau will be able to tell you. If it is a worthy cause and you wish to participate, pay by check and keep the cancelled check.

If you doubt the cause is legitimate, or just don't wish to participate, mark the item "refused" and return it to the Post Office. Even if you opened it before you realized what was inside, you can rewrap it in the original wrapping as best you can, write "refused" and return it to the Post Office.

Whether you open the package or not. you don't have to pay for it. You are under no obligation to return it as "refused"—but it's a good idea to do so. This will greatly discourage further shipments to you from the same company.





SIMPLY DELICIOUS stuffing suggestions start with a packaged mix and end up mouth watering.



Use as stuffing for roast chicken, Cornish hen, summer squash or eggplant.


