Merril Krueger Wins \$60,000 in Illinois Lottery



Merril J. Krueger of 1680 Riverview Drive, Kewaskum, who was among 14 qualifiers for the top prize of \$200,000 as part of the Illinois State Lottery's \$1 million bonanza game in Springfield, Ill., won the \$60,000 second prize last Thursday.

Krueger, 49, matched the color on his qualifying ticket

with the color picked during the drawing to double the second prize of \$25,000 and the \$5,000 he received for qualifying. An Indiana man won the first prize of \$200,000.

Krueger qualified for the drawing with a 50-cent ticket. Each finalist is assured a minimum of \$5,000 by entering

the drawing, according to Richard W. Carlson Illinois lottery superintendent.

Top DHIA Cows in Washington County

The Washington County Dairy Herd Improvement Association (DHIA) has just released information on the top producing cows for the month of November. The awards are based on pounds of butterfat produced by the animals in various age categories for 305 day lactation records.

The "Under Three Year Old" group was topped by a holstein cow owned by Edward and Harvey Klumb. The two year, two month old Holstein produced 20,047 pounds of milk, 3.8% butterfat and 759 pounds of butterfat. The second place cow in that category was owned by Thomas Wiedmeyer. The two year, two month old animal had a record of 20,017 pounds of milk, 3.6% butterfat and 724 pounds of butterfat.

In the "Three Year and Over" category, the first place animal is owned by James A. Wiedmeyer. This three year, 10 month old Holstein produced 24,791 pounds of milk, 3.6% butterfat and 881 pounds of butterfat. The second place animal in that category is owned by Edward and Harvey Klumb. The three year, five month old animal produced 21,781 pounds of milk, 4% butterfat and 879 pounds of butterfat.

In the next category for animals "Four Years of Age and Older," the top producer is owned by James Esselmann. The four year, nine month old cow produced 21,765 pounds of milk, 3.8% butterfat and 819 pounds of butterfat. The second place animal is owned by Harold Mueller. The four year, two month old animal had a production of 19,304 pounds of milk, 4.2% butterfat and 812 pounds of butterfat.

In the "Five Years and Over" category, the top animal in the listing was a five year, nine month old animal owned by Edward and Harvey Klumb, with a production of 25,210 pounds of milk, 4.1% butterfat with 1,035 pounds of butterfat produced. The second place animal is owned by Robert Langenecker. The five year, eight month old animal produced 25,056 pounds of milk, 3.9% butterfat with a butterfat production of 977 pounds.

In the category of "Colored Breeds," one animal was listed, owned by James F. Stuetgen. The two year, one month old animal had a production of 13,400 pounds of milk, 3.6% butterfat and 478 pounds of butterfat.

Still without leading scorer Mark Tessar, the Kewaskum Indians folded in the second half to suffer their fourth straight Scenic loss to Mayville here Thursday night, 86-64. The game was a make-up of a contest snowed out on Dec. 9.

At the start it appeared the Indians would blow the Cardinals off the floor as they jumped off to an 11-0 lead. Led by the shooting of guard Dale Poling and forward Al Jaeger, Kewaskum brought it to 14-2. Late in the quarter Mayville climbed to within five and then moved to within one at halftime, 36-35.

The third quarter jinx plagued the Indians again as the result of turnovers and a stout Cardinal defense. The Mayville depth also began to take its toll and Coach Bob Wajtslik was able to keep his players fresh by substituting. The Cards outscored the Indians, 29-11, in the disastrous third period to put the game away.

The Indians' defensive pressure was effective in the first half, but without much reserve strength, the first five couldn't keep up the pace. Kewaskum's JVs edged Mayville in a good game, 61-59, with Bob Nigh having a fine effort. The freshmen lost, 69-51, with Brian Dreher scoring 12.

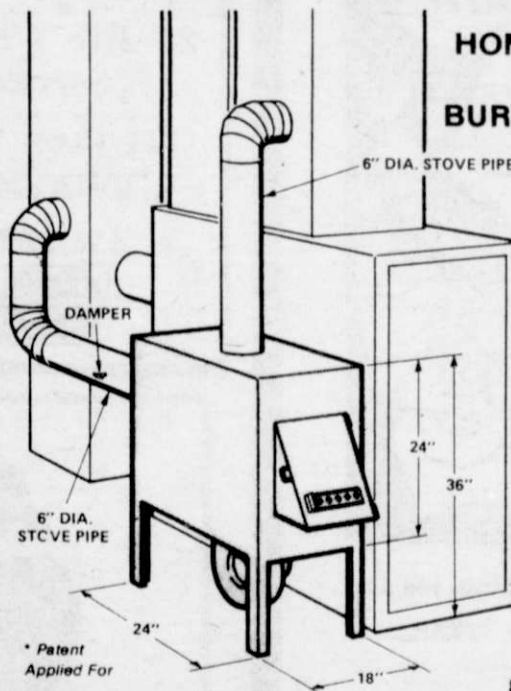
