

### Flooding for Ice Skating, New Equipment Occupy Village Board

Ice skating this winter may depend upon the timekiness of flooding and clearing the area of the river to be used.

Dave Nigh asked that all the necessary arrangements be made soon while the season is at its peak. Discussion revealed that proper methods were to be employed if "ripples" were to be avoided. Tom Larsen would be contacted for information concerning the flooding. "I would like to see something done about it before the winter is over," urged Nigh.

No action was taken by the village board Tuesday night concerning the new license fees proposed last month. Commissioner William Martin was instructed to investigate the possibility of holding a public hearing before making any changes. The village attorney would be contacted.

Road equipment — street sweeper, garbage truck, salter and hydraulic basket was discussed, but no difinitive reports could be made at this time. Purchase of the sweeper was tabled until more information could be acquired, and the village is still waiting for delivery of the garbage truck and salter.

Dan Schmidt said he had received a letter from the DNR acknowledging their receipt of village expenditures estimated for this year's work on the new park.

Commissioner Martin was

authorized to request an estimate for an overflow pipe to extend down the length of the water tower to a "splash pad at ground level." Since the Lane Tank Company would be doing the painting, they would be contacted for at least an initial estimate.

Thre recapping for the "refuse truck" will be done by Roger's Service for \$66, according to a unanimous decision by the board.

Installation of a "communications device" to develop a network between the garbage truck, Chief Bilgo and the "base" station was discussed. No action was taken, although the need for such equipment on days when the truck makes a "run" to Lomira was recognized.



KHS GIRLS 880 RELAY TEAM'S 1st SETS STATE RECORD; CARRIE KEMPF 1st IN 220 . . . . .



FIRE DESTROYS BARN ON HENRY OPPERMANN FARM . . . . Monday night, Jan 24 — Fire completely destroyed the upper portion of a 136 by 40 foot barn on the Henry Oppermann farm on E. Auburn - Ashford Or., west of New Fane, about three miles north of Kewaskum.



SEVERE HAILSTORM PELTS AREA . . . .

Wednesday, Aug. 3 — A severe hailstorm, with hailstones ranging in size from large marbles to golf balls, struck the immediate Kewaskum area at 5:10 p. m. The hail caused severe damage to crops and gardens, stripped leaves off trees, broke windows and damaged cars. The downpour lasted between five to ten minutes and left the ground covered in winter white with some ice nuggets still visible the next morning. Some older residents remarked it was the worst hailstorm in memory.





Any qualified voter, unable to get to the polling place on election day, may ask to vote by absentee bailot. A qualified voter is one who is a U.S. citizen, will be 18 years of age or older on election day, and who has resided in the ward or aldermanic district where voting is desired to be accomplished for at least 10 days prior to the election. If the voter resides in a municipality which requires voter registration, then registration is also a requisite for the voter who is qualified in other respects.

registration is also a requisite for the voter who is qualified in other respects.

To obtain an absentee ballot, contact the clerk in the city, village or town in which you reside by mail or telephone, or in person, and request an application form. After properly completing and returning the application to the municipal clerk, an absentee ballot will be sent to you along with a postage pre-paid return envelope or given to you if the application is submitted to the clerk in person. The deadline for receipt of the application by the municipal clerk is 5:00 p.m. on the day before the election.

Absentee ballots can be marked at home anytime after they arrive in the mail. They can also be marked right in the clerk's office if submitting the application in person. If returning the ballots by mail, the affidavit-certificate must be properly completed and witnessed by two persons. If returning the ballots in person, the affidavit-certificate must be properly completed and sworn to by the clerk or the deputy clerk who are authorized to administer oaths. In either case the marked, sealed ballot must be in the hands of the issuing municipal clerk on or before election day. Any absentee ballot received at the polling place after the polls close or received in incomplete or improper form cannot be counted.
