Flooding for Ice Skating, New Equipment Occupy Village Board

Ice skating this winter may depend upon the timeliness of flooding and clearing the area of the river to be used.

Dave Nigh asked that all the necessary arrangements be made soon while the season is at its peak. Discussion revealed that proper methods were to be employed if "ripples" were to be avoided. Tom Larsen would be contacted for information concerning the flooding. "I would like to see something done about it before the winter is over," urged Nigh.

No action was taken by the village board Tuesday night concerning the new license fees proposed last month. Commissioner William Martin was instructed to investigate the possibility of holding a public hearing before making any changes. The village attorney would be contacted.

Road equipment — street sweeper, garbage truck, salt-er and hydraulic basket — was discussed, but no definitive reports could be made at this time. Purchase of the

sweeper was tabled until more information could be acquired, and the village is still waiting for delivery of the garbage truck and salt-er.

Dan Schmidt said he had received a letter from the DNR acknowledging their receipt of village expenditures estimated for this year's work on the new park.

Commissioner Martin was authorized to request an estimate for an overflow pipe to extend down the length of the water tower to a "splash pad at ground level." Since the Lane Tank Company would be doing the painting, they would be contacted for at least an initial estimate.

Tire recapping for the "refuse truck" will be done by Roger's Service for \$66, according to a unanimous decision by the board.

Installation of a "communications device" to develop a network between the garbage truck, Chief Bilgo and the "base" station was discussed. No action was taken, although the need for such equipment on days when the truck makes a "run" to Lomira was recognized.

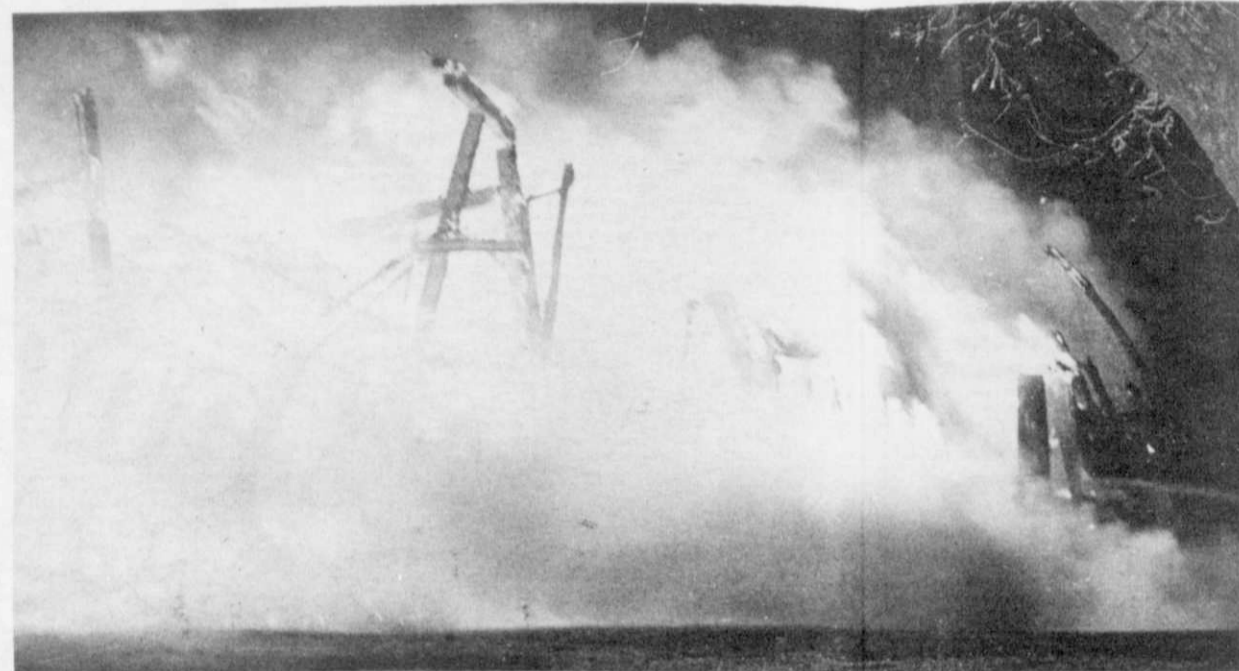
GIRLS BASKETBALL TEAM TO STATE TOURNAMENT

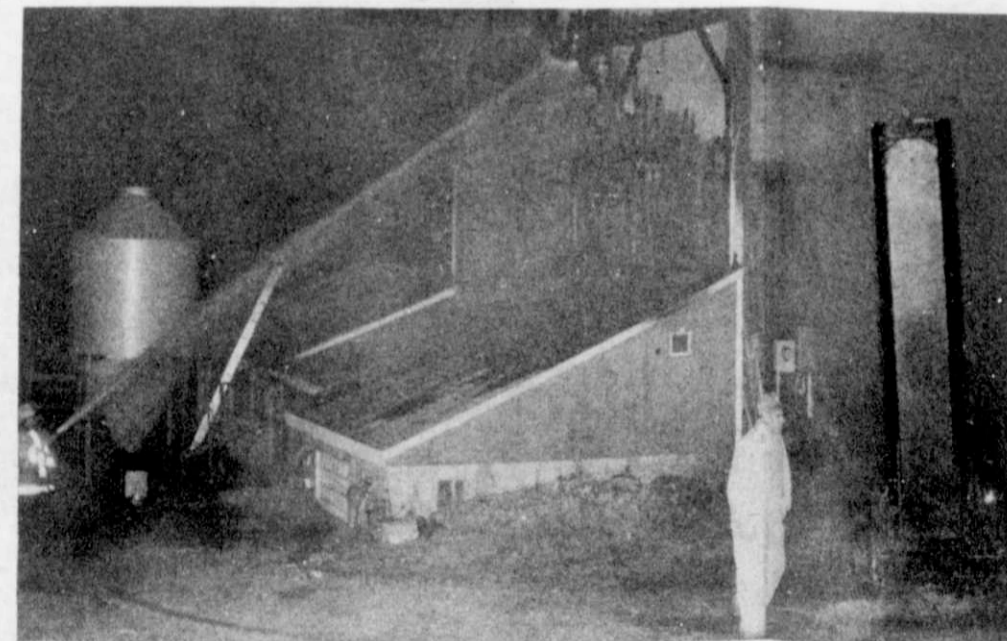
WOMAN INJURED IN LOCAL CAR-TRAIN CRASH

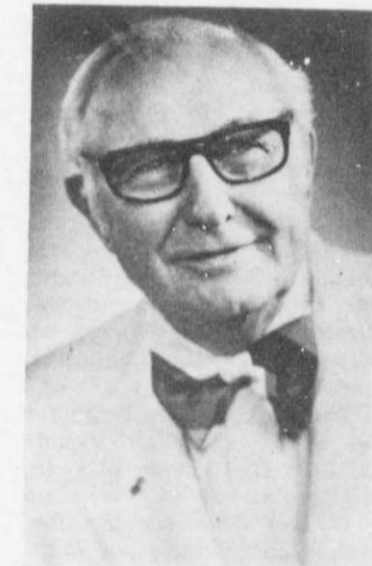

Minus Two Starters, Indians Lose Fifth Straight Game to Cougars

Still without leading shooter and scorer Mark Tessar after a bout with pneumonia and another regular, Jeff Limberg, who was also ill, the Kewaskum Indians returned to action Tuesday night here in a non-conference game with Campbellsport and were defeated by three points by the Cougars, 64-61. It was the fifth straight setback for the Indians.

Free throws made the difference in the contest. The Cougars made good on 20 of 27, including three in the final minute to break up a tie score, while Kewaskum missed 20 shots from the free throw line, 12 of them in the first half.

It was a rough game with many personals called and the players of both teams getting into several entanglements. Campbellsport lost three on fouls and Kewaskum two. Two other Indians and one Cougar had four personals. There were three others with three each.

Both teams showed evidence of the holiday layoff in the first quarter in finding the range and with their floor play. The Indians pulled ahead by one, 13-12, at the quarter and increased it to two at the half, 32-30.

Play improved for the Cougars in the third quarter, which proved disastrous for the Indians, as Campbellsport after falling behind by four, scored 14 unanswered points to take a 46-36 lead. Eight of them were scored by senior Steve Rose. The Indians then closed the gap to 50-45 at the period's end.

In the last exciting eight minutes, the Indians caught up again to tie the score and the lead changed hands several times. Fouls began to take their toll as both teams lost starters. The score was tied twice in the last 2:10 minutes before three free throws won it for the Cougars in the last minute.

Rose led the Cougars with 20 points and Randy Bonlander had 12. For the Indians Rezel scored 18 and Dale Poling 14.

The Indians obviously missed Tessar's and Limberg's scoring.

The Kewaskum JVs handed Campbellsport its first defeat, 58-44. Bob Nigh and Todd Schultz each had 13 for the Indians.

In other non-conference contests involving Scenic Moraine teams Tuesday, Slinger was edged by Hartford, 61-59. Grafton won over West Bend East, 59-52, and Hartland defeated West Bend West, 60-52. Hartford, West Bend East and West are all of the Little Ten conference.

The Indians return to Scenic action Friday night at Slinger after losing to the four top teams in the conference. Slinger is also winless (0-3), and Kewaskum is 0-4, but the Owls have a 3-4 overall mark. Slinger made it to the state tournament last season.

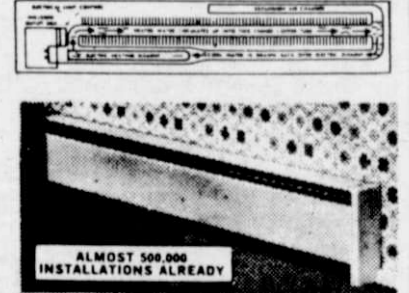
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Any qualified voter, unable to get to the polling place on election day, may ask to vote by absentee ballot. A qualified voter is one who is a U.S. citizen, will be 18 years of age or older on election day, and who has resided in the ward or aldermanic district where voting is desired to be accomplished for at least 10 days prior to the election. If the voter resides in a municipality which requires voter registration, then registration is also a requisite for the voter who is qualified in other respects.
To obtain an absentee ballot, contact the city, village, or town in which you reside by mail or telephone, or in person, and request an application form. After properly completing and returning the application to the municipal clerk, an absentee ballot will be sent to you along with a postage pre-paid return envelope or given to you if the application is submitted to the clerk in person. The deadline for receipt of the application by the municipal clerk is 5:00 p.m. on the day before the election.
Absentee ballots can be marked at home anytime after they arrive in the mail. They can also be marked right in the clerk's office if submitting the application in person. If returning the ballots by mail, the affidavit-certificate must be properly completed and witnessed by two persons. If returning the ballots in person, the affidavit-certificate must be properly completed and subscribed and sworn to by the clerk or the deputy clerk who are authorized to administer oaths. In either case the marked, sealed ballot must be in the hands of the issuing municipal clerk on or before election day. Any absentee ballot received at the polling place after the polls close or received in incomplete or improper form cannot be counted.
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
