Receives Teacher of Year Award

Random Lake High School science teacher Ed Ferber was one of two Random Lake teachers awarded Wisconsin Teacher of the Year Awards for 1977-78 by Dr. Barbara Thompson, state superintendent of schools.

Ferber is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Ferber, Sr. of the Town of Auburn, R. 2, Campbellsport, and a brother of Mrs. Leroy Bier of Kewaskum.

Enthusiasm for teaching is one of the reasons Ed (Doc) Ferber had been named a Wisconsin Teacher of the Year. "I guess I try to stay interested in what I'm doing says the 33-year-old teacher. "I try to put 100 per cent of myself into my teaching. No teacher will be successful if he doesn't do that. I enjoy what I'm doing. I enjoy the job," Ferber says.

Ferber was born in Menomonee Falls, but grew up in the Kewaskum area. He was a letter winner in football and track at Kewaskum High, and was the trainer for the basketball team. "I was out for basketball the first two years," he recalls. "The coach said I wasn't a basketball player: 'Hey, why don't you become an athletic trainer?'"

Ferber enrolled at WSU - Platteville and was the athletic trainer there for four years. In 1967 he graduated

with degrees in biology and geology. He belonged to Lambda Sigma Pi fraternity. Now Ferber keeps busy as trainer for the Random Lake Rams.

Ed also served as the school's successful chess coach for 10 years and this year is hoping for a state championship.

Ferber taught one semester at Milwaukee's Robert Fulton Junior High before going to Random Lake. He had taught general science, math, geography, earth science, and advanced science.

When he came to Random Lake Ferber got the nickname "Doc." I could be called a lot worse names," he says.

Ed and his wife Cheryl have two children, Cory 8, and Kelli Lynn, 3½. They live at 203 Center Ave., Adell.

As there are only six candidates, no primary election will be necessary.

On Wednesday evening, Jan. 11, a drawing for position on the ballot was held at 8 p. m. at the high school administration offices.

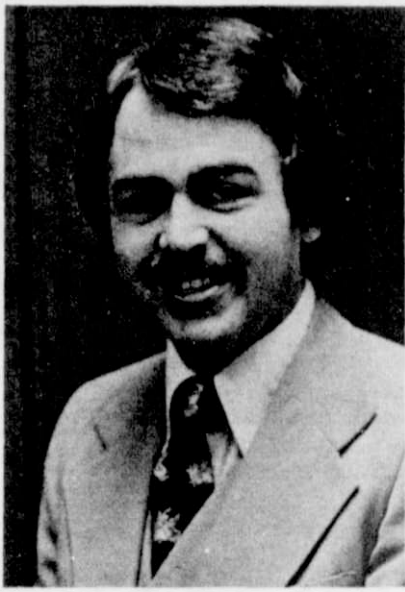

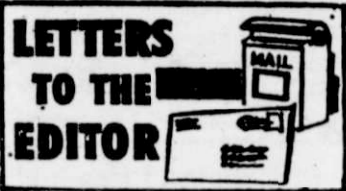

Dear Bill:

The Social Security tax bill, just passed by Congress and signed by the President, will impose one of the largest peacetime tax increases in U. S. history — \$227 billion over the next decade.

Social Security tax deductions taken from paychecks of many middle-income Wisconsin workers will triple over the next ten years.

I join all Americans in favoring a strong Social Security system. Reform of the system is imperative if we are to continue to have a sound Social Security plan; we owe it to the millions of Americans who have contributed to Social Security all of their lives and expect to receive benefits in their retirement years.

However, I voted against the massive tax increase for

several reasons.

First, the bill was regressive. It placed the greatest financial burden on those who are already among the highest taxed in the nation.

Second, it will hurt the economy. The increase in payroll taxes is so high that many economists predict a staggering blow to the economy at a time when unemployment remains too high and inflation continues to be a threat. The increase will be a severe jolt to the family budget, a drag on consumer spending, and an obstacle to the creation of more jobs.

Third, the legislation was ill-conceived and hastily passed. Because of the serious funding problems with Social Security, due primarily to welfare programs tacked on to the original retirement trust fund, revisions are desperately needed.

As a better approach to the problems of Social Security I would support a four-point approach premised on re-evaluation and restructuring of the system, to provide more solvency and equity for those paying these taxes and those receiving the benefits:

1) Hold tax increases to a reasonable level to minimize the burden on working people and the economy in general, as proposed in legislation developed by former

President Ford.

2) Allow a shift in revenues among the component programs of Social Security (old age, disability, and hospital insurance funds) to prevent insolvency of any one of the three until a long-range plan is developed. Eventually, Medicare should be taken out of the Social Security system, where it does not belong.

3) Eliminate a quirk in the law that drives benefits of current workers up faster than inflation. This "de-coupling" alone would wipe out half the estimated deficit between now and the year 2051.

4) Save administrative expenses by improving the efficiency of the Social Security bureaucracy, a source of thousands of complaints from constituents who have asked for my help with government-related problems.

This approach would, in effect, buy us time and prevent the economic disaster posed by massive tax increases while we worked out a more sensible, workable long-range plan.

The people of Wisconsin are all striving for a better quality of life — a meaningful job, better health care, an education for themselves or their children. Congress' solutions to national prob-

lems must respect and encourage those goals, not stifle them with massive tax increases.
