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



Dear Bill: The Social Security tax bill, just passed by Congress and signed by the President. will impose one of the largest peacetime tax increases in U. S. history - \$227 billion over the next decade.

Social Security tax deductions taken from paychecks of many middle-income Wisconsin workers will triple over the next ten years.

I join all Americans in favoring a strong Social Security system. Reform of the system is imperative if we are to continue to have a sound Social Security plan: we owe it to the millions of Americans who have contributed to Social Security all of their lives and expect to receive benefits in their retirement years.

However, I voted against the massive tax increase for

several reasons.

First, the bill was regressive. It placed the greatest financial burden on those who are already among the highest taxed in the nation.

Second, it will hurt the economy. The increase in payroll taxes is so high that many economists predict a staggering blow to the economy at a time when unemployment remains too high and inflation continues to be a threat. The increase will be a severe jost to the family budget, a drag on consumer spending, and an obstacle to the creation of more jobs.

Third, the legislation was ill-conceived and hastily passed. Because of the serious funding problems with Social Security, due primarily to welfare programs tacked on to the original retirement trust fund, revisions are desperately needed.

As a better approach to the problems of Social Security I would support a four-point approach premised on reevaluation and restructuring of the system, to provide more solvency and equity for those paying these taxes and those receiving the benefits:

1) Hold tax increases to a reasonable level to minimize the burden on working people and the economy in general, as proposed in legislation developed by former

President Ford.

2) Allow a shift in revenues among the component programs of Social Security (old age, disability, and hospital insurance funds) to prevent insolvency of any one of the three until a longrange plan is developed. Eventually, Medicare should be taken out of the Social Security system, where it does not belong.

3) Eliminate a quirk in the law that drives benefits of current workers up faster than inflation. This "de-coupling" alone would wipe out half the estimated deficit between now and the year

4) Save administrative expenses by improving the efficiency of the Social Security bureaucracy, a source of thousands of complaints from constituents who have asked for my help with government-

related problems. This approach would, in effect, buy us time and prevent the economic disaster posed by massive tax increases while we worked out a more sensible, workable longrange plan.

The people of Wisconsin are all striving for a better quality of life — a meaningful job, better health care, an education for themselves or their children. Congress' solutions to national prob-

lems must respect and encourage those goals, not stifle them with massive tax increases.

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


GED Classes for Adults at MPTI





Scherr leads the Scenic Moraine in scoring. It was the Indians' 5th conference loss in succession and six overall.

Zurn and Jonas each tallied 18 points, leading the Owls to their first Scenic win. The Indians gave up a lot to stop Scherr but Coach Jim Westphal didn't expect such a strong output from Zurn and Jonas, who played well.

Outscoring Kewaskum in every quarter, Slinger got off to a fast start, taking a 9-0 lead before the Indians could score with 5:40 remaining. KHS narrowed the gap to 7 but had trouble again scoring early in the second period. They fell behind by 14 but climbed to within 10 once more at halftime.

Slinger outscored Kewaskum by narrow margins in the third and fourth quarters but when the Indians did come back at times Dale Poling was mainly responsible. He was the outstanding player for KHS and ended up with a game high 19 points. Roger Rezel was also in double figures with 12 points.

Kewaskum won the JV contest handily, 68-45, having four players in double figures namely Scott Brendemihl with 16, Al Dominguez 14, Henry Shilter 12 and Bob Nigh 10

In other Scenic tilts Friday Kettle Moraine and Hartland both won to remain tied for the lead. Kettle downed Mayville, 75-64, and Hartland defeated Germantown, 73-57. Grafton rolled over Pewaukee, 88-55.

In a makeup game Tuesday Slinger won its second game. defeating Germantown, 58-54. In a non-league affair Mayville won over Watertown of the Little Ten, 55-45.
