When the deadline was reached at 5 p. m. on Tuesday the Village of Kewaskum had four candidates lined up in hopes of claiming the three trustee positions expiring this April.

Robert Danielsen and Raynor Herriges will seek reelection to their trusteeships. Donald Mlodzik, presently on the Plan Commission, and Merle Miller also seek those seats. Gregor (Pat) Nigh chose not to run for re-election this year.

Village Board Amends Town of Kewaskum Fire Service Contract

The Town of Kewaskum will be able to consider an amended fire service contract agreed upon by village officials Monday night.

Instead of 15 calls for \$19,900, the town will be allowed 18 calls for that figure. Additional fire calls will cost \$600 each plus an hourly wage of \$3.50 per man. In the past, the pieces of equipment to be used were spelled out; this year's contract broadens the terms to "all equipment that the department deems necessary to suppress the fire."

Robert Danielsen cast the only dissenting vote, explaining that he felt the Town of Kewaskum should be allowed the same number of calls but the Town of Auburn should be cut back in the number initially allowed. The village's contract with Auburn is to

Curriculum Committee of School District Begins Work

The District Curriculum Committee has begun its work by laying ground rules and defining areas of study according to a report made by Dennis Reha, chairman of the committee, on Monday night.

Reha told the School Board that sub-committees in defined areas of academic and altruistic study would be formed by Feb. 15. Volunteers from the community would meet with supervisors to coordinate their ideas before actual curricula would be formulated sometime this summer. Reha said that although some areas would not be touched, those in most need of attention would receive the scrutiny of a fair "cross-section" of interests in including private schools and businesses. Everyone in the district is invited to contact the Curriculum Committee with suggestions in the area that may interest them most

The areas of study and their coordinators are: Mathematics. Dennis Reha: Social Studies, James Reigle Reading, Marlene Erickson: Competency-based Education. Kathy Spencer and Floyd Brenholt; Health Education and Physical Education, Marlys Ryan and Allen Koepke: Career Education, Mark Ro denkirch: and Values Education, Jean Goeden. Information will also be included in the next newsletter from the district.

When Richard Theusch represents the Kewaskum School Board in Madison this week, his vote at the Wisconsin Association of School Boards' Delegate Assembly should reflect any information discussed as each resolution comes to the floor. Policies are "usually passed or turned down as written." according to Theusch, and the board chose not to send any specific Instructions or suggestions for changes with him. The rescue squad calls were up by six over the previous year. 1976, when there were 158 calls. The fire calls were down by 12 from 1976. in which 32 calls were answered.

cal compliance with federal guidelines in determining funding eligibility, early teacher retirement benefits. a "basic skills" testing program and a supportive resolution to "encourage — member boards to develop programs for the gifted and talented."

Although no action was necessary, the board informally voted a negative response to an inquiry made by the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association concerning football playoffs. John Tessar "questioned if the board should even act on this," leaving the evaluation of the matter to those most involved — the school principals and athletic directors. Clark Pearson, who was present to answer questions, said that a vote could be necessary -"eventually." He said that most football coaches favored the playoffs, while his own feelings were mixed. Only "wins and losses" are recorded without point-spread notation. Playoffs had been "conducted as an experiment for WIAA schools during the 1976 and 1977 seasons."

On a temparary basis, children of three families will be picked up closer to home during adverse weather conditions. A study of route problems was promised by Erv Gorecki of the Johnson Bus Co. Theusch opposed the move citing possible effects on the whole district.

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

He served as clerk of the Township of Wayne from 1936 to 1973, and was an honorary member of the Kohlsville Fire Dept.



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Rep. Engeleiter **Kiwanis** Speaker

State Representative Susan Shannon Engeleiter (R-Brookfield) told the Kewaskum Kiwanis, which recently celebrated its 30th anniversary, that Assembly Republicans have introduced a plan to cut state income taxes through an increase in the Wisconsin standard deduction.

Speaking before the group at the Wigwam, Representative Engeleiter said that "the tremendous surplus in our state treasury is the result of overtaxation-and permanent tax cuts are the answer."

Representative Engeleiter is a co-sponsor of the Republican measure, which would increase the state standard deduction to federal levels. For taxable year 1978 and thereafter, the Wisconsin standard deduction would be the larger of the low-income allowance or \$2,200 for an individual or \$3,200 for a husband and wife.

The current ceiling on the percentage standard deduction for state income taxes is \$2,000 for single persons and married couples.

stantial tax reductions for the

average working family in Wisconsin," Representative Engeleiter emphasized. "Wisconsin has the third highest taxes in the nation and it is the middle income wageearner who bears the brunt of this tax burden."

Representative Engeleiter noted that, under the Republican proposal, 92% of the total tax decrease would be provided to taxpayers with incomes under \$20,000 a year.


She cited the example of a married couple with one child and an adjusted gross income of \$15,000 a year. "Currently, that family would pay \$809 in state income taxes," Rep. Engeleiter explained. "Under our proposal, their taxes would drop to \$684, for a tax cut of \$125 a year."

It is estimated that the higher standard deduction would decrease state individual income tax collections by about \$123 million each biennium.

"Republicans want to stop the political charade of overtaxing to build up surpluses and then giving taxpayers a token amount of their own money back as 'tax relief'." Rep. Engeleiter said. "With a projected surplus of \$378 million, there is simply no

excuse for delaying permanent tax cuts which will keep such excess funds in the taxpayers' pockets."

Representative Engeleiter said Republicans are also working on additional proposals which will adjust state taxes "to offset the effects which a tremendous growth in state spending and inflation have had on the average family's tax bills."




