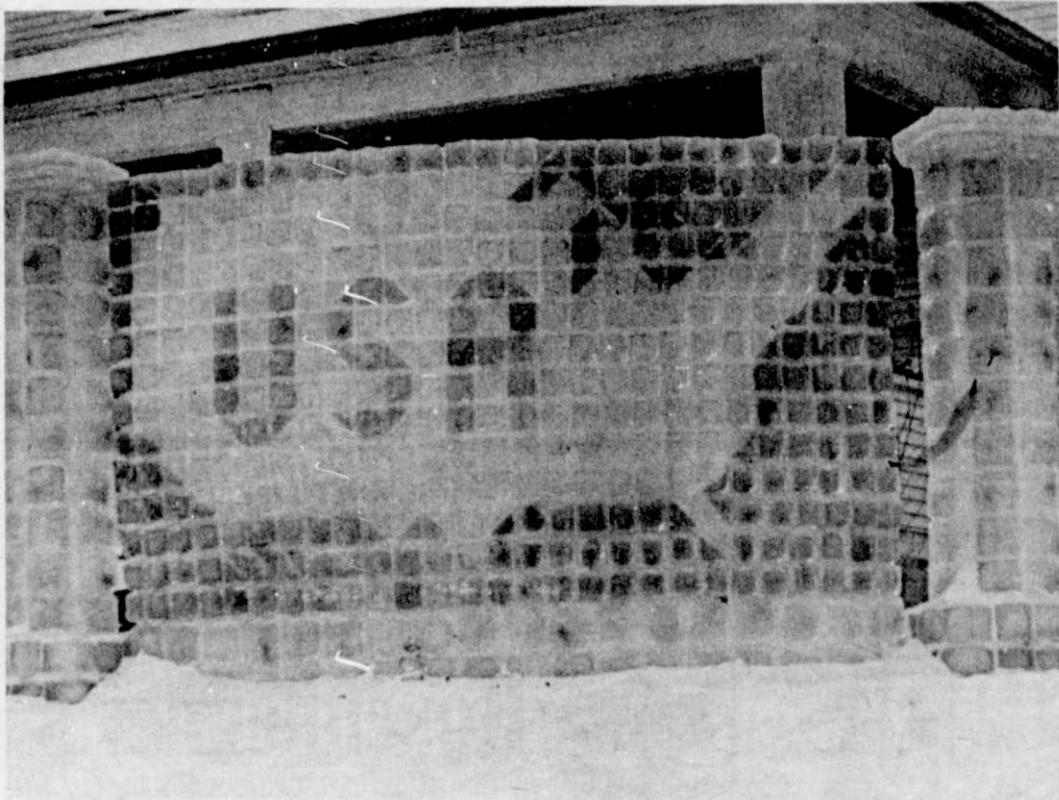

Busing Policy Concerning Pickup Points Discussed by School Board

When the Transportation Committee of the Kewaskum Board of Education meets to discuss "pick-up points and walking distances" there will have been a change in the membership of that group.

Richard Theusch asked to be excused from the duties of that committee Monday night after considerable discussion concerning present board policy regarding walking distances. Theusch reported that he'd received a request from a parent recently for a child to be picked up at home for medical reasons. At this point he expressed concern over deviating from past board policy saying that until an official policy change would be made, the board could be charged with not being fair to all the children of the district. Charles Ogi said the medical excuse would have to be presented before any busing changes could be made in this specific case.

Superintendent Floyd Brenholt said that medical excuses have always been honored in the past when authorized by a physician. But he did ask: "What is the Board's policy going to be if not one-half mile?" No specific answer could be given, though several alternatives were discussed, because the number of extra miles and possible rerouting of buses — if any — could not be determined without further study of the situation.

Parents from the Lake Seven/Beechwood area in attendance Monday had been asking that their children be picked up at their driveways instead of walking to a pick-up point during the winter months. They said that no changes in routing have ever occurred to allow their children to be picked up at home, and said they believed they were the only ones on that route who's children were walking to a pick-up point during the winter. They stressed that there would be no difficulty for the route driver in being able to turn around and no significant amount of mileage involved.

John Tessar will replace Theusch on the Transportation Committee which expects to meet soon to discuss the question.

Jean Goeden distributed an outline explaining some definitions that will guide the Values Education Subcommittee of the Curriculum Committee.

A teacher from Menomonee Falls, Peter Vickman, will be added to the Drivers' Education team at Kewaskum. Certified and licensed in that ar-

ea, Vickman will instruct Saturdays and after 5 p. m.

Two programs not involving the use of local funds were approved unanimously by the board. Project money from Title IV-B will provide film, projectors and filmstrips for Kewaskum children through the elementary grades and library services, while high school students studying general math and having problems with that subject will get a boost through some computer programs. Getting a Paper Out in a Blizzard

Everything was fine last last Wednesday evening as our paper was all ready for the press at our central printing plant in Plymouth Thursday morning.

On Thursday morning we couldn't get out of the driveway with five foot snowdrifts in front of the garage door.

Later in the day our telephone went dead and we couldn't call out or receive calls. We were sort of isolated. Friday morning we had to struggle over the snowdrifts to make calls from a neighbor's house.

Finally we got the driveway plowed out about 11:30 a. m. Friday. Then the car wouldn't start. Our daughter tried to help and we pinched her fingers twice slamming down the hood. Then her car wouldn't start either.

So we hired a four-wheel drive to make the hazardous trip through the snowbanks to Plymouth to have our papers printed. It got only as far as St. Michaels when the road was impassable. So back to Kettle Moraine Drive, then a round-about route to H, to 144, to Random Lake, to 57, and finally into the back door of Plymouth.

There was some trouble with the press and we were short of papers.

Trying another route home the four-wheel became stuck in a snowbank and it took a half hour of shoveling to get it out. Nearing home on 45 the vehicle had a blowout with no spare tire and had to

be driven flat until a phone could be reached. Then we took a car out to pick up the papers from the four-wheel and bring them in.

The costly trip to Plymouth took five hours, from before noon until 5 p. m.

Hope you enjoyed your late paper. It didn't make much difference, the carriers couldn't get out anyway.

Plows, Snowmobile Help Rescue Squad

During last Thursday's blizzard, it took at least three snowplows to get a Kewaskum ambulance to a woman on State Hwy. 28 west of the village.

According to County Highway Commissioner Frank Scharrer, a patrol truck led the ambulance and became stuck behind a stranded car. A larger V-plow was unable to get around the two blocked vehicles. Finally a second V-plow was able to get through from the north, and the rescue squad transported the woman to St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend.

In another Kewaskum rescue squad call during the storm which continued on Friday, the ambulance was delayed for about two hours until a snowplow could clear the way. Finally a snowmobile was put into use to get the patient to the waiting ambulance.

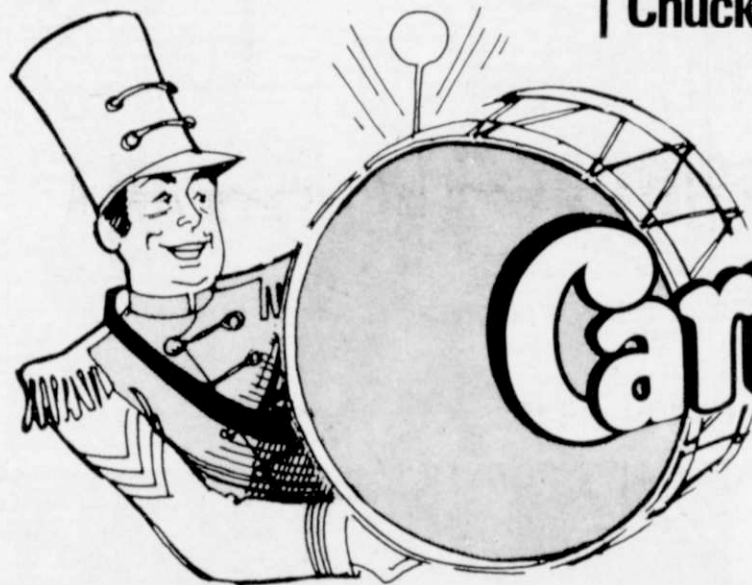

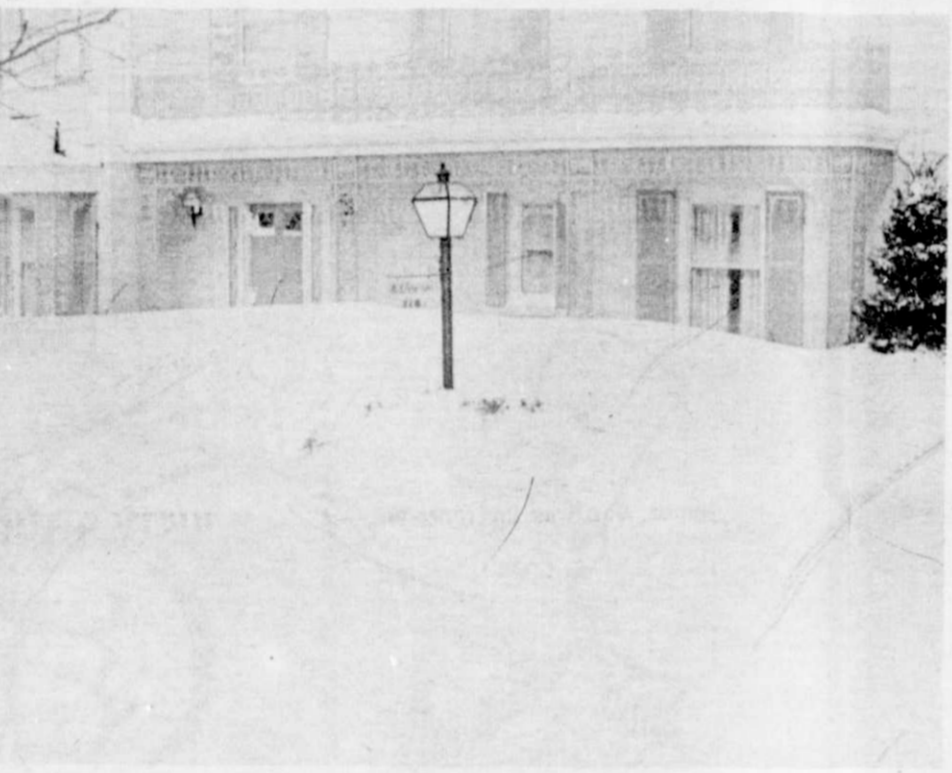
Rural residents were isolated and people in town couldn't get out of their driveways. Milk haulers could not reach the farmers and some milk had to be dumped.

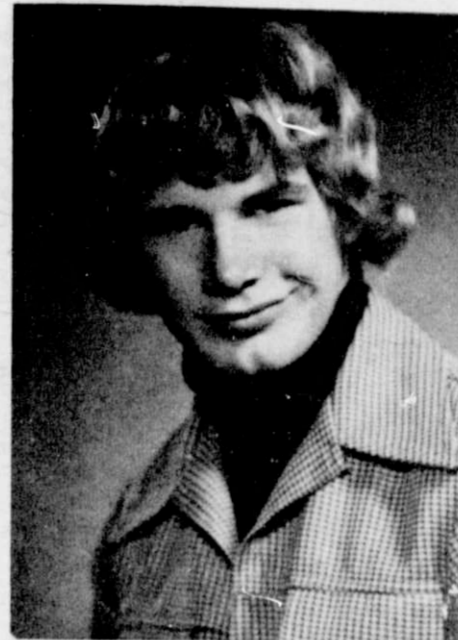


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January Kiwanis Students of the Month

Our captain Tami Regnitz would doubtless have made all-conference were it not for the injury she suffered in a car accident which made it impossible for her to play the last part of the season. We would have had a better performance in the tournament too," Bigler feels. "She was the best all-round player as well as being the tallest woman on the team, which really gave us an advantage

at the net." Tami will attend UW-Stout in fall.

UWWC ended the season with a 10-3 record. "One of those losses was to Ripon, a four-year college, and two were to unbeaten Waukesha, strongest team in the conference," according to Coach Bigler. "In the conference tournament at Waukesha, we finished in third, losing again to Waukesha in the semi-finals."

Women's sports are receiving new interest on the UWWC campus. This spring will mark the debut of the first women's basketball team. Many women from the volleyball team will also participate in basketball, to be coached by Athletic Director Tom Brigham.
