At a meeting held February 1, the Kewaskum Area United Fund, Inc. was formed. A steering committee comprised of Jerry Stollenwerk, Clifford Stautz and Jerry Kiefer, all of Kewaskum, presented to a group of Kewaskum area residents plans and bylaws to be used by the new corporation.

The United Way is a plan for soliciting and distributing funds for charitable organizations and agencies which will eliminate the numerous solicitations and individual passing of envelopes throughout the year. It is hoped that the United Way Fund Drive in the Kewaskum area will be organized and ready to begin in September, 1978.

## Donald Mitchell, 26, Killed in Auto Accident

Donald F. Mitchell Jr., 26, of Route 2, Townline Road, Kewaskum, was killed shortly after 1 a. m. Sunday in a three-car accident on Hwy. 45, about one-half mile north of West Bend.

According to the Washington County Sheriff's Department, Mitchell's car was northbound when it slid sideways into the opposite lane and was struck broadside by a southbound auto operated by Michael J. Schleif, 21, of 750 Sherman Way, West Bend. Police said the rear half of the Mitchell auto was torn off in the collision.

The Mitchell car then was struck in the left passenger section by another oncoming auto, driven by Ralph Koenings, 20, of 1421 Sunset Ridge Drive, West Bend. Mitchell was dead on arrival at St. Joseph's Community Hospital in West Bend of massive internal injuries. His wife, Mary Kay Mitchell, 26, was hospitalized for treatment of a shoulder injury and forehead cuts.

Neither of the other two drivers was seriously injured. Mitchell was Washington County's first traffic fatality of the year.

Donald F. Mitchell, Jr. was born May 11, 1951 in Milwaukee to Donald Mitchell Sr. and the late Clara Tachaulski Mitchell. Prior to living in this area for 12 years he lived in Los Angeles, Calif. for four years. On June 20, 1970 he married Mary Kay Volm in Holy Trinity Church, Kewaskum.

He was district sales manager for British Leyland Co. of Mt. Clemens, Mich. for 2½ years.

Survivors include his wife; three children, Jennifer, Heather and Shannon, all at home; one sister, Cynthia (John) Dye of California; one brother, Robert R. Neldner, also of California; his father, Donald Mitchell Sr. of Oak Creek, Wis.; his foster parents, Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Neldner of Kewaskum; parents-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Francis Volm of rural Kewaskum; other relatives and friends. One daughter and his mother preceded him in death.

Visitation will be Thursday from 4 p. m. until the time of services at 8:30 p. m. at Miller's Funeral Home. Rev. John T. Budde will officiate and burial will be in the new Holy Trinity Cemetery.

## Tavernkeepers Oppose Raising of Fees at Action-Packed Meeting

In an action-packed meeting Monday night the Village Board failed to reach a final decision concerning the raising of certain fees paid for licenses and permits. While only one person was on hand to complain about the raise of dance permits from \$18 to \$25, about half a dozen representatives from local pubs voiced their disapproval of a \$100 increase in the Class B beer and liquor license package.

While Trustee Bob Danielson said he agreed with dissenters that the increase should have begun perhaps as much as ten years ago and continued in small increments to the present \$100 and \$200 figures requested by the new ordinance, the board stood firm in its conviction that the new rates fell fairly in line with charges established in other municipalities.

Mark Kral asked that the board table a final vote until the next meeting in February. Three members of the board were not present during the public hearing for discussion of the fees.

Police Chief Donald Hlavaty reported that no money could be made available until July 1 for "Installation of

passing lanes on the shoulder of Fond du Lac Avenue" near the Sison Clinic or for the addition to the passing lane at Hy. 45 and Hy. H. Detailed maps and reports submitted by Hlavaty in August of 1977 should aid the state in making a decision.

Hlavaty was also on hand to review the bids submitted by three dealers for a new police car. The Meyer Ford/Mercury dealership received a unanimous vote of approval to supply the chief with a new vehicle for \$3660 with a trade.

Lane Tank Company was given the green light to install a six-inch overflow pipe down the length of the water tower when they paint the structure this year. Augie Bilgo assured the board there would be no trouble providing a splash pad for the anticipated run-off. The cost of the pipe and labor (\$1465) will be added to the \$18,600 price for painting and sandblasting. Any welding, Lane reminded the village, would be additional at \$35 per hour.

When Kewaskum residents visit the wastewater treatment building April 30 they may get a look at the new chlorinators the board voted to purchase. Replacing two

one-ton tanks will be a system of six to eight 150-pound cylinders. The smaller units should prove more economical to use according to Peter Albers, and easier to handle. A compact housing unit will be easier to keep above the 32 degrees operational temperature required for 24 hour treatment of village wastewater.

Auctioneer Jim Paul will be contacted soon after village action concerning the house formerly rented. Trustee Dan Schmidt proposed that the house be auctioned for salvage.

Two service clubs, the Kewaskum Lions and Junior Woman's Club, were given recognition for their part in literally lightening the load for Kewaskum trash collection. People even from outside Washington County travel to Kewaskum to take advantage of the Juniors' recycling program, and to this date, Lions have collected 130 tons of paper for reuse. Money collected by these two groups eventually finds its way back to the community in the many projects they foster.

Besides encouraging Kewaskum residents to use the recycling facilities to their advantage, village officials will be reminding people that dumping petroleum products into village sewers is illegal as well as polluting. A note with water bills will tell the story.

Funding from the DNR appears to be available in answer to Kewaskum's request for funds to reimburse costs incurred in creating the new park. In an update on park developments, Daniel Schmidt said that gravel should be brought in soon while frost keeps ground hard enough for heavy equipment.

Although the work week for Kewaskum employees has been defined a straight 40

hours, with anything over eight hours per day being counted as overtime, officials still have not released copies of wage scales for village workers. As soon as copies can be made, Commissioner William Martin has promised their availability. Job descriptions and new pay rates went into effect the first pay period in December of 1977.

**WEEKLY Health TIP**

In case of a chemical burn of the eye, 60 to 90 seconds may be the difference between blindness and sight. It is important to dilute the chemical with water as quickly as possible by gently flushing the eye with water, while immersed in a bucketful, or slowly from a faucet or pitcher — holding the lids open if necessary. The slight discomfort can mean the saving of eyesight. Follow with prompt medical care.

## Dairyland Seed Company Acquires Research Stations in Wisconsin and California

Acquisition of two seed research stations by Dairyland Seed Co., Inc., Kewaskum, was announced by Orville N. Strachota, Dairyland president.

Included in the purchase from Americana Seeds, Inc., Muscatine, Iowa, is a substantial legume, grass, soybean, hybrid corn and hybrid alfalfa germ plasm pool. This is parent stock for new generations of seed hybrids and varieties.

The 160 acre Wisconsin facility is located at Clinton; the California complex involves 80 acres near Sloughouse. Both stations

are equipped for basic applied plant genetic research, with greenhouses, irrigation systems, temperature and humidity controlled seed storage vaults, together with specialized seed farming equipment.

Robert C. Tillery is station manager at Clinton and Joe R. Edde at Sloughouse.

Dairyland plant breeder is Dr. William Campbell. Current developmental work includes: 20,000 alfalfa lines on 7,500 plots; 15,000 soybean varieties on 8,000 plots; 1,500 corn inbred lines with 7,400 hybrid corn plots.

Research in these species

was begun in the late 1960's when both stations were owned by the old L. Teveles Seed Co., Milwaukee, acquired by Americana in 1972.

Director of Research Operations for Dairyland is Thomas G. Strachota.

According to Strachota, the acquisition included U. S. patent rights for the production of the world's first hybrid alfalfa, with patents applied for in other principal alfalfa producing countries.

Dairyland markets a diversified line of farm seeds via 1,500 dealers in Wisconsin, Illinois, Iowa, Michigan, Indiana and Minnesota.

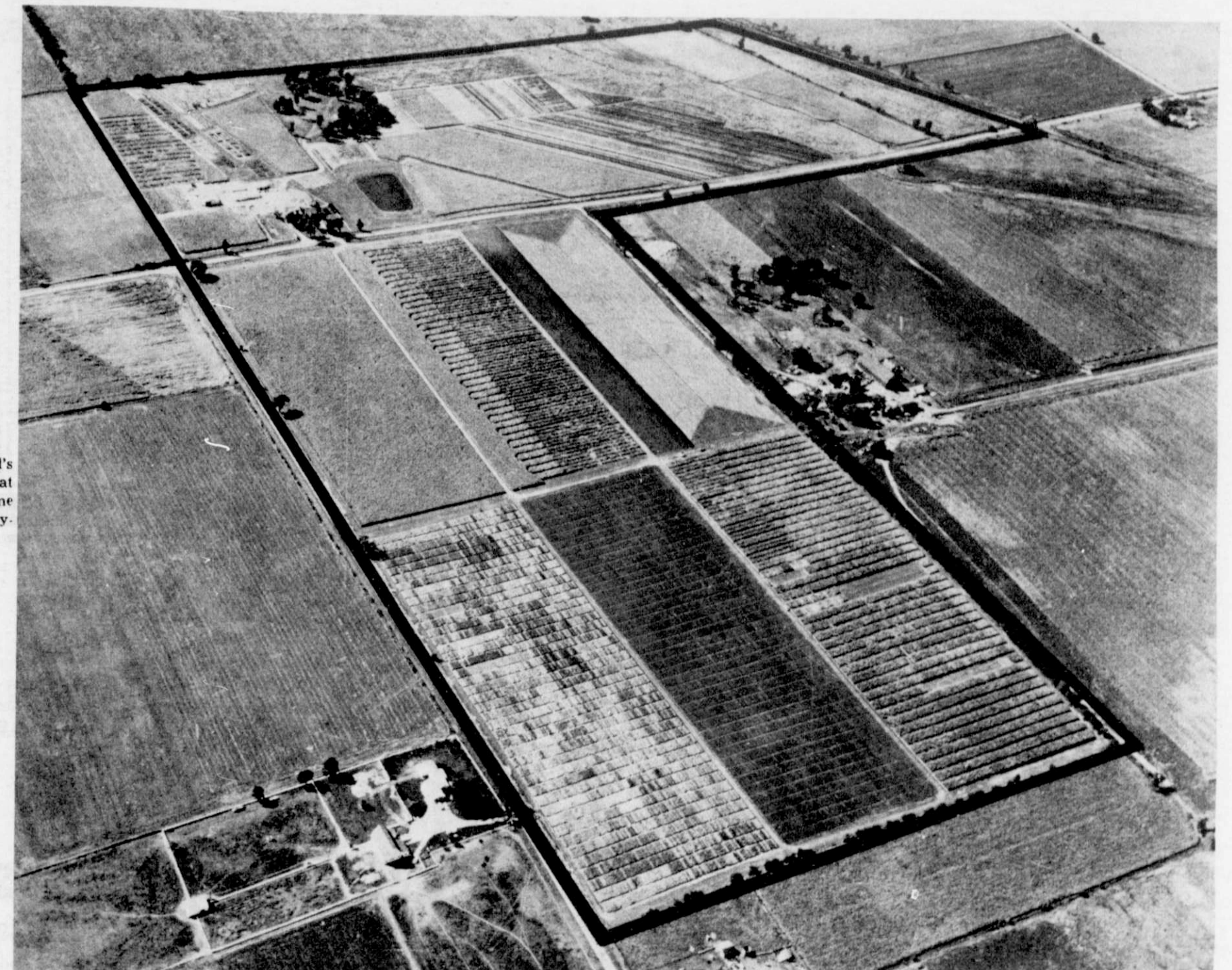

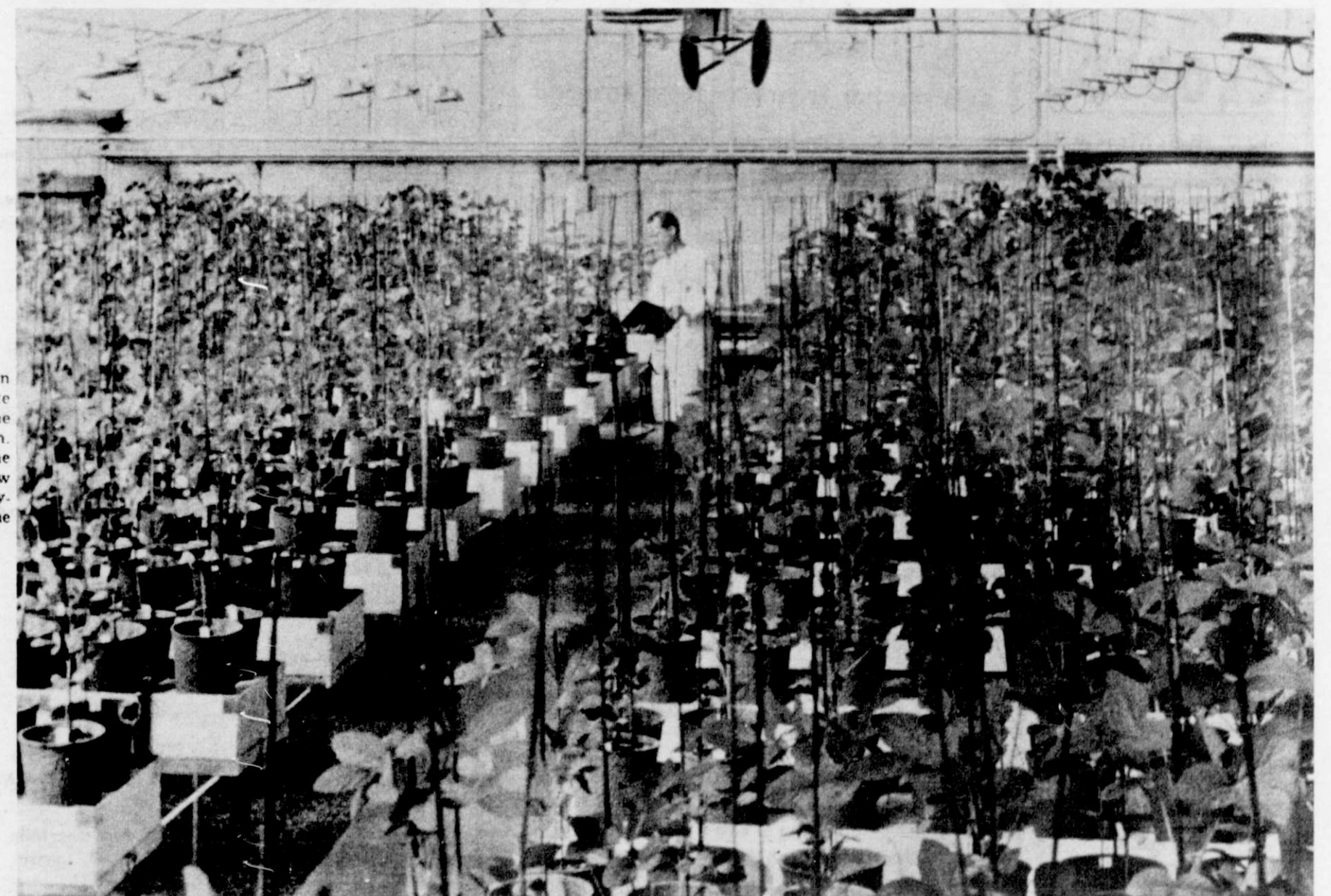

### Minutes of Village Board Meeting

Mid-Monthly Meeting  
January 16, 1978  
8:00 P. M.

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in mid-monthly session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building.

President Charles Miller presided. Trustee Gregor Nigh had asked to be excused and was absent. All other trustee members were present.

The Commissioner noted that there was a typographical error in the printing of the minutes of the January 3 meeting. The roll call vote to the motion in paragraph seven (7) should read "4 Aye and 0 Nay."

The proposal of the Heign Equipment Co. of Milwaukee for the purchase of a used 1971 Elgin Pelican street sweeper at a cost not to exceed \$8,250.00 was accepted by the board. Motion by Trustee Danielsen, seconded by Trustee Schmidt. Roll call vote, 6 "Aye," 0 "Nay."

President Miller introduced a letter from the Kewaskum

Chamber of Commerce offering to donate to the village two advertising sign posts on Fond du Lac Avenue near the Wigwam Restaurant. Trustee Danielsen volunteered to check into the matter and to report back at the next meeting.

Trustee Danielsen moved and Trustee Schmidt seconded that an ordinance adjusting the village's license and permit fees be prepared and that the proposed ordinance be scheduled for a public hearing on February 5th. Unanimous vote.

The 1978 Fire Service Contract between the Village of Kewaskum and the Town of Kewaskum was amended as follows: The basic fee of the contract shall be \$19,900.00 for the first eighteen (18) fire calls during the year. For all fire calls beginning with call number nineteen (19) the rate shall be \$600.00 per hour for all equipment that the Fire Department deems necessary to suppress the fire. Labor shall be charged at the rate of \$3.50 per hour. Motion was made by Trustee Schmidt, seconded by Trustee Kral that the fire service contract as amended be forwarded to the Town of Kewaskum for their consideration. 

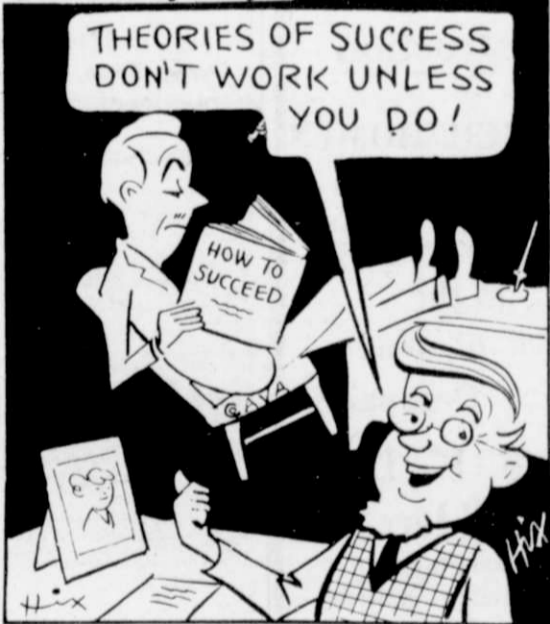

### ELECTION NOTICE VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT

County of Washington  
State of Wisconsin

Any qualified voter, unable to get to the polling place on election day, may ask to vote by absentee ballot. A qualified voter is one who is a U.S. citizen, will be 18 years of age or older on election day, and who has resided in the ward or aldermanic district where voting is desired to be accomplished for at least 10 days prior to the election. If the voter resides in a municipality which requires voter registration, then registration is also a requisite for the voter who is qualified in other respects.

To obtain an absentee ballot, contact the clerk in the city, village or town in which you reside by mail or telephone, or in person, and request an application form. After properly completing and returning the application to the municipal clerk, an absentee ballot will be sent to you along with a postage pre-paid return envelope or given to you if the application is submitted to the clerk in person. The deadline for receipt of the application by the municipal clerk is 5:00 p.m. on the day before the election.

Absentee ballots can be marked at home anytime after they arrive in the mail. They can also be marked right in the clerk's office if submitting the application in person. If returning the ballots by mail, the affidavit-certificate must be properly completed and witnessed by two persons. If returning the ballots in person, the affidavit-certificate must be properly completed and subscribed and sworn to by the clerk or the deputy clerk who are authorized to administer oaths. In either case the marked, sealed ballot must be in the hands of the issuing municipal clerk on or before election day. Any absentee ballot received at the polling place after the polls close or received in incomplete or improper form cannot be counted.

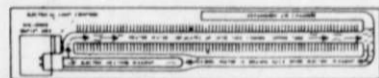

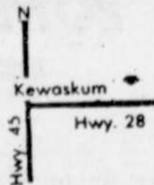

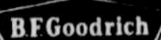
