Board Retains Busing Policy, Considers Leaves of Absence

The Kewaskum Board of Education decided to retain its transportation policy for this school year and deny all recent requests for home pick-ups, except those accompanied by a valid medical excuse.

John Tesar of the Transportation Committee reported that numerous requests made since January would necessitate the addition of three more bus routes if all of them were to be honored. The board felt that it was "too late for the additional cost" this year but requests would be considered again when routes would be decided for next year.

Lake Seven residents on hand for the decision said that their location would not put them in a position for re-routing due to any addition of children on that route. They restated their concern for their children having to walk every year — a total of 18 years for one family according to one mother. The use of company buses for private transportation purposes was also charged, one mother saying that a bus driver had admitted getting permission "from the terminal to use the bus." Parents charged that gas used on private runs was supplied by Kewaskum funds.

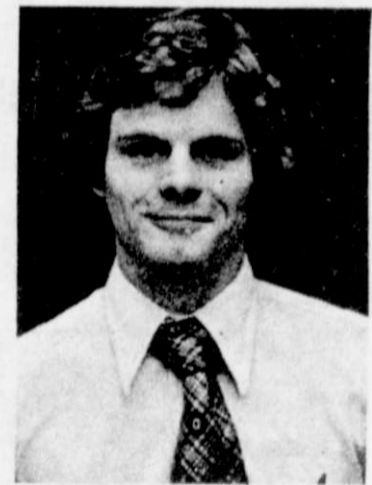
John Tessar acknowledged that, "maybe in the Lake Seven case they could have done something a long time ago," but the policy would remain firm at least until next year's routes would be drawn up. Any route drivers now making exceptions without authority to do so would be instructed to "follow the policy without exception," according to Tessar, and any misuse of gasoline would be investigated.

Three leaves of absence re-

quested by teachers prompted Floyd Brenholt to ask the board consider drawing up informal "guidelines" for reviewing them. Presently contract language only stipulates that leaves may be granted "upon approval of the school board," and that "reimbursement" would be decided upon individually. "Only teachers with five years of local experience are eligible to apply," according to the terms.

One request was denied Monday night when the motion to grant it failed to receive a second. Keith Amundson had requested a three-day leave without pay for a ski trip to Colorado during that sports season. An overseas trip scheduled to begin in June, reserved by Mrs. Filzen of the Middle School before this winter's snows extended the school year, will be another case decided upon at the next regular board meeting. She requested the last three days of school since she reserved her flight schedule for June 3 when plans were made last August. A request for five days next fall made by Ken Soerens coincided with wedding plans also

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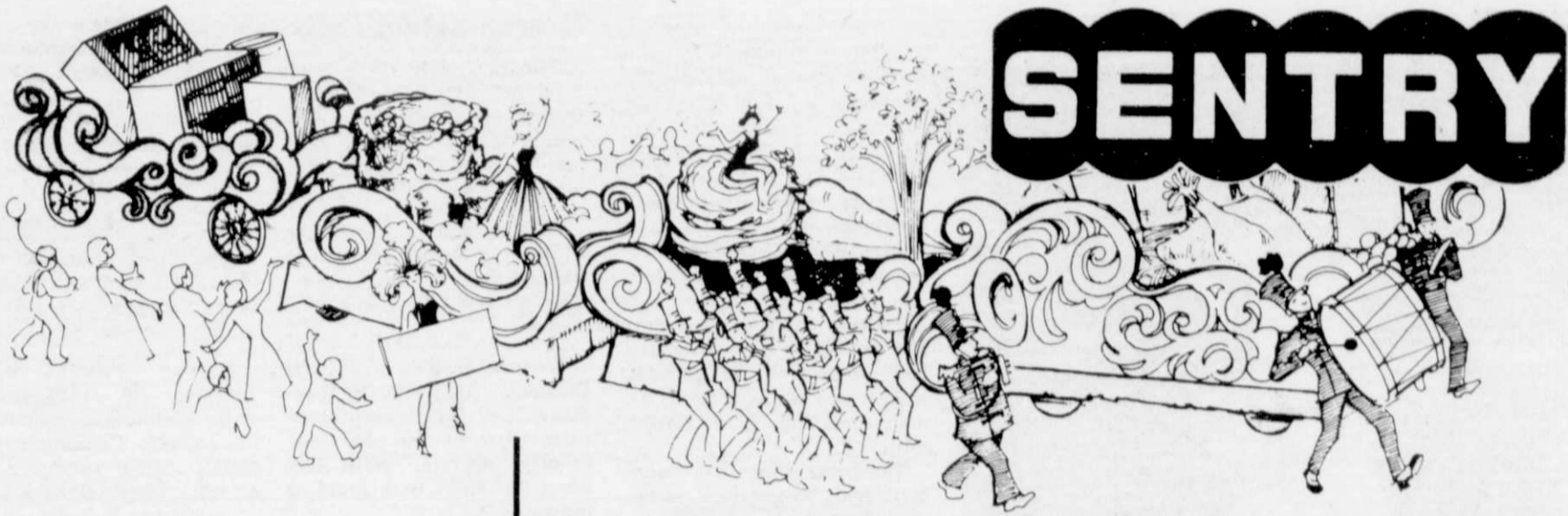

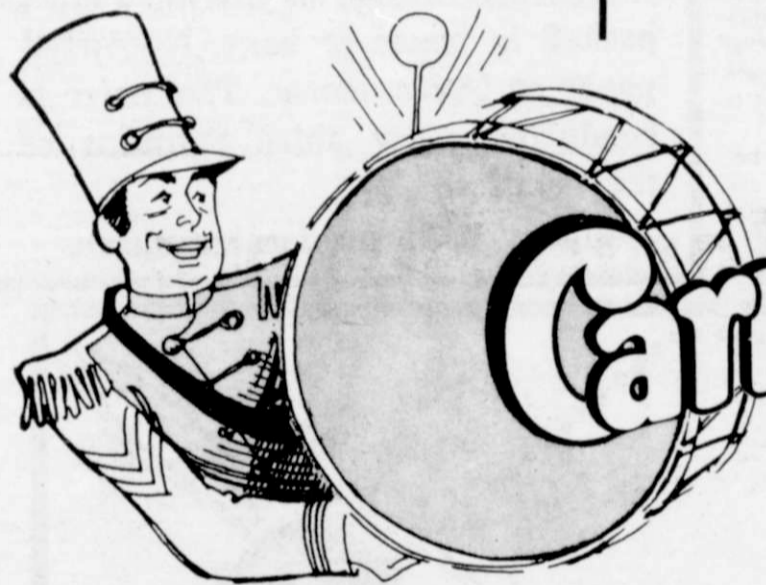

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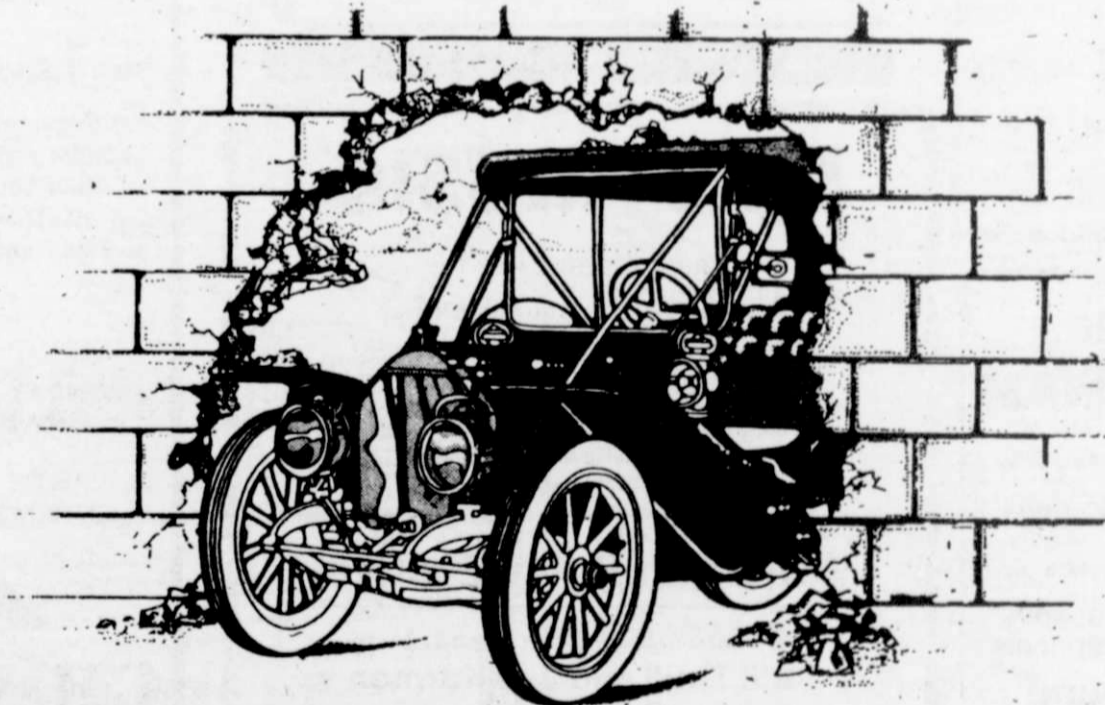

Jr. Women Hear Youth Service Bureau Speaker

The February meeting of the Kewaskum Junior Woman's Club was held Thursday evening, Feb. 9, at the Valley Bank, with Mrs. Ann Enright, president, presiding.

The program for the evening was presented by Dan Robinson, director of Washington County Youth Service Bureau. Robinson explained the different services performed by the Youth Service Bureau. The bureau handles only those cases which cannot be referred to any other local services of Washington County. 80% of the adult population has had contact with law enforcement. From the 80%, 65-75% are juvenile delinquents.

The bureau has done research concerning these facts and has arrived with 5 areas pertaining to why juveniles are having problems, these being: 1) frustration of find-

ing jobs, 2) family problems, 3) lack of recreation, 4) frustration of education alternatives, 5) relationship with law enforcement.

Robinson believes in the Preventative Medicine Concept. He feels we have to involve the kids by letting them work with us. We have to learn to accept kids as part of the community. They have a right to voice their opinions. There's kids out there waiting for the opportunity to put their talents to work. He explained that we should build on their positive aspects not negative aspects. Robinson said, "there are no magical answers, but maybe we could look toward resources such as youth centers, or by getting the kids involved."

unit of blood provides the community with a gift that will keep on giving. Remember Tuesday, Feb. 28.

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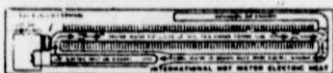

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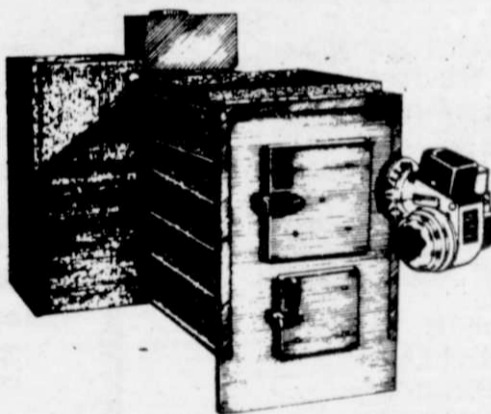
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Local FHA Chapter Observes National FHA - HERO Week

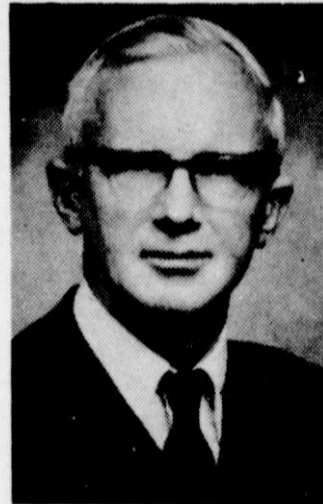

FFA Safety Tips For Snowblowers

Every year at this time there are many snowblower accidents due to carelessness. Most of the snowblower accidents can be prevented by careful and attentive operation of the snowblower. Here are some tips for safe operation from the Kewaskum FFA Chapter:

1. Shut the engine off before attempting to clear a clogged discharge chute. If re-starting is hard, perhaps the engine needs a tune-up.
2. Disconnect the spark plug wire before working on the machine. If you don't, you may accidentally start the engine when you have a hand or foot under the auger.
3. Be careful where you aim the discharge chute. The

machine can pick up and propel sticks, stones or other debris.

4. Watch out for the hot exhaust pipe. A nasty burn can result if you touch it.

5. Before using an electric snowblower, check to see if the cord is frayed, cut or has exposed wires. Be sure connections are good and keep them out of the snow where they may get wet and short out. Be sure the extension cord is a heavy-duty type approved for outdoor use and be sure the machine is grounded.

6. When using a gasoline-powered snowblower, be careful in filling and do not allow the fuel to contact the hot exhaust pipe. Always

store gasoline in a well ventilated area.

7. Do not allow young children to operate a snowblower.

When using a snowblower, follow these simple safety tips and chances are you won't have an accident. Just think before you act, and use common sense because that is what safety is — using common sense.

Facsimile Ballot Notice of Judicial Election February 21, 1978

Office of Washington County Clerk
To the Electors of Washington County:

Notice is hereby given of a Spring Primary election to be held in the several wards in the County of Washington, on the 21st day of February, 1978, at which the officers names below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office to be voted for, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office and under the appropriate party or other designation, each in its proper column, in the sample ballot below.

INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his name and address before receiving the ballot from the ballot clerk. The initials of 2 ballot clerks must appear on the ballot. Upon receiving the ballot, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and mark his ballot. A ballot clerk may inform the elector of the proper manner for marking a ballot, but he shall not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

At a nonpartisan primary, the elector shall place a cross or other mark in the square at the right of the candidate's name for each office for whom he intends to vote, or insert or write in the name of his choice for a candidate.

The ballot should not be marked in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than 3 ballots shall be issued to any one elector. Not more than 5 minutes' time shall be allowed to mark the ballot. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After the official ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed indorsements and ballot clerks' initials on the outside do show. After folding the ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, give his name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him the ballot to be placed in the ballot box, and leave the polling place promptly.

An elector may be assisted by 2 election officials of different political parties in marking the ballot if he declares to the presiding official that he is unable to read, that he has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English, or that due to physical disability he is unable to mark his ballot. Alternately, an elector making such declaration may have another elector of the county assist him in marking his ballot or operating a voting machine. The presiding official may administer an oath to a person making such declaration.

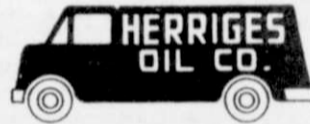
