New Sison Medical Clinic Opens Tuesday

Tuesday marked the opening day of the Sison Professional Building at 1040 Fond du Lac Ave.

The finished upper level of the Sison Building will be shared by Drs. Cesar Sison and Florizel Castro serving Kewaskum in the area of family practice. Working from a total of eight examining rooms, a nurses' room, business office, and waiting/reception room, the team expects to be able to meet most of the immediate needs of patients on a single level. The inclusion of a room for x-rays and a pharmacy in the upper level will facilitate patient care, as well.

The lower level of the building, to be completed very soon, has office space for Dr. Dennis J. Connor, a dentist, presently sharing rooms with Dr. F. E. Nolting, and Drs. Renato and A. Estrella, a husband and wife team. Dr. Renato Estrella is a specialist in obstetrics and gynecology, while his wife is a family practitioner. Dr. Connor had a hand in designing his own office space to suit his needs, while Dr. Estrella will control an area encompassing four examining rooms, a nurses' room, waiting room and receptionist area, and office. There will be a staff lounge in the building for professional personnel, too.

Dr. Cesar Sison hopes to devote more time to his specialty - surgery - with the addition of more staff to fill the needs of the Kewaskum area residents who have come to depend upon his service in the past 61/2 years since his arrival. The need for expansion and an increase in professional care became evident to him almost immediately after his arrival to the area in 1971.

Sison and his wife Aurora. also a general practitioner, actually came to Kewaskum

Preview

In a special interview and picture-taking session Sunday the publishers of the Statesman were given a guided tour of the new professional building by Drs. Sison and Castro, and were very impressed with the beautiful, modern new facility.

as visitors to the area. They first opened offices in Kewaskum on July 6, 1971 and also maintained offices in Campbellsport for a time. According to Sison, they "gave up Campbellsport about three years ago" when the retirement of Dr. R. G. Edwards became imminent.

Dr. Aurora Sison, presently aiding her husband by utilizing her skills in anesthesiolo-

gy, expects to devote more time to the area of medicine when their three sons, ages eleven, seven and four are a little older. Having planned and built a home in the Village of Kewaskum, the Sisons are content that Kewaskum is a good place to raise a family. After spending eight years in Chicago, during which time both doctors learned their specialties, and having lived one year in Milwaukee, the Sisons have sampled enough of both city and rural living to make an educated decision.

Their new professional home promises to give them enough room to practice medicine and enough space for patient comfort, including a fifty-space parking lot on the

Access to and egress from the lot, however, have been a matter of concern to the Sisons. Although the posted speed limit for that area of Fond du Lac Avenue is 45 m. p. h., many motorists have been found still traveling closer to the 55 m. p. h. posted further south on Hy. 45. As reported by police chief Donald Hlavaty at a recent meeting of the Village Board, letters detailing the immediate need for a 30 or 35 m.p.h. limit near the clinic have gone unheeded by state officials. Hlavaty explained that long-range plans include a request for the addition of a strip of blacktop to permit drivers traveling past the area to smoothly and safely circumvent those turning in-

to the parking lot. No money could become available, according to Hlavaty, until July 1, if the state O. K.'s the pro-

Dr. Sison said that he personally contacted Commissioner Randall Flemming about lowering the speed limit, but nothing has been done yet. "I'm worried about having a lot of heavy traffic,"

Sison confided. "I would like to avoid accidents." A natural reaction to a preventable problem by a man devoted to the health and well-being of a community.

Plans are being made for an open house of the Sison Professional Building after completion of downstairs offices is final.

School Board Reaffirms Busing Policies on Walking Distances

After recent concern over walking distances and transportation policies for the School District of Kewaskum, some confusion developed as to what the board meant by a "return to original policies."

In a motion "to reaffirm the policies on walking distances" approved Monday night by a full board, students who had been walking to pick-up points within the maximum half-mile limit would again be doing so with board sanction. Bus drivers ignoring this policy by extending "special favors" would be investigated according to promises made by John Tessar of the board's transportation committee.

For the Roger Reif family, a return to "original route" plans would mean pick-up at their home after the cessation of a temporary rerouting which meant a walk "just over two-tenths of a mile" for the past "six or seven school days." Their situation will have been reviewed by committee Wednesday morning, along with requests made by several of the other

half-dozen parents in attendance at Monday night's board meeting.

Committee member John Tessar said he didn't "blame people one bit for complaining" about practices only recently brought to his attention concerning individual drivers making exceptions to board policy. James Oelhafen indicated that buses are routed "to run them as economically as possible." Supt Floyd Brenholt commented that decisions on individual cases were, he felt, made "on the basis of the safety of the children."

Social worker David Schroeder, employed by the Kewaskum schools for more than a year, was released from his contract effective Feb. 28. Accompanied by a letter from his attorney and a specific release from renewal of his contract, Schroeder requested a release "for personal reasons." Although his name remained on the list of contracts approved for reissuance, Schroeder plainly in-

dicated his waiver of any further "rights to renewal."





I hope this has provided a clearer explanation of my Thank you for situation.



First Robin



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Vocational Education Found in Many Areas at Kewaskum High School

Vocational education at Kewaskum High School is found in many areas of the school with basic industrial arts and home economics a part of the Junior High curriculum. This is followed by sequence courses in all areas. There are 215 students in Graphic Arts I, II and III, where students start with black and white photography and the fundamentals of printing. This is followed by the use of the offset and letterpress printing. Graphics has been a very popular course and has lead to a career for many students.

The Home Economics de-

partment has courses in Beginning Foods, Advanced Foods, Beginning Clothing to Advanced Clothing - Synthetics and Wool. Consumer Management is an important area for all students to be prepared in. Housing and Home Furnishings, Child Development, Human Relations and Single Living, complete the list of courses in this area and serves 518 students.

The Business Education department starts with Basic Business and Personal Typing. Many students take advantage of the Bookkeeping course, Typing I and Typing II. The newest course in the department is Clerical Office Practice - a two hour course designed to prepare young people for working in a business office. This is one area in which students are prepared to go directly to a job. There are 297 students in Business Education. We have had more demands for graduates in this area than we have been able to fill.

Agriculture is available to students for all four years with preparation in soils, plants, and animal husbandry plus farm shop skills with farm management as a cap-


stone course. Farming or agri-business is the career goal for 124 students.

The Industrial Arts department is the largest area in the vocational wing. Students take courses in Drafting I II, Woods I and II, Metals I, II and III, Architectural Drawing, Industrial Synthetics, Power Mechanics, Electricity I and II, Welding and Auto Mechanics, which also has given the student hands on experience in body work. Building Trades is the newest addition to the curriculum and is designed to give the student a background in


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frame construction and building trades. There are 682 students taking advantage of the Industrial Arts courses.


