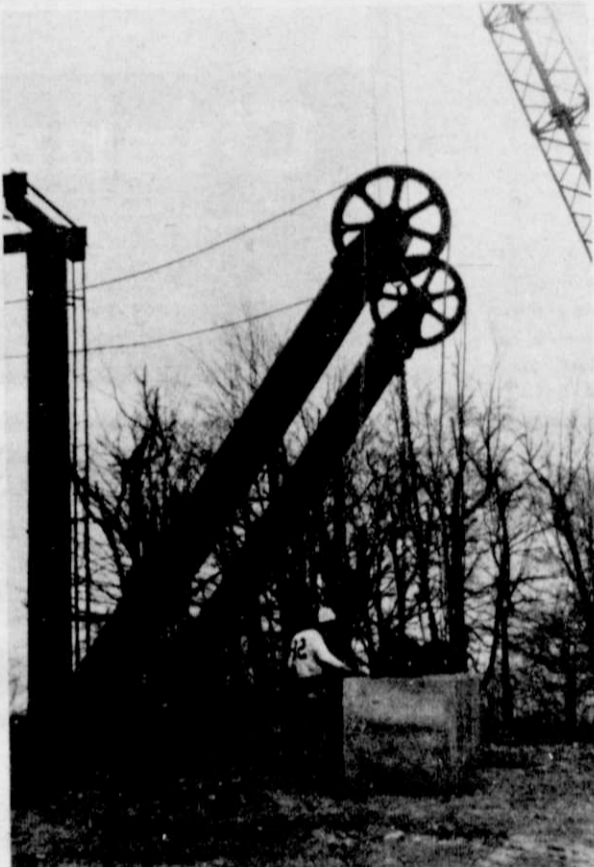

Riedel Speaks to New Kewaskum United Way Board

On Feb. 27 John Riedel, Executive Director of Fond du Lac United Way, met with the Kewaskum Area United Way Board of Directors. John has had great success in directing the Fond du Lac organization's activities. Many items were discussed relative to the subjects of campaign organization, soliciting agencies, pledging procedures, publicity, and budgeting.

President Jerry Stollenwerk announced major committee assignments. Jim Reigle and Lem Rosenheimer will be co-chairmen of the 1978 Fund Drive and Wayland Tesar will be Budget Director.

The United Way is a plan for soliciting and distributing funds to charitable organizations and agencies located primarily in the Kewaskum area and Washington County. The monies received for the organization's initial Fund Drive planned for September of this year will be distributed in 1979. Therefore, area residents should look upon the charity fund drives for the balance of this year like they have in the past.

Agencies and groups who have in the past solicited in the area are invited to apply for recognition and endorsement in order to be included in the funds distribution. Requests should be submitted to Budget Director Tassar. Application will then be sent to the requesting organizations.

Car Accidents Result in 2 Deaths

A rural Kewaskum woman and a Campbellsport man were killed in separate car accidents the past week.

Shirley Backhaus, 47, of St. Michaels, R. 3, Kewaskum, died of injuries she received on Sunday when the car in which she was a passenger was hit nearly head-on by a vehicle driven by Morris Cook, 40 of Grafton. The accident happened on State 33, about one-half mile east of the Washington - Ozaukee County line near Newburg.

The driver of the car in which Mrs. Backhaus was riding was her husband, Gerald Backhaus. Their daughter, Christine, 17, was also a passenger in the car. All were taken to St. Alphonsus Hospital in Port Washington.

According to the Wisconsin State Patrol, the mishap occurred around 8:00 p. m. Cook was traveling east when he crossed the center line, side-swiped a vehicle driven by Hildegard Haefler, 61, of Juneau and struck the west-bound Backhaus auto almost

head on.

Haefler, and her husband, Roman, 61, were taken to St. Alphonsus Hospital, then treated and released.

Cook was also taken to St. Alphonsus Hospital and a passenger in his car, his daughter, Sherry, 14, was taken to Children's Hospital in Milwaukee.

Another fatal traffic accident early Friday morning, March 3, on County Trunk V, just south of Eden, took the life of Patrick J. Garvey, 32, of 400 S. Helena St., Campbellsport.

Garvey, driver of the vehicle, died of massive head injuries sustained in the accident. According to the police report, he was thrown from the vehicle as it left the road and overturned. A passing motorist notified authorities of the mishap around 2:25 a. m.

Garvey was a partner in the McEssy - Garvey law firm of Campbellsport. His wife is the former Margaret Twohig of Campbellsport.

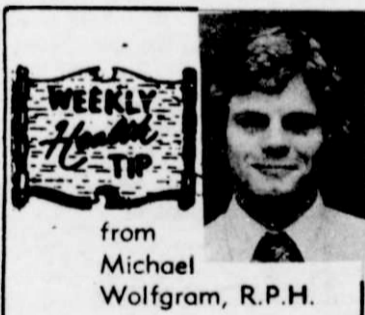
the long run costs less than the other one and would serve our purposes better than the cheaper one." Monroe Machine of Menomonee Falls had their bid of \$2,565 accepted unanimously.

The chlorinators at the wastewater treatment facilities will receive new housing as soon as spring weather permits the laying of a six-foot square slab. A fiberglass building at a cost of \$1,967 was chosen instead of an alternative one of steel for \$1,608 due to highly corrosive nature of chlorine as explained by Peter Albers. Albers said the building would also have storage space for scales used to measure the chlorine used daily.

In an age when inflation moves the cost of most everything in an upward spiral, the Village of Kewaskum will be getting the same fireworks package that it had last year at the same price it paid last year. The Spielbauer Co. will sell the display for \$980 if Kewaskum detonates the devices. "A fellow just (isn't) used to buying anything at the same price as last year," Raynor Herring said, expressing the general feeling of the board.

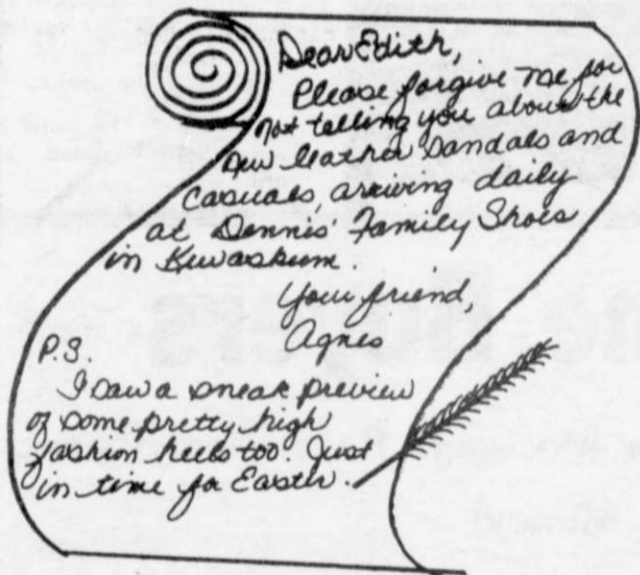

MILWAUKEE — "There was only one college graduate in my high school class and he died," Hattie Cushinery, one of the 21 graduates in Kewaskum High School's Class of 1947, said. So Mrs. Cushinery has set out to fill the void.

She's working on a degree through the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee Off-Campus Instructional program. She's been going to school since 1975 and has 38 credits towards the 120 she needs to graduate. "I'm going to major in English for sure," she said, "and philosophy, maybe."

She married Sam Cushinery six months after she graduated from high school and raised a family of five children who now range in age from "18 to 30 or thereabouts." Family and work responsibilities left little time for other things. But the children grew up and Mrs. Cushiner found she had time for activities outside home and employment. She took some business courses at Milwaukee Area Technical College and then some at Waukesha Technical Institute. Then she discovered the UWM Off-Campus Instructional Program.

"I always loved school," she said, "but I couldn't afford to go after high school." But now she's going, taking two courses each term and plugging away at a degree. "It changed my life," she said. "It's made it much more interesting and sometimes more hectic." School has also, she says, given her

"an expanded outlook and opened my mind to new ideas and new perspectives."

This term she's taking a course in World Religions and Survey of American Literature, both of which she says she enjoys. Her favorite courses so far have been Inner Worlds and Visions of Women in Contemporary Literature and a Community Seminar in Popular Fiction. "And I loved a course I took in mythology and another one in Shakespeare."

In the future she plans to take "more English, more philosophy, more sociology, some cultural geography, anthropology and some atmospheric sciences or meteorology and geological sciences," she said rattling them off like a kid choosing treats in a candy store.

Mrs. Cushinery said she likes the convenience of going to school in the neighborhood. She lives at 8925 W. Adler, Milwaukee, and has been able to take courses in Wauwatosa, West Allis and New Berlin. "After you work all day, it's nice not to have to drive 15 miles," said the employee of Velvac, Inc. in New Berlin. "I like the off-campus program because I don't like driving at night, especially around the East Side because I don't know that side of town." She said she had taken one course on campus and had enjoyed it because she was able to take the U-Bus to and from class. She added that she was glad the off-campus program was beginning to offer more

upper level courses in her neighborhood.

For Mrs. Cushinery going to school is a joy. "I'm not going to change jobs or anything," she said. "I'm just going because I like school." At night instead of watching television she either hustles off to class or shuts herself away and reads and studies. "I'm very particular about what I watch on television," she said. "Learning is so much more fun."

Jan Koch to Present DAR Program on 'Surgeon's Quarters'

On Thursday, March 16 at 1:15 p.m., the Joseph Marest Chapter, DAR will meet at the home of Mrs. Charles Cecil, 125 University Dr., West Bend. Mrs. John McCutcheon Powell will be co-hostess for the meeting.

The program "Surgeon's Quarters" will be presented by a DAR member from Kewaskum, Mrs. Harry Koch.

The Surgeon's Quarters is the only remaining building of historic Fort Winnebago (1828-1854), located on Hwy. 33, three miles east of Portage.

Surgeon's Quarters overlooks the site where Louis Joliet and Father Jacques Marquette left the Fox River at the east end of Wauona Trail in 1673.

In 1828 soldiers came to erect Fort Winnebago, the middle link in a chain of three forts along the Fox-Wisconsin waterway. Francois LeRoi operated a portaging business; his house, built between 1819 and 1822, is now known as Surgeon's Quarters. The U.S. Government bought the home for medical offices.

Surgeon Lyman Foote arrived at Fort Winnebago in 1834. He was probably the first doctor to occupy the house; his predecessors had been quartered in the Fort itself. After Foote's five year

tenure, the Surgeon's Quarters became the home of Surgeon C.H. Laub, who remained until the last garrison left in 1845.

The buildings and property were ordered sold in December 1853. Jefferson Davis, who had been a young lieutenant in the first garrison, was Secretary of War at that time.

After the evacuation of Fort Winnebago, the house was occupied by a succession of families. The interior was cut up into several smaller rooms in place of the original four; chimneys and fireplaces were removed.

In 1937 the Wisconsin Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, bought the only remaining building of Fort Winnebago and began its restoration. Following War Department plans which had been used in the remodeling of 1834, four rooms were located and partitions restored. Fireplace locations were determined from the old foundations and footings and were rebuilt. Pine logs, squared and hewn with axes, form the outer walls; the floor and ceiling joists are hand hewn tamarack poles. Much of the original flooring is still in place. The walls are plastered over hand sawn

and hand hewn lath, a portion of which has been left exposed. Surgeon's Quarters was opened in 1954.

It is furnished with authentic pieces, some of which were actually in Fort Winnebago. The surgeon's room has the old fort hospital operating table and two desks built by soldiers. The wooden eagle which surmounted the Fort gate surveys the room from one of the desks. Visitors see a collection of old medical books, surgeon's equipment of the time, plans and record of the Fort, and furnishings of the day.

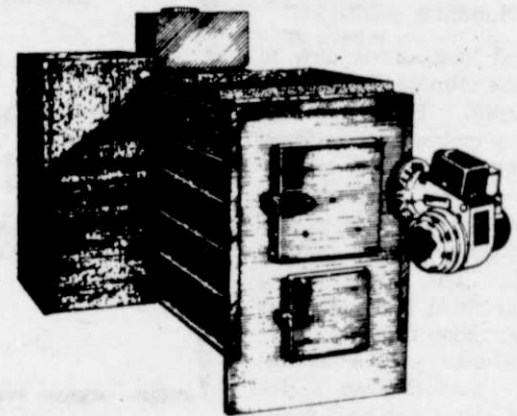
Located next to the Surgeon's Quarters is the Garrison School, used continuously from 1850 to 1960.

The three objectives of the Daughters of the American Revolution are historical preservation, educational and patriotic service. These aims are evinced in the restoration and maintenance of historic Surgeon's Quarters, the only remaining building of Fort Winnebago.

It is open to visitors from May through October.

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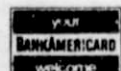
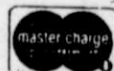
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Designate Mar. 12-18 Girl Scout Week

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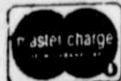
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Minutes of Village Board Meeting

Midmonthly Meeting

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin met in midmonthly session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building.

President Pro Tem Gregor Nigh presided in the absence of Charles Miller. All other Trustee members were present.

Three errors were noted in the minutes of the February 6 meeting as follows:

1. Paragraph 28 — Trustee Schmidt had received a telephone call from Tom Blotz of the DNR, not a letter.

2. Paragraph 29 — The Village Board was not asked to draft an ordinance with reference to sidewalk construction but will be consulted on the subject.

3. Second last paragraph — The motion authorizing the payment of all bills was made by Trustee Herriges and seconded by Trustee Danielsen.

In all other respects the minutes of the February 6 meeting were approved as printed. Motion by Trustee Schmidt, seconded by Trustee Herriges. Unanimous vote.

Peter Albers, Waste Water Treatment Plant Operator, reported that a prebuilt building to house the small chlorination tanks at the plant would cost approximately \$1,900.00. No action was taken.

Supt. Bilgo was authorized to get quotations for a dump box for the 1973 Chevrolet truck chassis.

Eugene Bohn, the village's insurance agent, suggested that the village increase their burglary insurance coverage as follows: 1. Misc. small tools, increase from \$500.00 to \$1,000.00; 2. Contents in

the lower control room at the waste water treatment plant, increase coverage by \$3,000.00; 3. Contents at the old incinerator room, increase coverage by \$2,000.00; 4. Contents at the new fire station, increase coverage by \$2,000.00. The annual increase for this coverage would be \$156.00. 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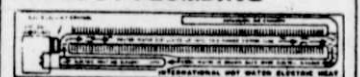

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Whitewater Sectional Next Indians Defeat Campbellsport and Sheboygan Falls for Regional Title

Kewaskum's surprising Indians won the WIAA Class B Regional tournament which they hosted Thursday and Saturday evenings, March 2 and 4, with victories over Campbellsport and Sheboygan Falls.

The Falls Falcons beat Kiel in the Regional opener here Thursday, 57-49. Both schools are of the Packerland Conference and had split two games during the season. In the nightcap Kewaskum won over Campbellsport of the Flyway Conference, 68-62, to avenge an earlier setback when the Indians faced them without high scoring Mark Tessar.

Thus Falls and Kewaskum advanced to the Regional finals Saturday and in a nip and tuck battle, in which the scor-

ces again bearing out the strength of the Scenic loop.

Free throws decided the issue in the Regional opener with Campbellsport. The Indians outscored the Cougars at the free throw line, 22-10, in recording a 68-62 victory.

Kewaskum, which stopped the Falcons with a zone defense, held a six point lead at 51-45 with three minutes to go. The Indians also had the ball. However, they missed the front half of bonus free throws three times down the stretch.

The final miss by Tessar came with 20 seconds left. Falls got the rebound but Brian Meyers missed a last second shot from the free throw circle to preserve Kewaskum's win.

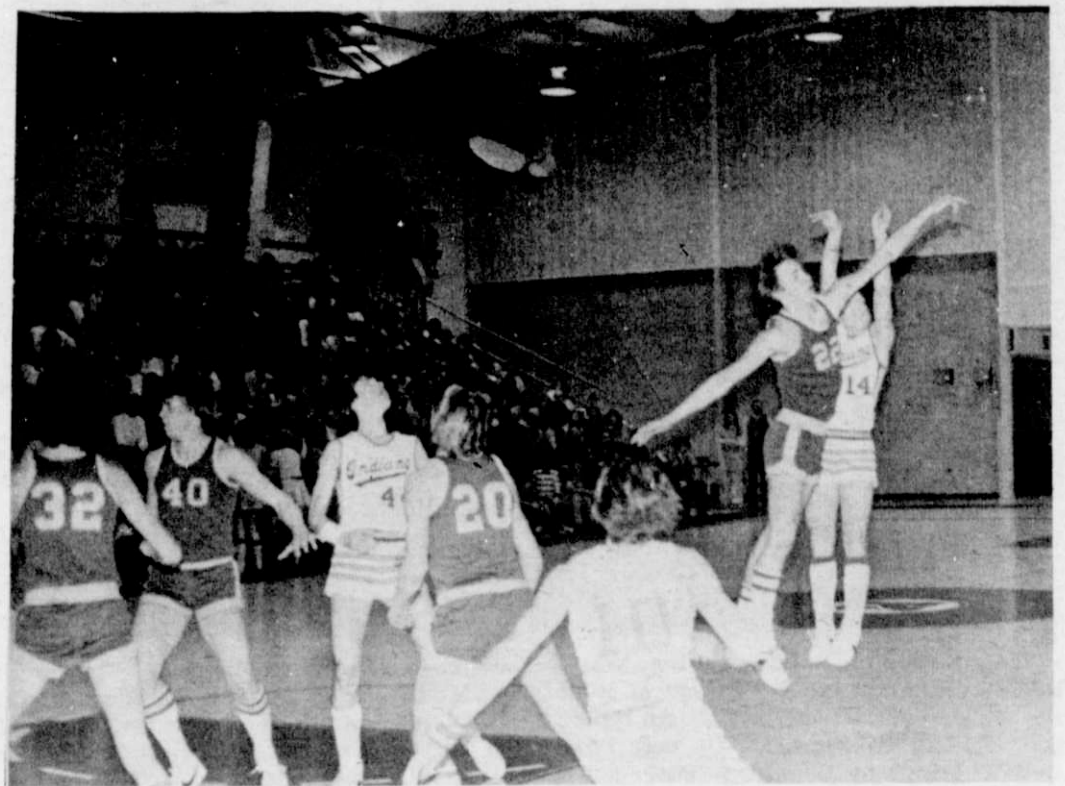
