Final Draft of Revised Zoning Ordinance Ready for Public Debut

Village Board members were told Monday night that the final draft of the revised Zoning Ordinance is ready for its public debut.

April 3, before the next regular meeting of the board, there will be a public hearing of the revisions which were eighteen months in the making. Commissioner William Martin explained that Kewaskum's Plan Commission, headed by Richard Zarling, worked with Roland Tonn from the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission (S.E.W.R.P.C.) to "tone down the restrictions" on lot size and building regulations in the old code. With approximately half the number of pages as the old ordinance, provisions are included relating to "Commercial Establishments Dealing in Pornographic Materials." Based on a similar work in Richfield, the zoning regulations deal with specific areas where such materials are limited by spatial regulations. The public is invited to a hearing on the revised Zoning Ordinance beginning at 7:30 p. m. Monday, April 3.

John Kratz of the Kewaskum Malting Company was on hand to explain and answer questions concerning the amount of wastewater credited to his quarterly billings. Although he claimed he was paying too much for the amount of actual water used in malt production, Pete Albers reminded him that he had been notified "two years ago" about faulty mains and a broken manhole which allowed runoff water to flow through Kratz' meter. Prompt action was asked by the board in repairing the leaks, and Kratz promised he would do so, "checking into it" on Tuesday.

A used set of Motorola mobile radios was brought to the board's attention by Angie Bilgo. A base unit and five mobile outfits for truck installation are available through the Valley Bank, handling a sale from the original, two-year owner Clark's Tree Service. The board voted unanimously to purchase the units.

Daniel Schmidt told the board that eleven frames for picnic tables for the new park were ready. The FFA at the high school had welded the frames and carpentry classes will be filling in the board work.

William Martin announced that S.E.W.R.P.C. Data Processing Manager John Ernst

told him that the commission would be able to handle Kewaskum's computer billing for water and wastewater. "Something simple and to the point" is expected to be drawn up by their "experts," and Ernst will reply by letter within a week or so. It is expected the program would cost less than if a private data-processing firm were to handle it. Second quarter of this year if set-up could be agreed upon soon.

A remodeling permit was ordered issued to Richard Ellis, 712 Memorial Drive, "upon payment of proper fees," and an additional permit was issued to a request not formally on the agenda. Regal Ware received permission to replace a metal warehouse on their grounds and add on a die-casting "foundry."

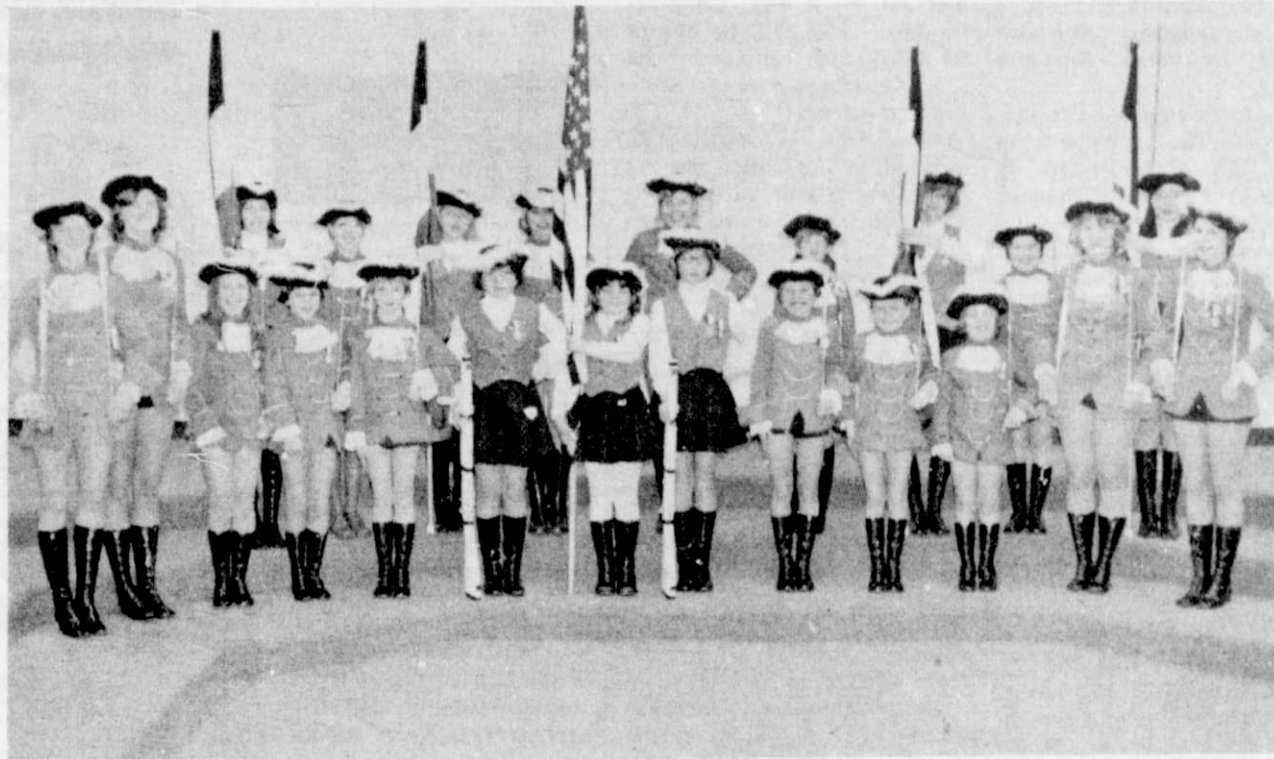

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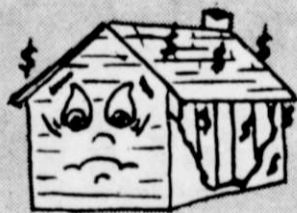

Visitor From England Speaks at Farmington School

KEWASKUM (Special) - - -

"Generally, we're the same people," Christine Webb of Plymouth, England, recently explained to children at the Farmington Elementary School

A visitor to the school and to the United States, Miss Webb graciously shared her homeland with the youngsters and answered their questions. She distributed coins and one and five "pound notes" to the small groups who sat around her as she explained the British monetary system. Although the samples were not for keeping, everyone understood that a pound is equal to about \$2 in American currency.

An explanation of British geography revealed that Wisconsin is larger, colder and snowier than the whole of Great Britain. Chris described it as "a country sort of place" with few really large cities.

In terms of hours, she said it would take about fourteen hours to travel by car from the northernmost point in Scotland to the southern tip of the island country.

Questions about Miss Webb's family revealed that she is the daughter of a railroad-worker, and her mother works for a local school. She is the oldest of three girls, and she works in the office of an insurance company in Plymouth. Although they live only three hours from London, Chris said that they have rarely traveled to that city.

Even London, she said, has a much slower pace of life than most areas she visited in America's midwest. There aren't so many "fast-food" chains — she's never seen a McDonald's restaurant there — and people aren't as interested in political participation as they are here.

"We eat a lot of vegetables in England, as opposed to a lot of meat," she explained, due to the cost of different commodities there. And not very many people own automobiles in Plymouth because of taxes and the cost

of "petrol" (gasoline). A gallon of gas costs the equivalent of \$1.60 in our money.

The difference in our educational systems was explained as being based upon series of tests given at the ages of 11, 16 and 18. Not all have the option of attending universities, and many begin technical-based training after the test at age sixteen.

"Oh, I like it!" Chris Webb said of America. She seemed to have only one regret: "I never did get to visit Plymouth," Plymouth, Wisconsin, that is.

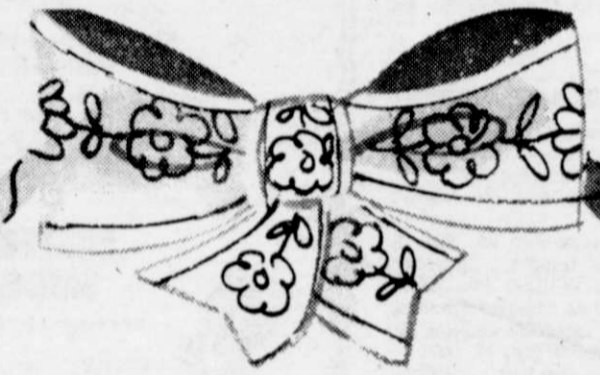
An "informational voters forum" was held at the Farmington Elementary School for the purpose of introducing the candidates for the Kewaskum Board of Education election on April 4.

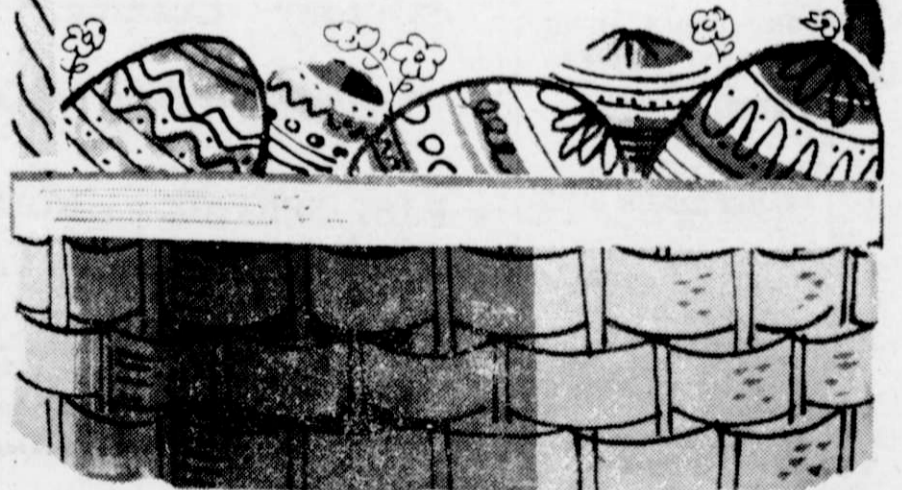

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building.

The President Charles F. Miller presided. Trustee David Nigh had asked to be excused and was absent. All other Trustee members were present.

The minutes of the meeting of February 20th were approved as printed. Motion by Trustee Herriges, seconded by Trustee Danielsen. Unanimous vote.

President Miller presented the following proclamation to the representatives of the Kewaskum Junior Women's Club:

PROCLAMATION

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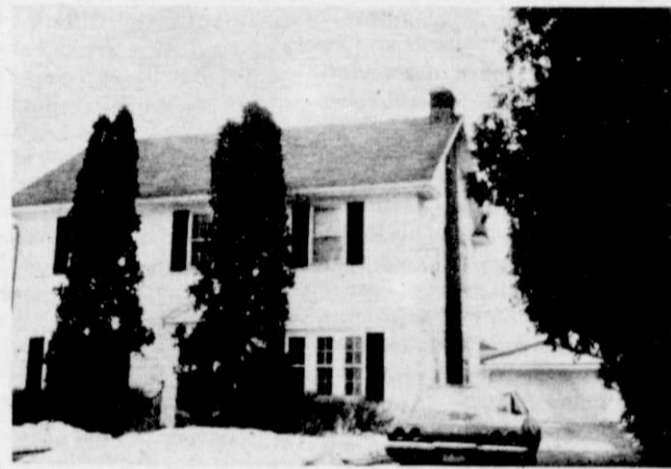

Protect Yourself

- When a thunderstorm threatens, get inside a home or large building, or inside an all-metal (not convertible) vehicle.
- Inside a home, avoid using the telephone, except for emergencies.
- If outside, with no time to reach a safe building or an automobile, follow these rules:
 - Do not stand underneath a natural lightning rod such as a tall, isolated tree in an open area.
 - Avoid projecting above the surrounding landscape, as you would do if you were standing on a hilltop, in an open field, on the beach, or fishing from a small boat.
 - Get out of and away from open water.
 - Get away from tractors and other metal farm equipment.
 - Get off of and away from motorcycles, scooters, golf carts and bicycles. Put down golf clubs.
 - Stay away from wire fences, clotheslines, metal pipes, rails and other metallic paths which could carry lightning to you from some distance away.
 - Avoid standing in small isolated sheds or other small structures in open areas.
 - In a forest, seek shelter in a low area under a thick growth of small trees. In open areas, go to a low place such as a ravine or valley. **Be alert for flash floods.**
 - If you're hopelessly isolated in a level field or prairie and you feel your hair stand on end—indicating lightning is about to strike—drop to your knees and bend forward putting your hands on your knees. Do not lie flat on the ground.

TORNADO SAFETY RULES

When you receive word of a tornado warning for your area, you should take immediate shelter. Seek inside shelter if possible. If in the open, move away from a tornado's path at a right angle. If there is not time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or ravine.

In homes with basements, seek refuge near the basement wall in the most sheltered and deepest below ground part of the basement. Additional protection is afforded by taking cover under heavy furniture or a workbench.

Mobile homes are particularly vulnerable to overturning and destruction during strong winds, and should be abandoned in favor of a preselected shelter, or even a ditch in the open. Damage can be minimized by securing the trailer with cables anchored in concrete footing.

Personal preparations should include availability of a battery-operated radio, in case of power loss; knowledge of safety rules and how to tell if a tornado or severe thunderstorm is approaching; and change of family plans in order to remain near shelter during a severe local storm threat.
