Projected Enrollment Up School Board Considers Additional Staffing

Discussion of the state's Department for Handicapped Children Site Review report continued at Monday night's school board meeting.

Richard Zarling, Director of Elementary Education and acting Director of Special Education, submitted a summary of "Site Review Team Recommendations." Emphasizing the importance of filling vacancies, Floyd Brenholt told board members that the Special Education department lacked a speech therapist and a half-time teacher qualified to work with children who are emotionally disturbed. The review team completed the report prior to the resignation of the school social worker, and that position is still unfilled since March 1.

Zarling emphasized the need for expanding the elementary level Educable Mentally Retarded program. He said that this year's enrollment at 16 was already "one over" the state set maximum of 15, and next year's list includes 17 children ranging in age from 5½ to 13. "It's just too much," Zarling said.

Another key recommenda-

tion of the team and Zarling was for the hiring of at least a half-time "fully certified and qualified Director of Special Education." "I wish to be relieved of my added responsibility of Program Designee for the 1978-79 school year," Zarling asked, "based upon the heavy demands of administering the Special Education programming." Brenholt asked the members of the board to consider Zarling's report and recommendations and to prepare any questions before the next meeting April 10. Voting on the requests is expected to come in April.

The board decided in favor of granting Clark Pearson's request for two half-time teachers at the high school: one to be added to the business education department and an intern to handle two art classes each semester.

Charles Ogi questioned the methods presently used in hiring new teachers, and Pearson broke down the system for the board. Most principals are relied upon to do the bulk of the investigation and interview work necessary, with about five people finally being interviewed for each position. Zarling added that the entire process usually spans at least a three-week period. Ogi said he had received a call from "someone in business" who would like to share his ideas about hiring with Pearson. Ogi said he would "send him over."

Discussion of adequate ventilation for the chemistry room and some remodeling possibilities for KCHS brought no action, but all board members agreed that ventilation should have pri-

ority in next year's budget. More information is needed before action can be taken to secure bids. Remodeling and repositioning of the library, art room and the 700 area of the high school could hinge on enrollment figures.

Clark Pearson said that without allowing for drop-outs or growth from new housing, the number of high school students could drop to 672 in 10 years from the projected increased figure of 820 for the 1978-79 school year. "I can see us keen growing," Pearson said in anticipation of general population growth in the Kewaskum area.

Floyd Brenholt said that the kindergarten enrollment was up considerably after this year's "kindergarten round-up." He asked that the board be considering the hiring of a half of full time teacher depending upon "how the board decides to combine or not combine" the students.

Brenholt emphasized that "the need has increased, and continues to increase each year" for some additional administrative staff. He asked that the members of the board consider the needs of Kewaskum and not judge the situation "on people's objections to large administrative staffs when that obviously does not apply to us." A comparison was made between Kewaskum and another school district with the "pupil-administrator ratio" of Kewaskum being 372.7 to 1 and the other district, not considered to have an excessive amount of administrators, having a ratio of only 187.5 to 1.

Tuesday, April 4, is Spring Election Day in Wisconsin.

Locally ballots will be cast for village trustees, school board members, a village referendum, county supervisor, justice of the supreme court, court of appeals judges, county judge and a state referendum.

Facsimile ballots appear on pages 15, 16 and 17 of this issue. The facsimile ballot for the school board election was published in last week's issue.

There are four candidates for the three village trustee posts. They are incumbents Robert Danielsen and Raynor Herriges, and newcomers Donald Mlodzik and Merle Miller.

The six candidates for the three school board posts are incumbents Charles J. Ogi, James D. Oelhafen and Jean E. Goeden, together with Geraldine Flynn, Gerald F. Stollenwerk and Maryanne Merwin.

The village referendum question to be voted on is as follows: "Should all Village residents and Businesses be required to install sidewalks?"

For county supervisor there will be a race in District 9, Town of Kewaskum, and Town of Wayne, where incumbent John A. Oelhafen will be opposed by Harold Westerman. In District No. 10 Town of Kewaskum and Village of Kewaskum incumbent Charles Miller will be unopposed, as will Norbert Dettmann in District 11, Town of Farmington and Town of Trenton.

Candidates for Justice of the Supreme Court are John L. Coffey and James W. Rice.

For Court of Appeals, District II, 6-year term Clair H. Voss is unopposed, 4-year term candidates are John G. Buchen and Richard S. Brown and 2-year term candidates are Harold M. Bode and James W. Rector.

James B. Schwalbach is unopposed for County Judge, Branch I.

The state referendum question is: "Shall section 23 of article IV of the constitution be amended to allow that there be more than one system of town government?"

Lee Honeck, Businessman, Dies Suddenly

Leander (Lee) Honeck, 63, owner of Lee Honeck Farm Supply of Kewaskum, was pronounced dead on arrival at St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, Friday, March 24, of an apparent heart attack suffered at his place of business.

He was born Jan. 17, 1915, in the Town of Barton to the late Killian and Emma Stark Honeck. On Nov. 15, 1947, he married Ione Petri at Holy Trinity, Kewaskum.

He served in the U. S. Army in World War II from 1942 to 1946. He was a member of Bonau-Whereatt Post 69, American Legion, Mayville, and of the 40 et 8 Dodge County Chapter. He was also a member of the Kewaskum Fire Department since 1933 and the Modern Woodmen.

Lee trucked cattle and then went into business more than 20 years ago, selling snowmobiles, rototillers, outboard motors and small farm machinery.

He is survived by his wife; one brother, Killian (Janice) Honeck and one sister, Mrs. Loraine (Gilbert) Korth, both of Kewaskum; four brothers-in-law; six sisters-in-law; nieces, nephews, other relatives and friends.

Visitation was at Miller's Funeral Home, Kewaskum, after 4 p. m. Monday, with complete services at 8:30 p. m. Monday at the funeral home, Rev. Darrell Joiner officiating. Burial services were held at 10 a. m. Tuesday at the new Holy Trinity Cemetery, with military rites conducted by Robert G. Romaine Post 384, American Legion.

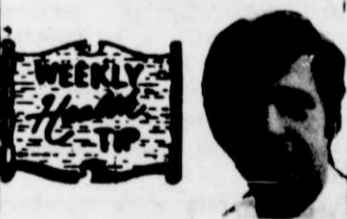

Sheriff Issues Warning About Marketing Scheme

Sheriff Clarence A. Schwartz has issued a warning to Washington County consumers about a telephone marketing scheme which purports to sell government surplus supplies. The scheme has been operating recently in the state, with most targets being government institutions, small businesses and educational, religious or social groups which could need office supplies.

Schwartz said the contact is made by persons who imply that they are calling from Washington, D.C., giving the impression that they are with some official federal governmental agency by using such names as "Federal Government Surplus Dispensing Agency."

The person contacted is told that office supplies such as felt-tip pens, pencils, cassette tapes, etc. can be purchased at vastly reduced or surplus prices which are now available because of federal funding cutbacks made to government programs.

Traditionally, said Schwartz, these firms refuse to give a phone number which can be called for verification. Recently, firms have been giving a Washington, D.C., telephone number, but it is only an answering service which

relays a callback message to a California office.

The supplies are usually shipped from a California supplier which has no connection with any federal government agency. Schwartz said it is frequently discovered that the so-called "surplus price" is not in fact cheaper than that of retail office supply dealers. He urged businesses and organizations to alert staff members who

might receive such solicitations to exercise caution before authorizing any orders. Incidents of the scheme should be reported to the Department of Justice Office of Consumer Protection, the sheriff said.

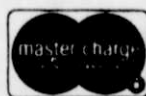

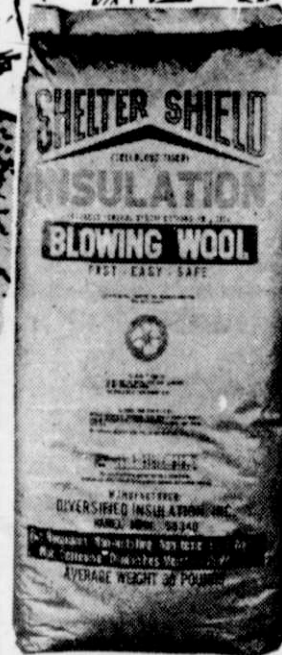

Peanut Spice Cake—An Inviting Dessert

PEANUT SPICE CAKE

2 cups unsifted flour
2-1/2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg
1/4 teaspoon cloves
1/2 cup margarine, softened



1 cup sugar
2 eggs
1/3 cup molasses
1 cup milk
1/2 cup chopped Planters Cocktail Peanuts
Cream Cheese Frosting (recipe below)
2 tablespoons chopped Planters Cocktail Peanuts

Sift flour, baking powder, soda, salt, cinnamon, nutmeg and cloves together. Set aside.

In large bowl, cream margarine and sugar together. Add eggs; beat well. Blend in molasses. Add dry ingredients alternately with milk, beating until well blended. Stir in 1/2 cup peanuts. Pour

into greased and floured 10-inch tube pan.

Bake at 375° F. 45 minutes or until done. Cool in pan for 10 minutes. Remove from pan and complete cooling on wire rack. When completely cooled frost top with Cream Cheese Frosting (recipe below) and garnish with 2 tablespoons chopped peanuts. Makes one 10-inch cake.

Cream Cheese Frosting: In small mixer bowl cream 1 package (3-ounce) cream cheese, 2 tablespoons margarine and 1 teaspoon vanilla extract together. Gradually add 2 cups confectioners' sugar. Beat until creamy and well blended.

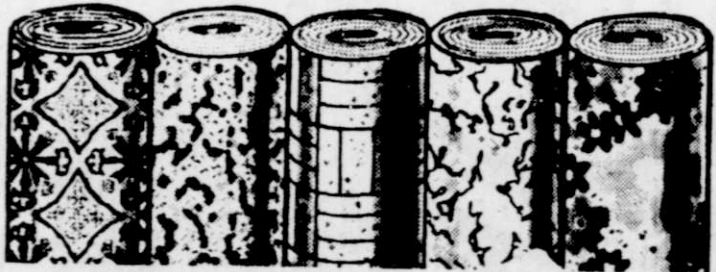

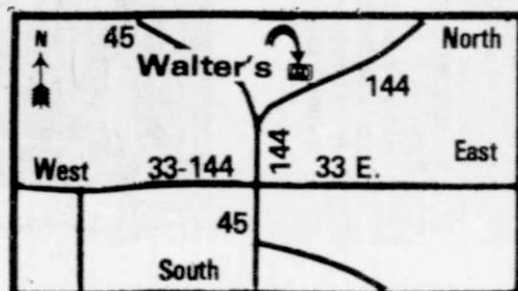

Pruning Apple Trees

When the first sign of spring appears, fruit growers sharpen their pruning tools to be ready for this annual job in the orchard. Pruning fruit trees need not be just a springtime task although it's a popular time for garden work. Pruning can be done anytime during the dormant period or when leaves are off the trees. Late winter or early spring before growth begins seems to be the best. If your trees have been properly trained when young, pruning is much easier and few simple directions are all that's necessary. Trees that have never been trained or pruned may require special consideration.

Here are a few simple rules that will provide direction. Follow them in order given.

1. Cut out all dead, diseased and broken limbs.
2. Cut out all water sprouts. These are the long whip-like branches that came from the trunk and lower large limbs.
3. Cut from the larger limbs those branches that grow toward the center of the tree.
4. If the tree is growing too tall, head the tall upright limbs back. Always make the cut just above a sturdy side branch.
5. Thin out remaining branches if necessary. Cut out the weak spindly branches.

When pruning an older neglected tree, the task is not an easy one. About all that can be done is to remove the dead wood, reduce the height of the tree and try to improve light penetration. The best way to reduce height and improve light penetration is to remove one or more of the large upright growing limbs usually found near the center of the tree. Cut them out where they originate even though they may be six or more inches in diameter. Do little or no detailed pruning until next year.

Roethke Wins Judo Matches

The 1978 Women's Amateur Athletic Union Judo Championship's were held recently at St. Francis High School in St. Francis, Wisconsin.

Lynn Roethke participated in the 134 to 145 pound division. Lynn won all her five minute matches by ippon (full point win). This is the third year in a row that Lynn has captured the Championship.

Winning her division gave her the opportunity to participate in the Grand Championship Award. The Grand Championship is held by competing against each of the champions in the six other divisions. Ms. Roethke fought three other champions and captured the Grand Championship for 1978.

Her toughest match was against Linda Richerdson from Judo, Inc. Linda is the 1977 Grand Champion for Wisconsin. She also holds numerous national awards and even placed in the British Open which is an international tournament.

Lynn won the match against Ms Richerdson within one minute of the start. She threw Linda with the throw O-Soto-Gari (major outer reaping throw).

Lynn's winning of the 145 pound class allows her to compete in the National AAU Judo Tournament which will be held in Chicago, Illinois on April 14th and 15th.

Statement on Ice Age Reserve set

A final Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) on the proposed Ice Age National Scientific Reserve Master Plan, prepared by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, is now available for public review and comment.

Three public hearings to solicit the views and comments of the public on the EIS are scheduled for 10:30 a.m. on the following dates and locations.

April 4, in the council chambers of the Plymouth City Hall, Plymouth; April 5, in the County Board room of the

Chippewa County Courthouse, Chippewa Falls, and April 7, in the County Board room of the Sauk County Courthouse, Baraboo.

The EIS, released on Feb. 28th of this year, outlines the existing environment of and the proposed plans for the Ice Age Reserve, and assesses the major impacts of the proposal.

Included in the proposed Ice Age National Scientific Reserve is the establishment of nine separate units across the state which include the 80-acre Sheboygan Marsh Unit and the 20,340-acre Kettle Moraine Unit near Plymouth; the 3,659-acre Campbellsport Drumlins Unit near Campbellsport; the 160-acre Cross Plains Unit near Cross Plains; the 9,810-acre Devil's Lake State Park Unit near Baraboo; the 875-acre Mill Bluff Park Unit near Camp

Douglas; the 4,000-acre Chippewa Moraine Unit near Bloomer; and the Interstate Park Unit near St. Croix Falls.

Copies of the EIS are available for public review at the DNR main office at 4610 University Avenue, Madison and at DNR District, Area and Park offices in Spooner, Rhinelander, Eau Claire, Milwaukee, Waunakee-Madison, Dodgeville, Oshkosh, Black River Falls, Menomonie, Baraboo, Hudson and Campbellsport.

Review copies are also available in the county clerks' office in the following counties: Manitowoc, Sheboygan, Fond du Lac, Dane, Sauk, Monroe, Juneau, Chippewa and Polk.

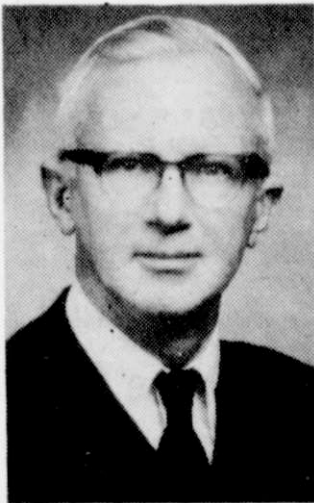

INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

The following instructions are given for the information and guidance of electors:

(a) Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his name and address before receiving the ballot from the ballot clerk. The initials of 2 ballot clerks must appear on the ballot. Upon receiving the ballot, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and mark his ballot. A ballot clerk may inform the elector of the proper manner for marking a ballot, but he shall not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

(b) To vote for a person whose name is printed on the ballot, make a cross (X) or mark in the square after the name of the person for whom you desire to vote. To vote for a person whose name is not printed on the ballot, write the name in the blank space provided for the purpose.

(c) The ballot should not be marked in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than 3 ballots shall be issued to any one elector. Not more than 5 minutes' time shall be allowed to mark the ballot. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

(d) After the official ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed indorsements and ballot clerks' initials on the outside do show. After folding the ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, give his name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him the ballot to be placed in the ballot box, and leave the polling place promptly.

(e) An elector may be assisted by 2 election officials of different political parties in marking the ballot if he declares to the presiding official that he is unable to read or that due to physical disability he is unable to mark his ballot. If an elector declares that he is visually handicapped, he may have anyone assist him in marking his ballot. The presiding official may administer an oath as to a person's disability.

(f) Any qualified elector who is absent, or expects to be absent from the village in which he is a qualified elector, or who, because of sickness or physical disability cannot appear at the polling place on election day, may vote at such election by means of an absent voter's ballot to be secured upon application to the Village Clerk, not more than sixty days and no less than three days, or by personal application, not later than the close of office hours on the day prior to such election.

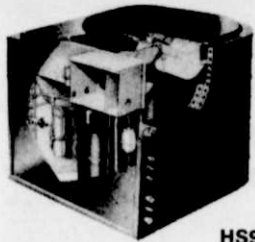

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that at an election to be held in the several towns, wards, villages and election districts of the County of Washington, on the first Tuesday of April, A.D., 1978, being the Fourth day of said month, the following proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Wisconsin, having been approved by two successive legislatures, will be submitted to a vote of the people pursuant to law: 1977 Assembly Joint Resolution 20

Deposited October 13, 1977

Published October 21, 1977

1977 Enrolled Joint Resolution 18

To amend section 23 of article IV of the constitution, relating to town government (2nd consideration).

Whereas, the 1975 legislature in general session proposed an amendment to the constitution by Assembly Joint Resolution 22 (Enrolled Joint Resolution 15) and agreed to it by a majority of the members elected to each of the 2 houses, which amendment reads as follows:

"(Article IV) Section 23. (1) The legislature shall establish but one system of town government, which shall be as nearly uniform as practicable, but the legislature may provide for the election at large once in every 4 years of a chief executive officer in any county with such powers of an administrative character as they may from time to time prescribe in accordance with this section and-

(2) The legislature shall establish one or more systems of county government.

(3) The legislature shall establish one or more systems of town government."

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the assembly, the senate concurring, That the foregoing amendment to the constitution is agreed to by this legislature; and, be it further

Resolved, That the foregoing amendment be submitted to a vote of the people at the election to be held on the first Tuesday of April, 1978; and, be it further

Resolved, That the question of ratification of the foregoing amendment be stated on the ballot as follows:

"Shall section 23 of article IV of the constitution be amended to allow that there be more than one system of town government?"

Explanation

Effect of Ratification.

The constitution presently requires the Legislature to establish but one system of town government which shall be as nearly uniform as practical. There may be variations in the details of government when based on reasonable classifications. Under the present single system, powers of the town are divided between the town meeting, composed of electors; the town board, composed of supervisors; and statutory officers. A 'no' vote on this amendment would retain the single system, powers of the town are divided between the town meeting, composed of electors; the town board, composed of supervisors; and statutory officers. A 'no' vote on this amendment would retain the single system and uniformity requirements. A 'yes' vote would remove the one system and uniformity requirements and permit the Legislature to provide one or more systems. Such systems could utilize some or all of the present components, but could also include components such as town commissioners, a town manager or executive, or others which the Legislature might prescribe by law.

Alternatively, an elector making such declaration may have another elector of the county assist him in marking his ballot or operating a voting machine. 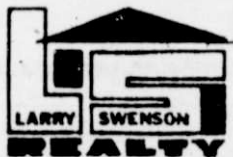

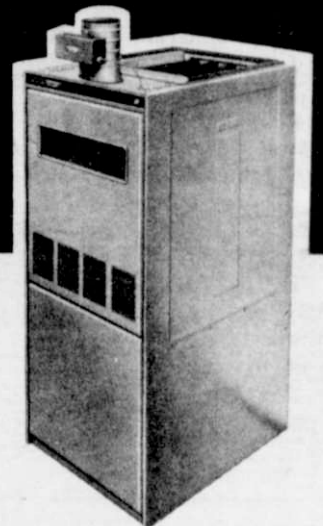
